

Livin Answer Questions on Regeneration Scheme

Dear Sirs. We have been following closely the articles and letters about the future of the Western estate. Some have contained facts and relevant information. However, unfortunately some have been misrepresentative, misleading and upsetting for many residents. For these reasons we want to put the record straight.

The regeneration of Western has been on our radar since 2014. This is because day-inday-out, as the main housing provider on the estate we deal with reported problems and do all we can to maintain and improve the estate for people living there. It remains our ambition to address these problems through regeneration based on strong community support through consultation. At the beginning of the consultation we asked residents what the estate is known as and those who engaged – including Mr Chandran who originally volunteered to be a community champion for the

project - told us it is known locally as Western. This name is also used officially for street signage and building names and has been for many years. In terms of the five questions that Mr Chandran has stated publicly that "Livin needs to answer" and which he claims came from his "visits," these are not questions we have come across when discussing the facts with over 200 residents so far. Nonetheless we are happy to respond as follows: Question 1 Who were the Private Sector Partners in

2014? In 2014 we considered the viability of regenerating Western with private sector partners on an informal basis. This was to establish possible options for redevelopment and associated costs. At this time regeneration was deemed

not possible because of a funding gap of £15million. However, should regeneration progress following the current consultation. private sector partners may or may not be required. At this point in time no private sector partners are involved.

Ouestion 2 Why Private Sector Partners? Answered above Question 3 Who at County Council have they agreed with in 2014 to demolition and rebuild? Our County Councillors have been deafeningly

silent ! Livin has not agreed to carry out demolition and rebuild with Durham County Council. any of its officers or any of its Councillors. Question 4 Livin misled their

Volunteers and Champions and Residents raide Champions and Residents pretending there were 3 Options when 4 years earlier, secretly, behind the scenes with Durham County Council they bed only one Council they had only one Option.

This is not a question, it is an allegation that is completely incorrect. Livin has, over the last 12 months and throughout the process of engaging with this community, been very open and clear about the options for the estate. There is more than one option. albeit we know, from what residents have told us, that Option 3 is the only option that would fully address their concerns. In recent weeks and in line with the community engagement plan we have

stepped up the consultation and spoken to hundreds of people. We will continue people. we will continue this until we have contacted as many local stakeholders as possible to determine their preferences.

As we have said throughout. As we have said throughout, we will only progress to masterplanning with strong community support. If that support is achieved this means the community will have the opportunity to work with us to develop a plan to show how the estate could look. Alongside this we will develop a Residents' Charter that will set out Livin's commitments to all residents together to all residents together with opportunities and arrangements for protecting residents' interests. But there is significant investment needed if regeneration is to go ahead and this has not been secured. We will not seek to secure investment without secure investment without strong community support. Question 5 Why was Garburn Place not included in the Scheme?

The reason Garburn Place has not been included is that from our management of the area and based on the data we hold it is clear that it does not experience the same issues as the Western estate. However, the if Mr Chandran, GARA, the Town Council or indeed any residents from Garburn Place feel differently we would of course be open to listen to their concerns and look to consider it as part of the overall regeneration project. Ultimately, it is the people directly affected by the proposed regeneration who will decide the future of the south of the project of the second se

estate - not Livin. This is why we are urging everyone to get in touch and state their preference. As mentioned earlier, we

are becomingly increasingly concerned that misleading information is being circulated and we urge residents to take a position based on the facts and what is best for the future of the estate and generations to come

We have recently become aware that residents of the estate have been incorrectly

than Livin that if they support Option 3 and move off the estate they will not have a right to move back and there is a chance they will be moved to other localities some distance away. This is completely untrue and we are very concerned that this misinformation is causing distress. We wish to reassure residents that, should the project go ahead and in the event that residents have to move off the estate temporarily whilst work is being done, all homeowners, Livin tenants and private landlords would have the option to return to the estate. We have been asked this question previously and the factual answer can be found on our frequently asked questions sheet handed out during our home visits and is also available on our Western website.

We are also aware of Mr Chandran's petition against the project. We would like to stress that the decision as to whether the project moves to the next phase, will only be based on the preferences stated by residents and collected by Livin over several months of engagement. We are doing this to ensure all residents' voices are heard, not just the loudest, and that they make their choices based on the facts

We are urging residents who might be concerned about having stated their preference based on misinformation provided by sources other other s. We than Livin to contact us. are still consulting and we are determined to ensure the residents of this estate are fully informed with the facts in making their decision. At Livin we care passionately about this community and believe that regeneration of the Western estate would provide a wonderful opportunity to help address the problems that many residents have to deal with every day. A milk service has returned to the streets of Newton Aycliffe and businesses are Aycliffe and businesses are now getting a piece of it. Local businessman Russ Gibson launched Aycliffe Dairies in April after local research carried out on social media cave a demend for the carrier saw a demand for the service. Just over a month since starting the business, he's already delivering almost 1,000 glass bottles of milk and juice a week to customers in Aycliffe and surrounding

areas. The 36-year-old is now also delivering to local businesses who have been quick to see a nostalgic return of the traditional morning milkman, which started to fade in the 1990s.

