A mission to provide 24-hour Public Access lifesaving equipment, and free CPR and Defibrillator training is exceeding expectations in the local area. The project funded by Great

Aycliffe and Middridge Partnership was to provide several community venues with equipment and training that can assist our emergency services with "The Chain of Survival". Every year in the UK there

are 350,000 heart attacks, 100,000 fatal. Young, old, fit, or unfit, all can be at risk. Over 20% of these attacks happen in a public place. Only 18 months ago there were no 24-hour defibrillator

units in Newton Avcliffe. now there are several units located throughout the community. A welcome addition to these are the two new units which have been installed at The Navy Club and Neville Community Association.

Supported by GAMP Neighbourhood Budget Funding from County Councillors Eddy Adam, John Clare, Kate Hopper, Scott Durham and Paul Howell, staff, members, and the Ladies Group headed by Dorothy Bowman based at the Navy Club were successful in obtaining £1700 for the installation of the new unit.



Holocaust Survivor Will Tell of Experiences at Memorial Event

Bishop Auckland Town Hall will host a day of moving events as Holocaust Memorial Day remembers victims of the Holocaust and genocides.

Every year, on the 27 Holocaust January, Memorial Day invites people to remember the tragic effects of genocide. The date coincides with the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi concentration and extermination camp.

Poignant events organised Durham by County Council, alongside Durham Cathedral and St Anne's Church, Bishop Auckland, will give residents and visitors a chance to learn more, as well as offering quiet time for remembrance. On Saturday 26 January,

Bishop Auckland Town Hall will have a stirring talk from Holocaust talk from Holocaust survivor Eva Clarke, who was born in Mauthausen concentration camp in 1945. It promises to be a heart-rending event, as 15 of Eva's family members were killed in Auschwitz-Birkenau, leaving only her and her mother as survivors. Performances from King James 1 Academy and The Hermitage Academy will also feature.

An exhibition at Bishop Auckland Town Hall will feature accounts of other genocides, including stories from Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Dafur, as well as a display explaining the Durham Light Infantry's involvement in the liberation of Bergen-Belsen death camp with testimonies from both liberators and the liberated. Events will take place between 10am and 3.30pm. St Anne's Church, Bishop Auckland Market Place, is also offering a place for



WW2 Atrocity Can Now Be Heard Online

The voices of veterans recounting their experiences of a Second World War concentration camp can now be heard online thanks to Durham County Record Office.

A new page has been added to the Record Office's existing schools web resource, Surviving Belsen, which uses archives to explore the story of the infamous concentration camp, located in Lower Saxony. Germany and established in April 1943.

The new page, 'In Their Own Words', contains interviews of veterans from the 113th Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment who, before the war, were parttime volunteer soldiers and became full time territorial soldiers when the war broke out.

The regiment was involved in the relief and liberation of Belson, tasked with burying the dead and providing food, medical attention and care for the survivors.

Gill Parkes, principal archivist at the Durham County Record Office, "Soldiers did not said: speak of their often experiences at Belson concentration camp at the time. Many wanted to escape the things they had seen.

"Years later however, veterans from across the regiment were interviewed as part of the Imperial War Museum (IWM) oral history project. This has given us a rich resource here in Durham, granting insight into some of the harshest parts of history and the personal experiences of those who survived them. This is particularly timely, with Holocaust Memorial Day upcoming on Sunday 27 January."



There are currently 660 children in foster care in Durham, many of whose carers could benefit from respite from experienced care givers. More than 450 foster carers

are needed in total across the North East of England over the coming 12 months. This January, Five Rivers

Child Care wants to thank all of the foster carers currently looking after some of the region's most vulnerable children and young people. The social enterprise is also calling for those with care giving experience and the relevant transferable skills to consider applying to be respite or short-term foster carers.

carers take in a Respite foster child for a limited time period, this might be because of a family emergency or pre-planned holiday or other work commitments. Respite carers provide vital support to long term foster carers

have a break from their fulltime role as a foster carer. In some instances, a respite carer might look after a child for an overnight stay, a weekend, or even just after school if the foster carer is unable to get home in time. Commenting on the ongoing need for respite carers in Durham. Martin Leitch, head of fostering operations for Five Rivers Child Care, said: "Respite carers are an integral part of the fostering industry and ensure fulltime foster carers can retain flexibility in their personal lives. Like everyone else, foster carers often find January a busy time so it can be a time when we require more respite carers than usual.

"This type of a care is а perfect employment opportunity for those with the relevant care giving skills and would be great for someone in an existing parttime care role looking for a flexible work opportunity. The roles also offer regular training with industry experts and the opportunity with industry to work alongside social workers and other healthcare professionals.

People from all walks of life can become respite carers as long as they are over 21 years of age, including single people, co-habiting couples, same sex couples and people living in rented accommodation. The only requirement is a spare room for each foster child.

