It was an inevitability that this club would be formed just over a year ago. There has always been a massive degree of interest in beekeeping in Newton Aycliffe, particularly amongst the allotment holders in the town and Roger Chappel (Aycliffe BKA chairman) has held regular talks with senior members of the Great Aycliffe Town Council for several years. For one reason or another nothing happened until, that is, 2019. Roger is a 'veteran' with over 25 years beekeeping experience behind him and he held the post of secretary of the largest beekeeping association in the country: the Yorkshire BKA for nearly 10 years. Over a period spanning nearly 15 years Roger has been instrumental in helping local beekeeping groups get started on limited resources not only in the Yorkshire area but also in County Durham. Thanks to his close links with Durham BKA he was able, with the support of the Great Aycliffe Town Council and a small group of loyal beekeepers, to lay the foundations of Aycliffe BKA in late 2018. Since then, there has been an upsurge in interest and the new association currently has over 100 members from the area around Newton Aycliffe with members as far afield as Shildon, Ferryhill, Bishop Auckland, Spennymoor, the Trimdons and Hurworth.

What is the secret of their success? A passion for bees and a nononsense, no fuss, no frills approach with the welfare of the bees and members at the very heart of everything they do.

Aycliffe BKA now have a well-established teaching apiary at the St. Oswalds allotment site (off Hylton Close) and have ambitious plans to open up others in the town. Regular courses are run for beginners (they're on hold at the moment due to the coronavirus restrictions) and meetings are held at the Eco-Centre on Moore Lane and at the Oakleaf

All our beekeepers get a buzz out of helping others look after bees in a friendly and supportive atmosphere and the committee have already created a happy sociable environment which enables everyone to enjoy this rewarding and fulfilling pastime. At the same time we are doing our bit to sustain the environment and to help the planet - what better way is there to spend some leisure time?

Most Cyclists Unaware of Highway Code Rules

Dear Sir.

A few weeks ago, a letter concerning this subject by Alan Atkinson was printed in the Newton News. I, having a similar outlook to Alan, arranged to meet and discuss the matter, and though Alan had some other issues, we agreed in full about the main one, and that is "cyclists using footpaths". For some reason cyclists seem to have got the idea that any footpath is also a cyclepath, not only is a footpath not a cyclepath, using one as such is against the highway code; rule 62 instructs on a certain level of conduct.

Both of these codes of conduct are not being ignored, they are basically unknown to the bike riders in question, because there is no set down standard for riding a bicycle, no test to be passed, no registration of a vehicle, no test as to the worthiness of the bike, and no personal insurance needed, the bike will usually be ridden by a child and I doubt that the parents can even be held responsible, if, however, the cyclist collides with a pedestrian, accidentally or otherwise. The parents of that child might even seek some form of retribution or other, from the pedestrian!

About a month ago, I was walking on a footpath when a boy aged, I guess between 14 and 16, came barrelling toward me, I stopped walking and simply stood where I was. He rode up to me and stopped because he could not pass unless I stepped off the path either into the muddy verge or onto the road. "This is a footpath" I said, "I know that you stupid ******dork", was his reply. I pointed out that he had left a cyclepath in favour of this route, but that only got me another round of abuse, at that I left the scene. I decided that the situation was going to become physical, and that although this boy was as big as an average man, I would still be found guilty of child abuse, probably even if I had come off worse.

We are being encouraged to become ecologically aware, and more responsible,

but it becomes harder all the time to commit to being a pedestrian. I am physically fit and all my faculties work, I shudder to think what it's like if you have a disability, let's say blind, deaf, walking problems or even mental problems which cause anxiety.

This situation is only going to get worse and become like it has in the cities of the south where people are mugged and robbed by cyclists, who are, by the grace of the aforementioned lack of traceability, able to cycle away laughing.

Writing to the local press is not going to solve this problem, it needs people to get behind it in quantity, and though you may not use the footpath much, somebody near and dear to you probably does. I have also written to my local councillor, who will bring the matter before the police; but if you agree with any of this you need to make yourself known. To those of you who might read this, but go everywhere by car, I suggest you try this - GET OUT OF THE CAR.

Find a crossing point on a road (not a zebra), you will identify this by some concrete bobbles on the pavement, put there for the benefit of the blind and before trying to cross, shut your eyes and put your fingers in your ears, now cross when you think it is safe, if you dare - and then try to imagine being in this disabled state as a cyclist comes hurtling past you on a narrow footpath from behind, at speed and without warning.

If you are a responsible guardian of a cyclist, you could check to see that Code Rule 64 is understood and that, where necessary, Code Rule 62 is observed. You should be sure that the cycle is up to safety standard and has an audible means of declaring it's presence. POLICE: Well we know you are busy, what with the fact that you are naturally short of staff and of course Covid, but it really is your job to get these bikes off the street and, if needed, into the crusher, before someone gets hurt.

