This is, of course, as it should be as we do not seek out your paper it drops through our letter boxes without invitation. The publication of two letters in last week's paper have alarmed me therefore.

The first letter was written by Mrs Elaine Robson and was essentially a rant directed at a Labour Party candidate in a forthcoming by election. Perhaps one can understand why, as editor, you chose not to suppress it, however personal and offensive the attack. Less easy to understand however was the careless placing of the letter in Friday's paper. It was starkly juxtaposed with election addresses by two other candidates. This, in itself, can be seen as likely to cause harm to the election chances of Mr Peter Davies. Hardly fair! The publication of the second

letter is far more problematic. It was a foul diatribe by Honest John masquerading as a contribution to the debate on the EU prior to the referendum. This is a criminal offence whereby not only the person expressing such views but also the publisher of such material puts themselves at risk of prosecution.

Greenfield Chosen to Represent UK | Far From "Honest"



Greenfield Community College in Newton Aycliffe has been selected to represent the UK in a special education programme to mark the centenary of the Battle of the Somme.

As living memory of what was one of the deadliest battles of the First World War fades, the programme designed by the British Council - aims to raise awareness of the significance of World War One and the importance of UK-France relations in continuing peace and stability in Europe today. Greenfield will forge partnerships with schools in the Somme region in France to allow pupils from both countries to discuss their shared history, build friendships and to commemorate those who lost their lives in the Battle of the Somme, 100 years on. The highlight of the programme will be a face to face workshop for all of the schools involved in July 2016. David Priestley, Executive Headteacher said. "We really value the opportunity education pack for schools

for our young people to take a significant role in the commemoration of such a momentous event from our history

THE EU DEBATE THE MESSAGE ON THE DOORSTEP

In the last few weeks, I have canvassed many residents about the EU and, on the doorstep, I get the following impressions

REMAIN VICTORIES

(1) **The economy**. The British economy – and particularly the North East economy – depends on trade with the EU. We are a member of the biggest free-trading block in the world, and have just renegotiated the best improvements we could to our membership package. Most people accept that it is an obvious nonsense to say that the best thing to do now is to leave ... and then set about re-renegotiating terms

nonsense to say that the best thing to do now is to leave ... and then set about re-renegotiating terms which, as an outsider, would almost certainly be worse. (2) **Rights at work**. The Social Chapter of our EU membership includes many rights and safety benefits for British workers, which will be threatened if we leave the EU. I have yet to meet anyone who believes that Michael Gove and Ian Duncan-Smith want to leave the EU so they can bring in better protections. (3) **Funding**. At a time when our own government is planning to end all grant-funding by 2020, only the EU accepts that County Durham should have funding to meet its social needs. Durham County Council is currently setting up a £17 million project to help the county's 6,000 unemployed young people into work. That money did not come from our own government but from the EU. (4) Cooperation. Not just our trade, but much of our scientific and medical research, our police response

to organised crime, our security response to international terrorism etc. depend on cooperation with other EU countries

(5) Endorsements. President Obama thinks Britain is better in the EU. So do the IMF, the IFS, the Solution scheduler of the reasury, by far the majority of business leaders . . . the list is endless. Brexit supporters include President Putin, Donald Trump and Boris Johnson.

LEAVE VICTORIES

However, in my doorstep discussions, the Remain campaign is being challenged in two areas: (A) **Immigration**. Actually, immigration is irrelevant to the EU debate. We are outside Schengen – we

DO "control our borders". The only place we have open borders is in Ireland, where closing them will wreck the Good Friday agreement. And most people I talk to confess they do not understand how Brexit would affect all the different kinds of immigration – non-EU, free-movement labour, asylum-seekers, refugees, international students. But when the Newton News prints a letter claiming that a Remain vote will see us grabbing our AK47 rifles to fight off fake ISIL refugees, one worries that the Remain campaign is giving ground to Operation 'panic and fear'. (B) **Sovereignty**. Actually, very few of our laws come from Brussels, and it is British businesses

which most assiduously introduce EU regulations (so they can win contracts in EU countries). The internationalisation of our culture, cuisine etc – which so frightens the "we want our country back" brigade – is unconnected in any way to our EU membership. But when the Leader of the Town Council evokes memories of 'Ein Volk, Ein Reich, Ein Fuhrer' one fears the 'Leave' campaign is winning on the biest devoked between the second secon the bigoted nationalism front.

