New Development Not Part of Newton Aycliffe

Dear Sir,
Regarding the letter about 'Development at Middridge' in last week's Newton News, I would like

to correct some points made by Great Aycliffe Town Councillor, Bob Fleming, regarding Middridge Parish.

Prior to 1983, Middridge was part of the Civil Parish of Shildon, and following the major reorganisation of local government in 1974, when Great Aycliffe Town Council (GATC) was first formed, Middridge was represented by two local Councillors on the new Shildon Town Council. Thus, despite any plans the Aycliffe Development Corporation may have had to include Middridge in Newton Aycliffe, in fact they have always been separate. In the early 1980s, the then Sedgefield District Council encouraged and supported Middridge to become a Civil Parish, and eventually we were granted this status in 1983.

Since then Middridge has had its own Parish Council, completely separate from both its neighbours. Thus, the new houses being built along Middridge Road, which lie wholly within the Middridge Parish boundary, are definitely NOT part of Newton Aycliffe! Nevertheless, the Parish Council do work in partnership with GATC, particularly as members of the Great Aycliffe & Middridge Area Action Partnership (GAMP).

Speed Watch in Aycliffe Village



Aycliffe Village Residents Association (AVRA), in association with Durham Police, this week started an ongoing campaign against vehicles travelling in excess of the 30mph speed limit on both the A167 and North Road through the Village. This has been a problem for years and at last AVRA is able to react and hopefully slow traffic down, especially those coming off the by-pass into the village. Monday morning's session was incredibly successful and effective. A significant number of vehicles were caught registering speeds well in excess of 30mph and one at nearly 50mph and also drivers using mobile phones, another, in particular, looking down to the left hand whilst texting. These drivers will be receiving a communication from Durham Police regarding their transgression. The speed checks will now occur at different times and on changing days for the foreseeable future, so drivers should be sure to be aware that 30mph is the speed limit and observe it.

MHM - Mental Health Matters

Dear Sir,
I work for an amazing charity called Mental Health Matters and I am based at the local CMHT - Goodall Centre in Bishop Auckland, we cover South Durham, Sedgfield, Trimdons, Spennymoor, Bishop Auckland, Shildon, Newton Aycliffe and as far as Crook and Tow Law.

We support people suffering with or who have had an episode of mental ill health but who are on a journey of recovery and looking for something vocationally to do with their time - this can include retraining, education, volunteering, and for some, eventually getting into paid employment.

HMRC Scam

Dear Sir,
I think this will be of interest for some of our older and more vulnerable readers. There is an email doing the rounds, reportedly from the HM Courts and Tribunals service detailing a fixed penalty fine for parking a vehicle.

Beware, it is a scam!

I have contacted HMRC and they have been inundated with calls about this issue.

What to look out for in the email:

1. It only says United Kingdom in location.
2. It quotes that the telephone number is currently unavailable.
3. Spelling mistakes.

If readers receive this email - DO NOT click on the link but instead forward the email to security.custcon@hmrc.gov.uk - HMRC will ONLY contact you by letter with a photograph for any driving/fixed penalty fines.

You should not give out any credit card or bank details to any person ringing or emailing you.

Happy Retirement Cath to Woodham Academy



Amidst the turmoil that presented itself in March this year, the education landscape changed in Newton Aycliffe as Cath Sewell retired from her post at the Durham School Centred Initial Teacher Training Programme (SCITT).

Cath has been a devoted servant of education in the town since starting her career at Woodham in September 1972, during which time she had significant influence over the development of generations of young people.

Cath's philosophy was very simple and was later embraced by the school as their motto 'Achievement for All'. She was a great advocate for creating an inclusive education environment in which all students could thrive. Her nurturing approach made her a firm favourite with not only students, but colleagues too. Cath began her time at Woodham as an English teacher, but it was in her role as Head of Year that she was most prominent and had the greatest influence in the development of students within the school.

