Elliott Harnett and his friend Tyler Mason Thomson-Raw, both aged 22, from Newton Aycliffe, attended Woodham and Academy. Together they are attempting a walk from John 'O Groats to Lands End in aid of Alzheimers Research UK, as Elliott's Grandma, Marj Hornby, has dementia and vascular arterial disease.

Our home has long been a place where many of Elliotts friends would gather, and she is well known to them all, Tyler is pretty special, fund raising alongside Elliott, for his Grandma.

They have watched her deteriorate, and this has affected Elliott deeply, as it has us all.

Elliott and Tyler have set up a GoFundMe page giving people the opportunity to sponsor them on this epic walk, they can also be found on Facebook (known as a JOGLE!-John @ oGroats/LandsEnd), there are also collection boxes in McColls, Simpasture, which is where Tyler works (McColls have been very supportive of their effort) and Neville Parade and also at our home at 7 Bede Crescent.

Elliott said: "As of August 1, I will be walking from John 'O Groats to Lands End, (874 miles) with my good friend Tyler Thomson-Raw,

for Alzheimers Research UK. As most of my friends and family are aware, my Grandma suffers from Vascular Dementia and this is my motivation for doing this fundraiser. Watching someone you love slowly deteriorate and become less capable and confused with each passing day is soul destroying, and the stress it puts on the family is, at times, almost unbearable." "I wouldn't wish this illness on anyone, and I certainly don't want my own children to endure what we as a family are currently going through, so I want to go out and do something positive to help make a difference." Tyler's mother, Sharon, cares for Grandma on a day to day basis, with Elliott, and it is difficult, there are so many aspects to her dementia, which at times they all struggle with. What she knows is that we keep her safe, she is secure in her environment, and we keep it real. Sometimes it's hugely frustrating, but we laugh, a lot, and she is still Grandma/Mum.



Funding Boost to Help Combat Holiday Hunger

Thousands of youngsters are set to benefit from a £150,000 funding pot aimed at combatting holiday hunger when children are not at school.

Durham County Council's Poverty Action Steering Group has been allocated the money from the Government's New Burdens Funding scheme for holiday activities with food from now until September 2020. Building on work already underway across the county, £140,000 will be divided between the council's 14 area action partnerships (AAPs). This will then be allocated

to schemes that provide opportunities for youngsters and families to socialise, be active and learn new skills, while tucking into healthy meals and snacks.

The remaining £10,000 will be made available for countywide projects led by the VCS Alliance, the council's One Point Think Family, culture and sport, and education and skills services and NHS Harrogate; and District Foundation Trust's health visiting and school nursing teams.

The school holidays can be a challenging time for many families, with increased costs, childcare difficulties and no access to free school meals resulting in some youngsters going hungry. The impact for children living in poverty returning after the school holiday has also been shown to be detrimental to educational attainment, health and wellbeing.

Calls for Government to Invest | Newton Aycliffe in County Durham Hospitals

As NHS trusts are told to scale back requests for capital funding, concerns have been raised about the impact on plans to upgrade County Durham hospitals.

NHS England and NHS Improvement have instructed trusts across the country to reduce their 2019/20 spending plans after the amount of money requested to fund capital projects nationally exceeded the Department of Health and Social Care's budget.

This includes funding for new buildings, new funding equipment and IT systems and enhancements to existing facilities. The spending review has

prompted fears for plans to replace the accident and emergency (A&E) unit at University Hospital North Durham (UHND) in Durham City, as well as a proposal replace Shotley Bridge Hospital near Consett with a new purpose-built facility. The Prime Minister's pledge to invest a further £850 million into 20 hospitals across the country has done little to ease concerns, as neither hospital has been

earmarked for funding. Cllr Lucy Hovvels MBE, Cabinet member for adults and health services at Durham County Council, is calling on the Government to provide County Durham and

Darlington NHS Foundation Trust with the money it needs to deliver these "vital rojects

Earlier this year, the trust set out various options to ensure the future of Shotley Bridge after securing Hospital £17 million to improve the facility. This included plans to relocate some care to the UHND in Durham City, while keeping the majority of services in a new purposebuilt facility in north west

Durham A community engagement exercise took place between March and May to gain residents' views about how care could be provided and a full public consultation is due to take place later this

year. However, However, potential cuts to capital funding could jeopardise the project. It is also a major setback for

the trust's bid to secure the £23 million needed for a new emergency care centre at UHND. Plans for the facility, which would double A&E capacity, were approved in 2017 and it is hoped NHS Improvement will fund the scheme

Cllr Hovvels, who is also chair of the Shotley Bridge Hospital Reference Group, said: "These projects are vital for us to continue to meet the health needs of the people of County Durham, which is why it's so

important our local trust gets the money it needs to bring them to fruition.