INTO THE FUTURE

All the evidence tells us that younger people generally want to stay in the EU. Of course they do – the only sensible way forward is to embrace our shrinking world, form international partnerships, and move only sensible way for ward is to embrace our similaring world, form international particle sings, and move into the future. Young people are very good at this. But they are bad at voting, and the danger is that the decision will be made for them by people who fear multiculturalism, seek parochialism, and want to turn back the clock to a mythical past they feel they are losing. The full effects of the referendum will only become clear in 20 or 30 years' time, when I will probably be long gone. So – for the future which my grandchildren would wish – I am voting Remain. Batik Workshops at Greenfield Gallery Voting "Remain" Protects Jobs for our Young People

Dear Editor. In response to Bob Fleming's letter which totally misguided in the assumption that he is voting out for his grandchildren. As the Chair of the Board of Trustees of NAYCC (Newton Aycliffe Youth & Community Centre) I Vote 'Remain' for our Young People's future and future apprentices.

I am totally amazed at Bob Fleming's article in the Newton News given his links with the trade union over the years. It is the trade union rights that have come out of the EU that Johnson, Gove and Farage want to destroy. We want the 'Leave' campaign to be straight with you as to what leaving the EU would mean, and how it would impact on the lives of British workers. At Labour IN for Britain, we've launched a petition. We're demanding the Leave campaign come clean with the British public and tell us which vital workers' rights they'd look to scrap if we left the EU.

Many of the employment rights and protection millions people rely upon are safeguarded by EU legislation — but Leave campaigners including Boris Johnson, Chris Grayling, Nigel Farage and Priti Patel & others have suggested they'd strip back our hard-fought rights if they got the chance.

So we want to know: which rights would be scrapped? Maternity Leave? Parental leave? Holiday pay? Equal pay? Given their abject lack of a strategic plan for Brexit, their inability to pay for all of their pledges and their tendency to immediately backtrack when challenged, the 'kippers and the hard-right fringe of the Tory party look increasingly like the Simpsons character Montgomery Burns offering the public a "mystery box" in order to convince them to vote for Brexit.

What's in the box, nobody knows for sure. But the Brexit campaign seem intent on promising everyone that it's going to be exactly what they want it to be, even if that's a multitude of different things to different people. Perhaps one of the most important considerations when being offered a "mystery box" is who is doing the offering, and how much you trust them. How much do you trust a bunch of hard-right Thatcherites to keep their word that they're going to invest in socialist spending like

funding the NHS or saving the steel industry for example My knowledge is that we are much better off in the EU and I could go on with all the good things that have come out of the EU just on the issues under the Social Chapter alone and if people think it will stop immigration then they a badly misled. We then have to look at the number of jobs coming to Britain as a direct result of being a part of the EU we have just got Hitachi to build trains but what of the supply chain how many jobs would the bring to Newton Aycliffe I think that this is too big of a risk to take, we also need to take a look at the new super college being built on the Business Park for our young people to learn engineering skills for the new industries in engineering like Hitachi.

Tony Blair weighed in on the debate over Brexit, warning that leaving the European Union would hit living standards and hit the poorest in society most. The former Prime Minister appears to make an appeal to Labour supporters - seen as an important swing demographic in the vote – in two interventions. Tony Blair laid into the Out campaigns, saying they were

determined on making the debate about immigration because the economic case for staying in has already been settled. His comments come as Vote Leave chiefs sent an open letter to David Cameron, accusing the Tory leader of "corroding public trust" on immigration.

"These people are focussing on immigration because on the economy it is now clear that we will suffer a deep aftershock if we leave the European Union," said Tony Blair in a TV programme with Andrew Marr. He added: "We have got over four decades of these interlocking economic relationships, you break that up and how can anyone argue that you're not going to have a problem afterwards, economically?

"On those running the Leave campaign, he said: "These people say they care about people's living standards and the poorest members of our society; those are the people who are going to suffer."

He warned that the true motives for those who would manage Britain's exit from the EU for wanting to leave would be an anathema for most Labour voters. "The pain is relatively easy to predict. That pain is measured in jobs, living standards, the ue of the money in your pocket," he said.

"The intellectual reasoning behind "leave" is to take us out of that European polity altogether and make us a global outlier. These are the folk who oppose the social chapter of basic employment rights and opposed the minimum wage. Most Labour voters would run a mile from that. These are the very people they have spent a lifetime fighting."

Major New Labour figures are throwing their weight behind the campaign to keep Britain in the EU, with a series of major interventions. Former Chancellor Alistair Darling has warned that a vote to leave the EU could cost the UK £250 billion in lost trade, while Peter Mandelson has hit out at the anti-immigration rhetoric of the Out campaign.

