

from John S. Denham Newton Aycliffe has been appointed President of the Durham County Rugby Football Union for Season 2017-18

Born 1946, in Bannockburn near Stirling, Scotland, he lived briefly in Darlington. John moved onto the new town in September 1951, with his family moving into a new house in Lee Green. His father was employed by ENV, which later was taken over by Eaton Yale and Towne. His mother Chris was for many years, the receptionist in Jacques the Hairdressers, one of the first shops in the Town Centre.

He attended the town's first school, held in the Bede Crescent flats and can remember sitting listening to the funeral of King George VI and watching the 'Blue Bridge' being constructed. He was transferred to the new Sugar Hill School when completed.

In September 1958 he attended Durham Johnston Grammar Technical School, where Technical his great interest and career in Rugby Union began. He played in each year and in 1964, was selected for the Durham County Schools' Under 19's.

Aged 11, John joined the St. John's Ambulance Brigade Cadets which met in the building next to Clarence Hall in Finchale Road. During this time, he attained his Grand Prior's badge, the highest award possible in the cadets and was promoted to sergeant. He joined, the Boys' Club, which was then across the road from the fire station, where the Magistrates' Court now stands, John completed the Bronze, Silver and Gold sections of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme followed by A visit to Holvrood Palace, to meet the Duke and receive his award

In 1965, he was selected to play for the England Boys' Clubs against the Wales Boys' Club, playing twice at the Gnoll, Neath and the Franklin's Gardens, Northampton. Aged 15, John took a paper

John began his teaching career in 1969 at the Shildon Boys' Secondary School, moving to the Junior School in 1971. When the Juniors and nearby Infant School were combined to form a primary school in 1982, John was appointed

On leaving school, John joined Durham City RFC, playing there until he suffered a knee injury in 1976. Unable to play, he joined the DCRFU Referees' Society and refereed his first match in January 1977. In 1986, he was appointed to the RFU National Panel of Referees for four seasons. For season 1990-91 he joined the Border Referees' Society refereeing out of the Jedthistle Club in Jedburgh. He was then appointed to SRU National

Panel of referees for four seasons. On returning to officiate in England, he was appointed to the RFU National Panel of Assistant Referees for two seasons. He then qualified as Referee Coach and in 2004 was appointed to the RFU National Panel of Referee Coaches for four seasons. Before and after this appointment, he was coaching for the North Group. Since July 1999 he has been the Secretary of the Referees Society and a representative to the DCRFU General

Committee. In September 2011, he was awarded Life Membership of the Society in recognition of his many years of service. In July 2011 John was also appointed secretary of the DCRFU General Committee. On 11th 2017, John was installed as President of the Durham County Rugby Football Union for Season 2017-18.

Detection Dogs Highlight Dangers of Illegal Tobacco

The dangers of illegal tobacco are being highlighted at a series of roadshows in County Durham over the coming weeks.

Illegal tobacco – tobacco that has been smuggled into the UK, bootlegged (duty free) or fake – is common in communities across the north of England but has serious consequences, including making it easier for children to smoke.

Other effects include bringing crime into the community, with criminals selling illegal tobacco and using the profits to launder money, as well as it increasing the availability of cheap tobacco products which can have a damaging effect on Stop Smoking Services. The sales also harm legitimate retailers and the

Earlier this month, a 70-year-old man was handed a suspended prison sentence and left more than £9,000 out of pocket for selling counterfeit cigarettes from his home.

As part of an undercover operation, Durham County Council trading standards officers posed as customers to purchase cigarettes from James Simpson from Hawthorn Square in Seaham.

And last November, more than 27,000 cigarettes without appropriate health warnings were found at an off-licence in Blackhall Colliery after a sniffer dog led officers to the room in which they were kept, leading to a £1,800 fine for shopkeeper Kamran Adil,45,

Train building apprentices and graduates are to start at Newton Aveliffe next week as part of a national training programme. Hitachi Rail's new apprentice and graduate programmes will see the company double their number of trainees to over 100 across the UK

Newton Aycliffe will employ four apprentices and two graduates every year to work on train manufacturing projects following the success of the current scheme at the site which include technical and manufacturing apprentices. The new apprentices will attend

With students getting ready to start university for the first time this month, we teamed up with teen magazine Future Mag to investigate the REAL cost of going to uni.

Nobody goes to university without knowing they'll take on debt. Fees are now £9250 a year, and that's before you've even paid accommodation, food and bar bills - even subsidised beer will still set you back about £2.50 a pint. Booze aside, there are so many ways to spend money as a student, so it's not surprising more than a quarter of students say their first loan instalment lasts less than a month (Endsleigh) and just two per cent of students manage without an overdraft. Students starting September will rack Students this up between £43,000 to £57,000 of debt, depending on how much parents help them, says the Institute of Fiscal Studies (IFS) - the average debt will be just over £50,000. Some 71 per cent of students rely on money from their parents to make ends meet, research from Save the Student shows. But most graduates won't pay their loans back completely. More than three quarters will have some or even all their loans paid off by the government after 30 years. the IFS estimates - you only begin to repay it once your salary is above an earnings threshold.

Students take on two separate loans: one for fees, which is paid straight to the university and a maintenance loan, which is paid into students' bank accounts, normally in three instalments at the start of each term (maintenance grants were scrapped in 2015). These range from £8430 outside London to up to £11,002 for students in the capital – but this just isn't enough to get by, say students. So where does the money go? Many students blow more than £120 on drink in freshers' week. But rent takes the greatest chunk of money. At one of the cheapest student cities of Manchester, student accommodation costs £5000 for the 40 week year, and at Portsmouth, it's even cheaper typically between £3.900 to £4,300, whereas at Bath it can be up to £6300 for top

students by surprise. Then there are one off costs of setting up as a studentaccommodation deposits are usually a month's rent up front, and there's cost of bedding, furniture, cooking equipment and insurance. This year the law has changed on TV licences, so if you're starting in September, you'll need to buy a licence for all live viewing and recording regardless of what channel you're watching or device you're using – mobile, laptop, games console. The mobile. £147 cost can be spread over the year, and you'll get a refund for unused months when vou're not in student accommodation.

Student railcards cost £30 a year and National Express coach cards £25 for three years, and offer a third of standard fares. 