1990s. As well as amassing 200 residential customers already, Russ is now providing milk and cream to Jackson's Coffee Shop and Sabre Rail on Aycliffe Business Park, as well as the Bay Horse in Middridge and Horndale Infant's School. It has been claimed the war on plastic waste could spark the return of the neighbourhood milkman as figures showed demand for milk in glass bottles is on the rise.

In 1975, 94% of the UK's milk was transported in glass bottles compared to just under 3% in 2016. That could soon change, as milkmen are reporting a rise in demand traditional glass bottles with consumers appearing to boycott the plastic alternatives



SCHOOL SUPPORTS APPEAL Extra Staff Trained to Issue Christian Aid **Fines for Dog Fouling etc.**

The region's largest council is stepping up the fight against littering and dog Durham County fouling. Council has increased the number of staff members who are able to hand out fines for environmental crimes

An extra 14 council workers, including head of Direct Services Oliver Sherratt and the authority's clean and green team leaders, have received additional training and are now authorised to issue Fixed Penalty Notices (FPN).

They join neighbourhood wardens, PCSOs, police officers and some town and parish council staff in being qualified to issue the fines for offences such as littering and dog fouling as well as flytipping, graffiti, flyposting and untidy yards and gardens.

Between April 2017 and March 2018. Durham County Council issued 464 FPNs for littering, 396 for untidy yards or gardens and 35 for dog fouling.

To reinforce the message that environmental crimes will not be tolerated, the council has increased the maximum penalty littering to £150. for

This is in line with government guidance and is discounted to $\pounds 65$ if the fine is paid within 10 days. However, anyone who fails to pay could be taken to court where the maximum fine is £2,500.

The FPN for dog fouling is £100, reduced to £60 if paid within 10 days. Anyone

to court for taken payment could face a fine of up to £1,000.

Cllr Brian Stephens, Cabinet member for neighbourhoods and local partnerships, said: "Most people do the right thing and bin their litter but there is a minority who don't despite the fact that bins are provided throughout the county and emptied on a regular basis.

"By increasing FPNs to the maximum possible level we're hoping that we send out a clear message that litter will not be tolerated in



which 31 Tenants, 14 Home Owners, 3 Private Tenants In Silverdale we met 2 Owners undecided and 2 Tenants in favour of Livin's

Option3 In Langdale we met only l owner and 2 Tenants in favour of Livin's Option 3. In Eskdale we met only 1 Owner who was undecided and 2 Tenants in favour of Livin's Option 3

was undecided, 1 Owner in favour and 3 Tenants in favour of Livin's Option 3. In Kirkstone 1 Owner was in favour and 2 Tenants in favour of Livin's Option 3. In Honister 2 Owners in favour and 6 Tenants in favour of Livin's Option 3. What is clear so far is that Tenants are overwhelmingly against Livin's Option 3, despite Livin's offer of £6,100 to each tenant if the

scheme goes ahead. Residents are rock solid whether Owner or Tenant against the scheme. In a lot of cases Tenants and

Owners have recently had visits from Livin and were completely unsatisfied by Livin's answers. First visits

completed 20.5.2018 The Total Opposed to Livin's Option 3: **214** (of which Owners 91, Tenants 123) Only 21 were in favour of demolition and did not sign the petition (of which Owners 5, Tenants 16).

Following a significant investment, a new entrance investment, a new entrance is for all patients other than those arriving by ambulance and there's a new, larger, reception area, where a senior clinician will stream patients as they arrive, to determine the most appropriate person to lead their care. lead their care.

Kerry Dawson, general manager for acute & emergency care at County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust, said, "At the moment all patients enter through the entrance at the front of the hospital, next to the main entrance, but this the main entrance, but this will now only be used by those arriving by ambulance, who tend to be the most poorly and who can be prioritised, going straight into the Emergency

Department. Patients using the new entrance to our Urgent Treatment Centre will be seen by one of our senior

happens as soon as possible and smoothly. "Patients can also make appointments with the Urgent Treatment Centre, via the 111 service. This removes some of the uncertainty for natients of the uncertainty for patients around when they will be seen. With an appointment, they can also self-check in when they arrive – another time-saving new facility.

"We're delighted with our new facilities and the benefits they will bring for patients but would like people to consider other treatment options before attending, including community pharmacists, their own GP and the 111 service. That way, we can preserve emergency services for those who need them most."


