Volunteer Opportunities on Offer in Durham City

supporting over 126,000 visitors to north east prisons each year, is seeking new volunteers to help support families and children of prisoners visiting three prisons near Durham City. Nepacs has worked across the north east region for over 135 years to help support a positive future for prisoners, their friends and families.

Nepacs have around 300 volunteers working across the region, but are looking to recruit more volunteers at three prisons in the Durham area - HMP Durham, HMP Frankland and HMP & YOI Newton (women's prison).

There are a range of volunteering opportunities - Monday to Sunday - to help families on the day they visit a loved one in prison. The Nepacs teams are looking for people who can help book families in for a prison visit, provide information and support, serve refreshments and help out in the play areas and

youth zones for children and young people, both outside of the prison in the visitors centre and inside the prison.

Emma Price, Nepacs' volunteer coordinator. "The impact imprisonment on children and families can be devastating which is why we feel it is important to support them every step of their journey – from the courts, during the time their loved one is in prison and prior to release. Our team of volunteers are dedicated to helping prisoners' families and children across the north east, but we are looking for more volunteers to join our team and help us to offer the best support possible during what is an extremely difficult time for families.

husband was *Lorna's sent to prison for two years and she told us that the worst part was telling her children. She said: "Everything is destroyed, your way of life, your security, your finances. You try to keep everything normal but it's not normal. Listening to your children crying every night asking when their dad is coming home.'

"Volunteering in a prison can environment rewarding for all. Nepacs volunteers come from all walks of life, younger and older, male and female, and those who have been personally affected by imprisonment and would like to help other families going through the same experience. History Lesson

Newton News are running a seven week series on the history of Newton Aycliffe. This series was written by County Councillor and local historian John D. Clare and will run from the ice age to present day. If you miss any of the weeks, you can catch up on our website at the end of the run www.newtonnews.co.uk

This series will compliment the 1950's Beamish exhibition to run in the town centre from 24th July until 14th August and will include various displays of memorabilia.

Have you ever thought how incongruous the place-name 'Middridge' is? Middridge is nowhere near a ridge it's at the bottom of a hill looking across a flat plain. The truth is, I don't think modern Middridge anywhere at all near where Saxon Middridge was – I think Saxon Middridge was located a mile away near Old Towns Quarry, across the railway line from Greenfield School. That would place it, meaningfully, on the middle ridge between the higher School Aycliffe and Old Eldon. And in this respect the name 'Old Towns' Quarry is significant, especially when you realise that it was called 'Middridge Old Towns' in 1427.

medieval Another conundrum you may have considered is why there are no houses round St Andrew's Church, with modern Aycliffe Village located almost a quarter of a mile away – and no, it isn't because of the Plague, which is the common misconception.

Come to think of it, have you ever noticed that both Aycliffe Village and Middridge are planned settlements Aycliffe designed as a square, Middridge as two parallel rows – both around a village green? Looking further, the 1847 Tithe Map of Middridge reveals that the two rows of houses were formed from plots of identical size - ten on Northside, nine on Southside. What circumstances could have produced such a rigid, imposed settlement pattern, away moreover from the location one would have supposed to be the natural site of the village? Who moved those villages, and whv?

The answer, as you may already have guessed, is William the Conqueror ... or, to be probably more exact, the Prince Bishops who ruled Durham for him.

We all know that William conquered in England in What you may not know is that, in 1069, the people of the North-East against Norman rebelled William, his entire kingdom at risk, came north in great wrath and did not cease slaughtering the people for the whole winter. Worse – in an age when you could not just pop down to Tesco's if you ran out of food William destroyed their winter food stocks. It was in effect attempted genocide, and the Chronicles of the time paint a graphic picture of too few living to bury the dead, corpses rotting openly in the streets, people giving themselves into slavery to avoid starvation, and all the villages deserted from Durham to York.

It is my belief that, when William was done, the Prince Bishops gathered the surviving Saxons, and incarcerated them into purpose-built settlements of rows of Nissen huts, facing onto a parade ground where they could be mustered every day. Don't tell the posh people of Middridge and Aycliffe, but their pictureperfect villages started life as Norman concentration

Even a century later, in 1183, a Bishop's survey called Boldon Book reveals that the villagers of Middridge still had a life little-betterthan slavery. They were 'villeins' – serfs – owned by the Bishop, forbidden to leave the village without permission, made to work the Bishop's land as well as their own, and laden with a huge burden of taxation in produce and money scotchalders of malt, and the same of meal, and the same of oats, plus 40 chalders of oat-malt, and 7½ cartloads of wood, and 30 hens and a thousand eggs ... EACH household.

