North East Transport Bid Welcomed by **Councillors in Durham**

Councillors in County Durham have voiced their support for an ambitious £377 million bid to transform million bid to transform travel across the region. This week the North East

Joint Transport Committee confirmed the region's outline bid for Government Transforming Cities funding

– a £1.28 billion pot for schemes that encourage sustainable travel.

The committee is made up of representatives from the North East and North of Tyne combined authorities, and, if successful, its bid would form a major part of a £448 million investment programme. The programme would span the entire region and would see the delivery of everything from major improvements at key railway stations, to more frequent Metro services, new park and ride sites, extended bus lanes and new cycling

and walking routes.
In County Durham, projects identified within the proposed outline bid include:

The expansion of the Durham City park and ride site at Sniperley and the creation of an additional site in the Stonebridge area, complete with electric vehicle charging points

Improved pedestrian access at Durham Railway Station, linking the A691 and the southbound platform

The demolition Durham Bus Station and the creation of a new building with improved facilities on the same site in North Road
• Introduction an

• Introduction and extension of bus priority lanes on the approaches to **Durham City**

Improved walking and cycling routes into the city.

"Those projects "These projects said: "These projects reflect our commitment to promoting sustainable transport, reducing air pollution and making it easier for people to access the shops, businesses, leisure facilities and attractions on offer in Durham City.

"They are just some of the ways we are striving to improve transport infrastructure across County Durham. Last month, work began on a new £10.5 million railway station in Horden, which is set to deliver an economic boost to east Durham.

"Major improvements are also being carried out at key junctions, including on the A1 at Bowburn and the A19 and A179 Sheraton junction at South Wingate, while our Strategic Cycling and Walking Delivery Plan sets out how we will improve our network of footpaths and cycle lane and

Cllr Carl Marshal, Cabinet member for economic regeneration at Durham County Council and member of the North East Joint Transport Committee, said: "Good transport links are crucial for a prosperous economy. It is a factor all businesses and organisations take into account when considering whether to invest

in our region. 'Transport in the North East has been substantially underfunded compared to London and the south for years. If the government is serious about the Northern Powerhouse and rebalancing the country's economy, they need provide our region with a fair share of the national funding. "This bid is about unlocking the North East's potential, and the two combined authorities working together for the benefit of all those who live, work and visit the region.'

The outline bid will now be submitted to the Department for Transport, with a final business case expected to be finalised by November. This means some schemes within the programme may change. A final announcement about successful is expected in early 2020, and the programme will be delivered between 2020 and 2023 by local authorities, Metro owner and operator Nexus and other partners.

Himalayan Balsam is a pretty pink flower which the bees love and can be found throughout many areas of Aycliffe.

However, this beauty hides a secret. If left to spread, it will out compete all native plant species causing a single stand of this invasive weed. As the plant is generally found along watercourses, the shallow root system can also result in unstable river banks and increase river erosion problems.

The plant is well established Woodham Burn and at Aycliffe Town Great Council have spent several years attempting to control it by pulling and cutting it before it goes to seed.

The Council encouraging residents to come along and assist residents in controlling the plant during a public event on Wednesday 26th June between 4pm and 6pm.

Participants are encouraged to wear long sleeved tops and trousers and meet at the Town Park pavilion. Gloves and Instruction will be provided.



Mental illness doesn't discriminate, it will take men, women and children with impunity. It's no respecter of position or status and where mental illness is concerned no one

Various forms of mental health issues are on the increase and while the suicide rate, especially in men, continues to climb, the age at which they take their lives is in free fall. It's no longer uncommon to hear of young men in their 20's and 30's committing suicide because they are unable to deal with their mental illness.

There is a great upsurge in the call for us to talk about mental illness, but talking alone won't fix the problem. Talking is the first step but without positive supportive action to back it up it's well meaning but lacking in the professional, social and community based awareness necessary to make a real difference.

Those who have to live with mental illness on a daily basis have to not only deal with their own illness, but also the ignorance and fear of those around them. It is the 21st century and yet the fear and stigma of mental illness renders some people powerless to deal with the realities when faced with the condition in themselves or a family member.

In an effort to raise awareness and help people better understand complexities mental illness and the help available in both support and treatment, Aycliffe Radio presenters Phillip Hawkins, Mary O'Sullivan and Karl Simons are planning to complete a tandem parachute jump 2019 September and produce a video to record the event and highlight the need for greater understanding and support in mental health awareness.





Station Harnesses Flower Power for Mental Health

Budding displays at Durham City's Train Station will help people discover mental

Floral displays throughout the station will draw attention to the work of health charity, mental Samaritans.

Samaritans is dedicated to reducing feelings of isolation and disconnection that can lead to suicide. The charity takes over five million calls a year via their 24 hour listening service, as well as responding to people in need via text, letter and face to face.

