Arriva Donate £2000 to Newton Aycliffe Charity



Arriva has donated thousands of pounds to 86 community projects in County Durham since 2001, through County Durham Community Foundation. Their most recent good cause is Newton Aycliffe charity, Lifeline Community Action, which has bagged £2,000 to help with the cost of premises.

Alwyn White, trustee of the charity, said: "The key difference that this funding makes is that it means we

can be in the town centre which we just couldn't afford otherwise because shop frontage is so expensive. "We actually started out working from someone's garden shed, then we had a couple of different spots on an industrial estate but they didn't last long. "We do tell people that we couldn't do what we do without funding like this. Many mistakenly think it's government funded which of

course it isn't. "To be based where we are is wonderful because people can get to us and they know where we are because the church was one of the first to be built and it is used regularly. It's also useful because the foodbank is based here too and we are referrers for it." Lifeline Community Action is based at St Clare's Church, on St Cuthbert's Way. The charity runs several projects, including Helping Hands, which supplies basic household packs of essentials for families in desperate need.

Alwyn, (2nd left) who is a retired teacher, said: "There is a most definite increase in need these days, particularly before Christmas. "There have been so many cuts and people who have been on benefits for many years are finding it extremely difficult. And it's not just people on benefits who are struggling - people on low wages are too." Alwyn says she has huge sympathy for the people that

Residents Reminded of Council Tax Discounts

Residents of County Durham are being reminded that a wide range of council tax discounts are available for those in special circumstances. Homes which include someone with severe physical disabilities could be eligible for reductions and carers can also be excluded when calculating council tax depending on the circumstances. Care Leavers under 25 who pay council tax or who live with someone who pays council tax are able to reduce the amount they pay by applying for a discretionary reduction. People living with dementia and those who care for people with a severe mental impairment, such as Alzheimer's, may also be eligible for a discount or exemption. Students are also exempt from paying council tax, while those aged over 18 who are the sole resident in a property are entitled to a 25% single occupier discount. Universal Credit claimants are reminded that they need to make a separate claim to Durham County Council if they are having difficulty paying council tax, as this isn't included in the housing costs element of the new Universal Credit system. Cllr Jane Brown, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for social inclusion, said: "These discounts and exemptions are designed to take the pressure off those who may be in difficult circumstances, and we're very keen for those eligible to get in touch. Council tax discounts and exemptions are an entitlement and we want to ensure that

need the charity because of her own circumstances.

She said: "I was brought up in poverty myself because my father died when I was young. He had been poorly for a couple of years and I was 16 when he passed away. Both my brother and I had been hoping to go to university and my mother had to go out to work which was a bit unusual at that time. I saw in her the way she was able to manage. We didn't realise we were poor."

Career Change - Why not Get into Teaching?

With the nation poised to head back to work after the festive break, new figures released today show January continues to be a popular month for people in the North East looking to switch into teaching as a career.

Expressions of interest from career changers in the North East spiked in January 2017 with 406 registrants, according to figures from the Get Into Teaching campaign. Ashley Kell, a Design and Technology teacher from Shotton Hall Academy in County Durham, took the decision to leave her career in retail in 2015 to go in search of a more rewarding career. Ashley is now supporting the national Get Into Teaching campaign, by recommending other people in the Durham consider making the switch.

Ashley, a Design and Technology teacher and local Get Into Teaching advocate said: "I'd always been intrigued by teaching and imagined it to be a very rewarding career. After seven years in the retail sector working my way from a sales assistant to a visual associate, I was quite bored of going to work to do the same thing every day and needed something which would excite me and give something back. Plus, I wanted to use my degree and felt I wasn't doing this in that role. The idea of switching my profession was nerve-racking, but it felt the right thing to do. I did my research, applied for the training, and haven't looked back since."

"Teaching at my school in Durham really makes me proud and brings daily rewards. For example, I now

have my own year 7 set group who I see every morning and greet me with a smile. I know I'll be their tutor from now until year 11 and can already see the change in their demeanour since starting this big, scary school. From being anxious to now being quite content in secondary school, being able to offer answers in lesson and volunteer for a task is lovely to see. I definitely made the right decision to change my career and would advise any other professionals who might be considering it to take the time to think about teaching this new year."

