Red Bags Support Better Communication Volunteers Needed to Help

Care homes and hospitals across County Durham & working Darlington together to make sure that when residents need to be admitted to hospital, the transition between the two places of care is as smooth as possible – particularly for people with dementia or who, for some other reason, can't easily communicate.

Distinctive red bags are now used to take essential information, medication and

other items such as glasses and hearing aids, to hospital. The bag travels with the patient, so there's no delay. Some care homes are also using the red bags to send in vital information with patients having an outpatient appointment.

Norman Devlin, senior nurse for integrated discharge at County Durham & Darlington NHS Foundation Trust, said, "Being admitted to hospital is a worrying

The new Prime Minister's announcement yesterday that 20,000 new Police Officers will be recruited across the country has received a cautious welcome from Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner Ron Hogg.

Ron noted that the number of Police Officers employed by Durham Constabulary been reduced by nearly 400 since 2010 as a consequence of Government funding cuts. He said, "We need Ministers to provide more detail about this. If the Government is going to replace Officers which the force lost as a result of austerity, then that is clearly something to be welcomed. I will be arguing to ensure that forces such as Durham receive a fair share of the new allocation, as

soon as possible". Ron added, "However, it's crucially important that the funding for these new Officers comes direct from the Government rather than because Police and Crime Commissioners are given permission to raise the Council Tax precept. I have been put in a position in the past two years where I have had to ask the people of County Durham to pay the maximum increase just to maintain Officer numbers. and I don't want to have to ask them for a greater increase this year".
Ron concluded, "Durham

Constabulary has been rated as 'outstanding' for efficiency for the past four years by Government Inspectors. It is an extremely well-run force and any additional resources will be used sensibly, focusing on cutting crime, and giving priority to offenders which cause the most harm to

Check Your Voter Information

Households in County Durham are being asked to check if the voter information for their home is correct. As part of Durham County

As part of Durham County Council's annual canvass, households will soon receive a letter asking them to confirm the information currently held on the electoral register.

David Collingwood, Durham County Council's electoral services manager, said: "It is important to respond to the request for information, even if there has been no change to the details, as otherwise people may be lost from the register and be unable to vote in future local and national elections."

Confirming details is quick and simple – and being registered to vote can help to improve your credit rating. If all of the information on

the form is correct you can:

• Visit http://www.
householdresponse.com,
select Durham County
Council and enter part 1 and
part 2 of the security code
printed on the form.

• Phone 0800 197 9871 and when prompted enter part 1 and part 2 of the security code printed on the form.

• Return it in the envelope provided. Postage is free.
The website can be used to add or delete an elector's name, or to make changes to a current elector's name. It can also be used to request a postal vote or to opt out from

being on the open register. If any of the information is incorrect, it can be amended on the form and returned to the council's electoral services team.

If you have recently moved or your details are not included on the form, you can go online to register at www.gov.uk/register-to-vote.

A GREAT DAY OUT | ManMade Exhibition | DOGGY FOOD BANK at Greenfield Arts

exhibition at new Greenfield Arts explores the changing nature of masculinity.

ManMade is a series of installations, sculptures and textile works that questions about raise men's behaviour and their expressions of masculinity. The exhibition has been curated by Newcastle artist Richard Bliss, who has been in residence at Greenfield Arts since April. For ManMade Richard has created Hanging, a piece that implores men to be kinder, and Over-Coat, (in partnership with Philip Clark), a work which explores the inner feelings of men and boys. The exhibition also features shirts from Richard's collection, The Quest for The Perfect Shirt; work by men who attend the Greenfield Cree; and The Gentleman's Wardrobe by William Titley and a group of male carers from East Lancashire.

"The idea for creating an exhibition that explored different kind of masculinity began when I was supported by Arts Council England to develop my project The Quest for the Perfect Shirt." Said Richard. "When I was developing ManMade I was struggling with some big questions: Why bully and banter, not kindness and care? Which is braver, daily caring or a single act in war? Who chooses fists over feelings? I can't answer the questions, but I hope the exhibition encourages us to think about the changing nature of masculinity.'

ManMade treats the gallery at Greenfield Arts in a fresh way. Each of the works has been given its own space, with creative use of lighting and unusual styles of presentation. For example, Over-Coat is hanging on a door, apparently having just been taken off by its owner, and visitors can sit inside The Gentleman's Wardrobe and hear the voices of the men who made the work with William Titley.

The exhibition illustrates what Richard describes as socially engaged art

"All the work has come through about some of collaboration", said Richard. "Public conversations have contributed to the ideas in the shirts, workshops led to us making the medals, and the residency led directly to making Over-Coat. The Gentleman's Wardrobe emerged from the process of engaging with a group of men who care for a loved one at home."

ManMade has been created with financial support from Lubaina Himid (with Into a Better Shape) and Greenfield Arts. It can be seen at Greenfield Arts until 18th September.

