

the pups were born only ten weeks ago. They are currently being looked after by foster families until they are old enough to begin their formal training. They will join the unit as specialist search dogs sniffing out drugs or explosives. PC Ian Squire, from the tri-force dog unit, commented: "Becky and Jackson are currently with their respective families and have already started informal training. They will be taught basic obedience, socialisation skills and exposed to different environments before being paired with a police dog handler and formally trained." "They are lively little puppies who are enjoying their days exploring their



new surroundings, Becky is definitely more boisterous than her brother. I wouldn't let that gorgeous face fool anyone, she is very mischievous!"

As of April last year, all dogs should be microchipped by the time they are eight weeks old. The chips allow details of the animals' owners to be registered on a database, making it easier for people to be reunited with their pets

San Hauxwell Review: "The blistering set takes in AC/DC, Saxon, Black Sabbath, Iron Maiden, Ozzy, Scorpions, Metallica, Rainbow, Guns 'n' Roses etc. Not always the usual choices but a mixed bag of METAL mayhem! What makes Revenant stand out from the rest is the years of experience and musicianship put into play during their live performances. Arguably one of the greatest local bands l've ever seen, they never disappoint their audience which is full of bikers and a loyal following. 


