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RETURN OF THE RAILWAY MUSEUMS

After 119 days of lockdown, the National Railway Museum in York and Locomotion in Shildon, County Durham have announced plans to reopen to the public this summer.

Locomotion will reopen on Tuesday 28 July and the National Railway Museum will reopen the following week on Tuesday 4 August. Both sites have undergone a rigorous cleaning regime prior to reopening and additional site-wide cleaning will continue to take place each day. Visitors will be encouraged to observe social distancing measures and the wearing of facemasks will be recommended.

In a significant change designed to keep the sites safe and comfortable, visitors at both sites will be required to book a timed slot in advance. Tickets will be free and available from the museum websites, but overall visitor numbers will be limited each day to avoid overcrowding. Tickets for Locomotion can be booked from 14th July, with National Railway Museum tickets available from Monday 20 July. Both sites will begin a phased reopening, initially on a limited number of days each week, before a gradual return to daily opening.

At York, the Great Hall which is home to world-famous locomotives such as Mallard and a replica of Stephenson's Rocket, will be first to open. The main gift shop and the Great Hall café will also reopen from 4 August, although steam rides, the miniature railway and the under-five's play area will remain closed for the time being.

In the coming weeks, the remaining museum areas such as Station Hall, the Warehouse and outdoor spaces are also due to reopen.

At Locomotion, the main collection building which features more than 40 historic rail vehicles will open from 28 July. The café will also reopen with a limited capacity, serving a reduced menu. The model railway, steam rides and cab access will return at a later date.

A one-way system will be in operation at Locomotion to ensure visitors can observe safe social distancing. Demonstrations of Rowland Emett's popular mechanical sculpture 'A Quiet Afternoon in the Cloud Cuckoo Valley' will increase, to be held hourly.

Judith McNicol, Director of the National Railway Museum, said: "We know that our sites - with their large, open buildings, outdoor spaces and car parking, can be great places for people to begin to re-engage with culture with confidence. We are cautiously reopening in stages at both museums, to ensure the safety of our guests and colleagues. At Locomotion and the National Railway Museum, we have dramatically enhanced our cleaning processes and introduced practical measures to allow visitors to maintain social distancing whilst enjoying the best of our collection. Although visitors may notice a few changes when they return, they can be assured of a warm welcome and the chance to enjoy our unrivalled collection of railway and engineering achievements. Prior to the Covid-19 pandemic, the National Railway Museum welcomed more than 750,000 visitors each year with Locomotion receiving around 200,000. John and Ann Millward live in Bali and are close friends of Brian Winwood, a member of Rotary Newton Aycliffe. Brian said "This is what John wrote to me in a casual

conversation". It wasn't until Widi just said in a conversation "many people with poorly stomachs because no food. They bring us notifications from the head of the village with government instructions, we are told to stay in and isolate".

The government has closed some shops and restricted opening times on others



and local markets. But all they are doing is bringing the same amount of people together in a shorter space of time, worse really. We are trying to help people in our local village get food during the bad times Coronavirus has created for many. The government has them locked down and isolating just like us, but it is difficult for some Balinese people, many out of work and particularly older people are going hungry. They remain in contact with others when they shouldn't because they need food. Widi (our lady) told us that old people and single parents in particular are suffering. The same as in the UK and many other places, but this is at another level and it is sad.

We gave Widi and Kadek some money and they put together small bags of food containing eggs, noodles and two kilos of rice and they handed them out around the village for us. Bukti Air Sanih Bali Village has been very badly affected by Coronavirus, especially the old.

Brief resume about John & Ann We were married and lived for many years in the North East and North Yorkshire. Much of our family is still there. Ann was always involved in some kind of charity work be it baking cakes for some fund raising event or working as a volunteer for many years in charity shops such as Help The Aged, she helped whenever she was asked, whilst John's work as a Graphic Designer kept him busy throughout the North East and beyond, working for local and international companies. Much like now, in lockdown, due to Coronavirus, computers and the internet allowed us to work more remotely and we moved to Scotland then on to France where we lived for 10 years. 

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PR Agency Facing Post-Covid World with a Fresh Start

Harvey & Hugo has been based in Business Central, Darlington, since 2015, but will now be going it alone, after managing director Charlotte Nichols felt the relationship with the office had run its course.

Explaining the decision, Charlotte said: "Breaking up is hard to do, but it's very much a case of us not them. With everything we – and the rest of the world – has been through lately, we felt the time was right to say goodbye.