Darling said that pulling out of the single market would introduce greater trade barriers, and that there was no feasible agreement that would be able to give Britain the level of free trade it currently enjoys.

Those wanting to leave the EU want to pull Britain out of the single market, which would mean introducing tariffs and barriers to our trade and putting billions of vital trade at risk," Darling said. "There is no trading arrangement outside the EU that gives us the free trade we rely on today. Leaving would put

Lord Mandelson used an article in the Guardian to accuse Outers of running a campaign that is "a disturbing echo of UKIP". But the New Labour architect said that the focus on immigration simply shows that the Leave campaign has nothing of substance to say about economic benefits of Brexit. "In a disturbing echo of UKIP's last party political broadcast, which told numerous untruths about Turkey, Gove asserted that 77 million Turkish Muslim citizens would soon be using the NHS,

and Albanian criminals were about to flood Britain." Mandelson wrote. "From Johnson questioning President Obama's "part-Kenyan ancestry" to EU migrants being blamed for the problems in everything from British schools to our health service to our prisons, every recent Vote Leave intervention has had immigration at its heart. "Should we be disappointed by this change in tone? Yes. Should we be worried? NO!

"Mandelson added: "Swallowing the nasty Ukip strategy wholesale may energise the right-wing base of the leave campaign but I cannot see it being enough to persuade more than half of the voting public to take a leap in the dark in quitting the EU. People want to know what will happen to their obs, their pay packets and their weekly shopping bill more than they want to hear abusive rhetoric and nationalistic myths. "New reports suggest that Tony Blair will also enter the

referendum campaign, by helping to organise an endorsement for Remain from former US President Bill Clinton. A Stronger In source recently told LabourList that the campaign would be happy to work with any major political figure backing a Remain vote, including Tony Blair.

However, given the former Prime Minister's divisive reputation, rumours suggest that the campaign are trying to limit his involvement, and see getting him to secure an intervention from Clinton as the most useful contribution. Gordon Brown recently made a low-profile entrance into the campaign, and is expected to make a bigger intervention when he makes a keynote speech on the subject at the Fabian Society conference later this month. Cold water shock kills – that's the simple yet hard-hitting message a new campaign aims to get across to County Durham teenagers this summer.

As groups of friends make for the county's rivers, lakes, reservoirs and quarries over the coming months focused only on enjoying themselves, many will be unaware of the dangers posed by the temperature of the water before they enter.

cold water shock, the body's short term involuntary response to being suddenly immersed in cold water, can be fatal. The Safe Durham be fatal. The Sale Durnam Partnership (SDP), supported by the family of County Durham cold water shock victim Cameron Gosling, has launched 'Dying to be Cool' -a campaign which will seek to

get this message across. The partnership, made up of Durham County Council, Durham Constabulary and Durham and Darlington Fire and Rescue Service and other partners, is targeting ten to sixteen year olds and will be rolling out a poster campaign through schools and social media

Representatives from the partnership will also visit schools to deliver assemblies on the dangers of cold water shock.

They will be showing pupils a video shot at the spot where Cameron died, featuring some of his friends who were with him at the time and his mum Fiona.

Fourteen vear old Cameron, a pupil at Parkside Academy in Willington, went to the River Wear near Bishop Auckland with friends on a sunny day in July 2015. Without acclimatising himself, he jumped into the water, got into difficulties and died. difficulties and died.

Fiona, who is pushing for water safety to be added to the national curriculum under the hashtag CampaigningforCam,

said: "Cameron's friends had paddled in the water before swimming but he jumped straight in and his body went into shock as a result of the sudden change in temperature. We want to educate young people on this little known killer and fully support what Dying to be Cool is trying to

achieve. One of Cameron's best friends, thirteen year old Matty Wraith, was part of the group which went into the river, and tried to save him. He said: "I jumped in after him. I was with him and then we went under a few times and then he just went.

Sudden immersion in cold water can cause blood vessels in the skin to close which makes it harder for blood to flood around the body. The heart then has to work harder and blood pressure increases.

At the same time there is a "gasp" response which can result in water being breathed rather than air. The breathing rate also changes

dramatically - it can increase by as much as tenfold. All these responses contribute to a feeling of panic. One effect of cold water shock can be cardiac arrest, while death can occur.

Rachael Shimmin, who is chair of the SDP and corporate director of children and adults services at the county council, said: "We want young people to enjoy the outdoors this summer but believe it is vital that they go near water fully aware of the risks of cold water shock.

