£2.5m Appeal for MRI **Scanners for Darlington** SAVING NHS TRUST OVER £1m A YEAR



Over a vear ago a reader contacted Newton News Editor Syd Howarth with alarming information on finance deal providing MRI scanning equipment Memorial Darlington to Hospital.

Further investigation showed a Private Finance Company, owned the scanner and the hospital were paying over a £1 million a year for its use. The scanner cost less than £800,000 and it has been in place for 18 years Syd, an Aycliffe Rotarian,



COUNCIL SUPPORTS GREENFIELD STUDENTS

At a meeting of the Town Council last week, members unanimously approved and adopted a motion in support of students from Greenfield Community College in their petition to the Secretary of State for Education the English regarding GCSE exam.

John Clare Councillor supporting the Greenfield students in their campaign to make English GCSE coursework equitable

proposed the motion: "Great Aycliffe Town applauds the Council of Greenfield students Community College, Aycliffe, who Newton have challenged the inequity of an exam system whereby English state schools entering students for the English GCSE exam do not have a 40% coursework option ... although that option

continues to be available to independent schools through IGCSE. Such a disparity of opportunity is unacceptable. Aycliffe Town Great

Council therefore requests the Secretary of State for Education to consider the Greenfield students' petition*, which seeks parity of treatment and calls upon Parliament to allow state schools the option of 40% coursework in English GCSE exams."

PCC's Call to Scrap Domestic Violence Fee

Ron Hogg has joined fellow Police and Crime Commissioners (PCCs) across the country, calling on Health Minister Jeremy Hunt to scrap the fee charged to domestic abuse victims seeking legal aid.

Due to recent legislation changes, domestic abuse victims now have to apply for legal aid.

However to qualify for support they need to provide specific evidence to prove that they have been subjected to such abuse. One of the accepted forms of evidence is a letter from a GP – a letter that some GPs are charging fees to provide.

The concerns have been raised in a letter which has been co-signed by 16 PCCs across the country. As a signatory to the "scrap the fee" campaign, Ron is calling for fair treatment for abuse victims. Ron said: "I firmly believe

NHS is currently The looking at its regional services, and is publishing draft 'Sustainability and Transformation Plans' (STPs) for different areas of the country. A draft STP has been published for our local area (which stretches from Wearhead to Whitby - see map) which you can read here: bit.ly/DSTPST

The STP says a lot of good things about preventing ill health, and improving the quality of care in our communities and hospitals. It confirms James Cook Hospital as a specialist and major trauma hospital. However, the STP is also proposing downgrade EITHER to Darlington Memorial OR North Tees Hospital, from 'specialist emergency

hospital', to merely a 'local hospital' ... which would mean losing its A&E, acute

surgery and maternity. Newton News believes would be a local disaster if we should lose Darlington's specialist services, including Darlington's A&E, and have to go instead to James Cook. Nor is it just about increased travel times. How would North Tees and James Cook cope with increased numbers

of patients – and has anyone assessed how the hospital car parks, and the local road systems, will cope with the additional traffic? It is for this reason that local MPs Phil Wilson and Jenny Chapman have been out campaigning to make people aware of the danger to Darlington A&E, and to

mobilise support against the changes. Sedgefield MP against Phil Wilson commented: "At this time, given pressures on existing A&Es it seems ludicrous to consider closing one. The possibility that the closure of the A&E in Darlington could lead to the loss of the consultant led maternity in Darlington would be a huge blow to my constituents who use these much needed services. It is clear this is primarily being done for financial reasons and not in the best interest of patients."

Local councillor John D Clare, who marched last October to protest against the proposed changes, told the Newton News: "Only Newton News: government could this suggest that the answer to the A&E crisis is to close the local A&E. Neither must we let this divide-and-rule government twist this into a contest between Stockton and Darlington, each trying to save their own local hospital. We must unite to demand an STP which has at its heart patients' needs, not saving monev"

Darlington MP Jenny Chapman does not want to wait until the STP is finalised, and then have to campaign if Darlington's A&E is named for closure - she wishes to influence the STP now while it is being written. This makes sense.

On Wednesday 1st February, our MP Phil Wilson handed a petition to Parliament calling for fairer English GCSEs. Mr Wilson gave his backing

to the petition earlier this year when students Christine Davies, Melissa Foster and Aidan Wong brought their campaign to his attention. The three students, from Greenfield Community College set up the petition to demand equality in English GCSE's after discovering the differences between the GCSE sat in maintained (state schools and academies) and independent schools.

independent Currently, schools can opt to sit the iGCSE, which allows for a 40% coursework component to count towards the student's final mark and offers students the opportunity to sit the exam twice. State

schools and academies on the other hand sit the English GCSE requiring students to sit one exam in the summer, counting for 100% of their mark.

The fury at this inequality is clear, with the student's petition having currently collected over 1000 signatures. Phil Wilson Wilson said he was 'appalled' and is adamant that students, regardless of whether they attended state or public school, must be on a level playing field. Mr Wilson said 'State school

student's face a far tougher examination process than those who have the privilege of attending private school, making the system inherently unfair

Council Reject Plan for 430 Houses at Woodham

On Tuesday, the County Council's Planning Committee voted to accept officers planning the recommendation to reject the application by Wilmott Partnership Homes to erect up to 430 dwellings on the land adjoining Woodham Bridge.