"My main concern has always been the health and safety of The Pack; we can all work from home and it works well for us, so why increase people's risk by making them come into an office? Some Pack members are shielding, and some have underlying health conditions, so I wouldn't want them coming into the office anyway. An added benefit is a better work-life balance with no commute and more time at home, which is also a boost to the team's health."

With increasing uncertainty over the potential for a second wave of the coronavirus pandemic, as well as questions over the impact this would have on the economy, Charlotte said the decision to split up was also a practical one.

She added: "I am worried that there will be a second wave and I don't want the burden of having an office that we can't use over winter. I want to be as financially agile going into an uncertain future, putting people before premises and prioritising The Pack's health and safety. We've also found that we're so much more productive working from home; as a very sociable group, we would find ourselves distracted in the office. This way, the team can get more done in less time, meaning they have more free time to do the things they love – which is so important after the upheaval of the past few months."

While the relationship has come to an end, the break-up was amicable – and Charlotte has fond memories of their time together.

She said: "We loved our time in Business Central. We were the first tenant to move in back in May 2015 and, as well as providing space to help my business flourish over the years, I also went through some major personal landmarks, including getting married and having a baby, while I was a tenant. In fact, Business Central was one of my one-year-old daughter's first trips out, and I regularly visited during my maternity leave.

"I would definitely recommend the centre for other businesses and I know a great office with the best view in Darlington going spare!" Bus & Lorry Tyres

Tyres aged ten years and older will be banned from lorries, buses and coaches on roads in England, Scotland and Wales in a boost to road safety, Roads Minister Baroness Vere announced this week. The ban follows an extensive investigation, including research commissioned by the Department for Transport, which indicated ageing tyres suffer corrosion which could cause them to fail. The move will make it illegal to fit tyres aged ten years or older to the front wheels of lorries, buses and coaches, and all wheels of minibuses. The secondary legislation will be laid in the autumn and will also apply to re-treaded tyres - with the date of re-treading to be marked making the age of the tyre clearly visible. Roads Minister Baroness Vere said: "In the same way that you wouldn't drive a car with faulty brakes, ensuring your tyres are fit for purpose is crucial in making every journey safer. Taking this step will give drivers across the country confidence their lorries, buses and coaches are truly fit for use - a safety boost for road users everywhere. This change is in no small way the result of years of campaigning, particularly from Frances Molloy, to whom I thank and pay tribute."

(THE ORLANDS, NEWTON AYCLIFFE) (TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE) ORDER 2020

The Council on 3/7/2020 made the above Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on 25m of The Orlands that extends westwards from 1 The Orlands to the rear of The Royal Telegraph Pub to enable new water supply works to be undertaken. An alt route for traffic is available from the western side of the closure from North Terrace south and south easterly to The Green, then north easterly and northerly onto Well Bank leading to The Orlands and the eastern side of the closure, and vice versa, the maximum duration of the order is 18 months. The works are expected to commence on 4/7/2020 and are anticipated to be completed in 3 days. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly.

NURSING COURSE APPLICANTS UP 16%

A record number of nurses and midwives are employed in the NHS, as the Nursing and Midwifery's Council reports its largest ever annual increase of registered nursing and midwifery professionals. Around 18,370 more nurses, midwives and nursing associates are now on the Nursing and Midwifery Council's permanent register to work in the UK compared to a year ago, bringing the total number to 716,607 by 31 March 2020. The number of people trained in the UK leaving the register has also fallen to a five-year low. The number of nursing and midwifery applicants to English universities has also risen for the second year running as the Government works towards delivering 50,000 more nurses by the end of Parliament.

The latest UCAS stats show that applicant numbers for nursing and midwifery courses are up 16% year-on-year, reaching 47,320 by the end of June. This is the second year in a row that applicant numbers have risen. In 2019 there was a 6.4% increase in people accepted onto nursing and midwifery courses in England compared to 2018. Prime Minister Boris Johnson said: "I'm delighted to see record numbers of nurses and midwives now working in our NHS as we work towards delivering 50,000 more nurses in this parliament. "As we continue our battle with this deadly disease, our world leading healthcare system has never been more important. We will continue to give it the support it needs today, as well as protecting it for generations to come. Nurses have saved countless lives during the pandemic, and the NHS simply couldn't function without them.' Health and Social Care Secretary Matt Hancock said: "This pandemic demonstrated just how talented and valued our brilliant nurses and midwives are, and it is fantastic to see an explosion of applications for nursing and midwifery courses. As well as a hugely rewarding career in one of the world's best healthcare systems, degree students will benefit from at least £5,000 a year from the Government in free additional support during their studies. With over 12,000 more fully qualified nurses working in our NHS compared to last year, we are well on our way to delivering 50,000 more by the end of this Parliament.'