In a collaborative project between Durham County Council, London North Eastern Railway (LNER), Durham In Bloom and Samaritans, the charity hopes to reach out to people who pass through the station

Large planters will not only display beautiful flowers, but will also hold cards with the telephone number for the charity readily available to anyone in need.

A weekly visit by two Samaritan volunteers, who will water and tend to the planters, will also give a visible presence so that anyone can speak to them.

The planters will also be included in Durham's bid for Champion of Champions this year in the national RHS In Bloom competition. The displays were funded by three Durham County Council elected members, Cllr David Freeman and Cllr Richard Ormerod, both ward members for Elvet and Gilesgate, and Cllr Liz Brown, ward member Neville's Cross, who supported the project with

The displays not only make the station an attractive place for our commuters and visitors, but draw attention to the charity's special service that may be seen at just the right time, by the right person."


Lynn Brooks, director of

Vehicles being used to transport controlled waste have been inspected at the roadside during an operation to clamp down on rubbish

being disposed of illegally. As part of Operation Stop It, Durham County Council's award-winning campaign to eliminate flytipping, the authority's neighbourhood wardens and licensing team, along with neighbourhood policing teams, road policing unit, HMRC, DVSA, and the Environment Agency came together to inspect vehicles that were being used to transport waste on roads in Spennymoor and Bishop Auckland.

During the six-hour operation the DVSA issued six prohibition notices, meaning that the vehicles had been identified to have one or more safety related defects that require the operator to take immediate



for overload prohibitions, including one for a vehicle almost eight per cent overloaded and the other for a small lorry carrying a pickup truck that was almost 22 per cent overloaded 22 per cent overloaded, which had to be recovered so the excess weight could be safely removed.

safely removed.

The DVSA also issued four immediate tyre defect prohibitions all for being below the legal tread limit.

delayed prohibitions, one for worn suspension parts and one for a defective exhaust. The road policing unit issued two fixed penalty notices, one for failing to display a rear number plate and one for a bald tyre.

The Environment Agency issued advice to several waste carriers instructing them on the required permits and licences required to transport controlled waste. Ian Hoult, Durham County

Council's neighbourhood protection manager, said: "We know that most people in County Durham dispose of their waste responsibly, however we will continue to work with our partners and target those who continually chose to blight the landscape

through flytipping."

Campaign Targets Scams & Offers Victim Support



Durham County Council is supporting a national campaign to target scams and offer advice to help people

avoid being duped.
Throughout June, Durham County Council's trading standards team is supporting Scams National Awareness Campaign to make people more aware.
With over 94 complaints

received over the last year, residents of County Durham are being told to stop, think and report if they think they have been scammed.

By participating in the campaign, the council hopes to build on recent success in prosecuting cheat traders in County Durham, which led to substantial penalties being handed out.

The operators of a roofing business were sentenced to 32 months imprisonment each and banned as company directors following investigation extensive involving some 35 victims and financial losses of over £85,000 being identified.

In the last two years, following a complex investigation into a sophisticated internet fraud, two individuals who were running a business offering goods such as furniture, hot tubs and saunas which were never delivered to consumers were sentenced to six and four years respectively, with scam victims suffering losses of over £450,000.

Owen Cleugh, consumer protection manager at Durham County Council, said: "The reporting of scams is severely underreported with many victims feeling too embarrassed to report being a victim to their family, the police or trading standards.
"We want to help people

firstly, avoid scams prosecuting scammers and ensuring the public are well informed, but also help those who are victims of scams to not feel isolated or powerless."
The campaign recognises

recent trends in scam attempts, including increase in doorstep complaints crime investigations concerning home improvements, roofing, driveways and conservatory extensions.

Durham County is working with partners, including Durham including Constabulary, County Darlington Durham and Neighbourhood Watch and Durham University to raise awareness of scams by encouraging residents to sign up to be a Friend Against Scams to pass on the message to family and friends.

A County Durham fabrications firm is facing a bright future after an investment of more than £2 million.

Facades Fabrications, which is based in Newton Aycliffe and manufactures metal rainscreen and fabrications for the construction industry, has invested in new machinery, increased services and a site expansion.

The firm, which has worked on projects including Tottenham Hotspur's new stadium and the Jaguar including Land Rover Gaydon site, has invested £2.1 million over the past year in purchasing new automated equipment to speed up the manufacturing process, as well as renting additional premises.

Managing Director Phil Atkinson said: "A few years ago, we started to look at automation, and we have recently taken delivery of the UK's first Trumpf fullyautomatic panel bender, which bends rainscreen panels, as well as ordering

a fully-automated punching system. 'lights out'

means that we're able to set the machine away in the evening and return in the morning with the load completed, thus saving time and speeding up production.
"Some people believe that automation equals job losses, but it's quite the contrary in our case - our head count increased from 40 to 55 over the past 12 months.

"For us, automation isn't just about speed and efficiency, it's also about quality. Using this new equipment, a typical rainscreen panel is bent to perfection in a third of the time of a traditional press brake, and then every panel after is exactly the same."
