The official opening of Cobbler's Hall Play Area took place on Friday 3rd The official August.

The new, much-anticipated,  $\pounds 150,000$  project, which includes a substantial play area and Multi-Use Games Area, was delivered by Great Aycliffe Town Council, with financial support from Durham County Council. Great Aycliffe Town Council entered into an agreement with Durham County Council to adopt the County Council's existing small play

area and redevelop it into a highly-valued play facility for residents. The project was funded by £20,000 from the Great Aycliffe and Middridge Partnership Area Budget, a further £45,000

from Durham County Councillors' Neighbourhood Budgets and £15,000 from Durham County Council's Delivering Differently fund. This was match-funded by Great Aycliffe Town Council, with an initial £75,000 capital investment. The Town Council also



From Monday the 9th of July until Thursday 12th July, Woodham Academy's More Able students travelled to Rome. Although only being in Rome itself for two and a half days, the trip managed to take in many of the major sites of this great city. 25 students (year 7 to year

10) and 3 members of staff (Mrs Scott, Mr Zielinski and Mr Gore) arrived in Rome early Monday afternoon, and after dumping their bags at the hotel, hit the street to make their way to the Time Elevator (a 4D cinematic experience detailing the history of Rome and its most famous inhabitants) grabbing а quick pizza on route. After being thoroughly educated

on the lives of Augustus, Michelangelo and Bernini they set off back to the hotel, via the Trevi Fountain, to eat more pizza and get an early night.

The next day students set off bright and early to catch the packed rush hour metro to St Peter's Basilica and The Vatican. The group was met by a local guide and shown around the interior of the Vatican museums, seeing incalculable sculptures,

The visit culminated in the Sistine Chapel where students were given time to admire Michelangelo's ceiling and many other frescoes by Renaissance artists. From there the group visited St Peter's Basilica, the largest church in the world, admiring its scale and collection of further masterpieces.

## **Volunteers Help Keep County's Beaches Clean**

Hard working volunteers have cleared more than 500 bags of rubbish from County Durham's beaches so far this vear.

Plastic bottles, balloons, riastic bottles, balloons, food wrappers and shopping trolleys are among the items removed during the regular litter picks, organised by the Haritage Coart term Heritage Coast team.

Heritage Coast is a partnership of local authorities, agencies and community bodies with an interest in protecting the coastline in Durham, Sunderland and Hartlepool. Louise Harrington, Heritage Coast project officer at Durham County Council, one of the partners, said the contribution of volunteers was instrumental to the scheme's success

She praised the many schools, businesses and individuals who have supported the beach cleans, adding: "Anyone who watched the BBC's groundbreaking and harrowing documentary Blue Planet 2 knows how detrimental rubbish like this is to wildlife from the smallest seabird to the biggest marine mammal.

"It's vital we educate people about the dangers and remove as much rubbish as we can. This not only protects wildlife but helps ensure our coastlines are safe and beautiful places to visit."

So far this year, Heritage Coast has organised 17 beach clean-up operations, collecting an average of 30 bags of rubbish per clean. And they are not alone, with members of the Seaham Beach Cleaning Crew often spending an entire day on the beach and regularly collecting more than 100 bags per session.

The rubbish collected is a mixture of cans, bottles and food cartons which people have left behind, along with plastic items and fishing waste from the sea. A growing number of balloons are also being found, possibly due to the popularity of mass balloon releases. Other items removed include supermarket trolleys, bags, tyres and lobster pots. "I am privileged to lead PCP, which is respected for being a responsive, dynamic thinking forward and health and wellbeing charity. Adaptability and health



## **UK's Largest Light Festival Spectacular in Durham**



Durham will host its most ambitious ever Lumiere light festival in 2019, featuring a selection of some favourites from the past decade of festivals.

Durham County Council's Cabinet agreed to re-commission Artichoke to deliver large scale events in both 2019 and 2021, with community activities and legacy artworks in the years between.

The 2019 event will run from 14 to 17 November and will see a number of highlights from the previous five festivals shine a light on the county - to mark the event's 10th anniversary. county - to mark the event's full anniversary. Lumiere was established in Durham in 2009 and the 2019 programme is expected to wow the hundreds of thousands of people who flock to the biennial event and to ensure that the county is showcased on a global scale. It will feature a mix of some favourites and brand request to the second scale and t new artworks

Announcing the confirmation, Durham County Council's leader, Cllr Simon Henig, said: "I am absolutely delighted to invite Artichoke back and I can't wait to hear more about what we can expect. 2019 marks a decade from the birth of Lumiere in Durham and it seems fitting to mark that in spectacular fashion, particularly as we anticipate the combined visitor numbers linked to previous editions will see us surpass

