## **STUDENTS AND BUSINESSES** UNITE TO SAVE THE PLANET

Over 120 students from secondary schools, ding Greenfield 17 including Greenfield College, Newton Aycliffe are embarking on a challenge to come up with business ideas that will protect the planet. Future Business Magnates, now running for its 15th year, will see school teams of year 8 pupils working closely with local businesses to develop, create and present business ideas.

With many countries and local authorities, including Durham County Council, Climate declaring а Emergency and committing to reducing emissions, this year students are being asked to come up with a business idea that will help to save the planet or will tackle one of the problems caused by climate change. At the launch students

heard from the Environment Agency (EA), who are a partner in this year's competition. ΕA representatives gave an interesting introduction to the concept of the circular economy, to get the teams' creativity flowing. The students representing schools from across County will undergo Durham six individual challenges over the coming months,



supported by dedicated partners business from successful Durham based organisations like Zumtobel Group, Honcho Markets, Wates Construction and Waterstons.

The programme culminate in an awards ceremony in June 2020 hosted by BBC Radio Newcastle presenter Charlie Charlton.

This year's competition was launched in November by Councillor Ossie Johnson, Vice Chairman of Durham County Council, and Business Durham at the Xcel Centre in Newton Aycliffe. Business Durham is the economic development arm of Durham County Council and runs the Future Business

Magnates programme. Sarah Slaven, Operations Business Director at Durham, said: "This exciting competition aims to inspire young people and help develop the skills needed to start and develop

to see so many positive outcomes for the students, the schools and the business partners. Students are introduced to possible career pathways and develop communications key skills, and businesses are given the opportunity to inspire young people whilst

## Family Tribute After Boxing Day Crash

The call comes as it launches a TV advertising campaign to highlight the upcoming changes to the law around organ donation in England. From spring 2020, all adults in England will be considered to have agreed to donate their own organs when they die unless they record a decision not to donate or are in one of the excluded groups.

The 'Pass it on' campaign aims to motivate people across England to "Pass across England to "Pass It On", whether that's by making the decision to pass on their organs to save lives; passing on their decision to family and friends or passing on information about the law

change to other people. The TV advert, which is due to air for the first time on 20th December, follows a woman holding a heart shaped balloon. We watch her quietly leave her home and sleeping family and travel by bus as she observes different scenes of life that continue to go on around her. In the final scene, we see her approach a building as the sun rises, silently releasing the balloon with a smile. A waiting patient reaches out from a window to receive it, symbolising the gift of passing on life through organ donation. The patient looks down and gestures as if to say thank you. The advert ends with a reminder that the law around organ donation is changing in England from spring 2020 and urging people to find out more and register a decision. The TV campaign is the next stage of the national organ donation law change awareness campaign, which launched in April

this year. The advert aims to reach people and boost conversations about organ donation at Christmas, while people are together with their families. Once the new system is

introduced across England, families will still be involved before any organ or tissue donation goes ahead and Specialist Nurses for Organ Donation will continue to speak with families about their loved one's decision.


In 2020, the law around organ donation will be changing in both England and Scotland. From spring 2020 in England and Autumn 2020 in Scotland, everyone will be considered as having agreed to donate their own organs when they die unless

they record a decision not to donate, what's known as 'opt out', or are in one of the excluded groups. This system was introduced in Wales in December 2015 and in Jersey in July this year.

Media students have been chronicling events as local historians find themselves on the brink of a discovery which could alter the annals of history.

Darlington College UAL Level 3 media students have created a movie trailer depicting a medieval melee in County Durham claimed to be bigger than the Battle of Hastings.

Up to 30,000 heavily armed troops are believed to have clashed in 937 at the Battle of Brunanburh as the Anglo-Saxon King Athelstan defeated Constantine of

Scotland and the Vikings. The encounter became the basis of a popular Icelandic tale, Elgin's Saga, and now two Icelandic historians Bjorn Vernhardsson and his son Stefan Bjornsson have discovered evidence that the battle took place in Hunwick, near Bishop Auckland.

Landlord of the Joiners' Arms Alistair Ruddick is seeking permission to dig around the village to prove the battle took place there.

Four Darlington College students – Molly Clark, of Newton Aycliffe, Jack Cornish, of Chilton, James Curtis, of Northallerton, and Gabe Yates, of Frosterley – produced the trailer with the help of the early medieval re-enactment group Acle. Darlington College

Programme Leader for L3 UAL Award and Diploma in Creative Media Production and Technology Film and TV Stephen Wade said the film would be used to increase awareness of the historic event.

"Students spent their time in a very cold and muddy field, on what is believed to be the battle site, recreating the drama of what must have been an epic battle," he said. "The final edit captures the atmosphere, the tragedy and the horror of a pitched battle staged on foot by thousands of men.

"You simply cannot recreate what the students have experienced in the classroom and to be involved in what could be such a monumental historical find is incredible." Molly said: "It was great working with Acle, especially as I used to be a member of the group when I was young. It was an added bonus that the Icelandic historians were there to help. We feel really proud of the final film."

James said: "It was so different from everyday life and it has inspired us to do more projects like this." Gabe added: "There was always something to film, even when they were just practising. It has really boosted our confidence."

Jack said: "The actors hurled themselves into it – they were pure berserker. It really was like being in the middle of a civil war."

Acle's Stuart Findlay said the research so far had been compelling. "Around 30,000 men clashed in hand to hand combat and if we can find the evidence this is huge for the North-East," he said.

Fellow group member and local historian Patrick Townsend added: "This was the largest land battles of the medieval period – bigger than Hastings. # Trust Look Forward to an Exciting Year

Work done by Durham Wildlife Trust and other organisations in the North East in 2019 has highlighted the importance of marine conservation and there are hopes that 2020 will see additional support with the launch of a major new project.