Just one man in Middridge was better off than the rest, who superintended the boon-works and went on the Bishop's errands. The Victoria County History suggests that his name spelled 'w-e-k-e' – should be pronounced 'Weakman', because he may have had a disability, but I am assured by someone who speaks Old English that a more authentic pronunciation would be 'Wakeman' ... which would suggest that he was the Saxon quisling who acted as the Bishop's enforcer, the man who woke the villagers for their morning roll-call. I think we might all at this point wish to send back through the centuries a wave of loathing for Mr Wekeman



(B6443 ST CUTHBERTS WAY, NEWTON AYCLIFFE) (TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE) ORDER 2019

The Council proposes to make an Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on 660 m of B6443 Newton Aycliffe between its junction with Durham Way North in a northerly direction to the Blue Bridge to enable phased carriageway resurfacing works to be undertaken. Phase I works is 500 m of carriageway between Durham Way North and the junction with Horndale Ave. Phase 2 works is 160 m of carriageway between Horndale Ave and the Blue Bridge. Alternative route during phase I from southern point of closure south on Durham Way North, then west on

phase I from southern point of closure south on Durham Way North, then west on Durham Way, then south on Durham Way South, then west on Heighington Ln, then north on Spring Rd continuing onto Whinbank Rd, then east on Horndale Ave to northern point of closure, and vice versa. Alternative route during phase 2 from southern point of closure west then north on Horndale Ave, north easterly on Pease Way, east on Stephenson Way, and south on St Cuthberts Way to northern point of closure, and vice versa. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence on 31/8/19 between 7pm and 6am and are anticipated to be completed in 8 nights. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly. Access will be maintained for emergency services.

NAYCC - Chair's Report

The Newton Aycliffe Youth and Community Centre Board of Trustees met at the end of last month for its AGM. The Trustees kindly asked me to continue for another year as Chair. This is what I said for my Chair's Report to the meeting:

WHENCE WE

WHENCE WE HAVE COME

"It is good perhaps to start by reflecting whence we have After Asset-transfer from DCC in 2017, you will remember, the Centre went through a period of difficulty. The Open Youth Club was under Council cuts, and for a while the finances were so straightened that we thought we might have to close. The Board, too, was hit by a number of resignations. It was in such circumstances that the current Board took over the running of the

"Since then, under the able hand of our Centre Manager Beki Metcalfe, the organisation has turned around. Finances are safe and stable (whilst not yet 'flush'), we have some long-term bookings and loyal 'returner' users, we have managed to start a Youth Club (albeit smaller than that run by DCC) which is looking successful, and we opened discussions with the police for a Friday-night Youth Club to take young people off the streets. Footfall is now double what it was two years ago.

I must particularly praise the Board, also, for their loyalty and reliability; we now have a Board which is stable and friendly, and which is fulfilling its proper function to act as a wise overseer of the Centre's activities.

SETBACKS

"Having said that, the Centre has suffered some significant setbacks in the past three months.

"Most damaging has been the setting-up by a squatter in our garden, which has damaged our business plan, constrained our user-offer, and created a safeguarding problem for those user-groups which help children or vulnerable people. Even though he has now left our garden, we are left with the cost and disruption of cleaning up (notably dealing with the dog-dirt/toxicara). I cannot thank our users enough for their patience and loyalty during this time.

"Recently, also, we have seen our omnipresent volunteer Vince Crosby retire; we have had our application for funding for the kitchen refurbishment rejected; we have found that the potential funding stream for the suggested Friday night youth club is not all we had hoped; and — particularly distressingly — our Partners have had their application for funding for the continuation

of the current Wednesday night Youth Club rejected (which, unless we find an alternative funding source, will mean that it will come to an end)

SETBACKS - OVERCOME

"At one time, setbacks such as these might have caused the Centre to stumble. It speaks volumes as to how far we have come in the past 18 months – to the harmony of the Board and the calibre of the Centre Manager – that in fact we have barely been harmed or diverted at all. Public goodwill, also has been remarkable, and a letter in the Newton News seems to have set people's minds at

THE FUTURE

"So the next year must be about not allowing these setbacks to affect our progress. We will restore the garden to use, and seek alternative funding for the Youth Club meetings and the kitchen. We already have a wonderful additional volunteer, and hope to strengthen membership of the Board.