"Through Dying to be Cool our aim is to educate as many teenagers as possible about what can happen when they go into cold water without go into cold water without acclimatising themselves. If what we are doing stops just one young boy or girl getting into difficulty it will have been worthwhile."

Tom Anderson of Bakewell Place has carefully tended a small piece of land outside his house for 30 years and suddenly the Council has clamped down and taken it back

He did apply to buy it six years ago. but the price then was around $\pounds1,000$ which everyone agreed was ridiculous. He also thought he should be given the land under "squatters rights" as he had kept it so well for the Council for so long and it could be seen as part of his house. Tom applied but all he got for his efforts was a solicitor's bill for £534.

He is retired now and could not afford to buy the small piece of land, but he is disappointed to be treated so badly by the Council who appear to be

insisting this small piece of lawn be transferred to the new Sedgefield Homes company.

In the last week the Council have taken back the land and cut the grass for the first time in 30 years. The change in the quality of upkeep is evident in the two photographs below.

It also shows a heartless approach and one which probably could have been resolved amicably in Mr Anderson's favour had it not been for greens being transferred with housing. It seems we can give away all the housing and greens, at the drop of a hat to a social landlord, but can't give a minute piece of land outside a house which has been nurtured for 30 years by a resident.

Lumiere Festival Delivers

Described by visitors as a 'majestic', 'mesmerising', 'ever-changing', 'spectacle' the UK's largest light festival, staged in Durham for the fourth time last November, installed a sense of pride, made people smile and delivered hugely increased financial benefits to the county and wider region.

200,000 people turned out to see Durham City transformed by 29 artworks across four magical winter evenings. They encountered incredible artistic feats including a colossal whale in the Wear, the history of the universe projected onto the iconic Cathedral and the mysterious fog below the Castle.

Now an independent report into the impact of the event, which is produced by Artichoke and commissioned by Durham County Council, has concluded the festival, which has become synonymous with Durham, delivered a total economic impact of more than £9.6million. Whilst some of the increase could be linked to greater scrutiny of visitor spend - that's nearly £4million more than the previous Lumiere in 2013.

As a result, next week the council's Cabinet members will be asked to agree another £600,000 commissioning fee to bring Lumiere back for a fifth time next year. The fee would be raised from a mix of Performance Reward Grant and budget underspends. The remainder of the funds needed to stage the festival, which is estimated to need a total budget of £1.8million, will be provided by an Arts Council England grant, and raised by Artichoke through sponsorship, trusts and foundations and donations.

Leader of the council, Cllr Simon Henig, says Lumiere has a proven track record: am immensely proud of our partnership with Artichoke and of our relationship with what is without doubt a world class event

'When we commissioned the 2015 festival, we did so based on sound economic impact which demonstrated a clear and significant return on our investment for the county, businesses and residents.

"It's tremendous to see that this was translated into even greater benefits not just in financial terms but also by creating that 'feel good factor' which you can't put a price on.

"More than 90 per cent of those surveyed rated Lumiere 2015 as 'excellent' or 'very good' and said it 'made them happy' with 80 per

cent of visitors saying they planned to come back. These benefits are ongoing for us and we know that events like these allow us to showcase our offer on a world stage, attracting new business, creating jobs and boosting our visitor economy.

"Not many organisations can enjoy a return on investment of nearly 1,400 per cent and make people happy at the same time." Supported by more than 80 partners and

funders including Arts Council England, Durham University and Durham Cathedral, Lumiere is the UK's largest light festival with a growing international profile. The independent evaluation, undertaken

by the Policy Research Group at St Chad's College (Durham University), also reflected the success of the interactive aspects of the art, the links to local history and heritage and the sense of pride and place the event inspired. The council's festival maker programme, which saw 190 volunteers take to the streets to help visitors make the most of the experience was also valued by visitors. The help and advice as well as a friendly welcoming face were seen as very beneficial.

The evaluation reports that the outreach programme was 'notably strong', involving 860 children and young people and 525 residents from right across the county via the council's Area Action Partnerships. The extensive programme saw Artichoke's artists work with people of all ages and backgrounds to inspire and create. Lumiere 2015 also featured an internationally

recognised conference.. 'Life, Art, The Universe, and Everything', which attracted delegates from around the world and offered another opportunity to raise the profile of Durham's cultural offer. In 2017 there is the chance to develop this further with the prospect of hosting the LUCI (Lighting Urban Community International) Conference alongside the festival.