Get Into Teaching is offering a package of support to help bridge the gap between candidates in Durham considering teaching as one of their resolutions, and actually registering their interest and applying. This includes a series of events, opportunities to get some classroom experience and tailored advice from teaching experts to help people through the application process.

To support the latest generation of New Year career changers, a series of online and Train to Teach roadshow events are starting this month. On Wednesday 7 February, 4.30 – 8pm, there will be a Train to Teach roadshow event at Jurys Inn Middlesbrough, Fry Street, Middlesbrough, TS1 1JH. There will also be a Train to Teach event on 24 February, 1pm – 5pm, at Newcastle University, Great North Museum, Hancock, Barras Bridge, NE2 4PT. Online events this month include:

• **Monday 8 January, 6.30pm – 7.30pm: Introduction to Teacher Training**

• **Monday 15 January, 6.30pm – 7.30pm: Change Career to Teaching**

• **Monday 29th January, 6.30pm – 7.30pm: Gaining School Experience**

Career changers could get a £26,000 tax-free bursary to train as a teacher in key subjects including science, computing, geography and languages. This year candidates could get £30,000 to train to teach maths – a £20,000 tax-free bursary while training as a teacher and a further £10,000 after tax once in teaching. Alternatively, prestigious scholarships of up to £28,000 are available in priority subjects for graduates with a 2:1 or above who are passionate about their subject and have the potential to be teachers.

CHRISTMAS WASTE FIGURES

Brits threw out 108 million rolls of wrapping paper, 54 million platefuls of food – and used 189 million batteries over Christmas, a study has found.

But eight in 10 admit they don't bother to try and justify the huge amount of waste they produce, with six in 10 saying they don't feel at all guilty about what they throw away over the festive period.

A poll of 2,000 adults found the nation will also get through more than 40 million rolls of sticky tape and bin almost 100 million black bags full of packaging from toys and gifts.

Seven in 10 admit to buying far more food than they need, with two thirds saying at least some of the turkey usually ends up in the bin.

And rather than recycling where possible, many simply throw their wrapping paper, packaging and old Christmas cards out with the rubbish.

A spokesman for GP Batteries, which commissioned the research, said: "Christmas is a time of great celebration, but this can result in a huge amount of waste – many of which we don't always do the right things with."

"And it seems many don't worry about the amount of their Christmas produce that ends up in the bin, despite the nation as a whole trying to do all we can to cut down on waste at other times of the year."

"Reusing things, such as Christmas Cards or wrapping paper, or using rechargeable batteries are small things to most people but will drastically reduce the amount you end up throwing away."

The study of 2,000 adults found the average household will get through four rolls of wrapping paper and throw away seven batteries over the Christmas period.

A roll-and-a-half of sticky tape will be used per household, while three-and-a-half black bags full of packaging will be thrown out.

The equivalent of a whole plateful of food will end up going to waste on Christmas Day, along with another plateful in the following days.

An average of 24 Christmas cards will also be discarded once the festive period is over, while 14 per cent will bin their fake Christmas Tree this year.

But researchers, from OnePoll.com, found many aren't

recycling or reusing their waste with one in five admitting to throwing their used wrapping paper into the bin.

More than one in four throw batteries into the bin, despite knowing they shouldn't, while three in 10 still use disposables instead of re-chargeables.

Others admit to throwing out leftover food rather than trying to use it in other meals and binning cards and packaging instead of recycling or reusing.

But one in six often try to justify the amount of waste they produce, with 34 per cent of those believing it's just part of Christmas.

One in five think it's OK as everyone else does it while 43 per cent believe it is impossible to avoid waste over the festive period.

It also emerged one in ten have even had rows with their family because of the amount of waste they produce.

As a result, many are trying to cut down on the waste they produce, with 48 per cent turning their Christmas dinner leftovers into other meals in the following days.

Forty-two per cent buy a fake tree instead of having to dispose of a real tree every year while a third simply buy less food than usual.