The number of new applicants between January and June was 68% higher than the same period last year (11,360 in 2020, compared to 6,750 in 2019). Nearly two thirds of nursing and midwifery applicants living in England are mature students aged 21 or over, a 24% increase on last year. New applicants or those without an offer can still seek a place at university via the clearing process which runs from the 6th July to 20th October.

Student nurses and midwives starting courses from September will benefit from new guaranteed, additional support of at least £5,000 a year to help with their living costs, which they won't have to pay back.



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Darlington Building Society to Reopen Branches on Saturdays



Darlington Building Society branches are reopening on Saturdays from this week as it extends its policy of putting customers first during the coronavirus pandemic.

The Society has adopted an "open for business" strategy throughout the crisis by making an initial commitment to open branches between 9am and 1pm Monday to Friday.

To ensure the safety of staff and members, social distancing measures were put in place, along with protective screens, PPE, hand sanitiser, and increased cleaning.

The weekday opening hours were increased from 9am to 2.30pm from June 15, and now branches are to open from this Saturday, between 9am and 2pm, to give members more time to make essential transactions.

Chief executive, Andrew Craddock, is proud that his staff have maintained a strong service to customers that has exceeded many other financial institutions.

Apart from a two-day closure of Northallerton branch, when a staff member tested positive for the virus, all branches have opened every day apart from Saturdays.

Mr Craddock said: "That record is a remarkable achievement by the staff. We had to react quickly, with IT staff moving heaven and earth, and others having to juggle childcare and the support of elderly relatives, but the way people have pulled together is tremendous. "Now, we are in a position to go further for our customers by extending the opening of our branches to Saturdays, to give our members more options and make it as convenient as possible." During the lockdown, staff have also been making telephone calls to some of the Society's most vulnerable members, just to keep in touch.

Ninety-five per cent of head office staff, and 100 per cent of the mortgage team, have been working from home, with DBS making an early decision not to participate in the Government's furlough scheme.

Instead, staff were given an assurance that they would remain on full pay, with no redundancies, for at least the remainder of 2020. "We are a strong, resilient business, with reserves that have been built up over more than 160 years, and we felt it would be wrong to take the Government's cash when we were able to stand on our own two feet," said Mr Craddock.

Mandatory MOT Testing Reintroduced from 1st August



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Mandatory MOT testing is to be reintroduced from 1 August 2020 as COVID-19 restrictions are slowly lifted, Roads Minister Baroness Vere announced on Monday 29th June.

Due to the coronavirus outbreak, drivers were granted a 6-month exemption from MOT testing in March to help slow the spread of the virus. However, as restrictions are eased when safe to do so, all drivers whose car, motorcycle or van is due for an MOT test from 1 August will be required to get a test certificate to continue driving their vehicle.

MOT tests are important for road safety and ensure that vehicle parts, including tyres, seat belts, brakes, lights and exhausts, are in proper working order.

Drivers with an MOT due date before 1 August will still receive a 6-month exemption from testing. However, all vehicles must continue to be properly maintained and kept in a roadworthy condition, and people are able to voluntarily get their MOT sooner should they wish, even if they are exempt from the legal requirement. Motorists can be prosecuted for driving an unsafe vehicle.

Only some garages remained open to conduct essential services during the coronavirus outbreak, but now over 90% are open across the country. Testing capacity has already reached 70% of normal levels and is steadily increasing.

While exemptions are still available for vehicle owners with an MOT due date before 1 August, it is vital that drivers still take their vehicle to be checked if they notice something is wrong in the same way that they usually would.

If drivers are vulnerable or self-isolating they should contact their local garage as many are offering pick-up and drop-off services, so drivers can get their car checked without having to visit a garage.

The Driver and Vehicle Standards Agency (DVSA) has also issued guidance to all MOT testers about safely conducting tests in line with the latest Government advice.

