Would they know what was happening and how to help? One in 100 people in the UK have epilepsy. For National Epilepsy Week (20-26 May) we are encouraging everyone to step up and learn how to keep someone with epilepsy safe when they have a seizure.

Recent statistics reveal that 36% of the public would be unsure or unwilling to help somebody having a seizure. A further 57% admit they have little to no knowledge about epilepsy.

Helping someone who is having a seizure is simpler than people think. Staying with someone, protecting them from further harm, and calling for help if it's needed, are three vital steps. If in doubt, always call 999 and ask for an ambulance. Epilepsy Action has created first-aid cards that can be ordered, they fit neatly into a purse or wallet so people can always have information handy. Posters are also readily available to be displayed in public

places, such as schools, workplaces or waiting rooms. You can order these free of charge and find out more at epilepsy.

Trust Urges People to 'Get Active' to Raise Funds

Durham Wildlife Trust is seeking ramblers and runners to take part in two events as a way of raising funds for its vital work.

The first event is the Sunderland 3 Peaks on June 22 between 10:30 am - 1:00pm, beginning at Tunstall Hills. Walkers will enjoy the views and climbs of Tunstall Hills, Herrington Hill and Penshaw Hill over a route of

approximately eight miles. On the way, they will meet expert guides on Herrington Hill, the Trust's newest Sunderland Nature Reserve, who will offer an insight into its importance for flora and fauna, including the spectacular display of wildflowers which adorn the reserve.

The walk will finish at Penshaw Tearooms. Durham Wildlife Trust will run a Minibus shuttle service from Herrington Country Park to the start of the walk. Walkers can enter for £8 per person or £15 per couple and dogs on leads are welcome.

The second event is the annual Run Rainton on Saturday August 17 at the Trust's flagship Rainton Meadows Nature Reserve near Houghton le Spring. Beginning at 10.30am, the 5k Trail Fun Run will take

participants over a challenging circuit of Rainton Meadows Nature Reserve, including Nicholson's Hill.

Advanced entry for the run is available for £10, places must be booked in advance, runners will not be able to join on the day. Ages 6+ are welcome, under 14s must be accompanied by an adult. There will also be stalls including tombola and

cake sales, fundraising for the Trust on the day. The entry fees to Sunderland 3 Peaks and Run Rainton go directly to Durham Wildlife Trust, enabling the charity to manage Rainton Meadows Nature Reserve as well as 36 other Nature Reserves from the Tees up to the Tyne. Trust Membership Development Officer Emily Routledge, herself a keen runner, said: "These events are a lot of fun and give people an opportunity to get out into the open air and appreciate our spectacular flora and fauna."

for Appleby Horse Fair

Preparations are underway across County Durham for Gypsies and Travellers heading to this year's Appleby Horse Fair.

Temporary Stop Over Areas (TSOA) are being set up in the Teesdale and South West Durham areas ahead of the annual event, which runs in the Cumbrian village from Friday, 7 June to Sunday, 9 June.

The nine designated TSOAs are located along the traditional travelling routes Appleby: Westerton to

Layby, Tindale Park, Wackerfield Layby, Winston Corner, Broomielaw Picnic Area, Stainton Bank, Shaw Bank Field, Binchester and Corner Guidepost Corner, Bowes, They will be open between

Friday, 25 May and Friday, 22 June, with Tindale Park opening a week earlier on Friday, 17 May. There is also a TSOA at Gurney Valley, Bishop Auckland, which is open now and throughout the summer.

Durham County Council's Gypsy, Roma, Traveller Service (GRTS) will ensure Traveller facilities are at all TSOAs, provided including temporary toilet facilities. refuse collections and, in some cases, water supply for animals. This is to encourage people to use TSOAs. rather than unauthorised encampments. Officers from the GRTS and

the council's neighbourhood wardens will be making regular visits to the TSOAs, as well as visiting any

unauthorised encampments. The TSOAs are being provided as part of coordinated response from the South West Durham Residents', Business' and Forum and the Travellers' Teesdale Residents' and Forum, which Travellers' representatives include from the county, town parish councils, n Constabulary, and councils, Durham local businesses and the Roma, Traveller Gypsy, communities.

reesdale Residents' and Travellers' Forum a member of the South West Durham Residents' Business' and Travellers' Forum, said: "All members of both forums will address any problems which are brought to them by residents and businesses in the area they represent in order that the migration period both to and from Appleby Horse Fair passes without incident." Sergeant Simon Rogers

Barnard of Castle Neighbourhood Police Team, said: "The police and our partners will be monitoring the migration through Teesdale and will be supporting our communities, with extra patrols on the run up to, during and after the event.

"Some residents accept the migration of Travellers through Teesdale at this time of the year, but others have concerns about the potential for trespass and there can be feelings of unease from the settled community.

"Our joined-up approach means that, in recent years, we have experienced a relatively small number of incidents directly linked to the Travellers."

