





IT LOOKS VERY MUCH LIKE A NO, NO! LIVIN

Cllr Ken Robson Vice Chairman of Great Aycliffe Residents' Association and Cllr Arun Chandran Secretary, are working very hard to ensure residents of West Ward get a say in Livin's Regeneration Plan. What is clear so far is that Tenants are overwhelmingly against Livin's Option 3, whether an Owner or Tenant. In a lot of cases residents have received visits from Livin and were completely unsatisfied by their answers. GARA strongly recommend

them, but they are vague with their answers and refuse to give any guarantees in writing.

GARA continue with the Petition till all homes have responded. There are 514 homes of which 351 have responded so far with 88% against Livin's Option 3.

Total Homes Opposed to Livin's Option 3 as at 19.6.2018 are: 300 (of which : Owners 117, Tenants 183). Only 41 were in favour of demolition, (of which Owners 10, Tenants 31) with people ask Livin to visit 10 to make their minds up.

New MRI Scanners Installed in Our Two Hospitals

Newton News Proud to Have Blown the Whistle

at Darlington Patients Memorial Hospital can now benefit from the second of two new state of the art MRI scanners at County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust. The scanner has been purchased in part thanks to the generosity of local people, business organisations who and have been donating to a fundraising appeal. The appeal, which will continue to fund-raise until the end of 2018, has also brought a new MRI scanner to Bishop Auckland Hospital, installed in December 2017.

Loney, Elizabeth Dr Radiologist Consultant said, "I'm delighted that our patients are now benefiting from this

technology. innovative Modern scanners play an important part in helping our Consultants diagnose and determine treatment plans for what can be life threatening or life limiting conditions, including many types of cancer and heart disease.

Previously patients had to undergo exploratory and sometimes invasive surgery to support the diagnostic process. This advanced technology, which provides detailed and high quality images, will help reduce

many such interventions. At Darlington, we also have a purpose built new MRI suite with spacious changing facilities and areas where patients can be cannulated and, when

I was more than pleasantly surprised by my more recent experience at Darlington. It felt like the difference between Economy and First Class. Because the technology is so new, the scan itself was much quicker, I was able to hear and reply to the radiographer in the control room, who talked to me throughout the scan. Being able to choose lighting themes may not sound much but it's very calming and I also like the idea that you can watch a film - all meaning a much better experience. The staff were very attentive





Over 40 PE teachers from across the county came to Greenfield Community College recently to take part in the annual 'Greenfield PE Teachmeet' event.

The hugely successful evening was designed for teachers to share their good practice and learn from highly skilled classroom practitioners from across the area. Organiser of the Teachmeet and one of the presenters, Greenfields Subject Leader for PE, Martin Subject Leader for PE, Martin Butterworth commented 'This has been an outstanding display of enthusiastic and passionate teachers sharing excellent practice with one another. 

Great Opportunity for Aycliffe to Attract Railway Buffs

The star attraction at a recent Town Council meeting was Trish Pemberton, who talked the Bicentenary of about the Stockton & Darlington Railway, and encouraged the Town Council to think about how it might support the event The S&DR, she told us, had opened in 1825. There had been anniversaries in 1875, 1925 (when the future king and queen attended), and and queen attended), and 1975 (which many councillors

remembered). With the anniversarv approaching, the Friends of the Stockton and Darlington Railway had realised the need to protect and restore the line, and to organise a proper celebration of its 200th birthday.

This had required bringing three Councils Darlington together (Stockton, Darlington and Durham), as well as forming links with essential organisations such as Durham University, Palace Green Museum, Network Rail, Hitachi, the Science Museum

The campaign had kicked off two years ago with a major conference at the Locomotion Museum, at which the S&DR's claim to be the 'first in the world' had been out to the test. At that meeting, delegates had been shocked to be told that the S&DR was NOT the first public railway, NOT the first steam-powered railway, NOT the first passenger railway, and NOT the first to be built as a result of an Act of Parliament. It could not even boast the first railway death! What made

made the S&DR spectacular, Trish told us, was not the individual firsts, but the fact that the S&DR was the first railway to put everything together. It was a public not a private railway, with a permanent main line plus branch lines. It used standard gauge with malleable iron rails. It carried a range of goods, along with passengers. It proved railway

technology worked (Shildon's Timothy Hackworth was instrumental in this) and established the reliability of steam locomotives. It invented the railway station, passenger timetables, and signals. It was PROFITABLE, and it immediately attracted visitors from all over the world (esp. Prussia, France and the USA) who went back home and copied it.

