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## **MONEY MATTERS**

#### **Carers Allowance Update** - Self Isolation.

For any Carers unable to visit the person that they care for, the government has confirmed that providing emotional support counts Carer's towards Allowance threshold of 35 hours of care. So, using Facetime or Skype to see the person whilst keeping a safe distance is fine. Carers Allowance Unit is operating on reduced hours 9.30am to 3.30pm weekdays and can be contacted on 0800 731 0297 for calls, but has long wait times, and 0800 731 0317 for Textphone

### Help for Families During School Closures

Families with children who would be entitled to free school meals may receive food vouchers for additional costs during the pandemic worth £15. Shops taking part include Sainsbury's, Tesco, Asda, Morrisons, Waitrose and M&S so far. Schools will contact parents directly.

#### **DWP Financial Support** for people affected by Covid-19

If you are self-isolating or caring for someone self isolating, you can now claim Statutory Sick Pay (SSP) at a rate of £94.25 per week. It's paid by your employer for up to 28 weeks. Talk to your employer to check sick pay entitlement. You will need to obtain an "isolation note" by contacting NHS 111, if possible the online service. If you are not eligible for SSP vou can now more easily make a claim for Universal Credit (UC) or 'New Style' Employment and Support

#### Allowance. Universal Credit is an online benefit

### 'New Style' Employment & Support Allowance

If you are ill or have a health condition or disability that limits your ability to work, you may be able to get 'New Style' Employment and Support Allowance (ESA) which can be claimed on its own or at the same time Universal Credit (UC). This is a contributory benefit based on your National Insurance contributions. You will need a "fit note" via NHS 111 please use the online NHS 111 service where possible.

Calls for this are to the UC Helpline 0800 328 5644 (choose option 2, then option 3) for calls and 0800 328 1344 for the Textphone service (choose option 2, then option 3) from 8.00am to 6.00pm weekdays.

#### **Face to Face Assessments** Suspended

Face to face appointments have been suspended and existing benefits awards will be extended by 3 months during the current situation. Claimants will be contacted to discuss the next steps

### **Energy Bills Support for Vulnerable Households During Covid-19 Lockdown**

With an estimated 16.8 million more people across the UK staying at home\* during Covid-19 the pandemic, concerns have been raised over vulnerable County households in Durham facing higher fuel costs as their energy consumption increases during the lockdown,

Bills are expected to rise by about 30%\*\* in the coming months as, even with the weather starting to turn households are using more power to run their hot water, heating, computers and other appliances during the day when previously the home would be empty.

Whilst the government has signalled it may step in to support vulnerable households and the initial crash in the price of oil has provided some relief to the 16.000 oil heated households in County Durham, there is concern many will still struggle, particularly if they face reduced incomes or additional costs of looking after relatives.

In response OFTEC, the trade association for the oil heating industry, is alerting households to the support available and providing advice on how to reduce energy consumption. This includes:

Identify the benefits available to you. Several new government measures

been announced have including extended sick pay (SSP) statutory those self-isolating, for enhanced Employment Support Allowance (ESA) for the self-employed and housing higher benefit payments if your income has dropped due to Covid-19. Contact Citizens Advice for information on the support you could claim.

Speak with your energy provider. Customers financial distress be supported by their supplier, according to the government. This could include a reassessment or pausing of debt repayments. For oil households, some suppliers are prioritising deliveries to vulnerable groups such as older people, families with small children or those with underlying health conditions.

Only heat the rooms you are using. Turn off individual radiators in rooms you are not using to save money. Also, in the rooms you use regularly, ensure radiators blocked with are not furniture as this reduces their effectiveness.

Adjust your heating timers. You may have a new routine if you are working from home so check when you heating is set to turn on. For example, if you are getting up later in the morning you may not need your house to warm up as early. With the worst of the weather seemingly behind us, you could also start to reduce how long your heating is on for.

Keep in contact with vulnerable neighbours and friends to ensure they are keeping well, especially as the lockdown could increase feelings of loneliness. There are many free video-calling platforms to stay in touch or a regular phone call can make a real difference. If you need to visit them to drop off food or other essentials, ensure you carefully follow the government's social distancing guidelines.

"During these unsettling times, many households may be feeling anxious about higher energy bills because they are spending more time at home during the day", says Malcolm Farrow OFTEC. "However, new announcements about the support available are being made every day by the government and energy suppliers so it's important to identify those which apply to you, or to family and friends who you know are struggling.

"The warmer weather will help to reduce reliance on heating and other measures such as adjusting timers and radiators may seem trivial but, over several weeks and months, the savings can really add up. They are also usually simple jobs most people can do themselves." Durham County Council is giving each of its 14 Area Action Partnerships (AAP) an extra £100,000 to allocate to groups who are working hard to provide support at a grass roots level across the county.