DECLARING AN INTEREST

Dear Sir,

Cllr. Clare stated recently that "Cllr. Chandran knows full well that the rules do not allow a councillor to take part in a decision which might affect them financially. Since double taxation will affect Durham County Council, which pays my councillor's allowance, I consulted the DCC legal officers, who informed me in writing that, yes, I should declare an interest. I am sure Cllr. Chandran thinks he knows better.

But what kind of councillor do you want - one

who breaks the rules if it suits him, or councillors like the five County Councillors who listened to the legal advice?"

The challenge is to see through the fog of rhetoric and conflicting

FACTS:

The Localism Act 2011, dealt with the issues concerned. The Minister of State in Hansard on 16th January 2013 stated: "The simple fact is that one cannot identify a disclosable pecuniary interest that relates to the setting of council tax. A beneficial interest in land is probably the nearest to that, but that interest is clearly not materially affected by the setting of council tax" and "The key point is that the advice being given to councillors that they cannot do that is wrong. They can do it and, actually, that is how we represent our residents."

So concerned was the Minister of State that on 5th February 2012 he wrote to all leaders of Local Authorities stating: "As you will know, the Localism Act 2011 abolished the last Administration's bureaucratic and controversial Standards Board regime." Furthermore he stated in a letter to all Leaders of Local Authorities

"that some council monitoring officers are informing their councillors that being a council tax payer is a disclosable pecuniary interest in any Budget debate. Councillors are then informed they would be committing a criminal offence if they speak or vote in that debate unless they obtain a formal dispensation.

Whilst my department does not issue legal advice, in our opinion, such dispensations are unnecessary. Council tax liability applies to the generality of the population; councillors have no unique position in that regard. Being a council tax payer or being eligible for a discount under the new local arrangements for council tax support are pecuniary interests, but are not disclosable pecuniary interests as specified in regulations. Therefore, a councillor does not need to seek a dispensation in order to participate in discussions or vote on decisions in the council tax setting process or local arrangements for

I made this clear in the Parliamentary debate, which I would encourage you to read. I believe that the blanket act of every councillor declaring the obvious (that residents are liable for council tax) adds nothing to that cause. Indeed, Section 106 of the Local Government Finance Act 1992 prohibits councillors who are in council tax arrears (by two or more months) from voting on Budgets. So there is a clear expectation that the generality of councillors are paying council tax. I hope this is helpful in reducing your council's unnecessary administrative paperwork. Council tax liability applies to the generality of the population; councillors have no unique position in that regard".

Councillor Clare, yes I do know better. Since 2012 every Council and its Councillors and Monitoring Officers should also know the law on that issue. In the Newton News, nearly 10 years ago, I did publicly challenge all County Councillors to prove me wrong, check with their County Solicitor/Monitoring Officers . . . but answer came there none.

Cllr. Clare was absolutely happy to put his case on double taxation on Facebook, he admitted he could have applied for a dispensation to speak in Town Council but decided not to!

The Town Clerk would happily put any dispensation to the meeting but, none there came. The Law says quite clearly, clarified by the Minister of State in 2012, any councillor can speak and vote on Budgetary Matters especially if you wear two hats ie: on Town and County Council, there is no pecuniary interest, no dispensation required.

Just occasionally one has to put the facts in the public domain, the five Labour County Councillors were wrong to declare interests and wrong to leave the meeting. Guess what? In May 2021 you the public can drain the swamp . . . again.

On Thursday 27th August my wife, Edith, was involved in an accident outside the town centre. Unable to walk and having not been out since March, due to the virus, she needed to go personally to the bank, straight there and straight back.

We parked in the dedicated disabled car park off Greenwell Road. I was pushing her in her wheelchair out of the car park when a gentleman stopped his car to allow us to cross the road to the opposite dropped kerb which takes you up the ramp to the arcade.

I proceeded to cross the road and suddenly the front wheels jammed, the back shot up and catapulted my wife into the middle of the road. Many people shot across to help but she was in a state of shock and her legs were buckling under her and, try as we may, we could not lift her. Luckily a chap saw us and came across and lifted her himself into her wheelchair.

The first aiders from the leisure centre came out and checked her over and pushed her into the arcade themselves. After going to the bank we went back to the car, getting in her knees buckled and she ended up sitting on the car sill. Once again a chap came over and after a struggle we got her into the car. Next day she phoned the doctors who sent an ambulance, subsequently, x-rays of her leg and arm show a fracture to both. Gladly she is now on the mend.

My wife and I would like to offer our sincere thanks to all the people that assisted us, especially the two very strong gentleman who, without them, we would have been in a right pickle. Another big thank you to the first aiders from the leisure centre.