"Looking at the projections, whilst we can never take anything for granted, the future looks hopeful, even bright, and we have a secure financial and organisational base on which we can try to build."

First Military Double Amputee to Climb Kilimanjaro Unaided

James Rose, 31 from Middlesbrough, an Afghan War Veteran and Invictus Games athlete, is aiming to be the first unaided military double amputee to climb to the top of Mount Kilimanjaro. The funds raised will support Help for Heroes and The Royal British Legion. The campaign is being backed by actor Brian Blessed, as well as numerous GB athletes.

"I want to give hope to other veterans and amputees and show them just how much their contribution means"

James is aiming to raise £30,000 to help achieve his goal of reaching the summit of Mount Kilimanjaro.

Joining the army in January 2008, James was posted to Afghanistan the following year. On patrol in November 2009, James heard a pressure plate (IED) click and he knew in a split second that his life was going to change. The results were devastating, a broken pelvis and tail bone and worse of all, the loss of both legs above the knee.

"As reality hit home, I became extremely frustrated. Would I be able to walk again with prosthetics? Would I need a wheelchair for the rest of my life? At the heart of this was my love for football, which I knew I could never play again. This led to depression and anxiety, and I'm very grateful for my family's support in this. I was determined not be beaten by the injuries sustained defending my country and decided to pursue my passion for fitness that I had prior to



my injury' James set himself many challenges, firstly rowing with a static chair, which gave him a new lease of life and pushed him to try and become a Para Rower. He achieved this feat in January 2014 and is now training with the Team GB Development team. In 2017, James conquered another challenge, cycling 65 miles with a hand cycle, for which he was awarded the "Local Hero Award for Courage". in the Local Heroes Awards, a celebration of grassroots sport in the North East.

In 2018, James applied for the prestigious Invictus Games, and was selected to represent Team GB in Wheelchair Basketball and Sitting Volleyball in Sydney, securing Silver and Bronze medals. As a result of this success, James is now a fulltime basketball player and trains every week. During the Games, James

met former RAF Corporal, Darren Young who suffers from a spine, shoulder injury as well as dealing with depression, and both decided to set themselves their next challenge: Climbing Mount Kilimanjaro.

Darren Young said "we're both incredibly grateful for the support we've received so far having raised £4,422 of our £30,000 target. Sport challenges and the training involved have not only helped keep me fit physically, but also mentally, allowing me to gain confidence and help deal with depression and anxiety. Our team of five have dealt with / currently dealing with PTSD, anxiety and depression – those who have left the military/RAF and our loved ones who have been there to support us and also been affected. This is the next big challenge, and we couldn't do it without the generous donations made our JustGiving page. Through this, we hope to raise awareness of mental health issues, and support two fantastic causes. Help for Heroes and The Royal British Legion".

Their campaign is also being backed by actor, Brian Blessed as well as a host of professional and Olympic athletes, including boxer Antony Ogogo and GB gymnast Craig Heap.

16-17 Saver Launched | Empty Homes Council Tax **Consultation Launched**

Changes to council tax charges in County Durham are being considered as a way of helping to bring long-term empty homes back into use.

Durham County Council is asking residents for their views on proposals to revise its policy on council tax charges for long-term empty properties, as part of its work to improve housing and tackle homelessness.

At present, a council tax premium of 50 per cent is charged on longterm empty properties, which is the term used to describe homes that have been unoccupied and unfurnished for more than two years.

However, the council is consulting over potential increases to the premium for properties that have been empty between two and five years to a maximum of 100 per cent. This is in line with new national government guidelines. It is also considering a potential premium of up to 200 per cent for properties that have been unoccupied and unfurnished for more than five years.

The premium is designed to provide a financial disincentive for absent landlords to retain longterm empty properties. It also aims to encourage the owners to either sell or rent these properties to help meet housing needs.

The introduction in April 2013 of the 50 per cent premium for properties empty for more than two years, saw the number of empty properties in this category fall by 33 per cent in the succeeding six months.