College Launches Sports Coaching Degree with OU

Bishop Auckland College is launching its second full degree programme this September in partnership with the Open University. The validation of the BSc (Hons) in Sports Coaching by the Open University means learners can complete a full degree at the college without having to travel far to study a university-level programme. From September, students can either study full time for three years or part time for up to six years. Applicants who already hold a Level 5 qualification in sport (such as a Foundation Degree or Higher National Diploma) can apply to join the programme for a one-year 'top-up' option to enable them to achieve a full degree.

Other advantages include significant financial savings. The £7,500 annual course fee is well below the average university fee of £9,250. Students will also receive £500 cashback each year to help with the purchase of study materials. They will also benefit from lectures delivered by teaching staff with a wealth of experience in sports coaching who currently work in the industry.

A further £500 per student per year will be paid by the college into a learning fund to resource masterclasses, international trips to key sporting venues as well as visiting speakers and guest lecturers. The new degree syllabus covers advanced coaching, contemporary issues in sports coaching and health, performance analysis and all undergraduates will undertake a final year research project. The college has already received a great deal of interest from past students as well as new enquiries and anticipate the course to be very popular, although places will be limited. Recent graduates from the college's highly successful Higher National Diploma in Sport have already signed up for the final 'top-up' year in order to achieve a full honours degree in sport.

Higher Education Development Manager and Sports Coaching Programme Leader, Kevin Hodgson, who led on the development of the course, said: "This degree will appeal to applicants who have studied sport at A-Level, Level 3 or HND, those already working in sporting venues like leisure centres, sports clubs and private gyms, and others employed as sports coaches for local authorities, private coaching companies or as health professionals.

"We are delighted at the number of applications we have already had, which demonstrates the huge demand for this degree course to be available locally. It's a great addition to prospective students from Bishop Auckland and its surrounding towns and villages, allowing them to study high level qualifications without barriers such as travel or finance preventing them from doing so.'

SWAN's Year 6 Leavers 2020 Local Author Debut Novel



Stacey began writing the novel four years ago but had to put it on hold while she had a new baby, completed her MA degree in Creative Writing, and her PGCE and SCITT teacher training. Despite taking a short break from the novel, she continued to write and had a short story The Making of Nancy shortlisted and published by The Bristol Prize. Her novel, The Meadows, which will be available to buy in paperback and eBook formats on Amazon, Kobo, Barnes and Noble, as well as



local independent bookshops, is a social realist piece of gritty fiction which focuses on the life of several characters after a teenage girl is attacked by a group of school girls. The novel, set in the northeast of England, shows how laws and opinions are effected by social and economic class differences, how social media can be a blessing and a curse, and the implications of 'kids being kids'. Stacey submitted the first draft of The Meadows to the Penguin Random House WriteNow competition and was both long listed and short listed, her prize for making the short list was meeting editors, authors, literary agents, and having her novel read by them as well as receiving full feedback which she said helped to motivate her to continue writing it. Stacey is currently working on her next novel and a short story collaboration as well as teaching secondary English full time. The Blurb

Free Energy Efficient Heating Systems Offered to Low Income Homes

Residents in County Durham are being urged to check whether they are eligible to receive a new gas boiler and central heating, which could lead to lower energy bills and a warmer home.

Durham County Council is working in partnership with utilities supplier E.ON and heating, insulation and renewables company 0800 Repair, to offer grants of up to £6,000 for homeowners on low incomes to replace solid fuel or electric storage heaters. The Warm Homes Fund will install 200 energy efficient gas boilers

and central heating systems in homes with an income of less than $\pounds 26,000$ or which are in receipt of a means tested benefit. To qualify, applicants must currently heat their house with solid fuel and only one radiator or use an electric storage heater.

David Jones is the first homeowner to have a gas boiler and central heating installed through the fully funded scheme.

Mr Jones, of John Street, Easington, said: "I am delighted with my new central heating system, my home is warm and comfortable now and I'm not worried about the cold weather and high coal bills anymore".

Cllr Angela Surtees, the council's Cabinet member for Social Inclusion, said: "This is a fantastic way for residents to have a warmer home and lower energy bills. I urge residents to apply as soon as possible as there is a limited number of grants available until November 2020."

The Warm Homes Fund is supported by Grahame Morris, MP for Easington. He said: "The Warm Homes Fund is an excellent initiative by Durham County Council, helping vulnerable people to heat homes by replacing inefficient solid fuel or electric storage heating systems. I am encouraging residents to check their eligibility before the scheme closes in November."

