









Heartbroken husband takes on Great North Run in memory of wife who died with Alzheimer's aged 62

A former club runner is taking on the Simplyhealth Great North Run for the first time in more than 20years to raise money for dementia research in memory of his wife who died with Alzheimer's disease aged 62.

John Elliott, a former member of Darlington Harriers, last ran the Great North Run in 1996, but will be tackling the half marathon again on Sunday to raise money for Alzheimer's Research UK. The 64-year-old, who has run the 13.1-mile race six times, chose to support the UK's leading dementia research charity because his wife, Christine, died last year with Alzheimer's disease having been diagnosed in 2011 aged 56. been She was also a member of Darlington Harriers and ran the Great North Run twice. John, from Newton Aycliffe, said: "Alzheimer's is such a cruel disease. It was really

tough and as the carer you see the full brunt of it. "It never really occurred to me that someone could get Alzheimer's disease at

such a young age. When she started having memory problems I did start to worry that it might be Alzheimer's, but I was still staggered when she was diagnosed. "She was okay for a long

time, but from mid-2016 she deteriorated very quickly and it got to the point where I had to look after her all the time, helping her dress and eat.

"If I ever raised money for or donated to charity in the past it would always be cancer related. But now I want to support dementia research. I believe funding for dementia research is inadequate, so I want to do all I can to help. I want to support research so that future generations won't have the same fate as my

wife." John, a retired bank manager who now works part-time as an environmental warden for Heighington Parish Council, has been running four times a week in preparation for the race and hopes to complete it in around two hours. The father-of-one said: "I do the occasional 10km race, but this year is the first opportunity I've had to do a longer race and I thought it's got to be the Great



North Run

"My best time for the Great North Run was one hour 14 minutes and I did the London Marathon in two hours 50 minutes. I don't expect to match past glories, but I will get round even if I have to crawl the last few miles. "I'm really looking forward

to the race. There's a small group of us, including some who are coming over from Florida, who will all be 65 around the race day. It's a bit of a last swan song for us!"

John has so far raised over £700 and his former employer Barclays will match fund donations up to £750. To sponsor John go to www.justgiving.com/ fundraising/JohnElliott64 John is one of 305 runners taking on the world's largest half marathon for Alzheimer's Research UK

MASKED thieves have broken into the compound of a popular charity store and stole key parts from one of its vehicles which is used to collect vital donations.

CCTV equipment protecting St T's, the charity superstore of St Teresa's Hospice in Darlington, caught the callous raiders on film.

Drivers Could Have Licence Revoked If Thev Fail Road Side

Eye Test

It has recently announced that several police forces across the UK have launched a crackdown on drivers with poor vision. Amanda Stretton, motoring editor at Confused com says: "Our sight is our most important sense when it comes to driving, so it's understandable why police are making sure people have clear vision while they're behind the wheel. It's likely most motorists would even support this crackdown, given that our research shows over half (55%) think regular eye tests should be a legal requirement if you hold a driving license.

Drivers who are unsure if they can read a number plate from 20 metres should book in their annual check-up. Drivers with poor eyesight can have their insurance policy voided if their insurer is unaware of any conditions and also have their licence revoked immediately.

"In fact there are a number of medical conditions – including poor vision – which require drivers to notify the DVLA, so to give drivers clarity on this issue we've pulled a list of these conditions and the reasons why they have restrictions into a helpful guide.'

consultation. Residents have until Friday 14 September to comment on the Supporting Children to Achieve and Maintain a Healthy Weight consultation as part of a joint review by Durham County

Council and NHS partners. The consultation, which began in July, is an opportunity for people to tell us what factors they think help children to maintain a healthy weight and ensure overweight youngsters and their families have the support they need. Rates of overweight and obese

children in the county remain significantly worse than those for England as a whole, with 24.1 per cent of four to five-year-olds falling into these categories in 2016/17. This is higher than the average for England, 22.6 per cent, and equates to about 1,400 children

or 46 classrooms. Among ten to 11-year-olds, 37.7 per cent were overweight or obese, compared to the England average of 34.2 per cent. This means around 2,000 children aged ten to 11 or 67 classrooms across the county are overweight or obese. Cllr Lucy Hovvels MBE,

Cabinet member for adult and health services, said: "Helping our children to achieve and maintain a healthy weight is a key priority in

