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
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Developers have submitted a planning application to deliver a £140 million business park - with more than 1.75 million sq. ft. of accommodation in Newton Aycliffe, which could create thousands of new jobs. venture company Joint Forrest Park Newton Aycliffe Limited, supported by leading commercial property developers Richardson Barberry, has applied to Durham County Council for outline planning consent for the expansion of

the 116-acre Forrest Park site located on Junction 59 of the A1(M). The proposals include a range of business, industrial

/ distribution units varying in size from 30,000 sq. ft. to 500,000 sq. ft., a trade park consisting of 11 units from 5,000 sq. ft. to 10,000 sq. ft., and ancillary amenity including roadside food offerings, a public house and a restaurant. There is also the potential to accommodate a rail freight interchange.

Forrest Park - which has attracted £13 million funding from the Local Enterprise Partnership could create 3,200 jobs and deliver a gross value added economic boost to the area of £495 million Aycliffe Business Park on over the next 10 to 15 years. A planning decision is expected in April. Jonathan Robinson.

Barberry director, said: "It has been a pleasure working alongside Park Newton Forrest Aycliffe and we are excited at the prospect of delivering one of the North East's premier business parks and it's great that we have reached the stage where the proposals are now with the planners for them to consider. Thousands Continue to Flout Mobile Phone and Seatbelt Laws

The UK's biggest independent road safety charity IAM RoadSmart is concerned that too many drivers continue to ignore warnings about the dangers of hand-held mobile phones and not wearing a seatbelt - putting countless lives in danger.

This follows the results of a major Department for Transport survey on revealing 7th February hundreds of thousands of motorists were still ignoring seatbelt and mobile phone usage laws in 2017.

The survey (reference 1) found that in 2017, 1.1% of all vehicle drivers were observed using a hand-held mobile phone while driving on weekdays in Great Britain, of which 0.4% were observed holding the phone to their ear, with twice as many (0.8%) spotted holding the phone in their hand.

The worst offenders were taxi/private hire drivers (3.3%), followed by van drivers (2.1%), then car drivers (1%).

While there is good news that seatbelt wearing rates remain high with 96.5% of all vehicle drivers observed using a seatbelt on weekdays in 2017, that means 3.5% of all vehicle drivers are choosing not to wear a seatbelt which can be a matter of life and death if you are involved in

a collision. Seatbelt use value with 93.1% of front seat and 90.7% of rear seat passengers buckling up in Great Britain. For car drivers, 98.6% were observed using a seatbelt in Great Britain in 2017. Greig, IAM Neil

RoadSmart director of policy and research, said: "In spite of these being small percentages, this still amounts to hundreds of thousands of people who daily flout the law and put themselves and others at

risk. "The best way of tackling this ever-present issue is to make people believe there is a high chance of being caught. This could start tomorrow if consistent guidelines on using mobile speed camera vans to enforce seatbelt and mobile phones laws were issued.

Currently there is no standard approach on using this high-profile resource across the UK. Making non-wearing of seatbelts an endorsable offence is also a quick win. Not only would it persuade more people to take the offence seriously, but it might tempt them to take a seatbelt awareness course. People avoid using seatbelts for a wide range of individual reasons and these views need to be challenged face-to-face."



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STUDENT'S FUTURE PROSPECTS STAND OUT IN OFSTED INSPECTION

Staff and students at UTC South Durham are celebrating after it was recognised for its efforts in preparing young people for the world of work.

Ofsted inspectors were so impressed with the development of students that they awarded a 'Good' rating – a fantastic achievement for a school and Sixth Form only in its third year.

The employability skills of the students have already been recognised by local businesses with all students leaving in Year 11 or 13 progressing on to either higher or further education, training, apprenticeships or employment. In fact 52% of the 18-year-old students went to meaningful paid apprenticeships with local employers – more than seven times the national average.

The school and Sixth Form which specialises in engineering, technology and sciences for students aged 14-19, was praised by her majesty's inspectors for improving the quality of education and raising students' aspirations.

Ofsted announced last month that there will be a future rebalancing of the inspection process with a greater focus on students' curriculum, behaviour and personal development, something South Durham UTC has focused on from the start.