Temporary signposts will be in place to show the locations of key TSOAs and to advise residents and road users. Signs will also be put up at each location outlining the conditions and expectations for anyone using the facilities

Ian Hoult, neighbourhood protection manager at Durham County Council, said: "We would encourage those making their way to Appleby Fair to use our temporary stop over areas as they travel through County Durham.

"We are committed to working with our partners to provide these locations, which are equipped with a range of facilities that won't be found at an unauthorised camp."

Those travelling to the fair are being advised not to set off too early to prevent people arriving before the TSOAs open. Fair organisers are also encouraging those who plan on attending the event with trailers, towed caravans or horse drawn wagons not to arrive at the fair too far in advance of it starting. 

significant new. more centre of food and finance solidarity. Shildon Alive continues to build on the experiences of the last five years by continuing to enable local people to care for local people. The project was founded by the Revd Canon David Tomlinson when he was

vicar of St John's and is now responsible for helping other churches in the diocese to become advocates of their communities and grow for their communities Revd David said: "The

larger premises [grown from 3 shop units from the previous 1] will allow us to respond better to demand. This is exemplified by the Credit Union now running daily instead of twice weekly, and more excitingly the expansions of the food for all program to include a healthy take away for children and young people, intergenerational cooking and learning together, a community supermarket with low priced staples supermarket not otherwise available

in a town that has no supermarkets." Projects Coordinator Paula Nelson said: "The 'food for all' program was established with the support of Morrison's, Co-op, Tesco, Sainsbury's, Aldi M&S Food and Greggs. It recognises that the £13bn of food trashed in the UK every year is a national

scandal, impacting the environment, food costs, and human flourishing. "As a Christian group, Shildon Alive believes passionately in taking care of the world around us so every week we collect surplus food from local

supermarkets, encouraging local people to make use of it and working together to minimise this problem in their area. Our food champion Joanne Iceton also runs the intergenerational cooking programme we call Littlechefsbigchefs which aims to bring generations together to learn and share in the joy of cooking.

Union, partnering with NE First, we run savings clubs in schools, budget lessons, and seek to challenge loan sharking. A financially healthy people are an emotionally healthy people too."

Revd David added: "A full-time advocacy service supporting people out of difficult places, signposting and being a kind and listening presence is making a massive difference to families and individuals who simply need a 'leg up' every now and again. Physical health and caring the environment go for hand in hand with two community gardens, a guerrilla gardening project involving around 800 children and young people (annually) litter picking and planting across the community.

"We also have an Alzheimer's café which has proved popular with both both carers and those living with the condition, giving support, along with planning musical and other events that have combined to make this a success. Girls keep fit, pop up table tennis table, youth group meetings, and more complete the picture."

Bishop Sarah said: "We are called to shine the light of our faith in our everyday lives and for the people of St. John's this means caring for our community in a way that ensures no one need be hungry, or lonely, or broken by financial crisis or family heartache. Shildon Alive is the lamp through which the church shines its light into the community of Shildon. 

FA GRANTS FOR ADULT MALE TEAMS

New-look scheme from The FA returns to support retention of adult male football teams · Grants available for clubs

to maintain existing adult male teams • Application window open

until Thursday 6 June 2019 The Football Association (The FA) is re-launching its adult male retention-focused funding scheme to support men's 11-a-side community football teams across the country.

The newly-titled Stay in the Game scheme will offer existing clubs the opportunity to apply for grants of $\pounds750$ to help cover the various associated costs of running a football team. Last year, under the name Retain the Game, the scheme helped to support the retention of 2,336 adult male teams across the country, supporting an estimated 55,000

community footballers. Clubs who benefitted from the grants last year were

able to use the funding for matchday and training facility hire, first-aid training and new equipment, whilst also subsidising matchday fees for members of their respective squads. Paul Simpson, England Under-20s Head Coach, said: "It's no secret that we are seeing adult male players move from regular 11-a-side football into other more casual formats of the game.

One of the main reasons clubs lacking money is for things like match fees, facilities hire, new kit and equipment, which can lead to their teams folding. "Last year's roll-out of the scheme saw some really positive strides and I hope we'll see men's 11-a-side teams across the country receive a helping hand.' This year, the grants will once again be available to adult male teams in the Under-18 to Under-21 category, open-age adult sides and veterans' teams.

Grassroots clubs that meet the following criteria will be eligible to apply:

• Clubs that operate with two or more adult male teams - Under-18s, Under-19s, Under-21s, Under-23s, open age and vets.

• Clubs that hold the FA's Charter Standard Award (Adult, Youth, Development or Community).

• Adult clubs that commit to becoming FA Adult Charter Standard within season 2019/20. • Clubs that have the support

of their County Football Association.

The application window for Stay in the Game is now open and closes at 5pm on Thursday 6 June 2019. 