Given her vast skillset, it was inevitable that she would be promoted to a position on the school leadership team. Her strategic awareness and ability to communicate and inspire staff made her an extremely valuable member of the team. In addition to all of her work within the school, Cath was a huge advocate of students learning outside of the classroom and had a great desire to support staff in a wide range of educational environments and residential visits. She regularly contributed to the staffing of overseas visits to support students in broadening their educational experiences. Although she finished her teaching role at Woodham in 2011, she still played a huge part in education, sharing her expertise and experience by training future teachers at the Durham SCITT which is managed by Woodham Academy. There will be many who have benefitted from Cath's experience and will be indebted to her as a result of her unique skillset. Whether it be staff or students, people will have been positively influenced as a result of the time they spent with Cath. All of her previous colleagues would like to wish her a very happy retirement and thank her for the contributions she has made!

Keeping People Safe in Volunteer Transport

Back in March, as the country went into lockdown, Supportive, a registered charity and not for profit organisation founded in 1994 helping people to achieve a better quality of life, immediately started to investigate how they could continue to support the people of County Durham to get to school and to much needed health appointments once restrictions were lifted.

With over 140 volunteer drivers, Supportive transport adults and children in support of Durham County Council and manage the Help to Health transport scheme in support of the Clinical Commissioning Groups.

As a significant proportion of the volunteering team are over the age of 60, and many over 70, it was important to find a way to welcome them back safely as the need for journeys began again. In conjunction with their domiciliary care service, Supportive staff dedicating time and resource and, with the application of some creative thinking, ensured the purchase of enough PPE and antibacterial solutions, made possible with added support and donations from businesses and individuals.

With safety of both passenger and volunteer driver in mind they developed a 'Safety Kit' complete with masks, wipes, googles, hand gel and gloves, held in a wipe down box with clip closing. Research was also conducted to find an easy to clean shield style solution that could be fitted to the volunteer's car easily and without damage to the vehicle, creating a barrier between the front and rear seats. After a number of sample tests, Supportive successfully found a Dutch manufacturer who supplied 100 'Driver Bubbles'.

The safety kits have been issued to all drivers and the bubbles are being fitted now to offer reassurance to passengers and give them the confidence to volunteer once more, knowing that they are prepared with safety measures in place. We are delighted to say that feedback from both passengers and the volunteer drivers has so far been very positive.

Police Will Take Enforcement Action

"I Will Leave The Reader to Judge for Themselves"

Dear Sir,

In answer to Councillor Michael Stead's poorly-researched and abusive letter in last week's issue of the Newton News. I gave the reasons why I voted against his motion quite fully last week. He alleges that I do not know what I am doing on the matter of double taxation. As the Chairman of the Larger Local Councils Committee in 2009/10, I represented the committee at the Durham County Consultative Committee and it was agreed that double taxation is unfair and obtained discretionary grants for all affected parish councils. Great Aycliffe received grants totalling £154,000 over four years.

His proposal that Great Aycliffe Town Council approach Durham County Council on its own would be doomed to failure. Durham County Council would not settle the issue with one council and ignore the claims of many other town and parish councils in County Durham.

Councillor Stead goes on to quote that 'a raft of services are provided in other areas'. He quotes three areas – Chester-le-Street, Crook and Consett.

Chester-le-Street is largely parished and has more parish councils than Aycliffe, for example Waldrige Parish Council, Pelton Parish Council, Lumley Parish Council, among others. Only the town centre and the Riverside area are unparished.

Now for Crook. Has he visited Crook and identified the raft of services provided? When I officially visited the area a number of years ago, with Councillor Bill Blenkinsopp, Crook had a welfare recreation area at Pease West (provided by the Miners' Welfare Fund) and a very nice swimming baths. I visited Crook recently and did not see any rafts of new services, but the swimming baths have been demolished.

I have not visited Consett in recent years so I am unable to comment on what is provided by Durham County Council there. I do know it received assistance from a number of agencies to help the area recover after the closure of its steelworks.

Councillor Stead goes on to say that unparished areas have wonderful flower displays, which we get from our Town Council for an additional cost. He should check his facts before he goes into print. Yes, in Newton Aycliffe we have some wonderful flower displays, especially at the entrance to the town from the A167, down Central Avenue and around St Mary's roundabout. This wonderful display was originally provided by Sedgfield Borough Council, is planted and maintained by Durham County Council and not Great Aycliffe Town Council. We do provide plants in our parks and Aycliffe Village.

