
JimJams hosted the event introducing various members of the Aycliffe Radio team who in turn introduced the artistes.



Neville Community | A Rare Outstanding Hat-Trick



"compassionate and kind" Newton Aycliffe company working with children and young people with complex needs has been awarded CQC Outstanding for the third

time running.
Families told the inspector that ROC Support Network made a huge difference to their lives and one local authority professional praised the working praised the working relationship they had with the company, adding that they have a "genuine care for our children and their

The which inspection. considered whether the service was safe, effective, caring, and well-led, responsive included interviews with service user families, local authority commissioners

and staff. "We a absolutely are delighted with the result," said director Sally Bishop. "Achieving outstanding is a great accomplishment but to get it three times running shows the skills and commitment of all of our team."

The company, which used to be called Reach Out Care Support Network, works with under 25s with autism, learning disabilities and other complex needs. Services include independent living skills training, confidence building activities, home support and a sleep over service.

In her report the inspector wrote: "Parents told the management team and support staff were exceptionally compassionate and kind. "Support staff told us they received excellent support from the management team and were extremely proud to work for the service. There was a very open and transparent culture where all young people were empowered to be involved in their care and voice their opinions. Without exception, all parents spoken to told us the service was exceptionally

well-managed." One parent told the inspector that without the service, she would not be able to keep her daughter at home as her own health was also very poor.

The inspector also wrote: "Safeguarding was at the core of the service's practices and the needs of all young people were paramount. Staff were clear on safeguarding protocols and demonstrated a good knowledge of the actions to be taken to keep young people and their families safe.

The company is part of the wider ROC Group its portfolio includes children's homes, extra supported housing for 16 to 18 year-olds with challenging behaviours and a supercontact service. supervised directors also founded a supported housing ed housing ROCSOLID, charity, which supports vulnerable people, including care leavers, trafficked people, pregnant young women and people with learning difficulties.

The group also holds Investing in Children accreditation and enhanced accreditation National Association Children's Contact

"To be able to adopt a child, especially a child with behavioural issues or a learning difficulty, you need to be determined, to have empathy and be honest about what you can take on, but the most important things are to have a loving heart and mind and you'll be amazing."
That is the message to

would-be adopters from a County Durham woman who has chosen to speak out about how adopting has changed her life as part a campaign to encourage more people to follow her lead.

Figures recently released by the government show the North East has nearly three times as many children awaiting adoptive families as there are adopters, with 350 children and only 105 families approved to adopt. Figures from the Adoption and Special Guardianship Leadership Board also show children with a plan of adoption are currently waiting 509 days to be matched with a family. There are also children with additional needs such as autism and ADHD who are waiting even longer to find a loving home.

On the back of National Adoption Week, Durham County Council is in the midst of its own campaign to recruit more adopters. The council, which was recently praised by Ofsted for its "excellent" adoption services, organised events last month to allow people interested in adopting to find out more and ask any questions.

As part of the campaign, Allison Cowen, from Chester-le-Street opened up on how she became a 'single adopter' in her 30s, by which time

the family scenario she had envisaged of a husband and children of her own had not

"I realised in my mid 30's that this supposed 'perfect' scenario was not relevant or important - I was in a position on my own to love and care for a child who needed me...

"I learnt that a family wasn't ready made and your family can come from anywhere and be anyone."

Allison, who has three foster siblings and whose grandma was adopted, contacted the council to ask about adopting and was ultimately approved, receiving training to prepare her for life as an adopter.

"I met some wonderful people... some in the same situation as me and others with completely different circumstances. It was a relief to share that experience and those emotions with people who were feeling the same as you."

Allison was contacted about one-year-old Thomas, who

had minor additional needs "As soon as I read his profile, I knew I wanted to be this child's mum. As soon as I saw a photograph of him, I fell in love - he was meant to be my son."

To her delight, Allison was told Thomas would become her adopted son.
"I just burst in to tears, I

could not wait to love him and to give him everything he needed."

Allison, who like any new adopter was supported by a range of professionals including paediatricians, recalls the moment it was made official: "I hugged paediatricians, my boy so tight and just remember repeatedly saying 'I'm your mam'."

Since adopting Thomas, she has got married, to fatherof-two Paul, with whom she had a son, Joshua in July.

"We have grown in to a big family, the children all love each other, and Thomas adores his daddy and his brothers and sister. All the children are loved supported equally, and we do not apply labels to each other either such stepbrother, half-sister or adopted. My favourite things about my family are simply that we are just that - a family. Seeing how much the children all adore each other makes every day

special.
"I am very thankful, and I feel privileged to be able to call Thomas my son."

Helen Fergusson, council's head of children's social care, said: "Allison own is proof that it is not just traditional families that can

offer a child a loving home.

"Anyone over the age of

21, regardless of gender,

religion, sexuality, gender,

ethnicity,

marital status,

can adopt, whether or not they live in their own home, have children or work and regardless of whether they have adopted before.

'Allison's account of the joy Thomas has brought and continues to bring, to both her and the family he is an integral part of, is proof of just how rewarding adoption

"I would encourage anyone who has ever thought about adoption to come along to one of our information sessions or to contact us for an informal chat."





Big Project to Restore St. Andrew's





The Anglo-Saxon Chronicle records that in 782, there was 'a synod at Acleah', which is presumed to be Aycliffe, Acleah being one of its earlier names. Undoubtedly therefore there has been a Christian building or purpose in this village for over 1300 years. When they originally constructed St Andrew's our forefathers were more concerned with building a house in which to worship and glorify our Lord, than to cater for its visitors and mere mortals.

It could be said also that in 1882, when the last major restoration took place, our Victorian forebears missed a trick also, for those of vou who have attended this wonderful old church, will have noticed, or maybe were even inconvenienced, by its lack of facilities.