Cabinet members will be asked to agree the £600,000 commissioning fee and a further £100,000 in kind support for a festival in November 2017, when they meet at Crook Civic Centre on June 15. report and The full evaluation can

New Life Changing Visits



A grandmother who has benefitted from County Durham and Darlington Fire and Rescue Service's (CDDFRS) new programme of Safe and Wellbeing visits is keen to spread the word to others who may be helped.

Bess Robertson from Newton Aycliffe cares for her husband Jimmy who has been living with dementia for the past six years

Life had become tough for Bess, who explained: "I had become very depressed, I had days where I would cry and be very upset and felt that I couldn't cope. Since the referral to the Alzheimer's Society through the fire service I've been so much better. My life has been changed by the service provided."

Bess first met firefighters at an event at Darlington Community Fire Station and subsequently spoke to CDDFRS community safety officer Mark Henderson about help available through fire service Safe and Wellbeing visits. Mark said: "Darlington Red Watch directed Bess to the

community safety team and Barry Bird visited Bess and Jimmy at their home a few weeks ago. Barry provided advice about keeping safe including information about the dangers of overloading sockets and he also recommended a referral to the Alzheimer's Society so that they could benefit from expert help with regard to dementia. The partnership between the Service and the Alzheimer's Society has been working extremely well since the new visits began in February helping individuals and families stay safe and improve their quality of life. Seeing how valuable the referrals have been to Bess and Jimmy reminds us all just how important this collaborative work is

Andrew Ball from the Alzheimer's Society said: "I can't praise CDDFRS enough for way it has embraced this dementiafriendly initiative. The Safe and Wellbeing visits bring peace of mind to people living with dementia and their carers. The practical advice they receive is empowering and enables them to maintain their independence for longer.

Since the fire service referral to the Alzheimer's Society, dementia advisor Hannah Johnson has been working with Bess and Jimmy to organise day care each week with Durham County Carers; free counselling sessions and contact with a mental health group.

Bess Robertson said: "The day care is such a help to me as I can plan to do things each week and know that Jimmy will be ok without me. I've also found the counselling sessions with Relate have been really beneficial. At first I didn't think I needed them but being able to talk about things that were worrying me and realising that I hadn't really accepted Jimmy's dementia and how it was affecting me has helped a lot.

"I can't praise the help that I've had through the fire service and the Alzheimer's Society enough. I just want to let other people, who may be in the situation that I was in, know that there is help out there and it can make life so much easier." possible. "He is an inspiration to us all," explained Nicky Leech, Sailing Secretary at Derwent Reservoir Sailing Club. "In 2014, just weeks after a major operation to lengthen seven muscles in his leg, he was out on the water sailing again, this time with his leg wrapped up in clingfilm!"

Choice of boat for Adam is very important, as he explains: "My first time sailing was in a Topper with my Dad and Uncle 2012 but because of my cerebral palsy I struggled to cross the boat when we tacked. After that we bought a Miracle which was a little better if I sat in the middle of the boat and let my dad do all the hiking out!

The solution came from Derwent Reservoir Sailing Club which has long been a recognised RYA Sailability

facility, owning some boats able to accommodate sailors with restricted mobility.

"The club had an old Access dinghy that was looking a bit sorry for itself," continued Adam. "Dad brought it home one winter, dried it out and put it back together again, ready for me to sail the following season. Halfway through this season I was approached bv the RYA Paralympic development coach and invited down to Rutland Water for a taster session in a Paralympic 2.4mR; since then I haven't looked back. This is a perfect boat for me and I now attend regular high performance training weekends down at & Lowton Sailing Leigh Club with Dave Woodhead as Coach."

'One of the downsides to the 2.4mR is launch and recovery, and it usually means my dad has to go into the water to do this while I transfer into the boat from a jetty or in the case at the moment at Derwent Reservoir, a rib with the boat on a mooring, since our jetty was washed away by the storms at the end of last season."

"I was lucky enough to be loaned a 2.4mR for six months while I got used to the boat, but now I have a boat of my own and I'm looking forward to racing it and having it set up specifically for me."

"I would have liked to have competed at the World competed Championships this year but they were right in the middle of my exams. Never mind, I'll have to concentrate on any domestic events after they've finished. I know there are a couple of the Youth Travellers events where I can get launched so hopefully I will make those, as well as other 2.4mR events

that are scheduled later in the year such as the Inland Championships at Rutland and the autumn ranking event down at Weymouth.

"I would really like to thank Derwent Reservoir Sailing Club for nominating me for the RYA North East Young Club Sailor award; Stephen Scullion and his rescue team for the help they give me when launching and coming back into shore; Matt Grier and Dave Woodhead for their excellent coaching and support and of course my parents who transport me, feed me and act