He then goes on to claim that we are paying £250 a year more Council Tax than other towns, without naming them. The figure of £250 is deceptive, as 74% of the rate payers in Newton Aycliffe live in Band A-C houses and pay far less than this amount. The following figures are taken from a document 'Schedule of Council Tax by Town and Parish Councils Within Durham County Council 2020/2021'. At Band D, these are Great Aycliffe £250, Chilton £218, Easington Colliery £272, Horden £305, Peterlee £285, Seaham £246, Shildon £275.

Great Aycliffe Town Council budget is £1,717,500, of which £67,000 is paid in providing the statutory services of cemeteries and allotments. All other services which are provided are discretionary. If Councillor Stead is proposing to reduce Town Council tax he has two main avenues - Raise the charges to the public or reduce services.

As we are preparing our Medium-Term Financial Plan and next year's budget, I would be pleased to receive Councillor Stead's proposals on which specific charges he wishes to increase, and which specific services he would propose to cut. Before he does so, I suggest he visits those councils mentioned above and check the services they provide, compared to those that the residents of Great Aycliffe receive.

I find his comments on the Town Council not being run efficiently offensive. Not only to all members of the Council, but also to our excellent staff members. What does he base this comment on? We have high level, independent auditors, who examine all areas of our finances annually. Over the past 13 years, from 2006-7 we have had the highest possible results, which in audit terms are 'unqualified' which means that the auditors have no adverse comments to make on our finances. We have, however, received many positive comments, the most important being that Great Aycliffe Town

Council provides good value to its rate payers. Has Councillor Stead ever studied, or even seen, the auditors' reports before making his outrageous comments?

Councillor Stead has shown time and time again that he has not done any serious investigations to so many items in his letter, he has not done his homework.

As for his attack on my leadership, Councillor Stead knows so little about me as a person or as a councillor that I won't even comment on his allegations.

Finally, Councillor Stead states that the voters do not believe a word that we say 'satisfaction surveys carried out in 2017 and 2019 showed that 79% and 87% of those responded thought Great Aycliffe Town Council provided very good services and value for money'.

In my opinion, Councillor Stead is not really interested in the £5.61 that he pays per year to Durham County Council and double taxation. That is 10p per week (if he saves it for a fortnight, he will be able to buy a carrier bag). No, it is all about next year's County Council and Town Council elections. Why do I believe that? On seeing the motion that Councillor Stead presented to the Council, I sensed that all was not as it seemed so a number of enquiries were made to other councils and lo and behold we discovered that identical (down to every sentence, letter and full stop) motions were also put before Spennymoor and Shildon Town Councils. When confronted with these facts, Councillor Stead admitted in Council that this was a Liberal Party motion, that was being presented to other councils in the area. So, did Councillor Stead compose the motion or was it composed by person or persons outside of Aycliffe in an effort to discredit the County Council and Town Council. This was an underhand move at the very best, so who was really trying to pull the wool over who's eyes? I will leave the reader to judge.

Eldon Fire Could Burn for Some Time

Dear Sir,
It has emerged that a waste site which has been on fire for weeks was the subject of numerous complaints from residents in the area prior to the blaze. The former Eldon Brickworks site, just a few miles from Newton Aycliffe has been on fire since Monday, 31st August



and is set to continue burning for some time.

The fire has prompted Lib Dem councillors to call for a full investigation into what has happened at the site and a full review of waste sites across County Durham. They believe more needs to be done to ensure potential fires are avoided in the future. Cllr. Mark Wilkes, Lib Dem shadow portfolio holder for neighbourhoods and climate change on Durham County Council, said: "It is very clear that the Council and others have been aware of problems with this site for some time, and we have discovered that some conditions of the original planning application were not implemented. Given the public health impact of what has happened, we believe there must be a full review of all waste sites across County Durham to make sure that they are safe for the environment, for local residents, and for those working at them."

Great Aycliffe Town Councillor, Michael Stead, who visited the site this week comments: "I am getting regular complaints from residents about the smell from the burning of this toxic waste. Some residents with existing health issues are really struggling. We need to know how much longer this is going to last."

The waste at the site is being control-burned for safety reasons and fumes can be smelt across whole swathes of County Durham. A multi agency team is working with site owners to address the problem.