Great Aycliffe and Middridge Partnership have funding available to support Community groups and buildings through the current situation related to COVID-19. Groups and buildings looking for support during this difficult period are welcome to discuss and apply for funding through Great Ayclife and Middridge Partnership.

We envisage applications will fall in to two categories.

Supporting Covid-19 Help Initiatives, supporting existing and new organisations to provide support to individuals who are impacted by Covid-19. Examples of expenditure include assistance with food, transport, associated utility costs, volunteer expenses and telephony.

Supporting the Community and Voluntary through COVID-19, where income has been negatively impacted by COVID-19 and organisations require assistance with urgent expenses such as utility bills insurance costs and urgent repairs for an initial period of up to 3 months, up to a maximum of £10,000. Brian Riley (GAMP Coordinator) added, "The GAMP

are looking to support local groups and residents in these difficult times, please contact the GAMP Team in the first instance with any queries".

Potential applicants are encouraged to contact the GAMP team to discuss project proposals and/or request further information and guidance on applying.

## PARLIAMENTARY NEWS

You will probably have seen that Parliament introducing virtual meetings. have already started committee level at the time of writing this, by the time you read it I expect that we will have had the first virtual sittings of the chamber, including questions to the Prime Minister.

At a personal level this affects me in terms of being present in the chamber for debate but also as regards the operations of the BEIS (Business, Energy and (Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy) select committee.

Whilst arrangements are still being finalised the latest information I have is that MP's are being strongly encouraged not to attend Westminster unless it is essential. Normally this would provide an excellent opportunity to get out and about the constituency but clearly that can't happen at the moment.

When it comes to debate in Westminster and asking questions these will be facilitated virtually as it is clearly a critical platform of democracy that MPs can question the government ministers on their plans and actions. I will as

always continue to submit questions in the hope of being drawn from the shuffle. This "shuffle" is a lottery type draw by the Vote office, which is non political, and is the well established process.

As regards my select committee work, this had a complication as a result of the change of Labour leadership. With a new Labour leader comes a new shadow administration.

This meant that a significant number of Labour MPs changed their roles, one of these was Rachel Reeves who chaired the BEIS committee, she is now a member of the shadow

You are not allowed to chair a select committee if you are a Minister or Shadow Minister. We therefore had our first virtual meeting last week to appoint an interim chair whilst another Chair is chosen.

The work of this committee has been significantly impacted by the coronavirus in that we have a need to focus on the immediate situations arising rather than continue with the work plan we had. We will consider over time the actions of government in regard to business and this crisis but I expect that in the short term our focus will be on what can be done to ensure that the economy recovers as well as possible as we exit the lockdown.

This will require debate on everything from how we make sure as many possible businesses as survive, but also how we make the economic environment as supportive

I would also like to reassure anyone that had particular interest in the work program we had previously, that this will not be forgotten and we will address it at the earliest possible time.

think in particular of the review of the Post Office IT Systems that we were halfway through when Parliament rose, the importance of these has not diminished and we will not forget

The BEIS committee will be sitting virtually on a weekly basis from now and you will be able to see this on line or on the Parliament channel.

## iComms for ICU's Project Democracy

support Jonathan Vasey, who works for me in Westminster, in his efforts to fund a project called iComms for ICUs. This iComms for ICUs. started with a request from staff at Kings College Hospital and St Thomas' Hospital in London. This was well before the Prime Minister ended up as a patient there, they were looking for iPads that could be used by patients and NHS  $\,$ staff in intensive care units. This then started a process looking for any surplus equipment in Westminster that could help. Due to the kindness of Sir Lindsay Hoyle, the Speaker of the House of Commons, Parliament have donated 300 iPads to hospitals throughout the UK.

So far, the iComms for ICUs project has distributed over 200 iPads across the UK, reaching over 1000 patients in ICUs. 72 of these iPads have been donated

to Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust covering all the hospitals in our area. These iPads are allowing patients in hospital communicate their families back home, at a time when visiting is impossible during the coronavirus pandemic. They are also allowing NHS staff in the ICU wards to update families on the condition of patients. In some tragic cases, these iPads allow patients to say goodbye to their loved ones for the last time, meaning they will not die alone.

We all owe a great debt of gratitude to the brave and dedicated NHS staff across the UK. These iPads will at least bring a glimmer of light to some in these dark

Newton Aycliffe Foodbank

In order to provide the most appropriate help for the circumstances of your situation we work with local agencies. If they feel you are struggling to put food on the table, they will issue you with a Foodbank voucher. The local agency can also provide long term support if needed to help address some of the issues behind the reasons for your crisis.