County Durham. are becoming overweight and obese at younger ages and are staying so for longer. This is concerning as it could continue into adulthood, causing more health problems and impacting





The expedition proved to be a once in a lifetime experience for all who were involved





and certainly lived up to and beyond expectations. It was split into three stages; a trek across the slopes of the High Atlas Mountains, a project phase where they renovated part of a primary school and a rest and relaxation period in Marrakech. The title 'World Challenge' couldn't be more appropriate as it most definitely proved one of the toughest challenges

of their lives to date. Early starts such as 06:30 wake up calls and the extreme heat during the day, with a peak of 42 degrees celsius, proved very energy-sapping for the challengers whilst trekking over 20km during the two days. Furthermore, a high proportion of this distance was travelling up steep inclines making it much harder and time consuming. This culminated in climbing to a peak height of just over 3000m. The first phase of the

expedition saw the group facilitate their own individual and team skills to help renovate a primary school on the periphery of Ouarazazate, a town made famous for its film studios. It was a race against the clock to complete within the time restraints they were given. Particular paid attention was to managing a budget, making their own choices of what they could and couldn't afford for the local community. The students were also responsible organising specific skills of people into certain areas, ultimately creating a more purposeful learning environment that will be truly special for the young students

upon their return to school. During the week all the students developed invaluable life skills that will help them develop into mature young adults and this expedition seemed the perfect way for the Year 11 group to round off their time at Greenfield Community College. Each student was given the freedom and guidance to assume the roles needed on an expedition (leader, budget holder, etc) and whilst assuming these roles they learnt more about their own strengths and weaknesses within teams.

(Large Poppy) - 3.5/3.75mm (UK 9), DK Yarn, Black Button Cast on 120 stitches. Rows 1 to 4 Knit. Row 5 Knit 3 stitches together

across the row - 40 stitches. Row 6 to 9 Knit. Row 10 Knit 2 stitches together

across the row - 20 stitches. Row 11 to 14 Knit. Row 15 Knit 2 stitches together across the row - 10 stitches. Break off yarn with long tail

and thread back through remaining stitches and pull tight. Join edges with mattress stitch.

Use a black button to sew to centre of the poppy.

Drug-Related Deaths

The rise in drug-related deaths needs to stop, and the Government can do something about it says Ron Hogg.

Government needs The to reform drugs policy as deaths from substance misuse continue to rise, says Police, Crime and Victims Commissioner Ron Hogg.

Speaking in advance of Overdose International Awareness Day, Ron pointed to an increase in deaths due to drug misuse: the highest mortality rate was seen in the North East, with 83.2 deaths per 1 million population, a 7.5% increase from 2016, compared to 42.7 deaths per million population in England.

Ron added "This is the human cost of a drug policy that isn't working. Drug users should be able to seek medical treatment without fear of being criminalised.

Needs to Stop

I continue to call on the Government to carry out a fundamental review of the current UK drug policy, as it urgently needs to do more to save lives and reduce

drug related-harm.' "We need more investment in services to support people to recover from drug addiction. Cutting funding for treatment services creates a false economy, because the cost of people remaining addicted to drugs will fall elsewhere on public services. I am therefore deeply concerned that the Government intends to cut funding for Public Health, with over £8m due to be removed from budgets in my area by 2020". Last year Ron published a

detailed manifesto, Towards a Safer Drugs Policy, which includes six key proposals for drug policy reform aimed at reducing the harm and deaths caused by drugs.

likelihood that the funding will run out, leaving people to rely on the NHS for their care," said Brett Dixon, president of the not-for-profit Association of Personal Injury lawyers (APIL) which represents injured people and their

'Manv of those who support this legislation believe it will reduce the NHS's own compensation bill. But the cost falls back on the NHS anyway when people run out of the compensation which is supposed to pay for their care. The big difference is that if the Civil Liability Bill goes ahead, the NHS will not only have to pay for its own negligence but for everyone else's as well. That includes employers who cause serious injuries at work, or negligent drivers who cause life-changing injuries to other motorists. It's absolutely right that the NHS should pay for its own negligence, but not for everyone else's as well."

The last survey, in 2016, almost received 8.000 responses from across the county, including the views of over 3,000 secondary school pupils. 
