Byerley Park and Local Artist Create 'Cosmic' Art for Durham University

A new 'cosmic' artwork cocreated by North East school children has been unveiled at Durham University's Ogden Centre for Fundamental Physics.

The piece comprises three large panels created by North East artist Mel artist Mel Connell, based on the children's interpretations of the pioneering astronomy and cosmology research undertaken at the University. The artwork was developed over six months, through the 'Changing Cosmic Cosmic Perceptions: An Exploration of our Universe' Project. Between January and March,

University researchers visited two North East Primary, in Newton Aycliffe, Brambles Primary Academy, in Middlesbrough, to explore their research with around 60 year five pupils.

Each school hosted three sessions, on three different themes: The Observers, led by researchers from the Centre for Extragalactic Astronomy (CEA); The Creators, with the Centre for Advanced Instrumentation (CfAI); and The Dreamers,



supported by the Institute for Computational Cosmology

All three are research groups within Durham University's Physics Department. Staff at the CEA observe the Universe; staff at the CfAI state-of-the-art technology; and ICC staff investigate the origins and history of the Universe.

As the researchers and children worked together, the children created paintings and computer-based images based on their learning and interpretation.

Then between April and June, Mel Connell worked with the children to turn their ideas into the artwork for the Ogden Centre.

The finished piece was unveiled at the Ogden Centre for Fundamental Physics on Thursday 27th June, when the children spoke about the project and what they had learned.

Adele Watts, year five class teacher at Byerley Park Primary School, said: "The pupils have really enjoyed all the science experiments and the equipment that we have been able to use during the project, and have been really keen to come to the University to share their learning. We're so pleased with the artwork. Seeing all the different light effects that the children explored, and the fact that the children are able to share and touch the work which you are not usually able to do. It's just great for them, and they've had a really great time." Victoria Fawcett, who is

studying for an astronomy PhD on black holes, was one of the physicists involved in the project. She said: 'It was fantastic to see how enthusiastic all the children were about astronomy. I ran an activity where we explored objects falling into black holes. It was great to see everyone excited about my subject. Sometimes it's nice to be reminded that the work I do is really interesting and I'm grateful that I get to do it every day.'



"Angel" Dora Recalls Making PUNCHING BELOW Greenfield Celebrate **Munitions During WW2**

An "Angel" shared her memories of ammunitions manufacturing during the Second World War for Armed Forces Day.

Dora Mattrick, 96, was just 20 years old when she started working at ROF Aycliffe, a Royal Ordnance Factory in County Durham.

Known as the Aycliffe the Angels, employed more than 17,000 women, producing hundreds of millions of bullets and other munitions for the war effort.

Dora now lives at Longroyds and Pilling Care Home, in Skelmanthorpe, where she was taking part in a reminiscence session and talked about her work during the Second World War.

Originally from Newcastle. Dora worked at the arms factory for two-and-a-half years, beginning in 1943, at the height of the war.

She was trained as a mechanical engineer and, after just 10 weeks, joined a team of eight ladies on the production line in the factory.

Just a few days before starting, however, there had been an explosion when a 25lb bomb went off, killing six workers.

This incident, alongside others, was kept quiet at the time, going unreported in an effort to keep moral up during the conflict.

Dora said: "It didn't really scare me. We just did what we had to do."

Despite the factory being top secret, it was visited during the war years by Winston Churchill and members of

the Royal Family. At the turn of the millennium, a memorial service was held to recognise the Aycliffe Angels for their efforts, attended by then Prime Minister Tony Blair and the





Queen. Unfortunately, Dora was unable to attend.

Armed Forces Day, which was on Saturday, 29th June, restored Second World War era Jerry Jeep visited Longroyds and Pilling House Care Home.
Dora said: "I was looking

forward to seeing the Jerry Jeep. I was always a big fan." Stella Hunt, home manager at Longroyds and Pilling House Care Home, said: "Dora was just 20 years old when she went to work in a top secret and highly dangerous facility producing

"Her bravery and that of the other Aycliffe Angels was incredible and everyone at the home, including residents and staff, is looking forward to recognising their efforts and commemorating those who lost their lives.

"Armed Forces Day is a chance to show our gratitude for all the men and women serving now and in the past, whether on the front lines or providing support services.'

The coffee shop, now under the management of the Meadow's Coffee Shop team from Rainton Meadows, Trust's the reserve near Houghton le Spring, will serve hot food and drinks plus homemade cakes and scones, and a new classroom and meeting space will allow the Trust to do more work with schools and the local community.

The site will continue to be supported by a team of Low Barns Ambassadors. all of them volunteers, who will offer information and advice about the reserve, its wildlife and local sightings. The Trust has been at Low Barns since the 1960s and the site has evolved over that time, as can be seen from the new interpretation in the centre and across the reserve.

"Places like Low Barns are needed so that everyone has a chance to get closer to nature and be inspired to help us conserve the natural world for future

David Makinson said: "I've been a volunteer at Low Barns for more than 20 years. It really is a hidden gem and we have a core group of regular visitors who get to enjoy the reserve and the vast array of wildlife it attracts. The updates to our visitor centre have made it much more accessible and the new coffee shop means that visitors can plan a full day here, with the chance to enjoy a hot meal for lunch. We are looking forward to welcoming lots of new people over the coming months."

Low Barns Coffee Shop Manager, Angela Watson, said: "We're delighted to be taking over the management of the Low Barns Coffee Shop. We have a loyal and supportive customer base