Our Foodbank works with a number of different agencies such as Citizens Advice, children's centres and health visitors. To find out more about the agencies that hold our

vouchers and how you can get help, please contact us. When you visit a referral agency they will take some basic details from you to complete the voucher. This will help them to identify the cause of your crisis and offer practical guidance. It also means we are able to prepare suitable emergency food for the right number of people.

Once you have been issued with a youcher, you can exchange this for a minimum of three days of emergency food at your nearest Foodbank centre.

Coronavirus (COVID-19) Advice & Support Information

Dear Resident,

This is to provide you with the contacts and information you may need in this uncertain time.

During this time of National Crisis due to the Covid-19 (Coronavirus) pandemic it is more important than ever that we follow the advice the government has published, it will save lives.

The single most important action we can all take, in fighting coronavirus, is to

Stay at home to protect the NHS and save lives.

You should only leave the house to: -

- shopping for basic necessities, for example food and medicine, which must be as infrequent as possible.
- 2. one form of exercise a day, for example a run, walk, or cycle alone or with members of your household.
- 3. any medical need, including to donate blood, avoid or escape risk of injury or harm, or to provide care or to help a vulnerable person.
- 4. travelling for work purposes, but only where you cannot work from home.

These reasons are exceptions - even when doing these activities, you should be minimising time spent outside of the home and ensuring you are 2 metres apart from anyone outside of your household.

The Government has also identified a number of critical workers whose children can still go to school or their childcare provider. This critical worker definition does not affect whether or not you can travel to work - if you are not a critical worker, you may still travel to work provided you cannot work from home and your employer is able to satisfy social distancing rules.

Please think of your friends and neighbours and stay safe.

- not leaving your home you should not go out to do shopping, visit friends or family, or attend any gatherings

### Getting assistance with foods and medicines if you are reducing social contacts

Ask family, friends and neighbours to support you and use online services. If this is not possible, then the public sector, business, charities, and the general public are gearing up to help those advised to stay at home. It is important to speak to others and ask them to help you to make arrangements for the delivery of food, medicines and essential services and supplies, and look after your physical and mental health and wellbeing.

If you receive support from health and social care organisations, for example, if you have care provided for you through the local authority or health care system, this will continue as normal.

### **Disposal of waste**

If you're self-isolating, please ensure you keep used tissues separate from your household waste in sealed bags for 72 hours before fully disposing. This is to contain the spread of the virus both in and out of your home other household waste can be disposed of as normal.

### Laundry

To minimise the possibility of dispersing virus through the air, do not shake dirty laundry. Wash items as appropriate in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions. If you do not have a washing machine, wait a further 72 hours after your 7-day (for individual isolation) or 14-day isolation period (for households) has ended when you can then take the laundry to a public launderette.

### Cleaning

When cleaning you should use your usual household products, like detergents and

bleach, as these will be very effective at getting rid of the virus on surfaces. Clean frequently touched surfaces such as door handles, handrails, remote controls and table tops. This is particularly important if you have an older or vulnerable person in the house.

### **Shopping and Groceries**

All the UK's major supermarket chains are now providing Elderly & Vulnerable Priority Shopping Hours. Please check with your local stores and online for more information. Food shops and pharmacies will remain open and stores have also reassured customers they are doing all they can to ensure their shelves remain full and their supply chains running smoothly.



# Support for Residents Concerned About Housing Costs

Residents concerned about three months as a result of team is working hard to losing their home due to the financial impact of Coronavirus are being urged to contact a council's housing team as soon as possible. Durham County Council

has reissued the plea following a recent poll by the homelessness by the homelessness charity Shelter, which found almost one in five private renters in England an estimated 1.7 million adults - say they are likely to lose their job in the next

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the pandemic.

According to the research, 24 per cent of renters have already seen their income fall or have lost their job, with two million tenants saying becoming unemployed would leave them unable to pay their

And with record numbers of people across the country Universal Credit, Shelter is calling on the Government to increase the housing benefit element of the welfare payment. It argues that the current level will leave renters who pay an average amount of rent with a massive shortfall.

In County Durham, the council's Housing Solution

Kevin Shaw, the council's Cabinet member for strategic housing and assets, said: "The research published by Shelter is very concerning and I would encourage any County Durham residents who are worried about paying their rent to contact our Housing Solutions team as soon as possible. Similarly, if you are concerned about paying your mortgage, please contact your mortgage provider and then get in touch with us.

"The sooner we hear from

you, the sooner we can provide advice and support and put your mind at ease. Help is available; and we will do what we can to ensure you remain safe and secure in your home."

As well as the assistance being offered by the Housing Solutions team, the council is committed to supporting residents who are finding it hard to make ends meet because of the pandemic.

