Great Aycliffe Events is a Private Company Limited By Guarantee, with a Company Secretary and two Directors, one of whom is Mr Russ Gibson.

The company appears to restrict its liabilities to £1. The company was founded on 17 April 2017. If we had been told that at the start the heading of Private and Confidential. (The application form, the Town Clerk's of the negotiations in April 2017, we would have informed the applicants that under the regulations applying in our Council, we would be unable to supply any financial support, staff support or the use of any equipment belonging to the Council. The Council should also charge for the use of our facilities and as the company was limited to £1 liability, we would require a very large bond, up front, well before the proposed event. The company would also have to provide evidence of a Public Liability Insurance Policy and we would also advise that they take out an insurance policy against cancellation of the event or damage to property. Included in the application was a very good safety document, which had been prepared by a reputable

We are proposing a reference back so that the Recreation Committee can reconsider its decision not to allow the Great Aycliffe show applicants to proceed further.

We believe the Recreation Committee should meet with the Organisers to discuss in public any questions, doubts, reservations, concerns it has with their proposals.

The organisers are waving their rights to privacy and it

is only decency and courtesy the Recreation Committee afford them an opportunity to answer all and any questions the Officers and Councillors have. In such an open, face to face meeting, Officers and Councillors will be able to ask questions on all and every aspect of concern.

Thus it would become clear then and only then, if the proposal was workable and has merit or that it was not viable, with every doubt or question answered or not. Without such a face to face

meeting in open Committee there will always be the perception in the public's mind as to why were they not allowed to put their case, to explain and detail any

information the Council wants, in a formal but friendly meeting with the Council. The Council has nothing to lose by doing so. Indeed it has a public duty to do so. This is not a party political matter, nor should it be.

experience in providing safety at events. safety at event Unfortunately there was no business plan organisational plan. Therefore many questions needed to be answered.

A major question which needed to be answered is how the event was to be financed. When the Council organised the Show, it cost in the region of £30,000. In initial discussions about funding it was indicated that support would be sought from local businesses and that it would be a ticketed event and this was indicated in the application form.

However, other documents indicate that this may be a free event, depending on support or sponsorship.

The applicants believed they would attract 7,000 people to the Show (this is a much larger number than the average attendance at free shows in the past). What would happen on the day if it rained or the event had to be cancelled or curtailed? (this has happened in the past). Remember Great Aycliffe Events Ltd would only be liable for £1. There are other questions which would need to be answered regarding

The application was for the use of the fields for 3 days one day to set up the show the day of the event, and one day to clear the site. The Council's experience of

running previous shows is that it takes 4 days to set up prior to the event depending on the elements of the show) and a day and a half to completely clear the site. In the opinion of the meeting, the application for 3 days was totally unrealistic.

In the application it is stated 'attractions roughly include military displays Army'. military displays – Army. What type of displays – static, recruiting or a display of a platoon or company attack? Which units have been contacted and agreed to attend at a date sometime

in July or August? I could go on but all of the information on which the committee based its decision is on the Council website. 3rd Place at Local Driver's First International Race

Local Racing Driver Max Coates claimed 3rd spot on the A2 class podium, finishing 70th out of 96 cars overall and 21st out of 36 cars in the TCE Class for touring type cars. As the slowest pair of cars in the field, to finish alone is a massive achievement. The sister car won the A2 class, and finished 50th overall and 10th in the TCE class. The event as a whole was a great experience and Max learnt a

lot about endurance racing. Max joined the Ciceley Motorsport team in Dubai for both of their international endurance racing debuts and they came away with a double podium. The Hankook Dubai 24 hour race is recognised as the start of the motorsport season and is a challenge for car, team and driver.

The team with which Coates has driven to three Renault UK Clio Cup victories took two Renault Clio's to the Middle East sporting fuel tank, braking and spot light endurance racing upgrades. Heading the multi-national driver line up in car 164 the North Yorkshire based driver claimed 2nd on the grid in the A2 class, just ahead of the

sister car. The A2 class is designed for smaller engine touring cars. With 96 cars on the entry list in total the grid was split into GT (faster sports cars) and TCE (touring type cars), in which Ciceley was racing against another 34 teams.

At the start the 164 car held 2nd place in A2, with only the other Ciceley Motorsport Renault Clio ahead. An early alternator belt failure put the car back to third place before a crash with another driver at around mid-race distance gave the mechanics their opportunity to shine. An hour and a half later they had fixed the damage and had the car back on track, but hopes of a race win were slipping away. The 162 Ciceley Motorsport Clio and 171 Peugeot of

Danish team Johnson Danish team Johnson Consulting ran with little mechanical issues and as a result Max and his team took the final podium spot. Max's team mates in car 162 took the win, finishing 10th in the TCE class and 50th in the overall results, a staggering achievement. Max said "We'd have liked to

come away with a 1-2 for the team but really, just to finish this race is an achievement. We climbed over 25 spots to

70th overall and were 21st out of 36 TCE cars which, along with the A2 podium is a great result. I have loved the experience and would definitely like to do more of this kind of racing in the future alongside my sprint racing commitments."