St Andrew's does not have a toilet, or a place to wash your hands. Nor does it have the facility to provide you with a cup of good cheer! It is proposed to remedy that at last.

Over £360,000 in Local Communities



Hays Travel will invest £360,000 to kickstart fundraising in local communities all over the UK.

The company is extending its Community Partnership scheme, which provides every branch manager with £500 cash, to its newly expanded portfolio of 745 shops.

Dad's Fundraiser for Daughter's Fight for Sight

A Darlington native is embarking on a hat-trick of fundraising events for eye research charity Fight for Sight, in the hope of finding a treatment for his daughter's rare eye condition.

Emily was just three months old when her parents noticed that she wasn't responding to visual cues and her eyes were not focusing. She was quickly diagnosed with a genetic eye condition known as Lebers Congenital Amaurosis and now, aged five, Emily is legally blind.

Her father Andy described their shock at learning of Emily's condition: "It has been a steep learning curve since we first found out about Emily's diagnosis. We had an avalanche of questions that have slowly been answered over the years."

Leber congenital amaurosis (LCA) is the term used for a group of inherited eye conditions and is one of the most common causes of blindness in children, affecting around two or three of every 100,000 newborns. LCA mainly affects the retina, which is the specialised light-sensitive layer that lines the back of the eye. It affects

the light-sensing cells called photoreceptors which play a vital role in making eyesight possible by converting light into electrical signals that are transmitted to the brain. When these cells stop working properly or are lost, this leads to sight loss.

There is currently no cure for LCA, but early research funded by Fight for Sight has led to a clinical trial of a gene therapy that is already restoring sight for patients with a different type of LCA. With more funding, new therapies could be developed to cover more types of LCA, like Emily's.

like Emily's.
Emily's parents are determined to help fund such a breakthrough and have been fundraising in their hometown of Darlington for Fight for Sight. In 2020, Emily's father Andy will undertake a series of endurance events to raise money.

He said: "We know that it's only through research that a cure for Emily's condition can be developed. That's why we decided to raise money for Fight for Sight – it made us feel like we were doing something to help."



In July, Andy will be doing the Summer Edition Fan Dance where he will be carrying a 35lb rucksack over a 24km SAS selection route in the Brecon Beacons. While in September he will undertake a 10-mile challenge event, again carrying 35lbs, which is based on the armed forces' parachute regiments test week.


Andy said: "The third event is yet to be decided. I have a good friend who has agreed to do the events with me and the general consensus is that we will concoct a bespoke challenge ourselves. I'm not satisfied with just the two, it has to be a hat-trick of events! I am determined to raise as much money as possible now and in the future, for eye research."

Emily is now in school and her dad has described his delight at seeing how independent she is.

He said: "Emily is in a

He said: "Emily is in a mainstream school and she has settled so well. She is involved entirely with her friends and loves to play in the playground just as well as her classmates. Emily has 1:1 support in the classroom, habilitation training in school to move around as safely and independently as possible, and a fantastic QTVI (qualified teacher of children and young people with vision impairment) who is with her through these early years and beyond. Such a framework of support is pivotal and already Emily is becoming fluent at Braille. "There's a misconception

A Blank Cheque

After nine years of the Tories being in power our public services are on their Chronic knees. underfunding and understaffing has left the NHS at crisis point. 

Ian Dove. business development manager, was named regional Innovation Champion, for being instrumental in the Trust leading the way in using digital technology for the benefit of patients. Many of the Trust's clinical teams now use an app, HealthCall, enhance the care and experience patients receive. It is particularly useful in enabling patients self-monitor, from the comfort of home, or even whilst on holiday or working away. Those keen to use the app, receive training, submitting their readings for the scrutiny of a specialist nurse, with any concerns being followed up by phone or in clinic. This convenience and the opportunity to be flexible with the frequency of monitoring, is popular with increasing numbers of patients across a range of services. It also means clinics are preserved for those most in need.

Trust Chairman, Professor Paul Keane, OBE, said, "Ian had the vision not only to see the potential of using digital technology across services as diverse as falls prevention, undernutrition, and our new gestational diabetes service, he also has the drive to transform his visions into reality. also instigated our ambitious and ground breaking working with care homes across County Durham and Darlington, staff training providing them with the technology to regularly monitor residents so that even slight deterioration can be spotted early – leading to a significant reduction in emergency hospital admissions. We're incredibly lucky to have Ian on our team and this award is much deserved." Commenting, Ian said, "I am immensely proud to be recognised by the AHSN for a role that is made easier by the dedication of our inspirational clinicians who strive to develop new

and innovative ways to support patient care and improve outcomes.' Trust's

arrest prevention team took second place in the Demonstrating an Impact upon Patient Safety category, for their strategy in reducing the number of patients having a cardiac arrest whilst in hospital, by 54%. The work, led by Lisa Ward, early detection and resuscitation lead nurse, and matron Claire Stocks began seven years ago, moving away from a focus on cardio-pulmonary resuscitation to one of identifying patients most at risk of having a cardiac arrest and doing everything possible to prevent that happening. Lisa, Claire and their team began this work in 2012 by taking an in depth look at all cardiac arrests to inform how best

to prevent them. Lisa said, "This analysis gave us a real understanding to allow focused education programmes in clinical however, project could not have been successful without the support of the Trust's leadership team in us changing our approach to focus on prevention. The Trust has a culture of encouraging innovation, listening to and acting on the ideas of its staff, then taking them forward. The project's success has also been dependent on the commitment, engagement and hard work of clinical teams across our services and it was an honour to accept the award on behalf of them all, in recognition of their dedication to constantly improving our patient's outcomes.