"Every event delivers huge opportunities for us to shout about what a wonderful place Durham is and to use that profile to promote our county as a fantastic destination to visit, live, study and do business. This importance is also reflected in the growth in support from the private sector with an ever increasing number of sponsors and supporters getting involved each time. We are also really grateful for the continuing support from all our partners including Arts Council England, the Cathedral,

including Arts Council England, the Cathedral, University and Durham Constabulary." Welcoming the news, CEO and artistic director of Artichoke, Helen Marriage, said: "The festival's continued success shows what is possible when the local authority, local business and local people come together behind a project, allowing us as producers to push the boundaries and do really exciting things

things. "The challenge is to keep it feeling fresh, so that Lumiere is always an adventure. I know a lot of people head for the centre: Cathedral, Market Place, Riverside and Castle. But I

never want Lumiere to become predictable and I think this has been the key to its success over the years. I'm always thinking of new ways to explore the cityscape and make the experience something of a magical journey of discovery." Asked what we can expect for 2019 Helen continued: "That would be telling wouldn't it? What I can say is that I'm so excited to be programming the 10th anniversary Lumiere festival and that it will be a moment to reflect and look back as well as forward. There will be highlights from the last ten years, a sort of 'director's cut', alongside new commissions. Watch this space!"

At Cabinet members heard that Lumiere 2017 attracted record 240,000 strong crowds, delivered the greatest ever community outreach opportunities involving 1,700 people across the county, provided volunteering opportunities for more Festival Makers than ever before and saw its regional audience grow significantly - securing the festival's place as one of both regional and national significance. It was also worth more than £7.5 million to the

It was also worth note that 27.5 infinite to the county's economy. It was agreed that together these factors presented a compelling case to commission further festivals and to facilitate this a £1.8 million VAT windfall ring-fenced for cultural activity from the council's culture and sport department to support future events was agreed. It will help deliver two full Lumiere light festivals in 2019 and 2021, interspersed with light-themed activities in the off-years. This will, in turn, release an additional £1 million from Arts Council England to support the festival. The balance will, as usual, be raised by Artichoke via partnerships, renonsorship and grants sponsorship and grants. The evaluation report also outlines how well

## Farewell Jessica Credit Union Merger PLAY CAFE POPS to Benefit Savers

The merger of two community banks is proving a prudent decision, bringing benefits to members and strengthening the region's credit union movement.

NEFirst Credit Union and Prince Bishops Community Bank merged on 1 June after a detailed review concluded it would be in the best interests of members and the wider population of County Durham.

County Durham Council has supported the directors during the merger to help ensure a smooth transition. Existing members' savings and loans will not be affected in any way and they should continue to access all services in the usual way. The council's Durham Savers

Project continues to work with the new organisation, NEFirst Credit Union, to help develop savings schemes with employers and schools across the county. Credit unions are not-for-

profit social enterprises which are regulated by the Financial Conduct Authority. They provide secure savings accounts, low interest loans and free life insurance. Following the merger, NEFirst credit Union has 16,000 members across the

region, shares in excess of £4.5m and a loan book of more than £3.5m. Cllr Jane Brown, the council's



Cabinet member for social inclusion, said: "Credit unions offer a stable and straight forward way for people to save. They also provide a much safer alternative to payday loan companies, pawn brokers and door-step lenders, with far lower interest rates. However, they have been underused in this country for decades, with just three per cent of the UK population

credit union members. "The merger of these two respected credit unions will help to strengthen the credit union movement in the North-East as a whole, helping people to reduce their debts and save for a brighter future."

Peter Mackie, chairman of NEFirst Credit Union, said: "This merger is good news for people in County Durham and across the North East. We look

forward to helping more and more families with sensible savings and affordable loans." NEFirst Credit Union was formed by the merger of a number of smaller North-East based credit unions which have been providing savings and loan accounts for more than twenty years. It is continuing to develop its services and now offers a debit card for its members.



## Aycliffe's Front Line By Sergeant Andy Boyd

#### Hello Newton Avcliffe.

July has presented the Beat Team at Newton Aycliffe with a variety of issues and crime, ranging from anti-social behaviour in the form of off-road bikes and adults purchasing alcohol for minors, to a handful of burglaries and theft from motor vehicles. There has been a vehicle security campaign across County Durham with an emphasis on reminding car owners to make sure their vehicles are secure overnight. I would urge you to get into the routine of not only checking that your house doors are locked overnight, but taking a few seconds to make sure that your cars are secure also. We have a number of suspects for these burglaries, one of which was arrested this morning (08/08/2018) at his home address and remains in police custody. Another was arrested for Burglary and Theft from a motor vehicle on the Industrial Estate and was charged with both offences.

In relation to off road bikes, we continue to gather evidence to identify the persons responsible, and have issued a Traffic Warning Notice to an individual in Silverdale Place, this means that if caught again that the vehicle will be seized. We have also issued a £90 Fixed Penalty Ticket to an adult buying alcohol for a minor and continue to work with licensed premises to identify other suspect for this offence.

We have been attending numerous events around the town including the Emergency Services Event in the Town Centre, St Jospehs Summer Fair, Sugarhill Primary School and the PCP Family Fun Day. All events were well attended and the team had a great time interacting with the community (some photos of these events can be found on our Facebook page). Three of our PCSO's also received WOW awards this month in recognition of fantastic customer service. These awards are particularly special to us as they are nominated by the

community, so we are very proud of Christine Obrien, Jennifer Atkinson and Matt Walls who are a great asset to the team. A major amount of work was also carried out by Christine Obrien in relation to the Anti-Social Behaviour caused by a male resident in Silverdale Place over a period of months, this caused a great deal of stress to other residents living in the local area. On the eve of a court appearance in order to obtain a Premises Closure Order to evict the tenant and close down the property, this particular tenant decided that it was in his own interests to move of his own accord.