Work Starts Next Month on WHAT'S ON AT PCP? **New Council Headquarters**

Work to build a smaller, more affordable headquarters for the region's largest council is set to begin next month, paving the way for a new multi-million-pound business district at Aykley Heads, creating up to 6,000 new jobs and delivering a £400 million boost to the county. Aykley Heads in Durham is

already home to more than 30 businesses employing 1,300 people but in order for the site to realise its full potential, it is necessary for Durham County Council to relocate its headquarters from Avkley Heads.

The authority is, therefore, creating a new, more modern, base in the heart of the city centre, which will be less than a third of the size of the current County Hall. As part of the construction approximately 250 new jobs will be created by Kier, which will be building the new headquarters. These will include opportunities for apprentices as well as people who are currently unemployed across the county. There will also be opportunities for local and regional suppliers and contractors.

The new building on the Sands car park in Durham City centre will not only mean a reduction in running costs, it will also enable staff to embrace modern ways of working and boost trade within the city centre.

Cllr Joy Allen, Cabinet member for transformation, culture and tourism at Durham County Council. "The development of the Aykley Heads site presents a once in a

opportunityto transform the county's economic prospects, with the development of what will be one of the most attractive business parks in the whole of the North East, and has the full support of the business community.

"The planned development will create thousands of new high-quality jobs and future employment opportunities for our young people, as well as bringing millions of pounds of investment into the county.

'The relocation of our headquarters is key to this but, furthermore, it will also enable us to develop a more efficient civic building in the heart of Durham City, providing an all year-round economic boost in trade in the city centre.'

The new headquarters will accommodate 1,000 staff from the current County Hall site with 700 workstations, whilst a further 850 staff will be relocated to one of four key council office sites being developed across the county, also providing a boost to the local economy. Initial works for the new HO

are due to start on site on Monday, 12 August, which will result in the Sands car park closing for two years whilst the building is constructed and the permanent relocation of the coach park to Belmont Park and Ride.

Sidegate car park in the city will also change from being long stay to short-stay to accommodate visitors, shoppers and Freeman's Quay Leisure Centre users. Disabled parking spaces for people visiting the city

are available in a number including locations Walkergate and Prince Bishops Shopping Centre. The car park at the development Riverwalk has also recently reopened, offering more than 450 additional spaces.

The new coach park at Belmont Park and Ride on the A690 will be expanded, providing more spaces and welfare and coach cleaning facilities when it is operational at the end of September. A temporary coach park at Belmont Park and Ride, with access to facilities, will be available until then. There will be no change for visitors by coach as they will continue to be dropped off and picked up by the coaches at the existing stops at Freeman's Place in the city centre. And the Cathedral bus service will continue to pick up visitors outside CoHo on Freeman's Place.

A temporary footpath will be created to ensure safe pedestrian access is maintained on the road side of the site although access to the riverbank side will be limited until the works are completed.

Main construction works are due to begin in September. Notices will be displayed on the current coach and car park at the Sands and at Sidegate explaining the changes. Coach companies will be advised of the new arrangements and signage will also direct the coaches to the new coach park.

History Lesson

Newton News are running a seven week series on the history of Newton Aycliffe. This series was written by County Councillor and local historian John D. Clare and will run from the ice age to present day. If you miss any of the weeks, you can catch up on our website at the end of the run www.newtonnews.co.uk

This series will compliment the 1950's Beamish exhibition to run in the town centre from 24th July until 14th August and will include various displays of memorabilia.

I always used to tell my students that – after the ice retreated – nothing ice retreated nothing happened in Aycliffe until the Anglo-Saxons. It shows wrong you can be, and there have been two discoveries recently which have completely changed my view of the area's prehistory.

The first happened in 2013, when Hitachi excavated the Merchant Park site before building their factory. They found a Stone Age flint in a quarry-site, and Bronze Age ceremonial cremation burials. It is impossible to argue that these are just the leftovers of nomads passing through - those people lived

Thus we have evidence of people living here as long as maybe-5,000 years ago, which has to be mind-blowing. They settled blowing. They settled just south of the terminal moraine, and no doubt found a living from the birds and fish which flourished in the marshy land round about. and from the nearby lake/ fen which we now call the Carrs. The archaeologists found that one of those Bronze Age residents had been cremated with his toolkit of flint knives and scrapers, so we can speculate about his lifestyle, and his beliefs, and his

family relationships. By the Iron Age, we have further revelations from the Hitachi site the foundations of two farmsteads, and evidence of animal-herding and sheep-pens ... from which we gather that our Iron Age ancestors here were more than hunter-gatherers - they were livestock farmers.

So we all know that the Hitachi factory has stimulated our local economy now and changed our immediate futures, but you may not have realised much it has also revolutionised our ideas about Aycliffe's past!

what about Romans? It seems that I was wrong about them as well. My very first act as a County Councillor was to call out an officer and complain about the state of Burn Lane. Ironically, at the same time as I was trying to get Burn Lane a decent modern surface, I was also telling people that the Romans had little or nothing to do with Aycliffe. So it is with some humility that I have to tell you now that, a year or so ago, I was contacted by Mr Tony Bennett of Safeline Taxis, who asked me whether I thought that Burn Lane was maybe a Roman Road? He even put me in his car and drove me round to prove his

point. And by the time he had finished, I agreed that he was correct.