Durham County Council is already one of only a small number of local authorities in the country to provide council tax discounts of up to 100 per cent for eligible residents. The Government's £500 million Coronavirus Hardship Fund has allowed the council to offer further reductions of up to £300, with revised bills with a combined saving of £1.9 million sent to more than

7,000 households in the Cllr Angela Surtees, the last two weeks.

Debt recovery for anyone falling into arrears with their council tax has also been postponed and an £1 million additional from the Hardship Fund has been invested into the Welfare Assistance Scheme. This offers shortterm awards for daily living expenses to help people in crisis situations, providing food, clothing, sanitary products and help

with utilities.

Tenants who need additional support to meet their housing costs may also be eligible for Discretionary Housing Payment. The council awards these stand-alone payments to help meet rent shortfalls in the shortterm, while the tenant addresses their money problems in the long-term.

council's Cabinet member for social inclusion, said: "We know some of our residents are finding it tough at this time. If you are struggling, please be reassured that we will do as much as we can to help. We have a range of support measures in place, including our Welfare Assistance Scheme, which provides assistance when

## **Health & Social Care Services** Are Still 'Here to Help You'

Health officials in County Durham and Darlington are reminding people the NHS and health and social care services are still 'here to help' after concerns that people may be putting off using health services for illnesses not related to Coronavirus.

Despite mounting pressures health across the UK, chiefs are urging patients to continue to contact their local health services if they need medical help. Jeremy Cundall, Executive

Medical Director at County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust said: "While we are very grateful to the public for their responsible use of the NHS at this time, and for continuing to follow the national 'stay home' guidance, we want to reassure our local populations that we are still here for you if you, your child or your relative becomes ill with relative non-COVID-19 symptoms.

"Do not delay seeking medical advice. If you need to come into our emergency departments, there are clear streams for those patients possible COVID-19 symptoms and those who are otherwise unwell in order to keep these groups separate and minimise risk to all.

All Council and Committee meetings have suspended on Government instruction to avoid gatherings of people.

#### **Council Offices**

The council offices are currently closed to visitors. The website is updated provide the latest information on services. Staff are attending the office on a limited basis and working from home to comply with government requirements to stay at home if possible.

#### Information on Cemeteries

Following clarification from the Ministry of Justice under Section 5 (8) of the Health Protection (Coronavirus, Restrictions) (England) Regulations 2020 cemeteries will be closed for the preparation of burials and maintenance of the site. In order to manage social distancing and further distancing and further protect our staff, Stephenson Way Cemetery and West Cemetery are now being used as a base for our Works Section employees.

### **Paid Opportunities in** the Care Sector

training training programme has been launched by the County Durham Care Academy in response to the pressures placed on the sector by COVID-19.

There are three key roles, including care workers, assistants and assistants being kitchen domestic recruited as part of the campaign.

The academy, which we set up, is also offering remote training and development to provide potential new staff with the skills they will need to access opportunities in the sector.

These are available to anyone wishing to work in adult social care, including those without prior experience.

Job opportunities, online training modules and an online application form can be accessed on the County Durham Care Academy web page.

The academy will then be able to match candidates' skills against a range of potential vacancies. within the council and the county's independent sector providers, once the online form has been completed.

There are more than 100 independent sector care providers in County Durham, supporting adults with social and physical activities

Supporting Providers: Cllr Lucy Hovvels MBE, Cabinet member for adult and health services, said: 'Social care is the second largest employer in County Durham and it is vital that we work closely with our providers to ensure that they are supported effectively. especially during the extreme challenges that are arising because of the COVID-19

'We are already being proactive in finding out what gaps there are in the workforce and they're being addressed by this campaign care academy. These online training courses and advice will be extremely valuable in allowing us to improve care across County Durham in these uncertain times.

'I would also encourage people who aren't currently working in the care sector to consider upskilling and applying for one of these roles. Some people may be feeling a lack of security in their current role because of the impact of Coronavirus, or would like to support the care sector at this time, and they could find these courses and roles very rewarding."

## P.P.E. LATEST

We have seen many messages in the press about PPE (Personal Protective Equipment) and shortages. I get briefings around the levels we have for our public services and locally supplies are robust either through the normal channels or via the LRF. (The Local Resilience Forum is a back up structure coordinating our key public services, both emergency and services authorities, with military support if required).

One of the problems in the discussions around PPE is that not everyone agrees on what PPÉ appropriate. Public Health England in conjunction with the national colleges have advised what it thinks is appropriate and this is what is being provided to front line workers. I get a number of representations from these workers who vehemently disagree with the level of equipment provided and I don't dispute their concerns and I share them with ministers but I do not profess to be more of an expert than either them or

From the stories I hear from our front line my admiration just grows and my team and I will do everything we can to support them.