Principal Tom Dower said. "We are all delighted with the outcome of our first Ofsted inspection. We exist to help students make up their minds about what they want to do in the future by offering them exposure to a variety of different careers. To establish the first UTC in the North East is a real privilege but to be able to lead a team that teach the next generation of business leaders is truly inspiring. In their time at UTC we equip our students with the workplace and industry skills required to futureproof their careers

We are told by companies that our students are innovative,



their approach and that the UTC difference makes them employable. The specialist education that we give here has placed students in STEM university courses, bespoke apprenticeship programmes and real jobs. I am very proud

of our students and staff and the impact we are already having in the business community." The education watchdog examined five key areas, which have all been judged as good: effectiveness of leadership and management; quality of teaching, learning

and assessment; personal development, behaviour and welfare; outcomes for students and 16 to 19 study programmes. Feedback from parents was

outstanding. In Ofsted's standard survey, Parent View, there were 94 responses (which is six times more than the national average); UTC parents really care about the education their children are getting. 94% of them would recommend the UTC to other parents, 98% said that their child is happy and 100% said that their child is well looked after at the UTC.

One parent said: "My son started his year 10 study at the UTC in September 2018 and is having an extremely positive experience. Partnership. Durham County Council has been successful in attaining the silver level acknowledging award, a more holistic view of the workplace, as well as engaging with local and national campaigns.

Cllr Lucy Hovvels, Cabinet member for adult and health services said: "A huge part of our lives is spent at work. It is therefore important that people are given the best opportunities to take care of their health. We also know that when people feel well and are active, they are often more productive. This award is a great way of recognising the important ways we are creating a workplace that contributes to the good health of our staff."

Employees took part in a range of initiatives,

targeting different aspects of health.

Forty-eigh people completed Dry January in 2018, and over 100 took part in alcohol awareness training. Everyday habits were challenged, with 77 taking the stairs instead of the lift in the Step Jockey challenge, burning 34,402 calories and taking 355,661 steps. Fifty-three people got their running shoes on, joining in the Couch to 5k. well as physical As activities, specialised training encouraged people to take care of their mental health. More than 700 people completed stress and resilience training and a further 500 people training

awareness training. The council also took part in Time to Talk, a campaign

completed mental health

encouraging everyone to talk about mental health. This is part of the wider Time to Change campaign, that aims to reduce stigma around mental health Over the next year, Durham County Council will be

aiming to attain a Gold Award. This includes undertaking further employee engagement surveys, building on physical and mental health activities, promoting lifestyles, healthier and encouraging more health checks.





Guarantee Pension Credit as a Couple Changes

Currently, if you are in a couple you can claim Guarantee Pension Credit as soon as the oldest member of the couple reaches the state pension age for a woman. The government has named these couples "mixed aged couples". If you are eligible for Guarantee Pension Credit it is important to claim this even if it is only a small amount each week as you may also be entitled to other help.

The current rules about claiming Gurantee Pension Credit are due to change with effect from 15th May 2019. From this date mixed aged couples will both need to be over state pension age in order to qualify for Guarantee Pension Credit. If both members of the couple are not over state pension age, then the youngest member of the couple will need to make a joint claim to Universal Credit. Universal credit rates are much lower than Guarantee Pension Credit rates

People who are eligible to claim Guarantee Pension Credit before 15th May will be able to do a late claim for up to 3 months after this date to avoid the need to claim Universal Credit. You will also be able to do late claims for Housing Benefit if you are on Pension Credit before 15th May 2019 and vice versa.

If you are a member of a mixed aged couple and think you may be entitled to Guarantee Pension Credit, then please call into your local Citizens Advice office for benefits advice.

Durham Stages Major Low Carbon Conference

Leaders in low carbon energy solutions gathered in Durham to discuss green issues. Greener, renewable energy was the hot topic of a major conference last week, last organised by Durham County Council. This formed part of the REBUS programme (Renovation for Ene Efficient Buildings), Energy European partnership project that aims to share knowledge on best practices for making buildings energy efficient.

The REBUS Mid Term conference focused on knowledge sharing looked to develop new, low carbon opportunities across County Durham and the wider region.

The conference built upon the strategic vision for County Durham, as Durham County Council shared its outcomes from the project, including a focus on using renewable heat (from minewater) to replace gas as a heat source and a schools LED lighting retrofit project called 'Enlighten'.