The 136th Durham Miners' Gala was scheduled to take place on Saturday, 11 July, but was cancelled earlier this year due to the coronavirus outbreak.

However, organisers The Durham Miners' Association and Marras – Friends of Durham Miners' Gala arranged to mark the day online with a series of new content and a live event.

Exhibitions and displays, which would have featured on the day, will also move online where they can still be viewed and enjoyed by those celebrating the festival.

Durham County Record Office has produced a virtual version of the exhibition they would have displayed at the event which will be available to view on the record office website. The Mining Durham's Hidden Depths annual exhibition has been a regular and popular feature in the 'big tent' on Gala Day since 2010. This year's exhibition explains the history of the Durham Miners' Gala, which started in 1871, and how the county has been shaped by work of the miners' association.

Featuring archives from the Durham Miners' Association, the largest miners' trade union in the country, the exhibition explores the association's powerful history and its members over the past 149 years.

An accompanying home learning resource pack, Child Miners, has also been created and is also free to view online at the record office website.

The Brass festival will also be marking the connection between mining and brass bands with its video piece, The Stories of Their Banners. The video features an original piece of music from 2004, from composer Will Todd, which celebrates the Durham Miners' Gala and has been reworked for a virtual choir and brass band. This will be available to watch from 6.30pm from Monday, 13 July. Cllr Joy Allen, Durham County Council's cabinet member for transformation, culture and tourism, said: "Although the Durham Miners' Gala has not been able to take place this year in the way it traditionally would, the festival can still be celebrated with as much enjoyment with a host of online content that has been organised throughout the day.

Refurbishment to Transform Gala Theatre & Cinema

Front-of-house facilities at a popular Durham City theatre and cinema are to be transformed as the venue undergoes a refurbishment.

Work at Gala Theatre and Cinema will include improvements to the foyer, bar area and box office areas as well as the introduction of an updated till system.

The changes are being made to improve facilities for customers, creating more welcoming, inviting and fit-for-purpose public areas. The venue, in the city's Millennium Place, has been closed to visitors since March as a result of Government restrictions introduced to help prevent the spread of coronavirus.

The improvement works had been planned before the closure but have been delayed due to the pandemic. It is now hoped that the Gala will reopen to visitors in January 2021, Government coronavirus restrictions permitting.

Cllr Joy Allen, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for transformation, culture and tourism, said: "This investment is incredibly important. It will significantly improve the customer experience for everyone visiting Gala Theatre and Cinema and will, hopefully, bring in new visitors - something that is crucial to the venue's recovery from the impact of the coronavirus.

"We had already planned to close the venue to carry out the refurbishment. It is unfortunate that the additional closure due to the coronavirus pandemic means that visitors will now have to wait a little longer to return to Gala.

"Government guidance permitting, we are confident that the venue will be able to reopen in the New Year. I am sure customers will feel that the wait was well worth it with some fantastic new front-of-house facilities to welcome them back."

The closure will mean the theatre and cinema's full autumn programme has been cancelled, including the annual pantomime. This year's show, which was due to be Robin Hood, will now take place during Christmas 2021. The Gala Gallery will also remain closed.

Anyone who had purchased tickets for shows this year will be contacted regarding a refund or an alternative date if the

performance has been rescheduled. However, this may take some time, so customers are asked to be patient. The Empire Theatre, in Consett, will also remain closed for the rest of



the year, with plans for it to reopen in January 2021. Maintenance work at the venue had to be paused when coronavirus restrictions were introduced. Its annual Christmas show will also be moved to 2021.

Meanwhile, the council is looking at whether it is possible to reinstate some events and performances at Bishop Auckland Town Hall, which has also just undergone a significant refurbishment programme.

Many members of staff who normally work at the three sites were redeployed at the beginning of the pandemic and have provided invaluable support to vulnerable residents through the council's virtual community hub and other essential frontline services over recent months. Where this demand has now reduced, the council has placed staff on the Government furlough scheme.

If you have tickets for a performance that was scheduled to take place during 2020, venue staff will contact you direct.

