During the day, 600 visitors to the Youth Centre venue in the town enjoyed 21 working layouts, 10 trade stands and 4 preservation society exhibits.

Profits from the exhibition will be shared between 'Heel and Toe', a local looking charity children with cerebral palsy and physical disabilities in County Durham and Darlington, "The Railway Children" and Rotary's own local charities

Friends' layout was the undoubted highlight for younger visitors, "Dunstan Harbour" layout by Norman Cook proved favourite in the 'The People's Choice' People's competition.

Jones Memorial Hopen, was 'The Great White River Steam Navigation and Extraction Company' from Norman and Meg Raven and was presented by Charlotte Iceton, granddaughter of John Henry Jones who helped found the exhibition 10 years ago. The same layout also won the new Edwina Burrows trophy donated by Tigertaz Models Stockton in memory of an Honorary Member of the Rotary Club who died recently and who had supported the event from inception, this was presented by Edwina's grandchildren, Charlie and Cara Burrows

Mr Wilson said: "It was a privilege to host Durham Council County Westminster. Durham is a great place to live and work with some great businesses. "Sedgefield has the largest business park in the North East with between 10,000 and 12,000 people working there.

would strongly recommend businesses locate in Durham because they always receive a great service from the county council and are made very welcome by the people who live there."

Guests heard presentations speakers including Cllr Henig; Terry Collins, Chief Executive of Durham Council; Anne-Isabelle Daulon. CEO of Eleven Arches, the company responsible for Brian Archer, Kynren: managing director of Business Durham; and Allan Cook, of Arlington Real Estate, the company behind the development of Milburngate.

Ms Daulon said: "The event was a testament to everyone in the room. Whether from Durham or outside the county, everyone is understandably passionate about the area and that's a reflection of the energy we see across the county.

James Ramsbotham, Chief Executive of the North East England Chamber of Commerce, said: "It's wonderful to see so many people here today giving such a positive message to people in Whitehall about what a wonderful place Durham is to live and to work.'

David Cullingford, development manager Durham, the Citrus company behind the Integra 61 development, said: "The reception has underlined all the positive things that are encouraging developers like us to invest in County Durham. I think this is a fantastic time for Durham, everyone should take a lot of pride in all that is happening in the county right now." The event also included

exhibition stands companies organisations representing many of the county's success stories including the Auckland Project, Artichoke, Durham University, Hitachi, Visit County Durham and UTC South Durham.

Durham County currently seeing significant investment, including £240 million on the

Riverwalk and Milburngate developments in Durham City and £90 million by Glaxo Smith Kline in a manufacturing facility at Barnard Castle. An £11 million railway station is planned for Horden, while projects such as Genesis at Consett and DurhamGate Spennymoor have regenerated successfully former industrial areas.

Durham has also seen significant growth and investment in its cultural offer and a packed calendar of openings. events. festivals and anniversaries has led to 2019 being declared a Year of Culture in the county - a move which has been praised by the Department for Culture, and Sport, Visit Britain and the England and Wales Cricket Board.

Highlights include Cricket World Cup fixtures at Chester-le-Street, a visit Flying Scotsman from to Locomotion, a new food festival at Seaham and events to celebrate what would have been the 100th birthday of Spennymoor-born painter Norman Cornish. The year culminates in the tenth anniversary of Lumiere in November, The UK's largest light festival has seen more than 840,000 visitors and in excess of £28 million in economic benefits

A CLIMATE EMERGENCY

Recent editions refer to climate change, energy initiatives. climate emergency, DCC's environmental plan, and councillors at demos using kids to press their point.

Only a few decades ago our main industries were mining, ship building, steel making and chemicals. Coal and wood were the main power source. Smoke and chemicals gushed from chimneys. Cars ran on leaded petrol. There were no fish in the Tees. The Skerne was one of the most polluted rivers in the land. People still survived. We were worried about running out of fossil fuels, even after finding large oil and gas reserves in the North Sea.

Coal for heating was partly replaced by cleaner coking coal, then natural gas or electricity (mainly from coal based power stations). Leaded petrol was replaced by cleaner unleaded, then diesel prevailed.

Now, despite all this, we have a climate emergency! We are told gas gives off too much CO2, as does unleaded petrol, and diesel gives off worse nitrous oxide! Spray cans give off 'CHC', which destroys the ozone layer. Cows fart, giving off

methane – worse still! The earth has been warming since the early 1900s, seen in retreating glaciers and ice sheets. A few years ago we were worried about another ice age, now it's global warming. We are told the earth will be between 2 and 7 degrees warmer by 2050, but if we act now, we can

limit this to 1.5 degrees!!! We know the earth's temperature fluctuates over geological time, we know what has happened in the past, and we know we are on an upward short term curve. which man has exacerbated. We also know that man's control on the earth's climate is extremely limited. DCC is looking at promoting cvcling and walking. banning cars from town centres, spending public money on solar power and wind farms, telling us we can't eat meat (even though eating more vegetables will make us fart more methane, like the cows!), telling us we can't take flights etc. Conversely, it promotes huge amounts of building on farm land, inward migration, and the extension of Teesside Airport! Meanwhile, other countries

dwarfing us in size exploit minerals. frack coal. denigrate rain forests, and pollute the air as we used to. Forests absorb and store CO2 and emit oxygen. Ongoing worldwide deforestation will have a bigger negative effect on global warming

conceivably do within the UK, but we are told we must set an example to the rest of the world! How condescending!

To make matters worse. actions so far do not inspire confidence.

Incentives for diesel cars are now widely considered flawed.

