County Remembers Victims of Genocide Groovy Street at Mad March

Millions of victims of murderous regimes are to be remembered in County Durham as part of a global commemoration.

Durham County Council is working alongside Durham Cathedral and the Holocaust Memorial Day (HMD) Trust to remember those killed by the Nazis, including six million Jews, and in subsequent genocides in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur.

International Holocaust Memorial Day is commemorated annually on 27 January, which coincides with the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi concentration and extermination camp.

HMD's theme for 2018 is the power of words which, whether spoken or written, can have a huge impact, whether good or bad. The theme explores how language has been used in the past.

As part of wider education about HMD, up to 250 secondary school pupils, from at least 12 County Durham schools, will take part in workshops on Friday, 26 January at the cathedral. Joni Stidwell, the council's education equalities team leader, said: "The aim of the workshops is to educate young people from across the county about the Holocaust and the important lessons to be learned for today.

"This collaborative annual event involves a lot of preparation but the feedback we receive from staff and young people tells us that it does have an impact in making young people think about the Holocaust and apply their knowledge to contemporary situations.

"As the theme of this year's Holocaust Memorial Day is 'The Power of Words', this reminds us all of the difference that words can make - both for good and evil."

An exhibition on the relatively unknown story of the Nazi persecution of Gypsy, Roma and Travellers will also be on display at the cathedral between Monday, 22 January and Friday, 26 January.

Information about HMD will also be available in libraries across County Durham the week commencing 22 January.

On Saturday 27 January, a public exhibition will take place at the Town Hall in Durham Market Place, between 10am and 3.30pm.

This will feature stories from the Nazi persecution of the Jews and accounts from the genocides in Darfur, Cambodia, Bosnia and Rwanda, as well as information on the 'Porrajmos' (Romani Holocaust).





A display explaining the Durham Light Infantry (DLI)'s involvement in the liberation of Bergen-Belsen death camp will also be available to view, with testimonies from both liberators and liberated.

The County Durham Faiths Network, representing members of different belief groups, has also contributed to the exhibition by submitting quotes and pieces of writing reflecting on the theme 'The Power of Words' and responding to the Holocaust and subsequent genocides.

And at nearby St Nicholas' Church, people are invited to attend a short act of commemoration at 1pm or drop in any time between 10am and 3.30pm to light candles and remember the victims of persecution.

The Town Hall, the DLI statue in the Market Place and the entrance to the church will all be turned purple to mark the holding of the exhibition. Uplighters will illuminate both inside and outside the hall.

Also on Saturday 27 January, the Durham Dales Centre in Stanhope, will host a creative writing and poetry workshop at 2.30pm, followed by a performance of spoken word and the reading of poems at 4pm.

Cllr Jane Brown, the council's Cabinet member for social inclusion, said: "The range of events and exhibitions will tell the very significant story of the victims of Nazi persecution and other genocides.

We hope the events will help to raise awareness of the positive effect kind words, or acts of kindness, can have on people and assist in inspiring community cohesion."

Children Glimpse Future of their School



A group of children got a glimpse into the future when they saw the steel which will build their new school being fabricated in a factory.

The Newton Aycliffe youngsters even got to sign some of the steel beams as construction firm SCH Site Services welcomed them to the firm's premises on Aycliffe Business Park.

Main contractor Construction awarded SCH a deal to fabricate and erect 115 tonnes of steel for Vane Road Primary School's new building on Čentral Avenue in Aycliffe.

SCH has now completed the six-week programme as Kier continues work at the site, adjacent to the school's existing building, which is expected to open in September 2018.

Finley said it was particularly pleasing to welcome local children into it his firm's factory on a local

project.
"We feel really proud to be working on Vane Road Primary School," he added. "It's really satisfying to see the work we do benefitting the local community. When the children from Vane Road came to visit SCH they were an absolute pleasure. They all behaved impeccably and were really interested to find out how their new school was going to be built."

During their visit to SCH, 24 Vane Road students got to see the process from design to construction as the firm's engineers showed them digital plans of the new building.

The youngsters, between seven and 11, then saw the steel being fabricated on the shop floor before they all signed parts of the beams which are already on site ready for the structure's next development phase.

The schools' head teacher Kieran Pavey said: "It was a fantastic opportunity for the children to go to a local company and see how their new school is being built. The new build is being constructed next to our existing site, so we've been doing lots of work with the children around the whole project and the actual fabric of the building, so they don't just think of it as a big steel structure being built.

"It was also goods for our students to see some of the work hands-on, and that may well inspire some of them to become engineers. One of the groups was led by a female engineer, and in what is a male dominated industry maybe we can inspire some of our young ladies to consider a career in engineering, which would be fantastic.



COUNCIL CONSULTATION ON Dangerous Laser Attack on **DURHAM HISTORY CENTRE**

People are being invited to have their say on the creation of a new history centre for Durham. following agreement by councillors to relocate the county's archive service.

Members of Durham County Council's

Cabinet heard today (17 January) that with plans to redevelop Aykley Heads being given the go ahead, Durham County Record Office will need to be rehoused as part of relocating County Hall.

