




Full Steam Ahead for 2019 Celebration of Locomotives

Back by popular demand and bigger and better than North Yorkshire Moors Railway's (NYMR) Annual Steam Gala returns this autumn with over 15 legendary locomotives, plus more railway themed activities than ever before.

The much-anticipated event runs from Thursday 26 to Sunday 29 September 2019. During the four-day celebration of steam visitors can view NYMR's guest engines including: 6990 engines including: 6990 Witherslack Hall, GWR 6000 Class 6023 King Edward II – from Didcot Railway Centre, and the much-loved Union of South Africa.

Visitors can marvel at heritage engines and enjoy a host of exciting events along the 18 miles of breathtaking countryside from Grosmont to Whitby, taking in the world-famous North York Moors National Park along the way. Levisham and Goathland Stations will host the Annual Steam Beer Festival and families can enjoy Peter's Railway - Young Engineer's Centre at Pickering, an interactive exhibition for children which brings to life engineering and science

through storytelling. For the first time in the Annual Steam Gala's North Eastern history Locomotive Preservation Group (NELPG) will be taking over the event on Thursday 26 September, with a celebration of its locomotives, drivers and cleaners, highlights include: K1 Locomotive 62005, Lambton Colliery No. 29 and LNER Q6 No. 63395 one of the few remaining Q6 workhorses to survive right up to the end of steam on British Railways.

Chris Price, General Manager at NYMR, said: "NELPG was formed in 1966 to preserve examples of the last two remaining classes of North Eastern

Railway (NER) freight locomotives which were then still operating in the North East of England before they were finally withdrawn by BR in September 1967. This was successfully achieved and the locomotives were restored by the charity's volunteers before they went to the NYMR where they

continue to operate.
"Like NYMR, NELPG is a registered charity and both organisations charitable aims are to preserve the golden age of steam for all to enjoy. This is a great extension to the Annual Steam Gala and showcases the stunning engines that have been carefully restored and cared for by the group. This is an event not to be

Maths Results the Best Ever

South Durham's GCSE Maths results have been the best ever with 70% of the cohort scoring grade 4-9 passes against last year's school national average of 59.8%. This is an outstanding achievement particularly for students aiming to go into a STEM or technical career.

Gaining good grades in formal qualifications an important start but the purpose of education is to help young people gain the experiences, skills, qualifications and confidence to pursue a meaningful career. We have many exceptional success stories for students at the UTC. For example, Jasmine Starbuck has always had great aspirations to pursue a career in economics and politics and has recently been awarded a scholarship to attend Durham High School Sixth Form to fulfil her ambition. Jasmine achieved outstanding GCSE results including a grade 9 for her English Language. Jasmine said 'I'm so pleased with my GCSE results. I have worked really hard to achieve this and I can't wait to continue to follow dream of going into politics'. Jasmine has even completed an extended project qualification which



is the equivalent to as A/S Level.

Many of the other Year 11 students are coming back to the UTC to carry on with their A-Level and technical studies. They will be able to take advantage of the combination of academic, technical and workplace education which includes project and placements with industrial partners. New facilities at the UTC include a mechatronics lab and additional fabrication and welding equipment. Recent results showed a 100% pass rate at A-level with 90% of students achieving Distinction or better in Tech Level Engineering; these have supported students in achieving outstanding STEM destinations.



Several students have moved on to other positive destinations, including three of the Year 11 students including who have been successful landing Level 3 apprenticeships at Gestamp Tallent. The students went through a challenging recruitment process to achieve the fantastic opportunity and all of the students were thrilled at fantastic being offered the position Joe Howarth, one of the successful candidates, said 'I knew coming to the UTC would help me achieve my ambitions of working for Gestamp as an apprentice. The UTC have not only helped me achieve my GCSE's but also supported me to get the apprenticeship. can't thank them enough for their support.'

If GCSE students are still deciding upon their next steps then there are still a few places remaining at the 6th Form. The UTC 6th Form is going from strength to strength and quickly becoming the place for employers to seek out their next employee with many coming directly to the UTC. COUNTY DURHAM COMMUNITY COMES TOGETHER TO FIGHT HOLIDAY HUNGER

A County Durham charity has joined forces with community groups and organisations across Bishop Auckland to provide more than 6,000 free meals to young people and their families.

A report from the All Party Parliamentary Group for Hunger estimates that up to 3m children are at risk of going hungry during the school holidays.

To help combat this, a team of chefs and volunteers at regional charity The Auckland Project have been preparing and cooking hundreds of healthy hundreds of healthy and fresh meals, to be distributed via 14 different holiday and youth clubs in the local area.