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Last week started with a good catch up with Hitachi who are joining forces on a scheme with Hyperdrive Tech from Sunderland to develop battery powered trains. This is an innovative beginning to the creation of a North East hub for battery technology which will assist with the governments Net Zero target and provide more employment to this area. I then attended a briefing meeting with Local Trust regarding our first full meeting of the APPG on Left Behind Neighbourhoods. On Thursday it was the BEIS select committee where we had the Secretary of State Alok Sharma joining us to be questioned on the work of the BEIS (Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy) department. He was joined by Sam Beckett who is the interim Permanent Secretary and two Director Generals, Joanna Whittington and Jo Shanmugalingham. We covered a number of subjects including Project Birch (which relates to specific business support); Support in local lockdowns (like Leicester); Commercial rent and business support; Pregnant women and Covid 19 work implications; 5 Business focus groups established by his department; the Green recovery agenda; Industrial Strategy and "Shovel ready projects" Sunday Trading; COP 26; The energy White paper; Funding Research and Development; The Horizon enquiry into Sub Postmasters; Equality and Diversity within his department and more generally; reform of the audit market and supply chains that include exploited workers.

As you can see the brief of BEIS is incredibly wide. I was then able to join Rachel and David in the office as we start to organise ourselves as we await IT connectivity etc and we are looking to plan our summer as hopefully Covid 19 constraints continue to lift and we can get out and about more. If you would like us to visit your organisation or if you would like to meet us at the office please do get in touch. I then had a meeting with Labour MPs around the project proposal to reopen the Leamside line and reconnect Ferryhill with Tyneside and Wearside. I was able to follow this with meetings on Monday with Grant Shapps, Secretary of State for Transport, and then Chris Heaton-Harris, Minister for Rail, where I raised this further.

Tuesday saw the first meeting of the Left Behind Communities APPG which was very well supported with over 70 people joining us. We discussed the need to look at how we could drive support into these communities as they are at higher risk than most from the impacts of Covid 19 and it must be understood, were not in a good place even before the pandemic. I am determined to make sure this APPG delivers tangible actions and real improvements to these communities and is not just a 'talking shop'.

After the 23rd July, Parliament is in recess. This means that I am much more available in the constituency and hopefully, as Covid lifts, it will mean I can get out and about and see more of you.

Please remember that as we all get out more and resume some aspects of our normal routines it is still vitally important that we respect the virus and maintain as much social distance as we possibly can and, where appropriate, wear our face coverings.

Please also give your consideration to our key workers, some of them are also getting used to the additional PPE they are now wearing.

Parliament Creative Summer Activities Planned to Showcase Hidden Heritage

A host of creative activities will be held virtually this summer to celebrate the heritage of a County Durham town.

From July to October 2020, the people of Bishop Auckland and beyond will be able to take part in five different online projects which aim to uncover memories, stories, crafts, people and places that reflect the history and heritage of the town.

In a partnership between Durham County Council's community arts team and the Bishop Auckland Heritage Action Zone, these five projects come together to make 'Hidden Bishop Auckland' which will run online throughout the summer.

Each creative project has been made in conjunction with local and regional artists. Due to restrictions in place, as a result of the coronavirus outbreak, the projects have been redeveloped and will be delivered online through social media and digital platforms.

The free projects have been designed to engage with people of all ages and abilities. For each activity, people can send in their creative submissions for a chance to be featured in this year's Bishop Auckland History and Heritage Festival, which will take place online in October, as well as displayed in an exhibition in 2022 in Bishop Auckland Town Hall. There will also be other activities as part of the festival to be announced soon.

'Hidden Stories', produced by artist Richard Bliss, will launch on 22 July. Participants can help Richard discover the history of the town hall and inspire the creation of a "workers shirt" in the style that would have been worn in the 1800s when the venue was built. People can join his virtual "town gatherings" via Zoom to hear a talk and share stories of the town hall, its more recent history, its origins and its links with music. Zoom places will be limited and can be booked via email to hiddenbishopauckland@durham.gov.uk

Richard will also be delivering short online workshop via social media on how to conserve your own heirlooms and artefacts and, for younger members of the family, how to make a puppet from old clothing.

'Hidden Gems', with photographer Lee Dobson, will launch on 1 August. Lee will be talking budding photographers through a series of engaging short tutorials online via social media, focusing on taking shots around Bishop Auckland's Heritage Action Zone area. People can then send in their images of local landmarks, building features and structures, based on a number of themes. Some images will be chosen to be included on one of 12 designs for digital postcards.