Based in the building since it opened in 1963, the archives now sit in accommodation that has become outdated and unsuitable for the collection, and provides little space for future

Having considered a number of options. councillors have agreed to consult on developing a history centre in Durham at the disused Mount Oswald manor house, on South

People can have their say online or at a number of drop-in sessions taking place over the next few weeks. Under the proposals, the Grade II listed building would be renovated to offer fitting accommodation for the county's archives and provide space for its current and future needs.

In addition, it would offer an opportunity to bring the archives together with a wide range of other historical records which document the county's heritage, as well as incorporating facilities for exhibitions, events, research, educational and volunteering opportunities. The plans would also see the manor house

at Mount Oswald become home to Durham Register Office, providing enhanced facilities in an historic setting for weddings and other ceremonies.

Cllr Ossie Johnson, Cabinet member for tourism, culture, leisure and rural issues, said: "Our archives span 900 years of Durham's rich and wonderful history and are accessed over a million times a year, as people search records and historical information online, by phone or

"However, as their current home at County Hall is no longer fit for purpose these new proposals would ensure our irreplaceable heritage is protected for future generations.

Durham County Record Office's archive ranges from the middle ages to the present day and spans five miles of written and photographic records, covering all aspects of County Durham's history. Cllr Joy Allen, Cabinet member for

transformation, said: "This proposal to create a Durham history centre is very exciting and offers us a unique opportunity to make our precious archives far more accessible to residents and visitors alike.

"Co-locating complementary services in such a distinct and attractive venue would also enhance the services we offer and help attract many more visitors to the venue, and as such boost the city's economy.

Family Business

Helicopter Air Ambulance

The chief pilot of the Great North Air Ambulance Service (GNAAS) has warned against the dangers of laser strikes after his aircraft was once more targeted, this time while returning to base

after a call-out.
Captain Jay Steward,from
Newton Aycliffe, was
flying back from the Royal Victoria Infirmary (RVI) in Newcastle, to the charity's base at Durham Tees Valley Airport at 5.49pm on Sunday night, when a laser beam was shone into the helicopter's cahin

He said: "We had just taken off from the RVI and were 1.8 miles south east of Peterlee town centre when I saw a laser waving around in the air. You could tell the person using it was trying to locate us, and then one of the crew shouted 'laser!' and it shone onto the aircraft.

"Laser strikes are incredibly dangerous because it can cause temporary sight loss which can lead to the pilot losing control of the aircraft and putting themselves and the rest of the crew at risk." On this occasion the beam lit up the aircraft at a height of 1,800 feet but luckily it was only for a few seconds so it

This is the fourth time since November 2016 that the

did not damage the eyesight

of any of the crew.



charity's aircraft has been targeted by a laser, and the incident has been reported to the police and aviation authorities.

Captain Steward added: "They might think it's funny and clever but it's a serious offence. Recently a man who shone a laser at a police helicopter in Leicester was jailed for 20 weeks.
"We would ask people that

if they see someone using a laser pen recklessly, or have any video evidence of it to call the police."

The aircraft was returning to base from the RVI having airlifted a motorcyclist to the hospital. The patient had sustained multiple injuries after being involved in a collision on the A68, near Corbridge, Northumberland. He arrived in a stable

condition

UK Parliament is currently considering a new bill aimed at introducing tougher punishments for those found guilty of such laser strikes.
The Laser Misuse Bill,

which is due to be debated in the House of Lords next week, would introduce maximum five year jail terms and unlimited fines on those who have been found to have threatened aircraft safety. "It can't come soon enough," added Captain Steward.

Staff at Greenfield were very proud of their confident students who bravely took to the stage. Two of the contestants even took it upon





Following endorsement by Durham County Council's Cabinet today (January 17) the masterplan for Aykley Heads – home to Atom Bank and Salvus House – will now progress and a delivery model will follow later this year. The Aykley Heads redevelopment is supported by a number of regional organisations including the North East including the North East LEP and North East England Chamber as well as Durham University. The business park approach is also welcomed by high profile regional business people including Sir John Hall and Edward Twiddy – Chief Innovations Officer at Atom Bank.

More than 1,300 people (excluding the council's staff) are already employed across the site by 40 companies and there is currently very strong interest from a business looking to move into Northumbria House. The redevelopment of Aykley Heads is planned across three phases

– with the first phase likely to progress in the near future.

The redevelopment of Aykley Heads also involves council vacating the site and today the council's Cabinet members made a decision on where the organisation's new HQ will be built. Following a thorough procurement process the preferred bid is on the council's site at The Sands car park, opposite Freeman's Quay leisure centre.

Plan for 6,000 Jobs & £400m

The preferred bid was put forward by Kier Property Developments Limited whose costings to build the new HQ came in significantly less than the cost envelope for the project and of the amount associated with staying in County Hall. Terry Collins, Chief Executive

of Durham County Council said: "We have been delighted with the response from the four bidders however we feel the preferred proposal offers the best overall value.