Others reuse Christmas cards as gift tags the following year, buy rechargeable batteries and even avoid wrapping presents at all. A spokesman for GP Batteries added: "These days a battery is for life, not just for Christmas."

"A modern rechargeable battery can be used up to 1,500 times and over its lifetime - saving a fortune in cash and waste. Once you go rechargeable you never go back."

Top ten things people have done to try and reduce their waste at Christmas:

1. Turn leftovers into other meals
2. Buy a fake tree to reuse every year
3. Buy less food
4. Reuse Christmas cards as gift tags
5. Use rechargeable batteries
6. Order online in one order to reduce packaging
7. Send e-cards
8. Buy fewer toys
9. Order less online to cut down on packaging
10. Don't wrap presents at all

Reported Crime Increases as Police Resources Diminish

REPORTED CRIMES in County Durham and Darlington are on the increase, according to the latest Performance Report from Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner, Ron Hogg.

The report indicates that whilst levels of anti-social behaviour reduced by 12% over the twelve months to September 2017, reported crime rose by 35%.

At the same time, confidence in the Police is higher in Durham than almost anywhere else in the country. 85% of people agree that 'taking everything into account I have confidence in the police', compared to a national average of 79%.

There are three reasons for

the increase in recorded crime:

National changes to recording rules which require more incidents including harassment to be recorded as crimes

The public are increasingly confident to report crimes, including those that occurred in the past

There have been real increases in crimes such as theft, robbery and arson

Commissioner Ron Hogg said: "It is reassuring that victims appear to be increasingly confident to come forward and report their experiences, especially victims of sexual offences and hate crime."

"Durham Constabulary is still the most effective and

efficient police force in the country. Our police officers do an excellent job, every day, keeping the public safe. However, the number of Police Officers in County Durham and Darlington has dropped by 400 since 2010 and I am concerned that the budget for local policing continues to reduce. I have continued to call on the Government to ensure that Police have the resources they need to protect the public."

S&D Railway Receives National Award as Heritage Action Zone

Three years ago, the Friends of the Stockton & Darlington Railway were founded out of concern at the deterioration - indeed, the loss - of our very own world class heritage, the S&DR. It seemed ironic that this should be happening at the very same time that a world class railway company - Hitachi - was bringing train and railway vehicle building back to the birthplace of the modern railway. Our answer was to hold a national conference in 2015 at Locomotion, National Railway Museum (NRM) Shildon to raise awareness of this world class heritage on our doorstep, debate the importance of the S&DR and encourage cooperative working between a wide range of partners. Since then a lot has been happening, the HAZ being the latest in a growing string of successes in the lead up to our 200th anniversary in 2025. It is the best Christmas present ever! Crucially, the major local authorities along the line (Durham, Darlington and Stockton Councils and the Tees Valley Combined Authority) are now co-operating together in a Rail Heritage Steering Group (RSHG) with other key partners such as the Friends of the S&DR, Historic England, the NRM (on behalf of the Science Museums Group), railway companies and the A1 Trust. The work of the RSHG covers three strands: firstly, to conserve, repair and make accessible the remains

of the S&DR along its 26 miles; secondly, to look at major infrastructure projects such as the North Road area of Darlington and thirdly, to plan for the major celebration events of 2025, the bicentenary of the S&DR and hopefully also the year in which the Tees Valley will be celebrating as the City of Culture. As one element of this partnership, an application was made to Historic England to become a Heritage Action Zone - taking part in a regional and then national competition to secure one of only eight designations for the whole country in this round of designations. Our Heritage Action Zone is different from most others as our Zone is linear in nature rather than geographically all in one place, covering as it does an area from Witton Park in County Durham (where the line begins), right through to Stockton on Tees where the line ended in 1825. What does it mean to be a Heritage Action Zone? The idea is the result of a government white paper which addressed concerns about the loss of significant heritage, including industrial heritage such as the S&DR. Organisations can take part in a competition to become a HAZ, which brings with it national recognition, only relatively small amounts of money but lots of vital support from Historic England to enable key work to be done to

arrest decline and bring about a brighter future for our heritage assets. For the S&DR it will help us to continue the crucial research that has already begun (a track bed audit funded by the three main councils was completed last year), to identify where money needs to be invested to protect the line - and, crucially it should help us when we apply to organisations like the Heritage Lottery Fund and Sport England for large sums of money to make things happen. It also provides an opportunity to work with local communities and schools along the line.