Cllr Alan Napier, Deputy Leader of Durham County Council and Cabinet member for resources, member for resources, said: "The government has provided legislation to help deal with longterm empty properties. The policy is designed to motivate owners to bring these homes back into use, which will boost the supply of affordable properties

available to rent in the county.
"However, it is important

that we seek views on the potential impact of the changes. The feedback we receive during the consultation will be fully considered when making final decisions on the empty property premium." Cllr Kevin Shaw, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for strategic housing and assets, said: "This consultation links in very closely with our new housing and homelessness strategies by meeting one of our key aims and objectives, which is to tackle the number of longterm empty properties and bring them back into use

"By doing so we not only increase the available supply of accommodation for those who are homeless or threatened with homelessness, but we will also improve our communities to the benefit

COUNTY DURHAM RECYCLERS Cree Welcomes 'Men REMINDED NOT TO USE BAGS Who Care' to Greenfield

reminded not to place items inside bags when filling their recycling bins and boxes

Stickers were attached to all recycling wheelie bins in County Durham, advising households that bags - such as black bin liners, bags for life and carrier bags - should not be included.

It is part of Durham County Council's Recycling Matters campaign, which aims to reduce contamination by educating residents about what can and cannot be recycled.

Oliver Sherratt, the council's head of environment, said: "We'd like to thank everyone for recycling but also remind residents that it's important to only place clean, loose items into their bins.

"Residents may think they are helping us by putting their recycling in black but the reality is that if we can't see what's inside, they can't see it at the recycling plant either, and in some instances, it might be a bag of rubbish.

'With large volumes of materials sent for recycling daily, it is not always possible to open the bags to see what's inside, and even when it is, extra staff have to be deployed to do it, which costs money. What we need are clean, loose items as these are easily sorted'

Recycling properly not only helps the environment -with every recycled can saving enough energy to run a television for four hours but it is also cost effective. In fact, it costs the council five times more to dispose of general household waste than recycling. This means that by recycling properly,



with clean loose, non-bagged items, residents can ensure environmental maximum benefit at the lowest costs to the council.

Cllr Brian Stephens, Cabinet member for neighbourhoods and local partnerships, said: "In County Durham, we currently reuse, recycle and compost about 44 per cent of

Residents are encouraged to place plastic pots, tubs, trays and bottles in their blue bins. along with cans, aerosols, foil, paper and cardboard. Glass bottles and jars should go into the recycling box, and all objects should be clean and dry. If a resident has excess recycling that cannot fit in their blue lidded bin, even when the contents are squashed, the extra items should be placed in a clear plastic bag next to the

Recycling collected in County Durham is taken to Biffa's recycling plant in Washington. The vast majority of the plastic collected is sent to reprocessors within the UK. Biffa only exports materials when there is no viable UK outlet. Any material it does export is done through licensed and accredited exporters and is sent to facilities that have been approved by the UK

Monitor Your Ash Trees

Since its confirmation in the UK in 2012, Ash Dieback has been rapidly spreading across the country. Earlier this year it was confirmed in Aycliffe and many ash trees are now showing typical signs of the disease.

The disease, which is spread by infectious fungal spores affects the entire tree and results in rapid die back and likely death of the affected tree.

As a parish, Aycliffe has a higher percentage of mature ash compared to many areas of the UK and so is likely to be affected greater than most.

Current national guidance suggests that there is little that can be done to halt the natural spread of Ash Dieback and the best course of action for land owners is to monitor their ash tree stocks to ensure that the trees remain safe to the public: effectively managing a staged decline of any affected trees.

Great Aycliffe Town Council would like to reassure residents that they are taking this problem seriously. They are in the process of mapping substantial mature ash trees within their ownership in prominent locations, so that the safety of the trees can be monitored and appropriate actions taken when

In addition, the Town Council will replace any tree that is required to be felled with a minimum of three more appropriate tree species that will not be affected by the Ash Dieback.

Police Help Lost Walkers



A young mother has praised the police and the Teesdale and Weardale Search and Weardale Search and Mountain Rescue Team (TWSMRT) for coming to her aid after a forest walk went

wrong. Jess Tinsley, 24, had gone on a walk in Hamsterley Forest with her partner, Kieran Parkinson and friend Dan Curry, after work at about 7.00pm on 11th August.

The trio, from Newton Aycliffe, had never been to the forest before but decided to follow one of the marked trails. However, after two hours, Ms Tinsley said the group started to become concerned that they had not come to the end of the trail and they had lost phone

signal.
After another hour, the group found a map telling them they were in fact on a 12-mile route but without knowing which section they were on and with the weather turning, they decided to call 101 and ask for help.