The team are attending the Horndale Residents Association Family Fun Day on Thursday 16th August at Greenfields Arts and Community College. It promises to be a fantastic event, PC Welch has promised to get into the stocks so everyone can throw wet sponges at him too!!

## **Auckland Castle Open Spring 2019**

With construction well underway, new dates have now been announced for the launch of The Auckland Project's purpose-built welcome centre, Auckland Tower, and the re-opening of 900 year-old Auckland Castle, Bishop Auckland. Auckland Castle, once a private palace for the Prince

private palace for the Prince Bishops of Durham, will re-open to the public in spring 2019, following a multimillion pound conservation programme to recapture its former Georgian Gothic randeur.

grandeur. It had originally been hoped that this extensive work would be complete in time for Christmas, however the complexities of working with an ancient structure and the ongoing discovery of hidden historic features has led to a small adjustment in the timescales, as The Auckland Project's CEO, David Maddan, explains.

"Since work began in September 2016, Auckland in Castle has continued to throw up a number of fascinating surprises," surprises," David said, "starting with the discovery that the Scotland Wing had no foundations, which meant we needed to underpin the entire structure before any of the planned work could commence.

"In the months that followed our contractor Meldrum Construction Services Ltd has continued to uncover hidden historical features, from coats of arms and fireplaces dating back to the 15th century, to hidden staircases and former windows

'As a result of such discoveries our work programme has had to be repeatedly adapted to ensure these intriguing and unpredictable finds could be cumented and protected

wherever possible. "It is this ongoing succession of relatively small but necessary changes that has ultimately combined to create a shift in the overall timescales, which will now see Auckland Castle open to the public in spring 2019."

of The conservation Auckland Castle is Auckland Casue is supported by a £11.4m grant from National Lottery Players via the Heritage Players via the Heritage Lottery Fund, as well as the Heritage Conservation Trust, Sir James Knott Trust, The Charles Hayward Foundation, The Headley Trust, The Linbury Trust, The Rothschild Foundation, Garfield Weston Foundation, J Paul Getty Jnr Charitable Trust and Richard Oldfield. Work at the Castle is currently being carried out by

Gateshead-based Meldrum Construction Services Ltd, with the site due to be handed back to The Auckland Project in early 2019. From there, the charity's

Curatorial Team will work alongside expert craftspeople to dress the space, using sumptuous fabrics and furnishings to reflect its former Georgian Gothic opulence and hanging more than 50 artworks, including Zurbarán's Jacob and His Twelve Sons, which have been housed at the Castle for more than 250 years. Auckland Tower

Auckland Tower, which will serve as the welcome centre for the wider Auckland Project visitor destination



will open on Saturday, 20 October 2018.

Before that, there will be two chances to take a sneak peek inside the unique site, with an Auckland Tower Town Update event on Saturday, 21 July 2018 and a special community event on Saturday, 29 September 2018

It was previously expected that the Tower would be complete in time for July's event, however the complexity of the structure and impact of the weather has meant work will now be ongoing into the autumn, as The Auckland Project's Property Director, Chris Property Director, Children Blacklock explains. "The unique design of Auckland Tower has brought

with it some unusual challenges, making it very difficult to predict the exact

timescale of the building programme," Chris said. "That, coupled with the harsh weather we had earlier in the year, including high winds and snow that were particularly dangerous for structure stretching 29m high, has meant we will not be fully complete for 21 July

as originally hoped. "We are however keen to ensure the public have a chance to venture inside the building as soon as it is safe to do so, and, in partnership with VEST Construction, are committed to opening the doors on 21 July and 29 September to offer a sneak preview, ahead of the official launch in October.'

Work on Auckland Tower, supported by Headley Trust, began in February 2017, following the appointment of Bishop Auckland building and engineering firm, VEST Construction, as the main contractor.

The building's unusual, modern design by award-winning architects Niall McLaughlin, reflects that of a great wooden siege engine, standing proudly against the walls of Auckland Castle and effectively opening up the former private palace for the Prince Bishops of Durham by creating a more direct link

between it and the town Once complete Auckland Tower will serve as a starting point for visitors to Auckland Castle and all of The Auckland Project's forthcoming attractions, including the Spanish Gallery, Walled Garden Gallery, Walled Garden and Faith Museum, with a 15m high viewing platform offering unrivalled views the destination. across Bishop Auckland and the wider region beyond. Visitors will have their

first opportunity to venture into Auckland Tower with the Town Update event for Bishop Auckland residents running from 10am to 3pm on Saturday, 21 July. This includes a chance to learn more about the building's unique design and the construction work in progress, as well as hear what the tower will be used for and how to get involved with The Auckland Project as a whole. A special community event at Auckland Tower will also be available on a drop in