The project has run, partnership with Incredible Edible Bishop Auckland, for the duration of the school summer holidays and by the end of the break it is estimated that 6,085 meals will have been distributed. Food suppliers, including DeliFresh, Bidfood's Gateshead depot and Darlington-based Acorn Dairy, donated vegetables, fruit, milk, cream and cupboard staples to help create the meals throughout the six-week period.

County Councillors, Shirley Quinn, Christine Wilson, Tanya Tucker and Joy Allen also supported the project, contributing from their Bishop Auckland and Shildon Area Action Partnership neighbourhood budgets.

Volunteer drivers from The Auckland Project delivered the prepared meals to youth clubs, holiday clubs, church groups and school-based transition days across the Bishop Auckland area to be provided for free to children aged from 0 to 16 taking part in holiday activities.

A number of community organisations joined the initiative and distributed the free meals to local communities via various holiday activity clubs. were, holiday activity clubs at the Bishop Auckland Fellowship of Christian Churches, Time for Toddlers, Auckland Youth and Community Youth and Centre, Wear Valley Christian Church Summer School, Shildon Alive, St John's Church Summer Activity Club, St Anne's Cinema Club, Incredible Edible Activity Day and Feeding Families.

Meals were also given out at King James I Academy Summer School, the Summer School at St. John's School and Sixth Form Centre and Bishop Barrington School Summer School.

And The Auckland Project's Learning and Engagement Team established its own Holiday Club which met weekly at Henknowle Community Centre for a range of fun and creative activities. Parents attending the sessions were also invited to stay and enjoy the activities so families could have a meal together.

Charlotte Walton, Food Project Co-ordinator at The Auckland Project, said: "Reports have found that Holiday Hunger can be big issue, especially during the long summer holidays, and it is something that can affect so many people.

"We wanted to do something to help and it has been a real team effort. It would not have been possible to deliver more than 6,000

working with "And many different community groups, businesses and organisations from across the Bishop Auckland area has been really rewarding." Cllr Olwyn Gunn, Cabinet member for children and young people's services at Durham County Council, added: "We know that school holidays can be a challenging time for families, with parents and carers facing the additional expense of keeping youngsters entertained and fed throughout the day.

"We really welcome this local partnership project which has provided meals for a lot of children in the area over the summer."

Susan Justice, Head of Business Development, North East at Bidfood, said; "Bidfood took no persuading to get involved with this amazing initiative run by The Auckland Project.

"Holiday Hunger is a cause very close to our hearts in Bidfood and our hope is that one day all children will have access to good, nutritional food in the school holidays.

"Until then we will work with The Auckland Project and their dedicated team to ensure we reach as many children as possible, and help make the school holidays a time to look forward to."

The Auckland Project is a regeneration charity with an aim to create positive change in Bishop Auckland. The Holiday Hunger project is one of a number of community-based initiatives being run in the town. Other schemes include Heritage the Friendly Group, weekly sessions combining local heritage with dementia friendly activities, and Blooming Bishop Auckland, which supports horticultural and environmental projects in the local area.



Greenfield Arts Celebrate Cornish Centenary

Greenfield Arts are looking forward to hosting an exhibition by a renowned and well-loved local artist. 'Norman Cornish: A Man of Destiny' will run from Thursday 10th October – Wednesday 11th December and chronicles the great determination and resilience he showed to become a professional artist.

The exhibition forms part of the Norman Cornish celebrations Centenary which is a year long celebration of his life and work. The Centenary has offered the opportunity and privilege to celebrate Norman's life and work, the exhibition features personal quotes from Cornish and an interesting narrative that highlights key moments of his career and showcases work that was

Across County Durham

Pupils have been praised for their GSCE results, as County Durham continues to perform strongly in the face of major changes to the exam

Schools across the county maintained success from last year and there has been significant improvements in academic performance of

disadvantaged pupils.
The results are set against ongoing reforms to the GCSE system, with the majority of GCSE courses now giving pupils a 1-9 grade. A level 4 is deemed as a 'pass' which is similar to the old 'C' grade and level 5 as a 'good pass. There has also been a shift away from coursework, meaning more weight is given to the final

across England Results have been in a state of flux since the first wave of reforms, and grades for all regions took a dip in 2017 when the new maths and English qualifications were introduced.