What is the Friends' vision for the future? Take it for granted that we want to preserve what is left for the future and make it more accessible.

But what about a Stockton & Darlington Marathon, sponsored by some of our partners? After all, the main line of the S&DR is about 26 miles long. How about a film of the story of how the railway came to be built - it really is as entertaining as a Catherine Cookson novel. How about bringing steam back to the line - say, from Darlington right the way up Weardale? How about themed holidays for people interested in railway history - people from all over the world, including Japan? Above all else, we want to use our heritage to inspire the present and future generations of youngsters coming through our schools today to take up engineering and make this area what it used to be back in 1825 - a hotbed of innovation at the forefront of world industrial development. We want to use our heritage to stimulate economic regeneration and bring much needed jobs and prosperity to our area. We want to celebrate the place where the modern railway was born and remind everyone just what an amazing place it is we live in. 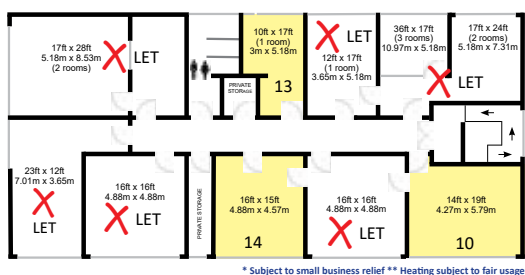

Xmas Recycling - Do's & Don'ts

Households are approaching the worst time of the year for recycling waste as families drown under a mountain of Christmas packaging, experts have warned.

Waste disposal experts at Junk Hunters advise households to stop and think and not take the easy route out by chucking everything in the general bin.

They also recommend double-checking typically recyclable items such as paper, plastic and card as they may not be suitable if adorned in shimmery, glittery designs.

From wrapping paper and cards, to foil trays for pigs in blankets and ripped Christmas crackers, festive paraphernalia is aplenty and while much of it is recyclable, a lot of it is unsuitable.

People think they are trying to do the right thing by recycling certain items in their boxes, but good intentions don't always work during Christmas time.

This can cause whole boxes of rubbish, some of which are suitable to be rejected and sent to landfill which

wastes recyclable materials. By following a few simple steps, you can do right by the environment this Christmas. Here's his list of seasonal trash do's and don'ts:

CHRISTMAS CARDS & ENVELOPES

Do – recycle if the cards and envelopes are made of paper.

Don't – recycle if they are covered in glitter or foil, dispose of in the general bin.

WRAPPING PAPER

Do – remove all tags, bows, ribbons and sellotape and try the 'scrunch test'. If it stays in a ball once scrunched it can go in recycling.

Don't – put it in recycling if it doesn't stay scrunched, pop it in the general bin.

FOOD

Do – put all cooked and raw food into the food recycling bin.

Don't – put any food in the food recycling that still has residual bits of cling film or foil, and don't forget to remove pesky chocolate wrappers.

FOOD CONTAINERS

Do – clean any disposable paper plates, trays and party cups and add them to the

paper recycling bin.

Don't – put dirty, food stained disposable paper plates into the recycling bin.

GLASS BOTTLES AND JARS

Do – swill glass bottles and jars and put them in the recycling.

Don't – take their lids off, the lids help them to be easily sorted and recycled separately.

TREES

Do – cut into small pieces and dispose of in the garden waste bin. If there is a lack of equipment to do this, Darlington Rotary Club will recycle it for a small fee for St. Teresa's Hospice.

Wreaths, holly and mistletoe can go in with garden waste.

Don't – dispose of them in the paper recycling bin.

OLD CHRISTMAS LIGHTS

Do – follow the electronic disposal guidelines on the set before recycling and check with the local council for recycling information.

Don't – just chuck a set in the general bin as believe it or not, many lights can be recycled.