i.e it was where the fullyfunctioning modern railway system was born. It is therefore a UNIQUE offer, and not just for tourists and railway buffs – it was the line's heritage offer that had brought investment from Hitachi into Newton Aycliffe. SO WHAT HAS BEEN

ACHIEVED? (1) The Friends have done a track-bed audit, identifying 617 assets (including the Locomotion Pub, which the Friends are trying to buy and restore), which the three Councils have promised to

protect and restore. (2) A Railway Heritage Board has been set up, including the three Councils plus key organisations such as Network Rail and Hitachi. This meets regularly to plan progress.

(3) The line has been granted Heritage Action Zone (HAZ) status by Historic England, which will oversee the regeneration of the line, with up to £700k to spend on doing

The HAZ is not just about organising another spectacular cavalcade, as in 1975. The focus of the project has to be on regeneration, economic and community development, and on SUSTAINABILITY ... on making changes that will on making changes that will create "a lasting legacy" for the area. One such will hopefully be a 26-mile walking/cycling route along the entire length of the line. There must be other gains in terms of tourism gains in terms of tourism, local business growth ... and the development of local pride

and a 'sense of place'.

Reported Crime Up!

REPORTED CRIMES Durham and in County Durham and Darlington increased over the past year, according to the latest Performance Report from Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner, Ron

Hogg. The report indicates that the number of reported victimbased crimes rose by 32%, whilst levels of anti-social behaviour reduced by 11% over the twelve months to

March 2018. At the same time, residents of Durham and Darlington have greater confidence in the Police than almost anywhere else in the country. 84% of people agree that 'taking everything into account I have confidence in the police', whilst Durham is rated higher

than any other force for 'community understanding'. Commenting on the report, Police, Crime and Victims'

Commissioner Ron Hogg said "There have been real Hogg increases in crimes such as theft, robbery and arson, but the increase is also due to changes to the national requirements for crime requirements for crime national recording: more incidents such as harassment are now recorded as crimes, for

example. added "The Sunday He Times reported last weekend that Durham has the highest 'solved rate' for crimes of any force in England and Wales, mainly because of the Constabulary's on-going commitment to neighbourhood policing. 

POLICY 23 – DELIVERING SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT

sustainable transport choices by: • Seeking to put new development in locations which minimise the distance and time of

Making the best use of existing public

Making the best use of existing public transport and the highways network; and
 Integrating sustainable transport choices into the design of new developments, which will be planned to maximise opportunities for travelling according to the following priority: those with mobility issues or disabilities, walking, cycling, public transport, car sharing and alternative fuel vehicles.

The Plan will protect Rights of Way, Railway Paths and Green Infrastructure, and a new County Durham Cycling Delivery Plan will identify a proposed cycling network (including 'Cycling Super Routes').

As for cars, the Plan will establish parking standards which focus on limiting car parking supply at destination. It will also set minimum car parking standards that house builders must

car parking standards that house builders must adhere to when building new housing, and it will encourage electric vehicle charging infrastructure and car sharing bays. **POLICY 24 – DURHAM CITY SUSTAINABLE TRANSPORT** This policy seeks to relieve the pressure of traffic around Durham by a number of measures including a new 'Western Relief Road' (from Broompark to Sniperley) and a new 'Northern Relief Road' (from Lanchester Road to Carrville): both these proposed roads Road to Carrville); both these proposed roads will run through the Green Belt. POLICY 25 – OTHER ROUTES AND FACILITIES

Other transport proposals in the Plan include an eastern by-pass for Barnard Castle, the reinstatement of the Leamside train line from Ferryhill to Gateshead, a new station at Horden, and an inland rail freight interchange

The Plan is aware of a proposal for a new north Darlington by-pass linking the A167/A1(M) junction 59 to the A66, which could have potential benefits to Newton Aycliffe Business Park as a result of improved links to Teesport. Although the majority of this link road will be located in Darlington the County Durhom Plan will safeguard the small part of the route in County Durham, specifically the link to the A1M junction.