In County Durham, the proportion of pupils achieving success at grade 4 and above in both English and maths is 60 per cent. This matches last year's performance, which was a significant improvement from 56 per cent in 2017. The average attainment score for both subjects has also

The overall attainment 8 score for pupils, meanwhile, has risen again to 44.7 from 44.4 last year. This is a measure of a pupil's average grade across a set of eight subjects. Disadvantaged attainment 8 has significantly

improved to 40.4 compared to 35.5 in 2018.
Cllr Olwyn Gunn, Cabinet member for children and young people's services at Durham County Council, said: "We are delighted our young people have achieved such good results. The system has been changed has been changed significantly in recent years, with the removal of coursework and more difficult questions increasing the pressure on pupils during the exam period.

'These results are testament to how hard our young people have worked. They also reflect the commitment of our teaching staff and the invaluable support provided by parents, carers and other family members.

"GCSEs are important but if you did not get the results you want, please do not worry. There are many paths to success and support is available, so make sure you seek advice and access the help on offer."

First Force in Country to Use Nurse & Patient Take **Specialist ANPR Technology**

The idea for a unique Speedwatch van was born when officers within the Neighbourhood Police Team were brainstorming on how to improve the volunteer-led service last March.

The traditional Speedwatch scheme sees volunteers use a speed matrix to manually record speeding drivers who pass them.

However, this involves relying on the accuracy of the volunteers' eye and multiple vehicles can be difficult to register all at once, especially in harsh weather conditions.

But after teaming up with the 3 Towns Area Action Partnership (3 Towns AAP) and speciality traffic sign firm, Westcotec, officers were able to design their own Speedwatch van which is the first of its kind in the

Utilising latest intelligent radar technology, an Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) Camera and a Speed Indicator Display (SID) with safety camera warning legend beneath, the equipment works together to clock speeding vehicles. If above the speed limit, the sign will flash in warning as the driver approaches and if the driver continues to speed, the camera will capture the registration of the vehicle along with its

The camera can also register multiple vehicles at a time. making results much more reliable and these are sent straight through to a laptop operated by volunteers in the front cabin meaning they will also be protected from the elements.

PC Ellis Hutchinson, who led the project, said he was delighted the van was finally ready and had been

worth the wait. He said: "This van has allowed us to enhance the capability of our volunteers and our data quality while we have also achieved our aim to support the volunteers' hard work whilst having an impact on driver behaviour.

"We are confident this will contribute to reducing casualties and educate drivers on the importance of sticking to the speed

communities safe.

Chris Spinks, managing director of Westcotec, said the team were really excited to work with officers on the

Mr Spinks, who is a former chief inspector with Norfolk Police, said the company always invited input from their customers and knew the Speedwatch van would be a particularly good idea when PC Hutchinson suggested it.

"We started looking at ways to have an automated Speedwatch team and that's when the Crook team suggested the device in a van," he said. "It's a really clear and visible deterrent to slow people down and means people can have that choice to slow down before they get clocked."
He added: "It's been great

to work on as I have an understanding of the issues and challenges the police face around this issue.

"Westcotec is all about educating the driver and providing them with more information so they can make a better decision and alter their behaviour.

"We want to thank Durham Police for the opportunity to work with them to produce something to make a real difference."

The van was manufactured in France and was made possible thanks to funding from several 3 Towns AAP councillors who collectively contributed £25,395.

The councillors are Cllr Olwyn Gunn, Cllr Patricia Jopling, Cllr Richard Manchester, Cllr Andrea Patterson, Cllr Anne Reed and Cllr Fraser Tinsley.

It has even inspired bosses at Heathrow Airport who have also now adopted the same technology in their carparks.

Sandy Denney, 3 Towns Area Action Partnership co-ordinator, said: "Community safety is a key priority for us and a concern for residents so we are delighted all of our local councillors chose to support this innovative scheme with their 3 Towns Partnership neighbourhood budgets. This project is a first not only for County Durham but for the country. 'Speeding vehicles pose a serious threat to pedestrians and other road users so it is important we support the

police. "This van will build upon the fantastic work already being carried out by Speedwatch volunteers and sends out a strong message that speeding will not be tolerated in County Durham."

The van will be launched on Friday, August 30, at a special event at Crook Council offices at 10am.