It appears that as much as 4000 tonnes of waste was stored at the site. The site was only licensed for specific types of waste but general household waste was being stored at the site. Labour-run Durham County Council has been aware of problems at the site for some time.

Lib Dem Cllr. Stead says, "With such serious public health issues, some serious questions need answering. We have asked for a specific investigation in to what has happened at this site. I'm really concerned about people's health."

Cllr. Stead has had residents contact him including one resident in Woodham who says their relative is really concerned due to having a lung condition.

Lib Dem councillors are also questioning if national agencies have the resources they need and believe residents should be getting proper updates on the fire.

Official Opposition Leader on Durham County Council, Amanda Hopgood, (Lib Dem) comments, "We need to be certain that the Environment Agency has the resources it needs to monitor these sites, and we have written to them asking various questions."

"However it is also clear that residents across the south of the County feel there has been a lack of adequate communication by our Labour-run council and their partners."

Lib Dem councillors have contacted various County Council Departments, the Environment Agency, Public Health and County Durham & Darlington Fire and Rescue Service over the issue.

The FA Vase gets underway this weekend despite last season's final not having been played yet. The Consett / Hebburn final should have been played at Wembley on Sunday 27th September. However, this has now been postponed by the FA following the latest govt restrictions.

Meanwhile the 2020/2021 competition gets underway on Saturday 19th September. Colin Stromsoy will be hoping his side can make amends for their early exit from the FA Cup. Barnoldswick Town of the North West Counties League will be the visitors to the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium. It won't be their first visit. Aycliffe beat them 3-0 in 2015/2016 in what proved to be our most successful Vase season, reaching the fifth round.

Newton Aycliffe were due to travel to Whitley Bay on Tuesday 22nd September. However, that game has been postponed as Bay will be playing in the FA Cup that night. It's one of two fixtures which are awaiting a new date. 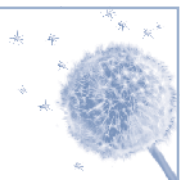

LET THE SECRETS UNFOLD



With roots planted firmly in Newton Aycliffe, Paul Howarth, editor of the Newton News, catches up with Arden Grant, a high school friend and author of, 'The Fuzidon, Will you die to live again?' Clinching a FREE read deal for his avid readers in a candid conversation, Paul asks about Arden's life journey and finds out where the inspiration came from to write his epic thriller - one that interlinks three worlds.

The Interview

Paul: "I bump into some of your siblings at times when they come into the shop. How many brothers and sisters do you have?"

Arden: "Four and four. I'm the second youngest of nine, making it five brothers.

Paul: "When you finished school at the Avenue Comprehensive, what did you do? As I remember you had a passion for cars."

Arden: "I suppose most teenagers did back then, until you pulled up in a van splashed with Night Owl Roadshow across it. I never figured you for a DJ?" (Paul laughed).

Paul: "I believe that was around the same time you opened your first business on Aycliffe Industrial Estate?"

Arden: "Yes, kit cars. I was a young, budding entrepreneur. It was short lived, though I did manage to make the front cover of some car magazine after exhibiting at the Great Aycliffe Show."

Paul: "What made you decide to leave your home town?"

Arden: "That's a loaded question."

Paul: "Would you care to elaborate?"

Arden: "Back then I was going through a lot of soul searching. But I recall one specific night when I was at an all-time low. The air was brisk. The sky was clear. Filled with frustrations, I walked to the garden gate and looked to the stars. I began muttering my inner thoughts aloud, questioning my purpose, like one does in difficult times. All of a sudden, a rush of adrenalin coursed through my veins. My heart raced, it was hard to breath. My hands started to shake. It was only moments, but it scared me. I felt my life was about to come to an abrupt end."

Paul: "Did this ever happen again?"

Arden: "Once in 2006. Maybe we'll come back to that later."

Paul: "Then let's talk about the time between then and now. Tell me a bit about your life, where you were, what career path you took before you decided to write."