Diocese of Durham Awarded £3.9M for Growth

The Diocese of Durham has been awarded 3.9M pounds to help develop new Christian communities in the North East of England. The award from the Church of England is part of £35M awarded to dioceses across the country this month in support of church growth through the Churches Strategic Development Funding (SDF) programme. In the Diocese of Durham five (5) projects will benefit from the award over a 6 year period, for activities designed to grow new church communities in Bishop Auckland, Stockton, Durham City, Washington and Gateshead.

Each project is different, but each is focused on sustainable growth and innovative approaches include which the development of a social media 'pastor' in Stockton; the creation of a new Discipleship community in Durham and the planting out of a new church in Gateshead. These are just a sample of activities amongst the ambitious plans for growth recognised by the award.

'Resourcing churches are established to be catalysts of church growth and development.

a proven track record across the country of reinvigorating churches reinvigorating and driving community engagement.

2018 a Great Year for **Rehoming at Dogs Trust Darlington**

Dogs Trust's Rehoming Centre Darlington successfully rehomed more than 1,000 dogs in 2018. The Sadberge-based Rehoming Centre, which is currently undergoing a redevelopment, has maintained successful adoption figures after a year of disruptions to the daily running of the centre due to construction works.

In order to ensure the team could continue to find homes for as many dogs as possible during the disruptions, some residents were put on the Home From Home Fostering allowed which program, them to stay with families temporarily until permanent homes could be found. 144 dogs were placed in foster care in 2018: with 92 of them going on to successfully find their forever homes as a result; which has increased by more than 30% since 2017.

Despite these fantastic milestones, there are still plenty of residents at Dogs Trust Darlington waiting on new owners to give them loving new homes. Two such residents, three-year-old Greyhounds Jasper and Pablo, are hoping to be some of the first dogs of 2019 to find their forever home.

Earlier this year the Rehoming Centre in Sadberge began a two-year rebuilding process which is set to create even more facilities and kennels for canine residents, due for completion in 2020. The new centre will feature 10 additional kennels, increasing capacity to 75 dogs and include a state-of-the-art hydrotherapy pool where dogs can be aided in recovery if they have undergone surgery or have long-term mobility problems. Sue Embleton, Rehoming Centre Manager at Dogs Trust Darlington, said:

"2018 was a very successful year and a testament to the hard work of the team, who ensure all the dogs at the centre are cared for and given every opportunity to find new owners. We are also very fortunate to have such a community of dog lovers and us and our dogs are lucky to benefit from funding from players of People's Postcode Lottery, whose funding not



only help us to continue this work but has contributed significantly to the rebuild of the Rehoming Centre. "Once the Rehoming Centre

is complete we will be able to help even more dogs like Pablo and Jasper, who all deserve their home comforts while waiting for potential new owners."

Pablo and Jasper may look very similar, however they are both looking for homes to call their own. Jasper is a sensitive soul who prefers the quieter life and can live with children over the age of 14; with Pablo being much more outgoing and

full of energy. Jasper is such a loving dog and could potentially live with another canine companion who will help build his confidence a bit more. Pablo absolutely adores getting attention and could also live with another dog that can match his energy, as well as children over the age

of 11. Over the last five years more than £9.5million has been funded by players of the People's Postcode Lottery which has helped Dogs Trust continue to go that extra mile for their canine residents. New Base for Great North Air Ambulance Service

Work has begun on former converting а industrial site into a "world-

class" clinical training facility that will also house the region's air ambulance service. The Great North Air Ambulance Service

(GNAAS) said its new base at Urlay Nook, Eaglescliffe would allow its globallyrenowned pre-hospital medicine courses to expand resulting in lives saved in this region and beyond.

GNAAS will move its helicopters, clinical team and charity staff to the site of the former Elementis works when the project is complete. The first phase began this week as Tolent Construction moved onto the site.

GNAAS chief executive, Grahame Pickering MBE, said: "We are already well known for the exceptional level of care we provide, but this will give us the foundation on which to improve even further.

"As well as accommodating our aircrew and charity staff, the centre will provide education and training for the growing number of medical professionals in the UK and overseas wishing to improve upon their own skills and knowledge in this

relatively new speciality. "Through training others and developing our own service, we will save more lives in our area and beyond. Additionally, the revenue it

generates will be spent on improving our front-line care even further."

The first phase of work on site involves adapting the pre-existing office block to incorporate the centre of excellence's training and research, and to develop an operations room for the air ambulance service.

Subsequently, a new hangar will be built for the charity's aircraft. The latter phase is expected to begin later this year, meaning that GNAAS will continue to operate out of Durham Tees Valley Airport (DTVA) in the meantime.

Mr Pickering said the move to relocate staff from three of the charity's sites – Darlington town centre, Newton Aycliffe and DTVA would result in rent savings

alone of £120,000 a year. He added: "We are always careful with our money and so we are pleased to be making a move that will leave us in a better position. But as ever, we still need the support of the public in keeping our aircraft and crew flying across the

region." well Tolent As as Construction, GNAAS is working alongside Niven Architects, Muckle LLP, s h e d, Driver Group and JH Partners in delivering the

project. The costs are being met by grants, reserves and ongoing fundraising.