The Council on 23/8/19 made the above Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on 660 m of B6443 Newton Aycliffe between its junction with Durham Way North in a northerly direction to the Blue Bridge to enable phased carriageway resurfacing works to be undertaken. Phase 1 works is 500 m of carriageway between Durham Way North and the junction with Horndale Ave. carriageway between Durham Way North and the junction with Horndale Ave. Phase 2 works is 160 m of carriageway between Horndale Ave and the Blue Bridge. Alternative route during phase 1 from southern point of closure south on Durham Way North, then west on Durham Way, then south on Durham Way South, then west on Heighington Ln, then north on Spring Rd continuing onto Whinbank Rd, then east on Horndale Ave to northern point of closure, and vice versa. Alternative route during phase 2 from southern point of closure west then north on Horndale Ave, north easterly on Pease Way, east on Stephenson Way, and south on St Cuthberts Way to northern point of closure, and vice versa. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence on 31/8/19 between 7pm and 6am and are anticipated to be completed in 8 nights. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly. Access will be maintained for emergency services.

Newton News are running a seven week series on the history of Newton Aycliffe, written by Town & County Councillor, and local historian John D. Clare and will run from the ice age to present day. On 16th September 1825, a number of heavy wagons left the Stephenson Works in Newcastle and trundled 32 miles southwards down Great North Road. When they reached Aycliffe - perhaps some 4 or 5 days later, such was the pace of transport in those prerailway days - they turned westward up Heighington Lane, until they reached the new railway line which the Stockton & Darlington Railway Company had been building for the past three years. There, at what is now the level crossing at Heighington Station, the first public passenger steam locomotive in the world was assembled and placed onto the rails of the first public passenger steam railway in the world. At the time the locomotive was named 'Active' but, because the Company had ordered Company three more locomotives for their fleet, it soon became, simply, 'Locomotion No.1'. The new company quickly developed all the infrastructure to run a modern steam railway, signals, including timetable, branch lines, the first railway suspension bridge, repair yards etc. The crossing at Heighington Lane became first a halt. then they built a tavern there for people waiting, then they started selling tickets there .. and what we know as the Locomotion Pub became at

there, suitably hidden. People fight about which was 'the first railway in the world'. There certainly been wagonways using steam locomotives in collieries, and railways with horse-pulled passenger

carriages, all well before the Stockton & Darlington And the Railway. proponents of the Liverpool Manchester Railway (1830) argue that the S&DR was in fact only 'the last wagonway', and that it was the L&MR which was 'the first railway'. But, as they do new research for the bicentenary in 2025, the Friends of the Stockton & Darlington Railway are proving beyond doubt that in fact, not only was the S&DR the first company to put all the elements of a modern steam railway together into a working whole, but that they made it commercially viable ... and as a result, people from all over the world copied it (including Germany and America ... and, yes, the

Liverpool and Manchester Railway). At the time, I suspect the people involved in that epoch-creating event on Heighington Lane were unaware of how momentous a moment it was. Having delivered the locomotive, it was discovered that no one had a tinder-box (and of course there were no matches in those days), so no one could light the boiler. A boy was sent to the local pub for some fire, but he went and never returned. In the end, it being a sunny afternoon, one of the navigators – a man named Robert Metcalf – lit a fire with the magnifying glass he used to light his pipe.

it's exciting, isn't it! The new railway carried freight, goods and passengers. Local farmers sent their produce to market by train. A mine at Middridge was just one of

And the world steamed off into our future. I mean ...

many collieries which used the S&DR, and you can still trace the wagonway which took its coal down to the line. Small villages grew up beside the railway at the bottom of Walker's Lane Riseburn to the south and Eden Pit to the north - and commercial quarries were established there too. A rival company built a better route from Aycliffe to Stockton but, because it still had to join onto the S&DR at Simpasture, the Stockton & Darlington Company able to drive it into bankruptcy, and to take over the line.

don't know whether you imagined 19th century Aycliffe and Middridge as sleepy, Lark-Rise-to-Candleford rural villages, but they were anything but. 853 people lived in Middridge in 1890 (compared to 300 today) and the population of Aycliffe in 1879 included, stunningly, not just the expected farmers, market gardeners, cattle dealers and hay sellers etc., but also: a plasterer, 3 butchers, a coalman, 6 shopkeepers, a tanner, 3 shoemakers, a beer seller, 2 tailors, a baker, 2 joiners, 3 pubs and 2 hotels, 2 blacksmiths, a miller, a builder, a greengrocer, a cartwright, a school, the church and two Methodist Chapels, a railway station and a saw mill. years ago, our area was economically-dynamic, and socially bustling. Of the 146 people over the age of 16 living in Middridge in 1851, just 33 had been born in the village.

When I was a teacher, it took an hour's lesson and a homework to teach the students all the economic and social consequences of the railways. How amazing is it to think that it ALL started at that one point in time and place ... which we now know as Heighington In this series, Station. we have heard that a man from Thickley invented our democracy, and that a stallion from Middridge Grange transformed horseracing. But this was the moment when an event in Great Aycliffe went on to change the world.