Coming to an opening, the group luckily picked up some phone signal and managed to make the call to the police on 101.

A call handler quickly identified the need for the free What3words app, which has divided the world into three metre squares, each with a unique three word code to give people a simple way of referring to a specific location.

Ms Tinsley said she had never heard of the app but was relieved when she was able to give the call handler the words kicked, converged and soccer, and told help was on the way.

The group sat tight as members of TWSMRT were despatched and raced to their exact location deep within the forest.

The team, who are all volunteers, were able to use the What3word codes on their own GPS system.

Both services also used texts and phone calls to reassure the trio and keep them updated. Ms Tinsley said she had never been so happy to see the mountain rescue team and warm up in their Land Rover. all within 90 minutes of her first making the call to the

The home care worker said: "I was so happy. When the call handler first told us to download the app I thought they were crazy but as soon as it was it only took a minute for them to pinpoint our location. "I will never forget those three words and can't thank the police and mountain rescue team enough - they could not have been more hands on and helpful. They were absolutely brilliant'

Pete Bell, of TWSMRT, said: "We were able to check the What3words code against our system and send them a text which, once opened, gives us a reference in our mapping which was bang on.

"We were really happy with the result which was very effective and thankfully everyone was well, albeit a bit cold. They were lucky to have had phone signal as it's normally really bad in the forest.'

Ms Tinsley, who was reunited with her daughter, Emmie, has already recommended the app to friends and family.

Bishop Neighbourhood Auckland Inspector, Andy Reeves, also praised the quick actions of the call handler and the mountain rescue team said: "The mountain rescue service are an invaluable service and using the What3words app has saved crucial time and resources in locating the walkers. I would encourage everyone to download the app as you never know when you might need it."

The girls stayed with their foster family for a year and a half, experiencing family life

Amber said: "We got used to things, our foster carers helped us learn to cope and tried really hard to include us in family life. We'd never eaten together round a table when we lived at home or been on a holiday – they took us to the Lake District which was so much fun, camping out and having more relaxed time as a family – we both loved

When Chloe turned 18, the girls moved into a supported lodgings placement after special permission was granted for Amber to stay with Chloe. Ann, who they live with, provides board and lodgings alongside support to prepare the girls for independence.

Durham County Council's

strategic manager for looked after children, Karen Robb, said: "It can be very hard to find foster carers who are willing to take brothers and sisters, especially when they are teenagers, but when you hear from girls like Chloe and Amber, it brings home why it is so important for us to keep brothers and sisters together whenever we can.

"While having two or more brothers and sisters may seem like harder work, in reality, the children are often support for each other.



When children have lived through traumatic or difficult situations at home, they often develop such a strong bond -it's a survival mechanism.

"Being able to stay with the brothers and sisters you love and trust can be of enormous value to a child, helping them to cope and adjust to what can be an exceptionally difficult time in their lives."



A new report from the organisation, which speaks up for all those who use health and social care, also highlights how health professionals could improve how they signpost to the wealth of dementia support groups in the county.

- is based on feedback from people with direct experience of local dementia services. Fifty surveys with people with dementia were completed online or face-to-face as part of the research and the majority of the respondents (80%) were happy with the support they received. However, around a quarter (24%) said they did not feel supported by their GP.

Nearly all the people with dementia who took part in the research had been referred by their GP to other services but for almost half (45%) these referrals took longer than four weeks, which they said made their dementia journey more

The experience of one carer - "Dave" - is highlighted in the report to demonstrate how local independent support groups and services are helping people with dementia to live well. However, "Dave". like many others Healthwatch spoke to, discovered these on the recommendation of friends and family, because professionals not

signposted him to them.
Based on all the first-hand experiences received, the report concludes the speed of diagnosis and referrals can make a huge difference to the lives of people with dementia and those around them.

Neil Jarvis, strategic commissioning manager for adult and health services at Durham County Council, and chair of the Dementia Strategy Implementation Group, welcomed the Healthwatch report. He said: "We have made dementia one of our priorities so having good feedback on that is great for us. "Clearly the main issue to come out of this for future work is the need for speedy referral into support services and the role of the NHS in that process. Though we have done quite a lot of work on that already we definitely need to
