

either of the knitting groups: You can collect wool from St. Marv's Hall on Wednesdays between 1pm and 3pm, when that group meets.

There is also a group at Crafters Companion on a Wednesday 2pm to 4pm (Knit and Natter Group). Everyone is welcome to attend and join in with poppy making. Completed poppies will also be on sale at Crafters Companion,



proceeds to Poppy Appeal. Anyone wishing to join them is welcome. Patterns can also be downloaded from the internet.

KNITTED POPPY PATTERN

(Large Poppy) - 3.5/3.75mm (UK 9), DK Yarn, Black Button

Cast on 120 stitches. Rows 1 to 4 Knit. Row 5 Knit 3 stitches together across the row - 40 stitches. Row 6 to 9 Knit. Row 10 Knit 2 stitches together across the row - 20 stitches. Row 11 to 14 Knit. Row 15 Knit 2 stitches together across the row - 10 stitches.

Break off yarn with long tail and thread back through remaining stitches and pull tight.

Join edges with mattress stitch. Use a black button to sew to centre of the poppy.

Durham County Consultation Plan | Should've Gone To | JOIN THE HOG BLOG



Dear Editor

As reported in the Newton News for the last couple of weeks ago The Durham County Plan is in the consultation phase and it is important that the views of those in the Great Aycliffe Area are heard. One way it will affect us in where and how many houses are built in this area. The Town Council are happy to see continued development of the Industrial Estate and of more housing to serve the needs of those who live and move to work in this area. Whilst we are pleased to see the development of housing on sites such as that at Copelaw, we are concerned about the County Council's proposal to designate the

area at Cobblers Hall which runs alongside Burnhill way (DCC Plan Reference runs Number H33 - [7/NA/186]) as a site for housing development.

Although this area may look an ideal site, there are two main factors that the Town Council are concerned about. The first is that the site was previously marked by Durham County Council and earlier by Sedgefield District Council as an area that was unstable and therefore completely unsuitable for building land. Secondly, the site is also of historical and biological interest. It has been suggested that this area has been untouched

since Roman times, perhaps

those in the past have known

its current designation as a development site. It's also a habitat for an extensive amount of wild flora and fauna. The Town Council Planning Committee are of the opinion that this area is of extreme biodiversification interest and should be preserved as an undeveloped piece of land. If you agree with the Council on this issue, please go on to the Durham County Plan web site and add your weight to the argument for preserving this site.

and if not rescued die a slow and painful death WHAT TO DO IF YOU FIND A SICK/INJURED HOG

Injuries - take to a vet asap Hogs out during the day may need help (sitting in one place for a lengthy period, wobbling but not when collecting nesting materials). WHAT TO FEED A HEDGEHOG

are lactose intolerant ONLY GIVE a few dried mealworms mixed in with food (a whole diet of mealworms causes calcium deficiency)



experience on-board will be completely transformed. Each new train will offer fast, free Wi-Fi in both Standard and First Class as well as complimentary on-board entertainment system, Exstream, allowing customers to stream the latest movies and TV shows during their journey.

British businesses will be chosen to supply train parts. The investment in these new trains is supporting thousands of jobs across the UK through

Hitachi's decision to choose over 30 UK firms to supply key components. Businesses chosen include Lucchini Unipart Rail (LUR), whose Manchester factory will build wheel sets for the trains The fleet will also support

long-term jobs at depots along the route, including Hitachi's newly built £80million depot in Doncaster. Hitachi is using its famous

Japanese-bullet train tech-nology to make the new Nova 1 fleet light and aerodynamic. The 19 trains will all be hybrid, meaning they can switch seamlessly midjourney between electric and diesel power. A local school has come up with a novel way to promote reading over the summer. 

Police Forces Reveal


Drink Drive Results

Cleveland and Durham police have revealed the results of their latest drink drive campaign. One hundred and ninety three

drivers were charged with drink and drug driving offences or failing to provide across Cleveland and Durham.

Mass screenings and stop checks were carried out at roadside checkpoints, both in the morning and evening, where drivers were asked to provide a voluntary breath test. 3,400 tests were administered in their most recent crackdown which ran from June 14 for a month.

Inspector Jonathan Malcolm of the Cleveland and Durham Specialist Operations Unit, said: "We made it absolutely clear to drivers that we would be stepping up our efforts and we warned people against the dangers of drink and drug