New Regulations Protect Renters Living in Poorly Insulated Homes

Renters in County Durham living in cold homes with high energy bills have been given new protection rights with landlords now required to ensure their property meets a minimum energy efficiency standard as part of a series of new regulations.

a series of new regulations. The changes will help households who live in poorly insulated homes with outdated heating systems which are often difficult and expensive to heat effectively. Since 2018, all private rented properties have had to meet a minimum of Band E before they can be let to a new tenant or a

tenancy is renewed. Recent updates to these rules now mean landlords must pay up to £3,500 towards the cost of energy efficiency improvements in substandard rental homes*.

From April

From April next year, more stringent regulations will require landlords to improve properties with the lowest energy performance ratings, even when occupied with existing tenants, or face significant financial penalties.

Since 2002 the private rental sector has doubled in size and now accounts for nearly a quarter of UK households. However, 25% of these properties don't meet basic energy efficiency standards. Rural renters, including many in County Durham, are some of the worst affected, with data showing some 97%

many in County Durnam, are some of the worst affected, with data showing some 97% of oil using homes in the UK are currently rated Band D or below, despite oil being amongst the cheapest of all heating fuel options for offgrid homes.

Malcom Farrow from

OFTEC, which represents the oil heating industry, commented: "With quality, affordable rented housing in short supply, many may feel compelled to move into a property without first checking how energy efficient it is, despite fuel bills being one of the biggest household expenditures. These new rules will put the onus on landlords to ensure that all properties they let meet a minimum standard which should provide welcome relief to many renters, particularly those living in fuel poverty and struggling to pay their energy bills."

Tenants are also being reminded to check with their landlord that the heating system has been recently serviced by an OFTEC (for oil) or GasSafe (for mains gas) registered technician to make sure it is working correctly and efficiently.

Malcolm added: "As well

as providing a better deal for tenants, these updated regulations are designed to reduce carbon emissions by encouraging landlords to install modern and more efficient heating systems as well as reducing unnecessary heat usage due to draughty walls and windows. The government has set a target to upgrade as many homes as possible to EPC band C by 2035."

New Regulations Protect Renters | Care Academy to be Launched

Care providers and those wishing to pursue a career in the sector can access free training at a new academy launching next month.

Durham County Council has set up the County Durham Care Academy to improve skills and resilience within the care sector, offering support across a range of areas including recruitment and retention of staff, training, technology and service delivery.

It is part of a broader programme of work aimed at supporting independent adult social care providers across the county.

And on Tuesday 3rd September a special launch event will take place at Durham Masonic Hall in Old Elvet, Durham City, with the public encouraged to come along between 1.00pm and 3.00pm to find out more about careers within the care sector and the training on offer.

In County Durham, there are more than 100 independent care providers whose teams of care workers support adults with social and physical activities including household tasks, personal care and attending appointments.

Adult health and social care roles make up a large proportion of the

county's employment opportunities. According to the independent charity Skills for Care, 10.3 per cent of adult social care roles are vacant in County Durham, which equates to about 1,400 vacancies at any one time.

The average age of a care worker, meanwhile, is 44, with 25 per cent of the workforce aged over 55 and due to reach retirement age in the next ten years. This is set against increasing demand for care, as the aged population continues to grow.

To help providers meet this need, the Care Academy has developed the Routeway into Adult Health and Social Care course which starts this September. Just one of a broad range of training opportunities on offer at the academy, the free sixweek accredited programme has been developed with employers and is aimed at those who wish to start a career in the care industry. Anybody can apply and its approved by Job Centre Plus as a routeway to work with guaranteed interviews at the end.

There is also a programme for people who are specifically interested in working as personal assistants, supporting



people with day to day tasks at home and within the community. The free two-day course will be delivered in venues across the county and covers topics such as safeguarding, infection control, emergency first aid and food safety. Participants will also receive a free DBS check and can register as a personal assistant and access current job opportunities. Cllr Lucy Hovvels, Cabinet

current job opportunities. Cllr Lucy Hovvels, Cabinet member for adult and health services at Durham County Council, said: "Adult social care providers are under increasing pressure to recruit and retain staff to meet demand for services. As a council we are committed to ensuring that our providers are supported

effectively so that we can continue to improve care in County Durham.

"The Academy is a small but vital part of a much larger programme of work that aims to transform how we deliver services to our residents."