Coates is hoping to announce his 2018 racing campaign shortly and is working closely with his sponsors, Harron Homes, Clements, Primex Plastics (Aycliffe), PLASgran Recycling and JT Atkinson Builders Merchants.

As I write my New Year update on policing in the Great Aycliffe and Middridge area I am struggling to believe that already January is drawing to a close! I'm sure many of you, like me, are looking forward to the lighter nights again!

In Early 2017 we set up an Anti-Social Behaviour Panel covering Newton Aycliffe and Middridge. This panel meets monthly and includes police and our partners such as the Fire Service, Street Wardens, Council, Livin Housing and a

These regular meetings enable us to share information more effectively and work together at addressing the ASB issues we have long suffered including off road bikes, small fires and general nuisance incidents. We also use a scanning system now where Police, Fire and Council download information daily. We all have access to this data so that we can be more effective at tackling issues. In the past 12 months we have seen a significant reduction in ASB. I would like to thank residents and those who work within our area for their continued support and for continuing to call us and report incidents. All information is important to us and is assisting us to reduce such behaviour in

In November 2017 we suffered three commercial burglaries on Aycliffe Industrial Estate. A further burglary occurred on the industrial Estate earlier this January. Through some excellent proactive work by the Neighbourhood Policing Team in Avcliffe and excellent support from our colleagues in CID and CSL a male was arrested and charged having admitted three of the four burglaries. Unfortunately we continue to

suffer from spates of vehicle crime. In December and early January we had another spate and a male was subsequently arrested and charged with several of these offences. However he is not alone in committing these offences in our town.





Our MEP Talks of Trade Do You Have What it Takes? **Bill Power Vacuum**

Kirton-Darling, "Jude Labour Member of the European Parliament for the North East of England, this week gave evidence to the Trade Bill Committee in Westminster. The Trade Bill is a key piece of legislation that sets out new powers for the government to negotiate trade deals.

Currently trade deals are negotiated by the EU on behalf of its member states, with the European responsible Parliament for ensuring democratic oversight. But should the UK leave the EU customs union, there's a real risk that the new UK system would result in a power vacuum, with deals concluded behind closed doors and no scrutiny rights for Parliament.

At a time when the UK is redefining its position on trade with the EU and rest of the world it is vital that any new laws set out proper mechanisms to ensure that trade policy remains transparent and democratic. Jude travelled from Brussels to tell the Committee what she thinks about the Bill. Her wealth of knowledge from sitting on the European Parliament's International Trade Committee, together with her experience of leading steel workers across Europe means that she can bring a great deal of expertise to the proceedings.

said: "My main issue with the Trade Bill is that it would afford MPs only half of the powers MEPs currently have; MPs could still veto trade deals, but would have virtually no role during the negotiations. EU trade negotiations are by no means perfect, but there has been a lot of progress made in recent years in terms of transparency and democratic control.

I am very concerned that when the UK leaves the EU the rights that were hard won over a number of years will be watered down. This can have very concrete repercussions on the content of trade deals too - under the Tories' proposal, the government would do what it wants in negotiations and opposition MPs would have little other option than vote against trade deals. In Brussels, social democrats are not the majority but thanks to parliamentary scrutiny we can actually influence trade policy. I'll advise the committee today not to forget that today's

government is tomorrow's opposition.

In the Newton News of 19th January 2018, Nigel Boddy is drumming up support for a campaign to "Save the A&E Dept. at Darlington Memorial Hospital" and also, in the same issue, decrying "Whitehall's" policy on privatisation of the Health Service by financing Hospital building via. PFI Contracts. I am unaware of any alleged

local plan to close the A&E Department. However, having watched Prime Minister's Question Time, and the BBC's "Victoria Derbyshire" programme, and indeed, the BBC news, I am well aware of the Labour Party's agenda to 'weaponise' our National Health Service. Personally, I think they are using the National Health Service as a smokescreen to thwart the Leave vote. If you voted leave, and even if you are a 'lunatic' and/or a 'racist' who voted Leave, be aware of the establishment's attempts to discredit and therefore ignore,

While the MP's are explaining about their attitude to local health services they can also explain how, after being elected on a Brexit Manifesto, they intend to implement the wish of the LEAVE voters.

Whatever the truth in this matter, it is clear that there is turmoil in the local Labour Party such that the electorate, and their membership, do not trust them to do what