Separately we have also agreed that the council will re provide The Sands parking spaces and that we will also facilitate additional parking nearby. There are a number of high quality developments currently underway along the city's waterside and we want to make

sure we complement those. The procurement process has delivered a scheme significantly less than the build cost envelope agreed previously by Cabinet agreed previously by Cabinet in July 2016. A new HQ will provide much smaller and fit for purpose civic facilities in a centre location with greatly reduced running costs and which can support the organisation's ambitious transformation programme. Investment in, and the expansion of, its centres at





The collapse of the Carillion company just shows how incredibly stupid Whitehall's policy of privatising parts of the health service has been. If we end these PFI contracts and bring buildings and equipment back into public ownership there are vast savings to be made for the NHS budget.

Directors of companies like Carillion, have paid themselves

fantastic amounts of public money awarded to their companies to carry out public sector contracts and build public works. As a direct result the Carrilion company has now collapsed unable to perform those contracts or pay pensions to their former workers.

One Carillion director alone received more than £1billion in the last two years according to a report on the Guardian Newspaper website. These are the same Top Civil Servants who want to shut our A and E in Darlington, because they say they cannot find an extra £271 million to keep running A and E on three sites in Teesside.



applied in multiple markets, including food inspection, bomb detection medical radiography, and the company is making considerable headway in all

Most significantly, IBEX is working with a number of NHS trusts to demonstrate how its technology can help hospitals improve the detection rates and diagnosis of osteoporosis, a bone disease which affects some three million people in the UK and is the highest cause of injury-related deaths.

PCVC TO INCREASE POLICE ELEMENT OF COUNCIL TAX BY LESS THAN £1 A MONTH

Government, Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner Ron Hogg has decided to increase the amount of Council Tax which goes to the police service, known as the precept, by 7.09%. This equates to an increase of £8 a year, or 15p a week for a property in Council Tax Band A. Members of the public are being asked to comment.

said: Ron Hogg Government has reduced the funding for policing in Durham and Darlington every year since 2010. We now have around 360 fewer officers than in 2010 – a reduction of 1 in 4." "I have been lobbying the Government for some years, to fund policing fairly. I did not expect the Government to respond by placing an additional burden on Council Tax payers. However, in my view they are abdicating their responsibility to protect our communities. This has put me in a position where, if I do not introduce this increase, I will be reducing the income of Durham Constabulary this year, and for every year afterwards. It will inevitably mean fewer Police Officers in the community, preventing and solving crime. I cannot do that without risking the safety of the community. The Government's decision to relax the cap on the precept equates to an extra 15p per week for a property in Council Tax Band A."



This morning the chairs of the Cleveland and Durham Local Criminal Justice Partnership, the Police and Crime Commissioner for Cleveland, Barry Coppinger, and the Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner for Durham. Ron Hogg have signed an innovative new plan at the Crown Prosecution Service offices in Middlesbrough.

The Cleveland and Durham Criminal Local Justice Partnership brings together agencies with responsibility delivering criminal justice, and services for victims and people who have offended. The partners have agreed a clear vision: 'County Durham, Darlington and Cleveland are areas where people have confidence in a local criminal justice system which supports victims, rehabilitates offenders and reduces re-offending, and delivers value for money'

The innovative new plan has three core objectives to be delivered by 2021:

- 1. An end-to-end service for supporting Victims and Witnesses
- 2. An end-to-end system for rehabilitating offenders and reducing re-offending.

3. The most efficient and integrated local criminal justice system in the country. Too often victims are let down by the system because they are passed from one agency to another and not properly supported. This has an impact both on their ability to cope and recover from crimes, and on the likelihood of justice being done. The plan will address this by creating seamless services for victims.

People who commit offences often have many problems in their lives, in particular with accommodation, substance misuse. relationships. substance self-esteem, finances and Instead employment. endlessly putting them through the cycle of the criminal justice system, partners are going to work together to address the underlying issues of offending, which will help to prevent crime and result in fewer victims.

No Difference in Drug and Drink Driving

Police have revealed the results of a drink and drug drive crackdown Cleveland and Durham.

More than 4,000 drivers breath-tested throughout December by the Cleveland and Durham Specialist Operations Unit (CDSOU) during their annual Christmas drink and drug drive campaign. In total, 119 drivers were arrested for drink-driving and 60 were arrested for drug driving. This compares to 116 drinkdrivers and 57 people who tested positive for drugs during the same campaign last year.

A number of operations to stop check vehicles were carried out, both in the morning and the evening, where drivers were asked to provide a voluntary breath test.

Officers also targeted activities in areas known for drink-related collisions and drink or drug drive offenders.

Chief Inspector Grahame Milne, of the CDSOU, said: "Drink-driving accounts for one in six UK road deaths. This is

a stark statistic which we hope will hit home with anyone who is even driving considering under the influence.

"We continue to warn people against the dangers of drink and drug driving but unfortunately, there is still a small but significant number of people who seem to think they can take risks with their own lives, and those of others by driving under the influence.