Cllr John Clare, Cabinet Member Support Economic Regeneration, who opened the conference, said: "Our commitment to low carbon must be embedded in and run through everything that we do. There are just so many opportunities in Durham.

A range of speakers from national government attended, including Business Energy and Industrial Strategy (BEIS) and Ministry Industrial for Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG), national organisations; The Coal

Authority, regional agencies; North East Local Enterprise Partnership (NELEP), Durham Energy Institute, and the European Institute for Innovation from Germany. Rich Hurst, REBUS manager said: "We are delighted to have been able to attract such a strong list of speakers connected with the low carbon sector. We know that delegates found it an informative and useful day which will develop new project ideas for the county and wider north east region. The event was funded by Interreg Europe as part of the REBUS programme. The council has been engaged in this project for three years and is set to continue for another two years.



New Project Opens Door To Employment For Young People

County Durham teenagers are benefitting from a new initiative designed to tackle anti-social behaviour and bridge the gap between academic qualifications and the workplace. Young people from the Peterlee area are

the Peterlee area are gaining valuable social skills, training and work experience as part of the Sliding Door Project. The initiative is a

partnership between Durham County Council's building and facilities maintenance service. East Durham College and Durham Constabulary's Neighbourhood Peterlee Policing Team. It provides five students, aged 14 to 16, who have been struggling to engage with mainstream education, with a chance to succeed through an

alternative education programme. All of the students have come into contact with the police, who are supporting the project as a way of actively steering the young people away from behaviours that may lead to criminality and supporting them to make positive changes in their lives.

The project's young people are gaining construction industry experience by working on Durham County Council's refurbishment of Peterlee Leisure Centre and Library.

Paul Burr, Durham County Council's building and maintenance facilities said: "The manager, Sliding Doors Project gives these young people Doors Project opportunity fantastic learn a wide variety to building construction of skills, such as plastering, painting and joinery. Our site manager Les Todd and the construction team have been very impressed by the students' passion and willingness to learn. We

hope that the experience will inspire them to work towards the required qualifications for a future career in construction, either with Durham County Council or another employer."

Greg Cocoran, from East Durham College's Engage Programme, said: "The Sliding Door Project is a fantastic opportunity for these young people to learn about the world of work and the requirements to gain an apprenticeship or paid work. We are really proud of them and their ongoing

efforts taking part in this project." Students from Sliding Door Project met with the HM Lord-Lieutenant of County Durham, Sue Snowdon, who was visiting Peterlee to learn about youth provision and partnership working in the area, and spoke about their enthusiasm for the project. 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COUNCIL PRECEPT INCREASE EXPLAINED

On Wednesday 23 January and Wednesday 30 January, Great Aycliffe Town Council unanimously decided to increase the Council Precept (that is what we charge the ratepayers to provide our services) by 4.99%. This will result in Band A (60% of properties) being charged an extra 65p per month, which is £8 per year. Band D properties will be charged an extra 97p per month, £11.64 per year.

At the time of writing this letter, the other three precepting authorities have not published their demands, but I believe that they will be very close to my prediction: Durham County Council will request close to 2.99%, which is the maximum they are allowed without a referendum, plus an additional allowable charge of 2% to meet the increased costs of adult and child care, which will result in an increase at Band A of just over £50 a year.

The Durham County Police Commissioner, Ron Hogg, is seeking an increase of over 13%, which will see an increase in the region of $\pounds 16$ in the year.

The Durham Fire Authority

will be looking for an increase in the region of 3%, which will result in a $\pounds 2$ increase in the year. As a result of all of these

increases, Council rates increase next year at Band A will be in the region of £76. The Town Council increase will be about 12% of the total increase.

Over the past ten years, Great Aycliffe Town Council precept has risen by 17.45%, an average of 1.75%. This is well below the rate of inflation over this period of time. This is no mean achievement as we have been subject to inflation, pay rises including the Living Wage, but also massive drops in income.