Millions were blown on smart meters, which don't vou change work once supplier, and all they tell us is that energy costs money! Millions were spent on wall and loft insulation, caused which often condensation, and was often inappropriately by

opportunist companies.
Energy Performance Certificates are scandalous. I had one recommending wall insulation, cavity which had already been done, and recommendations costing thousands to save pennies, because 'this is what the government tells me I have to recommend'! New boilers are designed to last only 10 years; old

ones lasted much longer. Mine was installed in 1990, and it's almost as low on emissions as the current energy efficient boilers, some being even less energy efficient! How can scrapping a boiler after 10 years be good for the environment?

Solar energy sounds great, but if a system costs £5K, saves £200 a year and must be replaced after 15 years, it's a bad investment, irrespective of how it's funded. The steel used to build it has to be made using coking coal, components to be shipped in, have the old system has to be scrapped. Would anyone be surprised if suddenly they tell us solar isn't the solution they originally thought?

Electric cars may sound great, but this surely depends on the carbon cost of scrappage and the source of the electricity (eg coal powered cars!).

Nuclear energy is considered clean, and can generate huge amounts of power, but nuclear plants are immensely expensive and nuclear waste is a problem. We were told they were safe, then Chernobyl happened! There are no easy answers, but if calcs nearer 7 degrees

are right, it won't matter whether we save half a degree or not - all the polar ice is going to melt anyway, the coral will die off, the Australian bats have had it, and we will have to evolve

into another species! How ironic that politicians now marching on climate demos fought tooth and nail to avoid closing coal mines, steel plants and shipyards!

You benefited from the Industrial Revolution you now have to suffer and become vegan! The Green Party (even with

BECOMING AN EXTINCTION REBEL!

My job as Cabinet Support for Economy & Regeneration means that I have a specific task to look after the County Council's 'Climate Emergency' Plan, so on Tuesday evening I went through to Durham to attend the monthly meeting of Extinction Rebellion Durham.

THE PEOPLE

I don't know how you imagine an XR activist to be, but what struck me most about the 50-or-so people who had gathered for the meeting was how gentle and polite they were. They followed autism rules for debate (jazz hands to show approval and, instead of shouting to bring the meeting to order, the meeting leader just raised her arm above her head - those who noticed did likewise, and the meeting immediately fell silent silently).

The majority were young sixth-formers and students or old. There were few 'in between' and some time was spent talking about how XR might extend its appeal.

THE PROGRAMME

One well-received suggestion was that the XR logo needed to be as familiar to people as the ban-the-bomb sign, and time was spent considering how and where to 'protest'. Suggestions, however, revolved around how to get noticed positively - for example by rejuvenating gardens, or picking up litter after public events. After the main meeting I listened in at the 'Lobbying'

workshop, which discussed how members might politely approach councils. supermarkets, businesses, landlords, bus companies

workshops looked Other at wider issues example: media, education, community resilience regenerative culture there is a realisation that saving the planet will require societal as well as technological change.

Some of the suggestions were brilliant. One was that we take off from shopping all our unnecessary/unrecyclable packaging and give it back to the supermarket. idea is that the supermarkets get fed up and demand reduced and recyclable/ biodegradable packaging from their suppliers. I dare not, as some, make everyone wait whilst I take off the packaging at the checkout. *can* collect it up at home and take it back in to customer service! Other suggestions worth a second thought included car pools for places without a good public transport service, community composting, and ways to stop taxis waiting with their engines idling

WORTHWHILE CAUSE

There are some disruptive XR strategies which I would find hard to defend, and some targets with which I cannot agree. But the people at Tuesday's meeting were earnest and caring, and we need to help them as they seek to protect the planet. Cllr John D Clare

Local School Makes a Difference!



On 30th April 2019, Year from Aycliffe Village Primary School went litter picking on Bickford Terrace in the village.

They did this as part of their Make a Difference Challenge at school to support Dogs Trust who look after the welfare of dogs. Bishop Auckland Town Hall Transformation Plans

Bishop Auckland Town Hall into a thriving cultural hub will be presented to councillors next week.

Durham County Council's Cabinet will be asked endorse a proposal to refurbish and fully redefine the Market Place venue as part of the wider regeneration of Bishop Auckland. The £1.5 million investment

is expected to save money in the long run by making the Grade II listed building more sustainable, with an improved layout and modern facilities allowing for a bigger and more enticing programme of events and activities. This would attract people from outside of the local area, boosting the venue's revenue and increasing footfall in the town centre. It would also contribute to the town's growing reputation cultural destination, complementing major events such as Kynren and multi-million-pound redevelopment of Auckland Castle.

Improvements include the creation of a new café, bar and contemporary art gallery space on the ground floor, as well as enhanced library facilities. The auditorium would also be revamped to include more comfortable seating, and the cinema would become fully digitised, allowing popular blockbusters to be shown as well as live screenings, productions, comedy nights and lectures. Bishop Auckland is fast becoming a centre for the visual arts following the opening of the Mining Art Gallery by the Auckland Project in 2017, along with the upcoming opening of the Spanish Art Gallery. The creation of a dedicated Norman Cornish Gallery within the town hall would upon this, while providing a permanent home for the artist's Durham Miners' Gala mural, currently on display in County Hall.

Cabinet will hear how the refurbishment proposed supports the ambitions of both the Bishop Auckland Master Plan and the Towns and Villages Strategy when it meets in Crook Civic Centre on Wednesday, 15 May.

If Cabinet approves the recommendations, work would begin on site in the autumn and is expected to be completed by spring next year subject to planning and listed building consent. The council would also consult with local people and visitors about the kind of events, theatrical productions, exhibitions and activities on offer at the venue.

During the planned closure, opening hours would be extended at Woodhouse Library. Close planning of wider library services within the town is also being considered.