'A great deal of work has been put into determining the best way to secure the future of Shotley Bridge Hospital. It's an issue that residents feel incredibly strongly about and raise with

me time and time again. "UHND's current A&E, meanwhile, is under ever increasing pressure as admissions continue to rise. The North East deserves the same standard of healthcare as the rest of the country and I am urging the Government to invest in our hospitals and show the people of County Durham that they care."

The information gathered during the Shotley Bridge Hospital engagement Hospital engagement exercise is being collated into a report. This will be presented to the council's adult's health and wellbeing overview and scrutiny committee in October and will be followed by a public consultation.

The Shotley Bridge Hospital Reference Group was set up by North Durham Commissioning Group (CCG) and is made up of local councillors, North West Durham MP Laura Pidcock, representatives from the CCG and County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust and other partners.

Young people are also involved in positive leisure activities, often resulting in raising money for charities.

Recent successes for the Skill Mill team include improvement works at a Peterlee park and on allotment sites as well as step and pathway construction to provide safe access to the River Wear for anglers.



He took a watching brief in the early stages until an overtake gone wrong between the leading two cars opened the gap for Coates to pounce. Immediately up to 2nd the Harron Homes backed driver set-up the move to take the lead at the turn four hairpin passing team-mate Jamie Bond. Coates looked set to take the win despite constant pressure from Jack Young behind until heavy contact from his chief title rival caused Max to lose the lead. The damage caused a puncture on the final lap which left Polydist UK sponsored Max to manage the final four turns with very limited grip, crossing the line in a cloud of smoke in 6th place.


In the second race the RMB Automotive and Bennett Renault backed car started well hanging onto 2nd position. The leader was given a 10 second penalty

for a jump start thus promoting Max into the lead early in the race. Then contact again from his title rival who forced his way past Coates into the then lead of the race. Coates stayed right with Young to the flag despite battling handling issues caused from the earlier contact. After the race Coates was

awarded the win following a penalty for Young who had been deemed to have gained an unfair advantage in the overtaking move to gain the lead.


Later Coates said, "The race two win has made up for the disappointing finish to race one which got a bit hairy at the end with the puncture. It's shaping up to be a very close battle at the front with a number of drivers able to make an impression on the podium. Thruxton is next and it's a track I had two podiums at last year, it is the fastest track in the country and it's always a challenge. Max and the team have two weeks to prepare for the Thruxton event down in Hampshire on the 17th and 18th August where the Renault UK Clio Cup will be again supporting the British Touring Cars. Max will go into the event as the championship leader, just six points ahead, with race two scheduled to be broadcast live on ITV4 at 13:45 on Sunday 18th.

Spare a Thought for Small Furries as **Temperatures Rise**

As the UK prepares itself for even hotter days, vets are reminding owners to protect small furries from soaring temperatures by keeping them away from direct sunlight and

with plenty of fresh water. A recent survey undertaken by the British Veterinary Association (BVA) found that there had been an increase in the numbers of companion animal vets treating smaller pets for heat related conditions with just over one in seven (15%) saying that they had treated a rabbit.

pant so it is up to owners to help them regulate their body temperature. Long haired breeds of rabbits and guinea pigs or those which are overweight will also have a tougher time staying cool.

BVA advises that hutches runs or indoor cages should be protected from direct sunlight, kept well ventilated, and if needed, moved to shadier spots as the sun moves during the day. We also recommend double-checking that fresh water is easily accessible and that there is a shaded place for pets to hide.

In high temperatures, flystrike can also be a life-threatening risk for rabbits so a daily inspection around their back end and under their tail is essential. Veterinary advice should be sought immediately if your pet is affected. Top tips:

Make sure pets always have adequate fresh water to drink and check for blockages in water feeders.

Provide adequate ventilation at all times. Provide shade from the

sun, especially during the hottest part of the day. • Watch out for early signs of heatstroke, such as heavy panting, restlessness and lack

of coordination. • Contact a vet immediately if the animal does not respond to efforts to cool it down.

If heatstroke or any other heat-related condition is suspected, pets should be taken to a cool, well-ventilated place and given water to drink while seeking immedi advice from their local vet. immediate