TOYS

Do – take toys out of the packaging put them in the general bin.

Don't – forget to take the batteries out and dispose of them at the local battery collection point. These are available at most supermarkets and can be found online.

Crematorium Raises Thousands for Charity



Two crematoria in County Durham have donated a total of £10,000 to local charities as a result of a share of surplus funds from a recycling scheme.

Sands, a stillbirth and neonatal death charity, and the North of England Children's Cancer Research Fund (NECCR,) have each received cheques of £5,000, from Mountsett Crematorium and Durham Crematorium respectively.

Durham County Council, which runs Durham Crematorium in partnership with Spennymoor Town Council and Mountsett in conjunction with Gateshead Council, is a member of the Metal Recycling Scheme run by the Institute of Cemetery and Crematorium Management (ICCM), which recycles metals which are left after a cremation.

Once written consent is given from each bereaved family, metals such as orthopaedic implants and materials used in the construction of the coffin are recycled by the ICCM with proceeds shared between

its members to donate to a charity of their choice.

Graham Harrison, the county council's bereavement services manager, said: "We're massively indebted to the generous families that have kindly donated these recycled metals to charity."

"Their consent, given at this difficult time for them, does mean that good causes continue to benefit."

The recycled metals scheme, which has been run in partnership with a Dutch company called Orthometals since 2006, makes a huge difference to the communities it serves, all while making the least possible impact on the environment.

NECCR fundraising manager Janet Price said: "We greatly appreciate receiving a portion of the proceeds from Durham Crematorium's recycling scheme. Every penny is integral in helping improve the lives of children and young people with cancer."

"Over 30 years ago when the NECCR was formed approximately 75 per cent of young people who contracted cancer died from the disease. Now, thanks to developments in research - funded by charities such as NECCR, approximately 75 per cent survive which wouldn't be the case were it not for the generosity of people in the North East."

Chairman's Medal for 80 year old Beamish Volunteer

A pensioner who has painstakingly built a steam locomotive from scratch has received County Durham's highest honour.

David Young has devoted more than 6,000 hours to recreating the working replica of a 19th Century narrow gauge engine based on a single surviving photograph of the original locomotive, known as Samson.

The engine is now on display at Beamish, The Living Museum of the North, where it was built over a period of three years by 80-year-old David from Fatfield, Washington.

Building Samson was part of David's contribution to society after recovering from a blood disease which required a liver transplant in 2001.

The Chairman of Durham County Council, Cllr Bill Kellett, has recognised David's dedication to preserving the past by awarding him the Chairman's Medal. He has also honoured the thousands of people past and present who have given up their spare time to volunteer at Beamish Museum's since its launch in 1970s with a separate award.

Cllr Kellett said: "David's reconstruction of an 1874 steam locomotive is a marvel of engineering expertise, especially given that he drew up his own plans and only had one original photograph from which to work. A fantastic achievement indeed – it would be very difficult in this day and age to find anyone else with his ability and technical expertise."

"The museum's volunteers have built Beamish up into the amazing, world renowned attraction it has now become. I am well aware

of the very large number who have contributed their time, knowledge and enthusiasm over the years."

Richard Evans, director of Beamish, said: "This award is a fantastic tribute to all our volunteers who make it possible for Beamish to continue to prosper. We are so proud of the recognition and grateful for everything they do."

"Beamish is supported by more than 500 active volunteers working in a wide range of roles right across the museum, from managing our collections behind the scenes to baking in our pit cottages. Volunteers work closely alongside our 430 staff – bringing the region's past alive for all our visitors. We simply couldn't do what we do without their help."

30 Dog Owners Fined Under New Control Order

Durham County Council has issued 30 fixed penalty notices (FPN) in the first five months of its Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) which seeks to tackle issues caused by a minority of irresponsible dog owners.

In the period between the order coming in on 1 June and 31 October, 23 people have been given the £100 notices for failing to pick up after their dog.

Six have been given FPNs for allowing their dogs to stray while one pet owner was given a FPN for allowing a dog into a fenced-off play area.