'Hidden Places in Faces', with artist Stu Langley, will launch on 20 July. For this project, Stu is asking people to take and submit some video footage of their favourite places in Bishop Auckland. Sending these in along with a photo of their head in profile, Stu will then animate a film which will celebrate places in faces. Stu will deliver a series of short social media tutorials using free to download apps which will help people digitally animate their own film.

'Hidden Crafts', by local arts organisation Daisy Arts, will launch online on 20 July. Daisy Arts will deliver a series of online short craft activity sessions created for both children and adults using different techniques and easily sourced materials and recycling. People can make a wildflower brooch, a pop-up structure, build a tower, try mosaic art and make a kite to fly.

There will also be a limited number of doorstep activity packs which can be delivered directly to homes and will include all the resources to make a Midsummer cushion. Activities will run in the summer holidays and during October half-term.

Hidden Bishop Auckland is funded through Durham County Council's Towns and Villages Fund and its community arts team, South Durham Enterprise Agency, and Bishop Auckland Heritage Action Zone, which is funded by Historic England and Durham County Council.

Building Society Marks Rail Anniversary by Keeping Profit-Share Pledge



A north east building society has promised to go on sharing its profits with local good causes for the next five years.

Darlington Building Society has donated five per cent of its profits to support the community since 2017, helping a wide range of groups and initiatives.

Darlington Building Society normally reviews the pledge annually, but chief executive Andrew Craddock has announced that the Society will maintain the five per cent pledge until 2025 to tie in with the 200th anniversary of the world's first public railway between Stockton and Darlington.

Mr Craddock had planned to unveil the 'five per cent for five years' pledge to members at this year's annual general meeting. The meeting could not go ahead in the normal way, due to the coronavirus pandemic, but the promise was still made at a virtual event. The board is also exploring ways to top up the amount given to local communities during that period.

"The five per cent pledge is close to our hearts, so we want it to continue despite all the challenges. Our communities still need our help so that financial support will remain in place, not just annually, but for the next five years," says Mr Craddock.

Staff volunteering is also a big part of Darlington Building Society's community commitment and that has also been reinforced during the Covid-19 crisis.

At the start of the lockdown, the Society promised staff they would be kept on full pay even though some have been working part-time due to the challenges posed by the pandemic. They were encouraged to use that spare capacity to help their local communities, and a large number signed up to volunteer for the NHS.

As a southerner, being born and raised in Buckinghamshire, Mr Craddock has been impressed by the strength of community spirit in the North-East - and the response of the staff at Darlington Building Society is typical of that sense of togetherness.

"We are all going through difficult times, but it is the acts of kindness, and the way people are looking out for each other, that have been so inspiring," he says. "That is particularly evident in the North-East - and I'm proud that Darlington Building Society is playing its full part and has remained open for business throughout."

Volunteer and Help Coronavirus Recovery Study

County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust is part of the new Durham Tees Valley Research Alliance along with South Tees and North Tees NHS Foundation Trusts, and has been recruiting patients for the national COVID-19 research trial which has made a major breakthrough in the fight against the virus.

Almost 100 patients cared for by CDDFT agreed to take part in the RECOVERY study, a national clinical trial aiming to identify treatments that may be beneficial for people hospitalised with suspected or confirmed COVID-19. Across the Alliance, nearly 500 patients from the region have entered the study.

James Limb, Director of Research and Innovation, explains, "Three months ago, there were no known treatments for COVID-19. The RECOVERY Trial, led by Oxford University and set up in record time at the start of the pandemic, is testing seven potential treatments and, thanks to the willingness of patients recruited to the study and the work of our teams, we've been contributing vital data. Nationally, nearly 12000 patients are part of the trial. "Recently, it was announced that the trial has identified a clear survival benefit to giving a

daily dose of a drug called dexamethasone to any patient ill enough with COVID-19 to need oxygen or ventilation. The significance of this result is enormous - dexamethasone is inexpensive, well-tolerated, easily available, and it is the first drug anywhere to show an improvement in survival for COVID patients. The actual results show a one third reduction in deaths in patients ill enough to be on a ventilator, and a one fifth reduction in those needing oxygen."

"Whilst all hospitalised COVID-19 patients should be considered for dexamethasone, the RECOVERY trial is continuing to test other potential treatments for COVID including convalescent plasma from survivors, and tocilizumab, a drug which alters the immune response. Another six COVID-19 trials are also underway in our hospitals, as well as a range of trials for other conditions. We encourage all patients to take part in research - their help plays an important part in improving medical care.

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