Proposing to accept the officers' recommendation to reject, local Councillor John D Clare welcomed the officers' decision to declare the area a 'valued landscape'. Not only does the area constitute a strategic break between the housing in Newton Avcliffe and Woodham Village, he said, it also forms a bio-diversity corridor allowing wildlife from the countryside into the very heart of the town. It is, he said, one of the 'green areas' around which Newton Aycliffe is conceptually formed, and as such essential to the whole nature of Newton Aycliffe as a settlement. Cllr Clare also welcomed

the fact that, for the first time, the emerging Great Aycliffe Neighbourhood Plan had been included in the planning considerations - the importance of Great Aycliffe's 'green spaces' was a major feature of the Neighbourhood Plan. Seconding rejection, local Dixon Councillor Mike

drew attention to the poor connectivity of the site, with poor access to local facilities

on foot, leaving the only option to drive onto the A167 and into town by car. Residents were hostile to the suggestion of a second access by bridge from Stag Lane, which would become a rat run.

The application was rejected on the grounds that "the Local Planning Authority considers the proposed development would result in transformative effects on the character of the area and setting of Newton Aycliffe/ Woodham resulting in significant adverse harm to a valued landscape and designated green wedge.

launch and operation of RRS Sir David Attenborough and Boaty McBoatface (a state of the art sub sea vehicle) to engage young people in science, enabling them to understand the scientific process and enhance their understanding of Science, Technology, Engineering and

Mathematics concepts. Sounds really cool, no pun intended!

ELMFIELD SCHOOL SITE On the 22nd of February an eyesore, and an almost doubling of the size of West to maintain the former at the Council Recreation

Committee I shall be putting forward a motion asking the Council to make contact with Durham County Council regarding the future of the derelict former Elmfield School site. 

Litter and Dog Fouling

Complaints about dog fouling are coming in thick and fast. Sadly there are a few dog owners who walk their dogs early in the morning or late at night or simply open their front doors to let their dogs run wild and their dogs are leaving their mess on the road and pavements throughout the village. Sadly, the problem is not unique to Heighington. It is a national problem which must be stopped. People who live in the delightful Chestnuts housing estate tell me of strangers who live elsewhere are having the temerity to drive from their own homes, park their vehicles adjacent to the large grassed area where children play, and let their dogs out leaving their filthy calling card behind them.

The result of dog fouling is making many residents particularly parents see red. Children are walking in dog mess taking it into cars, homes and school and pushchair wheels are getting covered in the stuff. It is unpleasant. embarrassing for the children and dangerous to the health of everyone. Unfortunately, control is difficult because of the times these irresponsible dog owners let their dogs do what they do naturally it is difficult to catch the offenders but something has to be done.

In the first instance, I appeal to all dog owners to pick up after them. You are the dog's owner and are totally responsible for it. Dog fouling is unacceptable to all and must stop. I urge all residents to contact me if you can identify any dog owner who does not pick up after his/her dog.

The details will be passed on to DBC Enforcement Team who WILL act. We have done this before and dog owners have had to pay an £80 fine and we will do it again. So to all dog owners who do not clean up theirs dog's mess be warned, there are lots of parents out there who are furious about the dog fouling problem and they will be watching...ALL OF THEM Litter – As a Newton News reader I often read letters sent in

from Newton Aycliffe readers complaining about the amount of litter in the town so as Chair of LitterFreeDurham I decided to see the problem for myself. I jumped on my bike pedalled around the ring road and turned right into a road somewhere near the Blue Bell garage. I had no idea of the road layout so I meandered randomly from the Blue Bell garage down to the Town centre, through Sharp Road and eventually back home via Heighington Lane taking in lots of roads that I never knew

existed. I am delighted to report that apart from the odd piece of paper there was very little litter seen on my longish travels. From my 'inspection' Newton Aycliffe is know where as bad as been reported. I don't doubt that there will be grot spots in the town and on the factory estate and it is these areas that your local authority and volunteer litter pickers should concentrate

on. The road from the A167 leading into the Business Park does not give a good impression to visitors and the hedge opposite Tesco tends to fill up with litter blowing across the road from the supermarket - two examples where action needs to be taken. Perhaps Tesco management can organise someone to clean up this hedge on a regular basis to save the local Primary school doing so.

Litter is a problem everywhere. In Heighington we pick litter monthly to keep the roads around the village clean. I know that there are lots of people in Newton Avcliffe who take pride in their town and this can be seen when driving through.

A number of people simply don't complain about the litter, they do something about it by getting out and cleaning up the littered areas and I am confident that many of these volunteer Litter pickers in Newton Aycliffe and Heighington will be supporting LitterFreeDurham's Big Spring Clean starting February 27th through to April 16th – don't complain – take action join them to help them to help you to keep our communities CLEAN.