In addition to the FPNs handed out by the council, Shildon Town Council has also issued its first notice through the PSPO.

Town and parish councils are also authorised to enforce the order with staff from Great Aycliffe Town Council having undertaken the relevant enforcement training.

Despite clear signage stating dogs are not allowed to enter fenced-off play sites at Hackworth Park, a member of the public continued to allow their dog into the prohibited area and was therefore issued with an enforcement penalty. The priority is to ensure fenced-off play areas remain dog-free.

Under the PSPO, on-the-spot FPN's can be issued by the county council's neighbourhood wardens and officers from Durham Constabulary for:

- allowing a dog to foul

- without picking it up
- allowing a dog to stray
- allowing a dog into a fenced-off play area covered by the order
- failing to put a dog on a lead when asked by an authorised officer.

The council runs the #FollowOurLead campaign to encourage responsible dog ownership.

Cllr Brian Stephens, said: "Children and young people have the right to play in a clean and safe environment and excluding dogs from entering fenced-off play areas is just one of the steps we have taken to support this."

"We acknowledge the majority of dog owners in County Durham are responsible, but sadly some are not."

"The issuing of 30 FPNs shows we are prepared to take action against those who are irresponsible and we hope that our doing so brings about changes in behaviour."

Ian Hoult, the council's

neighbourhood protection manager, added: "Education and engagement is paramount to ensure all County Durham dog owners, and visitors to our county, understand dog control rules set out under the PSPO."

"Dogs should always be walked and exercised with a responsible owner. If visiting a children's play area with a dog, please exercise it outside of the fenced-off play area and pick up any mess and put it in a bin."

"Although dogs are allowed off-lead in some public spaces, including parks and countryside sites, authorised officers have the power to request dogs are put on a lead for public safety and protect children, other dogs and wildlife."

Please check local dog control policies before exercising dogs off-lead."

Police Warning to Owners of Keyless Cars

POLICE are urging owners of keyless entry cars to protect themselves from theft as a growing crime trend emerges.

Durham Constabulary says that keyless entry car theft is gaining proliferation nationally as criminals exploit technology to steal high value vehicles.

Criminals manipulate the vulnerabilities of the keyless system by capturing the signal from the car's fob and fooling the vehicle into believing the keys are with the vehicle so that it can be opened, started and driven away within minutes.

PC Dave Taylor, from Durham Constabulary's organised crime team, said: "While the risk of having your vehicle stolen in County Durham and Cleveland remains low compared to other areas of the UK, it is without a doubt that there are criminals in our area who have the technology to steal vehicles."

Now the force is urging people to use a 'Faraday bag' to protect themselves from being a victim of this crime.

Drivers can store their keys in a Faraday bag to prevent any unwanted communication between the vehicle and its keys. The bags are made of flexible metallic fabric and are used to block out electromagnetic fields.

Superintendent Kerrin Wilson from the Cleveland and Durham Specialist Operations Unit (CDSOU), said: "Vehicle security technology is constantly being advanced by vehicle manufacturers but unfortunately technology is also being developed and used by criminals to combat these new measures."

"We want to be one step ahead of the criminal fraternity and are working in partnership with car dealers across County Durham, Darlington and Cleveland to prevent the crime."

"The use of Faraday bags is a low cost effective solution and by popping your keys into the bag, the signal will be blocked and your car will be safe."

"The other added benefit is to put your mobile phone in the bag when driving thus blocking the signal, stopping your phone from distracting you and reducing the temptation to check your messages."

"Distractions such as mobile phones when driving contributes to a huge amount of road traffic collisions. "Be safe, be secure, and get one of these bags."

Surveys have shown that 13% of people leave their car keys on their hallway table; 25% leave their keys in a key pot or on a key hook and 15% put them in a drawer downstairs.

Supt Wilson added: "Putting your keys in a drawer may make you feel safe as they are out of sight, however this does not deter or protect you from being a victim of this kind of theft. A Faraday bag will." Faraday bags can now be purchased for just £2.60 from the Durham Agency Against Crime, please contact enquiries@daac.org.uk to order.