Arden: "I don't think we've got a year to spare. But I'll paint you the

picture in broad strokes. Over the course of two decades I went in search of my destiny. I travelled a fair portion of the world starting in Europe. I connected to a few business owners. Being entrepreneurial I negotiated a deal paid on results. I felt I could do a better job than what others had been doing for them. It was a long shot but I was motivated. With no risk to them, it worked out and new doors of opportunity opened. After that, I travelled globally, both as a trainer, trouble shooter and sales director for companies in hospitality and real estate sectors."

Paul: "Did you miss your home town?"

Arden: "I did, but when you're living in the moment, it's rare to get time for yourself, and even harder to revisit family back home."

Paul: "Any regrets?"

Arden: "Sure, many. To others, it might seem a glorious way to live, in reality, it was a pressure cooker. Like New Yorkers said to me, five years in the Big Apple is like one in Europe."

Paul: "So when did you realise your years went by so quickly?"

Arden: "The day I saw you again." Arden laughed.

Paul: "Very funny. I see you never lost your sense of humour. So when exactly did you decide to change your career direction?"

Arden: "That was about five years ago, that's when I decided to write more seriously. But three years ago, writing became my primary focus."

Paul: "Your novel is somewhat of an epic, my wife's read it and her words after finishing it were, I want more! Where did the inspiration behind such a tale come from?"

Arden: "Well, the truth is quite unbelievable."

Paul: "I'm sure we would all like to know."

Arden: "Do you remember the opening scene in chapter two of my book?"

Paul: "I do."

Arden: "Putting the fiction aside, that morning when cold winds blew, drizzle fell, and dark clouds met with crashing waves, in reality that was me in 2006, jogging barefoot along the beach. Just like the time I mentioned walking to the garden gate, a short time before I left Aycliffe, I spoke out once more in frustration. Actually, I screamed."

Paul: "And is this when you felt that same sensation for the second time?"

Arden: "Yes, but on this occasion as adrenalin flowed, a story so vivid and overwhelming gushed into mind, swamping all other thoughts I had. Stupefied, I froze for a few moments. Afraid I'd lose the narrative thrown my way, I ran to a small beach shack and scribbled on more than fifty paper napkins."

Paul: "And that's how the story came to you?"

Arden: "The skeleton outline, yes. The storyline was a gift, yet a gift that taunted me to write and rewrite time and time again, until it all made sense and I typed the words, The End. Bizarre, isn't it, how the universe challenges you before it gives back?"

Paul: "Which means?"

Arden: "This is what I asked for Paul, back at the garden gate, all those years ago. It seems I had to have first lived life's course, to become worthy to have been handed this particular tale!"

Paul: "Then it's been a long journey."

Arden: "That it has, and yet the end is just beginning."

Last week started with me attending what is known as a Delegated Legislation Committee (DL). This particular DL was on the industrial training levy for the engineering construction industry and enacted for the levy from industry to be continued to support industrial training. This was passed unanimously by all parties.

Last Wednesday was National Farming Day and I was proud to be able to support our farmers in Westminster after Prime Ministers Questions. On Thursday I was pleased to join the launch of the Climate Assembly UK and its report on the path to 'Net Zero'. This was an assembly of people from all demographics and regions and provided very valuable contributions to the debate on our future path. Later in the day I contributed to the debates on Aviation, where I supported the value of regional airports like Teesside, and on Tourism where my focus was on the difficulties facing the coach industry, and I was able to reference them as the glue that connects all aspects of tourism.

Friday was a "sitting Friday" which happens several times a year. I participated in debates and I was pleased to be able to voice my support on the importance of Credit Unions within communities before travelling back to Sedgfield. As you may have seen in the press, in the early evening the Prime Minister held a zoom call with many Conservative MP's and I joined the call. This was to inform us personally about the Internal Markets Bill to be debated this week.

Over the weekend I went to see Newton Aycliffe draw 1-1 with Shildon at Moore Lane in the Northern League and then saw part of the young cricket 2nds playing Maltby. It was a lovely Saturday afternoon for watching and playing sport and it was great to see people enjoying themselves, of course with sensible social distancing employed. I hope to get there again next week to see the final game of the season for Newton Aycliffe cricket first team.

This Monday started with support for national Road Safety by firstly a trip to Dean Bank School to talk to an assembly, then supporting the neighbourhood police team in their efforts in Newton Aycliffe.

