through a LEADER grant aimed at rural development and backed by development finance through HSBC. The entrepreneurial couple

are backed up by a top team of professionals who bring a vast amount of construction experience. "Our special thanks go to John at Ashdan Consulting for guiding us through the design and development process and to Gradon architecture for giving us their architectural expertise. The build is now in the hands of Northern Bear Building Services who have worked tirelessly with us to ensure our dreams become reality."

Two local residents lost their lives following a one-vehicle accident in Newton Aycliffe on Monday 1st April. Roads were closed and traffic was diverted as emergency services attended the incident.

Pat Metcalfe, the driver, was pronounced dead at the scene. Her son Gary was airlifted to James Cook University Hospital in Middlesbrough. He died five days later after life support was withdrawn.

MISSED DOCTORS APPOINTMENTS

Dear Sir.

I am writing in response to the comment written by Honest John as regards GP surgeries in Newton Aycliffe. On average, surgeries in Newton Aycliffe each have 265 appointments which are booked and then people attend, that's 3352 working hours per month do not wasted. So for those out there who complain about no appointments they may want to look at the time wasters who get appointments and don't turn up! On top of that there are the appointments that are used for ailments that can be seen to at the chemists/opticians/dentists, but people choose to see the GP as they can access free prescriptions, even though the minor ailment scheme offers 'free' medication that some people are entitled to for certain conditions.

Honest John chooses a comparison between a vets and a GP surgery, maybe if a GP surgery charges for every appointment like a vet does, the availability of appointments might be better, or charging for those who don't turn up, they might think twice about wasting appointments. The receptionists who work in these surgeries are normal human beings like the rest of us, they aren't magically able to conjure up an appointment out of thin air, so when they advise there are no appointments, then that isn't their fault, so shouting and screaming at them doesn't make the situation any better. To conclude, we actually have a fabulous NHS service, and maybe the way to make it more efficient is to actually think if we really need an appointment in the first place. Because, without wasting appointments 265 more people could be seen per month!

About Us St. Michael's is central to the rural village of Heighington, both as a beautiful building, a centre of Christian worship and a focal point for the community. It serves both the Methodist and Anglican worshipping communities, following the closure of the village Methodist Chapel. In addition to the normal Sunday Services, there

are frequent baptisms, weddings and funerals. The church reaches out to the local community in many ways, eg: pastoral visiting as well as providing a vital network of support to those in need through initiatives such as 'street angels', a community lift scheme and a collection point for local food banks. Conscious of the need to reach out, the church welcomes a number of groups, and acts as a meeting place for elderly residents for fellowship for fellowship as well as providing an opportunity for agencies such as the police and fire service to contact vulnerable

people. The ch church also provides a facility for young parents with preschool age babies children ("Stay and and Play") The building is also used

by other groups such as a weekly relaxation class, as the next door village hall is already used to its full capacity. The Problem

> The church has no toilet, which severely hampers our use of the building and hinders our plans to increase its use to make the church more sustainable in the future. It also puts off some parishioners, both young and old, from attending events and services and creates difficulties for the local church school when they bring children for weekly activities. We cannot safely prepare food in the building either, as the only

facilities consist of a single sink in a cupboard! **Proposed Solution** We propose to install toilet facilities and a small servery, and to reduce the length of some of the pews, so that wheelchair access is improved, as

there is currently nowhere, other than in an aisle, for a wheelchair to be located. We have all the necessary permissions in place and building work is due to commence next month. The Cost



Despite only having a membership of 60 swimmers we were the only club in Co Durham who had a swimmer representing Great Britain in Europe over the past four years. 

'Unnamed' Locomotive **Mystery to go Under Spotlight**

Company equips businesses with the skills and Experts in early railway history are heading to in Shildon deliver Locomotion intelligence this month to investigate training and boasts a roster of regional, national a mysterious, 'unnamed engine as part of a new and international clients, including Hitachi Rail Europe, AlixPartners and BAE Systems research project.

Thought to be the world's first replica locomotive dating from 1855, the mystery engine has been referred to as 'The Hetton Engine' or 'Hetton Lyon' after the colliery in County Durham where it spent its operational life.

The engine is believed to be a replica of an original 1822 George Stephenson design. now lost to history, and it is hoped the research will reveal further secrets about the world's very oldest

steam engines. The project will be led by Dr Michael Bailey and Dr Peter Davidson ΰr who are recognised as world-leading specialists in the field of locomotive investigation. The team will take photographs and measurements and will systematically and carefully dismantle parts of the engine to compare materials and methods of construction with archive evidence.

Work is set to start on 9 April and is expected to continue over a number of three-day sessions lasting several months. The project will take place in public view at Locomotion so people can ask questions and see the investigation taking place and perhaps come up with own thoughts about their the locomotive's history.

Michael and Peter recently led a similar project in Newcastle which f Killingworth Billy found to be ten years older than thought previously making it the third oldest locomotive in the world. In the past Dr Bailey has also carried out investigations

with his colleague Dr John Glithero, into other historic locomotives such as Samson, Albion, Nelson and Canadian National No. 40

Although its name is a mystery, the Hetton locomotive may be a familiar sight to people based in the North East after spending the past eight vears on loan to the Living Museum of the North in Beamish.

At the end of the project, the engine will remain at Locomotion and will go on public display. The findings of the study will be sent to the National Railway Museum, before being offered to the next Early being Railways Conference due to be held in 2021.

The last project of this type involving the National Railway Museum took place 20 years ago when Dr Bailey worked on an investigation into the early history of Stephenson's Rocket. The results were published in the book 'The Engineering and History of Rocket'. This project is the first of its kind to take place at Locomotion in Shildon.

The locomotive was based at Hetton Colliery and hauled coal wagons there until 1912 - after more than sixty vears of active service. The locomotive took part in the 1925 centenary procession for the Stockton and Darlington Railway as well as other exhibitions such as the George Stephenson centenary celebration held in Newcastle in 1881.

The Hetton Colliery Railway was opened in 1822 by the Hetton Coal Company in County Durham. The line was eight miles long and was the first railway to operate without animal power and the first new line to be developed George Stephenson. by It is thought there were originally five locomotives built to work at the colliery between 1820 and 1822 Hetton Colliery closed in 1950.

A private donor is providing funding for this project. Dr Michael Bailey was the first student to obtain a DPhil from the Institute of Railway Studies in 2000, a joint project run by the National Railway Museum and the University of York