In the financial year 2012-2013, the Council received a Council Tax Support Grant of £352,800 from central government. In 2013-14, Durham County Council had to administer this grant, but the government reduced its contribution and the Town Council lost £56,650. Cuts in the grant have increased year on year, so that this year the grant is only £161,850, a cut of £190,950 from the \pounds cut of 2136,555 them in £352,800 we received in 2012-2013. The total loss of income over this period amounts to £1,055,000. Over the period we have also lost a double taxation grant from Durham County Council of £50,000 a year, a total of £300,000.

The Town Council's Medium Term Financial and Asset Management Plans show that our earmarked capital reserves for 2018/19 are £900,250 and our predictions show that unless we take immediate action, by 2025/2026 this amount will drop to £44,750, and by 2026/2027 there will be a shortfall of £102,750. Next month, in the Council's Spring Newsletter, there will be a detailed account of the

Council's finances. Finally, two points which I would like to emphasise: One – we do not receive any business rates or rates from the Business Park. Two – we have never owned any part of the Town Centre and are not allowed to trade

in opposition to local trades. The Policy and Resources meeting on 6 March will be discussing Members' Allowances. I hope to give you my opinion before that meeting. **Councillor Bob Fleming** Leader of the Council, Chairman of Policy and Resources

LUMIERE BAD FOR BUSINESSES

I feel that I must write in response to your article in last weeks Newton News - Lumiere 2019 To Have a Lasting Community Impact - to provide balance to the actual impact that this

biennial event, specifically with regard to the businesses in Durham. I have a shop in Durham's Indoor Market and, along with the majority of business owners, have real concerns regarding the impact that Lumiere has on Durham's trade. For four days, in the lead up to Christmas, we have had to endure significant losses in revenue over the past few years, at a time when retail businesses are struggling enough as it is. In fact in 2017 it took 10 days to erect the installation the in Market Place, severely impeding access to the shops in the Indoor Market. So it's not just the few days of the display that affect businesses. Small, independent traders, myself included, lose thousands of

pounds during this event. It would appear that the only businesses to benefit are hotels, bars and restaurants, although this cannot account for the £7.6 million that Artichoke quoted in the article. In fact I would not be surprised if the NETT revenue was actually a deficit, but Artichoke or Durham County Council have never asked how much money is lost to the City during Lumiere. The reality is that our regular shoppers stay away during Lumiere. Why? Because

it's impossible to park and shoppers are prevented from entering the centre after 2.30pm without a ticket! So for four days we have no afternoon trade. and significantly reduced morning trade. We are told to make the most of attracting the new visitors who come into Durham. The reality is that the visitors to Lumiere do just that - visit Lumiere. People don't come to shop and carry heavy bags between the art installations! This is a fallacy perpetuated by Artichoke and Durham County Council. In fact, traders have approached the Council to sell on the streets and have been told it's not possible. However, in 2017 there were scores of Eastern European traders being allowed to sell cheap glow sticks and the like throughout the city centre. None of that income staying within Durham!

I have asked Artichoke for their data regarding their estimate for the number of visitors and the 'economic impact', but have yet to receive a reply. In 2017 I asked for their feedback from local businesses but they didn't provide any. We get no compensation or thanks from either Artichoke or Durham County Council and just have to bear the losses. Lumiere causes chaos in Durham, is bad for business and has long since outgrown the small city of Durham as a location for it's light displays. Yours faithfully Colin Flett

Review of Statement of Policy Milestone Achievement **Under the Licensing Act 2003**

All licensing authorities must prepare and publish a statement of their licensing policy every five years. Our current policy which was published in 2014 must be reviewed this year. We will be developing a new policy over the coming months that will be adopted by the Council by the end of October 2019.

In carrying out that review, we want to consult with existing licensed premises with organisations, ns and bodies and persons representing responsible authorities, the public and most importantly, the licensed trade in our area. As with the current policy, the new one will be focussed on

the following four licensing objectives which the policy will seek to promote: • The prevention of crime and disorder

 Public Safety • The prevention of public nuisance

• The protection of children

from harm We believe that the Council's licensing policy should benefit the operators of licensed premises and the public alike. Our policy will reflect and incorporate the freedoms and flexibility provided to the licensed trade and leisure industry by the Act. However, it is important that our licensing policy balances the legitimate needs of

businesses in the county and the demand for leisure and cultural activities alongside the need to protect those who could be adversely affected by licensed premises. We would very much like to