There are more than 20 miles of coastline from the Tyne to the Tees and those waters play host to a vast array of wildlife. This coastline has an unusual geology, unique in the UK, with Permian Magnesian Limestone exposed under the sea. It also acts as a nursery ground for juvenile cod and supports a wide range of sponges, soft corals, hydroids, bryozoans and dahlia anemones.

Durham Wildlife Trust is a Partner organisation in the National Lottery Heritage Fund-supported SeaScapes project, led by Durham Heritage Coast, which, amongst other initiatives, hopes to highlight the marine wildlife of this coastline. Development work has been completed and the final project bid has been submitted for a funding decision. If granted, Summer 2020 will see the start of the £3 million project.

SeaScapes focuses on the often-overlooked Magnesian Limestone coast between the Rivers Tyne and Tees,

including its coastal cliffs, beaches and inshore waters. The project is not the only to target rare marine one wildlife in the area and one success story in 2019 involved Durham Wildlife Trust and concerns the little tern. Arriving from West Africa in late April, the little tern is the UK's second rarest seabird. Durham Wildlife Trust wardens watched the birds arrive but then disappear from the beach at Crimdon where they have nested for many years. Thankfully, the colony had only moved a short way down the coast to Seaton Carew and after two years of low fledgling success at

Crimdon, round-the-clock wardening by Trust staff and local volunteers saw more than 40 young birds fledge in 2019. Nationally, the Wildlife Trusts today publishes its annual review of marine

habitats for 2019. Almost 298,000 people have backed a seven-year campaign by The Wildlife Trusts to protect UK waters: 41 new Marine Conservation Zones were announced in 2019, bringing the total to 91. They will mean greater protection marine for underwater places including cold water corals, forests of sea fans, rocky canyons and sandbanks.

#### Thousands with Hidden Disabilities Benefit from Extended Blue Badge Scheme

New figures show 12,299 people awarded Blue Badge under new criteria
Since August 2019, people with non-visible conditions such as dementia, epilepsy or

Parkinson's are eligible • Changes to Blue Badge scheme continue the UK's world-leading plans to make the transport network more accessible

Thousands of people with Parkinson's, dementia, epilepsy and other "invisible" disabilities have gained access to the benefits from Blue Badges under new rules introduced last summer. In the first three months,

new figures show, 12,299 new badges – around 130 a day – were granted to people who cannot walk as part of a journey without considerable psychological distress or the risk of serious harm, as well as to people with a non-visible disability.

disability. The new rules, introduced by the Transport Secretary, Grant Shapps, in August, widened the eligibility criteria to ensure that people with "invisible" disabilities are not disadvantaged. The badges help people access shops and services, by enabling them to park closer to their destinations. Ahead of the change, the DfT issued new guidance

to councils in England on Blue Badge parking permit eligibility, and launched in August a new online eligibility checker to make

the scheme clearer for people before they apply. While the new criteria gives clear and consistent guidelines on Blue Badge eligibility for the whole of England, not everyone with non-visible disabilities will qualify for a badge

qualify for a badge. Local authorities decide if an applicant meets the eligibility criteria, as is currently the case.

The Blue Badge scheme had already meant that people with physical disabilities can park closer to their destination than other drivers, as they are less able to take public transport or walk longer distances. Abuse of the scheme on-

street is something that local authorities have been cracking down on and the Department has given them the powers to seize badges on-street when they are being misused.

To help councils with the expected increase in applications, the department has agreed with the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government to provide £1.7 million to local authorities in England in the first year of the programme.

## Passengers Able to Plan Journeys as Big Data Revitalises Bus Use

Government brings buses into the digital age with open data project to improve passenger journeys across England. Information on routes, timetables, location and fares will be easier to access to make bus travel more convenient.

The Bus Open Data Service will be launched in early 2020.

Bus passengers across England will soon be able to plan their journeys down to the minute thanks to a pioneering project to collate and share bus location data. Buses Minister Baroness Vere has announced a ground breaking project and standardise publish information from operators, which will enable bus users to plan routes, estimate journey and understand times costs in advance. It will also provide real-time bus location data so that passengers can travel with confidence.

Information on routes and timetables will be available from early 2020, followed by location and fares data by 2021, encouraging more people to choose buses by making them easier to use than ever.

Developers will be able to add the information into existing apps or develop new products to improve connectivity for communities and encourage more people turn to public transport. Only half of bus users think that it is easy to stay up to date with timetables and fares, impacting the

number of journeys taken and the user experience, according to Transport Focus. The Bus Open Data Service will be underpinned by

December 12th's General Election results show that the votes of many Newton News readers counted for nothing, thanks to continued use of our antiquated "First-pastthe-post" voting system. your Signing away democratic rights with the mark of illiteracy in single member constituencies enables MPs to be elected on a small fraction of the vote. As a consequence, seats won by a party do not necessarily reflect the level of support nationwide for that party, nor are outcomes consistent or certain. On December 12th, Boris Johnson's so-called landslide was achieved on just 44% of the vote; 56% of those who voted did not support his party. Moreover, in Scotland, the Nationalists took 81% of the seats for just 45% of the vote while in Northern Ireland, Unionists were awarded fewer seats than the Nationalists, even though they had polled more

votes. As the Labour Party's As the Labour Party's Secretary of the time observed as long ago as 1936: "There is no greater gamble on earth than a British general election. You might co wall throw diag" might as well throw dice". If your readers want to know more, www.knackered.org. uk sets out the deficiencies of our current voting system and advocates its replacement with the Single Transferable Vote, a British invention which is used for some elections in Northern Ireland and Scotland. STV increases the degree and accuracy of representation, it minimizes wasted votes. and it is the most powerful vote on the planet. It is high time it was introduced for all elections in the UK. 




