NHS England is calling upon patients and the public across the North East to have their say in a consultation on plans to cut the sales of sugary drinks sold on NHS premises.

The formal consultation means that England would become the first country in the world to take action across its health service in this way. The consultation seeks views

on an outright ban, as well as alternative measures to reduce sales of sugary-drinks.

Not only will this improve the health of patients and families visiting hospital, but also the health of hospital staff. A recent survey found obesity to be the most significant self-reported health problem amongst NHS staff, with nearly 700,000 NHS staff estimated to be overweight or obese. Rising rates of obesity is not



Drop in Anti-Social Behaviour Across County

Recorded incidences of antisocial behaviour dropped overall by 14 per cent across County Durham and Darlington in the twelve months to end of September 2016, in a report published today, with some areas seeing a 25 per cent reduction. The decrease is highlighted in

The decrease is highlighted in the latest Public Performance Report from Ron Hogg, the Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner for County Durham and Darlington. There were reductions in every neighbourhood policing area, a trend which has continued since Ron published his last report in June this year.

The areas with the largest drops in anti-social behaviour are Crook (down by 25.7 per cent), Newton Aycliffe (down by 24.9 per cent), Peterlee (down by 22.8 per cent) and Stanley (down by 21.6 per cent).

Ron said: "Residents have told me during past consultations that tackling anti-social behaviour is a priority for

them. This decrease in antisocial behaviour is good news for everyone living in the area, and police and partners are continuing to work hard on behalf of our communities. Whilst these figures are good news, we will not rest on our laurels and will continue to work with local people to prevent and tackle anti-social behaviour".

The report also shows that victim-based crime has increased by 27.1%. This is partly due to changes in recording practices and compliance with national recording guidelines, which mean that cases of harassment are now recorded as crimes when they may not have been previously. This has also contributed to the drop in Anti-Social Behaviour. There have been increases in burglary, vehicle crime, shoplifting and criminal damage. Following his latest meeting to discuss the figures with the Constabulary's Executive team, Ron said:

Inspirational teenager Kieran Maxwell whose long and brave battle against a rare form of bone cancer touched the hearts of people throughout the UK when his story was reported in the national press, on radio and television, has been awarded Rotary International's highest honour, a Paul Harris Fellowship

Eighteen-year-old Kieran was presented with his much-coveted award at his Heighington home by Newton Aycliffe Rotary Club President Nora Scott. She told him: "You have been an inspiration to many people who are battling life-limiting illnesses. We are

all very proud of you. Kieran lost his left leg to cancer in March 2011 after being diagnosed with Ewing's Sarcoma, a rare form of bone cancer. The following year, he carried the Olympic torch through Bishop Auckland and in May, 2013, won Gold at British Gymnastics NDP Acro Championships after learning eight days previously that his cancer had returned to his lungs (he had eight new tumours).

Kieran completed treatment including a stem cell transplant, and two months afterwards, started athletics. His highest achievement was in December, 2015, when he won a gold medal in the 100 metres sprint at the Brazilian School Paralympics.

But, at a routine check-up in October, Kieran learned his cancer had returned and was terminal. His friends rallied round and raised enough money to bring Christmas forward for the family. When they heard this, the villagers of

From the 1940's until the turn of the century, many County Durham villages had their own football team competing in one of several local leagues.