We have known for a long time, of course, about Dere Street, the Roman equivalent of our Great North Road, which ran straight as a die from Piecebridge, through West Auckland, to the Roman ruins at Binchester in Bishop Auckland.

And there has been speculation since the 18th century antiquarian John Cade first suggested it of a second Roman Road – a sort of Roman A19 – running north through Sadberge to Sedgefield and beyond. This theory was confirmed in 2002 when Channel 4's Time Team found the road - along with evidence of a large industrial settlement - across from Hardwick Park in Sedgefield. It was, apparently, the most northerly non-military town in the Roman Empire – and it seems to have made highend pottery for the whole of the north of England. One can't help but wonder whether the location of that factory-town was influenced the ready availability of clay from our alluvial moraine.

However, going back to Burn Lane, when I sat down with a map and drew straight lines from either end of Burn Lane, I found evidence which indeed suggests that there was a Roman road from Bishop Auckland, along Burn Lane, down Ricknall Lane past the Gretna, and ultimately following what is now a long straight footpath called Catkill Lane, whch joined Dere Street to Cade's Road. So if Dere Street was the Roman A1, and Cade's Road the Roman A19, then Burn Lane was the Roman A689 joining the two, and it rather sensibly ran across the raised land of our terminal moraine, south of the fenland which is now the Carrs.

So! Stone Age, Bronze Age, Iron Age, Roman Empire. Do you not find it mind-boggling to think that, across fifty centuries, there have been people working, travelling and living in the place we tend to think of as our 'new town', just 70 years

The Local Citizens Advice Office has seen several people who have been struggling financially because they have not claimed the New State Retirement Pension. This could be because people are unsure of their state pension age or they may not be aware that you now have to contact the Pension Service and make the claim for the New State

Retirement Pension.
Usually, the Pension
Service send out a letter prior to the retirement date informing people of the amount of State Retirement Pension entitlement and providing instructions on how to make the claim. However, on occasion these letters have not been sent out resulting in people not claiming their State Retirement Pension.

Number of Vegans | Loco Team Complete in Care Homes Have Carriage Restoration **Almost Trebled**

Vegan residents in UK care homes have almost TREBLED during the past 5 years, according to new research. according to new research. Staggering figures released this National Vegetarian Week show that residents following a vegan diet in UK residential care homes have risen by 167 per cent since 2014.

A representative sample of 1,000 care homes 1,000 care homes across the UK was interviewed earlier this year, in research commissioned by Vegetarian for Life (VfL), a charity dedicated to supporting older vegans and vegetarians living in care homes as well as independently.

There are currently more than 11,000 care homes for older people in the UK. The total number of vegetarians and vegans combined is now estimated to be over 7,000. across both nursing and residential care. There are one or more vegetarians or vegans living in one in every five UK care homes.

The rapid rise in vegan residents in particular has sparked VfL to urge care

Staff and volunteers Locomotion in Shildon are celebrating the completion of a five-year project to restore 2HAP unit no. 4308 thought to be Britain's busiest surviving

Nicknamed 'Project Commuter', the restoration began in 2014 and was led by Chris Osman from the Network South East Railway Society, involving staff and volunteers at the National Museum and

Railway N Locomotion. The two-car 2HAP electric multiple units with slam doors, would have been a familiar sight to commuters in the South of England where they operated for more than three decades. Unit number 4308 is distractive for having travelled a record-breaking 2.7m miles and carrying an estimated 5.3m passengers during its

working life. Project Commuter began in York where the interior of the car was stripped, and seat cushions and backs were cleaned. Metal work was cleaned and repainted, aisle ends were varnished and seat bases retrimmed.

At this point, corrosion in the bodyshell was found to be worse than first thought and the unit was transferred to Shildon where the workshop team began the painstaking task of stripping the carriage back to bare metal and replacing damaged metal and timber.

Once all repairs complete, the carriage body

was repainted with Network South East livery on one side and British Rail blue and grey on the other – both of which would have been carried at different points in the unit's history. The 2HAP became the first and only vehicle in the National Collection to feature a dual livery. The repaint also included details such as the black triangle used to indicate the position of the guard's van. By October 2018, the new

floor had been laid and seats reinstalled featuring specially manufactured, authentic moquette.

The completed 2HAP unit is on display at Locomotion and work is underway to restore the second carriage, which should be complete by the end of the year.
Chris Osman said: "Without

The name '2HAP' indicates that the train is formed of two carriages - and only one of these has a toilet compartment (something of a problem on longer commutes as the carriages were not linked).

The 2HAP unit was built at Eastleigh Works in 1959 for phase one of the Kent Coast electrification, a £25m scheme that replaced steam hauled trains from London Dover, Folkestone, Ramsgate and Sheerness. The unit was withdrawn in 1995 and joined the National Collection in 2006.

To mark the unit's 60th birthday, Locomotion organised a public event visitors the which gave chance to see the finished carriage, to climb inside the refurbished interior and to find out more about

volunteering.
Staff and volunteers also ran behind-the-scenes workshop tours to give visitors a glimpse of current and future restoration projects.