I then travelled to Westminster for the Internal Markets Bill. There has been a lot of emotive debate suggesting that this was a vote to break the law. This is not the case, the vote was to give the Bill a second reading and move it to the committee stage. At this point more detail is examined and amendments considered. There is also a context in which to consider the potential scale or significance of a potential dispute between UK law as mandated by Parliament and EU legislation through the Withdrawal Agreement. The European Court of Auditors stated in September that 15 EU states had breached EU rules in agreeing bilateral commercial deals, the German courts have ruled that they had the ability to determine when and if Germany is subordinate to EU law. This Bill is working on the same premise that, as stated in section 38 of the European Union (Withdrawal) Act 2020, that the Parliament of the UK is Sovereign.

The Bill strengthens our Union in many ways and is intended to put in place a last resort "break glass" clause to be used as in an absolute last resort should the EU effectively break the law by acting in bad faith in the Joint Committee. I absolutely hope that negotiations will, as intended, find a way to resolve checks to Northern Ireland through the protocol or a new free trade agreement and I was pleased with the Prime Minister's assurances that we will continue to use mechanisms such as the joint committee to resolve disputes. I voted in favour of a second reading of this bill.

I have received many, very vocal representations, on this Bill from constituents who have strong views in both directions. I will consider all views as we continue the debate on this over the coming days and I look forward to listening and learning more about this incredibly important subject before voting on its further stages.

We are all aware that we are seeing some increases in Covid positive tests, both nationally and close to our region. Please can I implore everyone to do the right thing to look after you, your friends and family and the broader population. Please wash your hands regularly, wear a face mask when required and give people as much space as practical. All of these actions are proven to drastically reduce transmission and increase the prospect of us all having as "normal" a life as possible.

If you need a test then information is available at www.durham.gov.uk/coronavirus where there is information on help and assistance available for anyone who may struggle to self-isolate. Help can also be accessed by calling the County Durham Together hub on 03000 260 260 between 9.00am until 5.00pm Monday to Friday. Testing capacity has increased substantially but the demand has increased even faster, if you have problems sourcing a test please let us know and we will do our best to help.

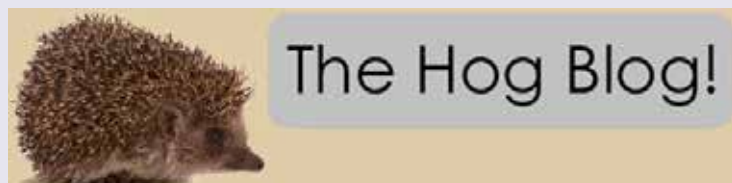
ACTUAL DEMOCRACY

Crafters Brave the Chop for The Little Princess Trust

Two women have raised more than £1000 for The Little Princess Trust after donating their long locks to the charity. Olivia McHale and Hillary Delve, who work at Crafter's Companion based in Newton Aycliffe, recently had seven inches and 14 inches respectively, cut off at The Salon in Coundon. Throughout the past few weeks the pair have also been fundraising for the charity, managing to smash their £600 target by raising more than £1000. This is the first time Olivia has donated her hair to The Little Princess Trust and Hillary's second time, the first being in March 2018. The hair has been sent to the charity and will be made into special wigs.

The Little Princess Trust provides free real hair wigs to children and young people, up to 24 years, who have lost their own hair through cancer treatment or other conditions.

Established in 2006, the charity has supplied over 8000 wigs to children and young people and has invested approximately £5 million into ground-breaking childhood cancer research.

Hillary said: "My reason for supporting The Little Princess Trust is that they don't just help children and young people with just one particular illness. They focus on supporting the mental health of all children with any life-altering illness and I am overjoyed that we have been able to raise some money for them."

Olivia said: "The reason I wanted to get involved was that, while we haven't had childhood cancer or any sort of illnesses that causes



hair loss in our family, I saw the effect that the chemotherapy treatments had on my grandma and how her confidence took a knock after losing her hair.

"She had a fake hair wig that she didn't enjoy wearing so she stuck to head coverings. I know that if she had a real hair wig, that was similar to her style, she would've been a lot happier. I can only imagine what sort of effect that losing your hair would have on a child or young person, so I feel really strongly about the charity and the work it does."