Garden Waste Collection Fees & the Alternative

Editor: We requested County Councillor John Clare to clarify this issue as some residents have interpreted the rules on Waste Collection wrongly

Dear Sir,
I acknowledge the letters recently which have criticised the rise in charges for garden waste collections. **THE BACKGROUND**
The background, of course, is that the government has cut £208 million PER YEAR from the Council's grants

and is cutting a further £15.3 million a year in 2018/19. That's £223,000,000 – almost a £_quarter-of-a-billion – every year – less than we got in 2010. In such a situation, the Council cannot spend money it does not have. It has to tailor the services it provides

within the budget it has available. Savings of such huge dimensions need some pretty extreme measures. Statutory services (those required by law, such as looked after children) are being required to operate as cost-efficiently as possible. Discretionary services

(provided voluntarily for the benefit of residents) will as far as possible have to pay for themselves.

GARDEN WASTE COLLECTIONS

Garden waste collections are a discretionary service introduced in the early 2000s, in a different world, by some district authorities in the county. The total cost is £1.8 million a year. Even after charges were introduced three years ago, they are still subsidised to the tune of £ half-a-million a year. The proposed price-rises are not, as one correspondent speculated, an attempt to destroy and shut down the service, but they are an attempt to make it pay for itself. To be honest, I personally do not think it is unacceptable to ask people with gardens to pay to dispose of their own garden waste – a duty everybody in the county accepted before 2000 – especially when the alternative is cutting much more essential services.

WHAT YOU CAN DO INSTEAD

Although not strictly allowed, small amounts of garden waste can be bagged and placed into

your domestic waste bin, whence it will be taken to Stockton and burned to make electricity – slightly less 'green' than turning it into compost as part of the garden waste collection, but better than dumping it into landfill.

Alternatively, you might wish to share a bin with a neighbour, or take it to the Heighington Lane Recycling Centre. Best of all, why not compost it yourself and improve your garden. What you must not do, however, is to put it as some people are suggesting into your recycling bin; the recycling waste is sorted by hand, and recycling bins containing garden waste will be rejected.

Neither should you dump your garden waste in a nearby wood or over the fence onto council grassland – that would be fly-tipping, and you will be getting a visit from the wardens and potentially a fine of anything up to £700-ish.

A 30p RISE

I am sorry that garden waste collection fees are having to rise, but in the circumstances there is no alternative. And – in the light of the huge cuts to the Council's grants – is a rise of 30p per collection really so terrible to ask?

WOMEN CONFIDENT IN REPORTING DOMESTIC ABUSE

WOMEN in Co. Durham feel increasingly confident to report cases of domestic abuse, according to Police Crime and Victims' Commissioner Ron Hogg.

The Office for National Statistics published figures this week showing the scale of domestic abuse in the UK. More than 10% of 16-24 year old women experienced it in the last year alone. The figures also identify Durham as one of the areas where cases of domestic abuse are most likely to be reported.

Ron Hogg said "These figures demonstrate that the scale of domestic abuse in the UK is a real cause for concern. I know that Police Forces across the country are encouraging women to report incidents so that they can be dealt with. Over 80% of prosecutions lead to a successful conviction in the

Durham Constabulary area." Ron added "I think we can take some comfort from the higher figures in Durham. It indicates to me that women know that they can report domestic incidents to the Police, that they will be taken seriously, and that the Police are committed to helping them. It's also very important that male victims of domestic abuse report incidents. Some men are reluctant to come forward, and they should know that the Police are just as committed to helping them".

Durham Constabulary's Domestic Abuse Innovations Team consists of specially trained officers introduced to improve the police response to those experiencing Domestic Abuse. In particular the team advising on effective safety planning for victims.

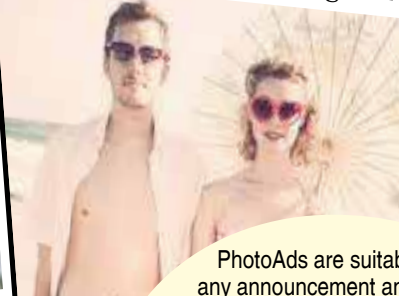