Can He Do It, No He Can't!

Dear Sir,

Cllr. Stead's campaign to cut your council tax is a lie.

New candidates do turn up from time to time claiming this and they are always popular! But they are talking nonsense about things they do not understand. (Or do understand, but are happy to lie for the chance of a £13k allowance.)

HOW IS THIS?

About 15% of your 'council tax' bill does not go to the Council at all, it is the money you pay towards the Fire and Police services. Cllr. Stead will NOT be able to change that. Of the rest, slightly under three quarters goes towards funding the revenue services of Durham County Council (DCC).

Council services divide into two types, 'statutory' (services required by law), and 'discretionary' (services the council chooses to provide for the benefit of residents). After ten years of government cuts requiring savings of a quarter of a billion pounds a year by the County Council, almost all remaining DCC services are statutory (and cut to the bone). Because of this, DCC has little leeway to reduce its costs (and its Council Tax). Cllr. Stead will NOT be able to find any major savings at DCC.

Finally, the Town Council does provide some discretionary services, and these are included in the 11% of your overall council tax bill which goes to the Town Council. Therefore, as a Town Councillor, it is true Cllr. Stead might have some leeway to suggest some cuts there, which will reduce your council tax bill.

HOWEVER:

1. For all his boasts, and after three months on the Town Council, he sat in this year's budget meeting and failed to come up with a single suggestion to reduce your council tax.
2. Don't forget that every time the Town Council has suggested cutting one of its discretionary services (e.g. Santa Tours, Fireworks display) the opposition has whipped up an outcry to STOP it.
3. Even if Cllr. Stead gets the County Council's Double Taxation grant restored, the cost of that will have to be added to the DCC element of your Council Tax bill, and Cllr. Clare has calculated that it would knock just 10p a week off the Town Council element of your bill.

Cllr. Stead's campaign to reduce your council tax is a deception and a fraud upon your intelligence. We doubt Cllr. Stead has a clue HOW he intends to reduce your Council Tax Bill by any significant amount. We challenge Cllr. Stead to come up with some costed suggestions, and to tell us how much they will reduce our council tax bill. We predict that it will boil down to dark (and untrue) mutterings about 'efficiency' and mythical 'reserves'.

(And, PS: Cllr. Stead, don't forget to run your suggestions past your LibDem masters before you comment. This year the only thing they suggested at Budget was to spend £½ million MORE!)

TWO RESPONSES

Dear Sir,

In response to criticisms in last week's Newton News:

(1) DECLARING AN INTEREST

Cllr. Chandran knows full well that the rules do not allow a councillor to take part in a decision which might affect them financially. Since double taxation will affect Durham County Council, which pays my councillor's allowance, I consulted the DCC legal officers, who informed me in writing that, yes, I should declare an interest.

I am sure Cllr. Chandran thinks he knows better. But what kind of councillor do you want - one who breaks the rules if it suits him, or councillors like the five County Councillors who listened to the legal advice?

The other reason I left the meeting, of course, is that DCC Councillors see a different side to double taxation to the Town Councillors, and I felt it important that, on this issue, the decision should be the Town Council's alone. As it was, the Town Councillors saw through Cllr. Stead's electioneering motion and turned it down; but can you imagine what the opposition would be saying now if any County Councillors' votes had been included in that result - I suspect they would be shouting 'FINANCIAL INTEREST!' just as loudly as they are crying 'DISGUSTED!' now.

(2) DOUBLE TAXATION

I am the County Councillor whom Cllr. Robson acknowledged had written about double taxation "in a lucid and intelligent way" on social media, and you can read what I wrote here: bit.ly/DTmotion Double Taxation is NOT a clash between councillors who care about Newton Aycliffe and those who do not. It is a wrangle between the Town Council and the County Council about which of them should pay for certain services.

In short, the Town Council provides some services that, strictly, it need not provide, but does so because it believes that it can do so in a more immediate and informed way. It just thinks that the County Council ought to help with the costs.

The inevitability of that matter however is that - whichever Council stumps up - we are going to have to hand over some of our Council Tax to pay for those services.

The difference it would make to our Council Tax bill is, genuinely, pennies.