When I checked the place of the accident, I found a gap of road missing, up to 70mm wide and over 40mm deep in parts across nearly half the entrance/exit to the car park.

This car park is solely for blue badge holders, who can't walk or have difficulty in walking. It is a serious tripping hazard at best, but a death trap for a wheelchair user. It has been reported but still not repaired, so if you use this car park, be very careful. F Clement

Parliament Talk

Last week started with a meeting with a local trust who are the Secretariat for the All Party Political Group (APPG) for left behind communities that I chair. This was to consider our future work and in particular the next meeting which I will cover later.

On Thursday I had a question in the Transport oral questions, where I raised the importance of integrated transport and invited the minister to come and understand the needs of linking local bus transport for places like Cornforth. After this I was in the BEIS select committee where the focus of our attention was understanding the technical aspects of the One Web investment proposals, which was very informative and interesting and I look forward to further debate in this area.

On Friday I had a regular virtual meeting with the Tees Valley MP's as well as discussions with local businesses and visits from constituents to the office. Later I called in to The Big Club to see their approach to the new restrictions that we find ourselves following. These interventions were introduced as a result of Durham County Council and their northern neighbours approaching the Government to request an intervention due to increased Covid cases. I finished the day with a visit to a constituent in Hurworth. On Saturday I met Ian Palmer as Newton Aycliffe cricket club first team played their last game of the season and discussed the need to support their efforts to improve their changing facilities. After this my wife and I took a walk around Middridge and picked blackberries on the path to the railway and back past the quarry.

Monday was another full day starting with a call with the Darlington group, followed by a discussion on local transport and in particular the future agendas to our north. After this I joined the veterans APPG, in particular to understand the bill being debated on Wednesday, I also was able to listen to a webinar on the role of tax in a green recovery.

Tuesday started with me a DL (Delegated Legislation) committee on coronavirus restrictions affecting Greencore before continuing the transport discussion from Monday. After lunch it was the next full meeting of the APPG on Left Behind Communities, that I am joint chair of, we listened to speakers on Social Infrastructure and Social Inclusion.

Over Monday and Tuesday there were also a number of debates on the Internal Markets Bill which I supported the Government on, this reinforces the law for trade within the internal markets of the UK post Brexit, I had put in to speak but was drawn 48, but the debate timed out at speaker 44. I was pleased to see the Government listen to us back benchers and bring in an amendment requiring a further vote in Parliament should the Joint Committee effectively break international law by not acting in good faith before we then enact the "break glass" legislation that has been put in place to protect our interests. Wednesday, we debated the Overseas Operations (Service Personnel and Veterans) Bill, the primary focus of which was to prevent our service personnel suffering vexatious claims driven by lawyers. I look forward to supporting this Bill.

To let you know, the variety of items in our inbox this week include TUC petitions, the Internal Markets Bill, the Overseas Operations Bill, Covid measures and cat microchipping.

As I am sure you will all be aware, we are entering a critical phase with Covid-19 and I get many representations around the measures being implemented, these range from those who think it is all a complete hoax to those that want stricter enforcement. I would implore all of you to think of each other and follow the guidance given and respect the restrictions imposed. It might be inconvenient or difficult, but it is the right thing to do to protect our communities. So please wash your hands regularly, wear masks when appropriate and give each other space.

Over 50 Apprentices on the **Husqvarna Career Ladder**

Over 50 people are working towards careers with Husqvarna thanks to a successful partnership between the lawnmower manufacturer and GEM Training.

The Peterlee-based company, which provides tailored training and apprenticeships specifically developed for its clients, has been working with the Newton Aycliffe firm for some time and has supplied over 500 temporary workers into the company.

The relationship is helping Husqvarna nurture its next generation workforce, and currently there are 53 people who have completed apprenticeships or are in the process of undertaking programmes. Impressively, many of those apprenticeships have been completed during the coronavirus lockdown, when training and development delivery has had to be significantly adapted to ensure learners were able to continue with their training.

Up to now, GEM Training, which is part of GEM Partnership, has helped 33 people complete an 'Improving Operational Performance: Business-Improvement Techniques, Level: 2' apprenticeship and the company is now in the process of developing some of these apprentices further with a qualification in team leading with the potential of developing from a multi-skilled operator to becoming a line leader.

Kelly Lee, Operations Manager at GEM Training, said: "Our partnership with Husqvarna is thriving with over 50 employees currently completing bespoke apprenticeships which have been specifically developed to meet the needs of Husqvarna. It's also about upskilling current employees to equip them with the qualifications they need to progress through the ranks.

"What we've been particularly impressed with is the attitude and commitment of the apprentices during the months of lockdown. How we trained them had to be significantly adapted, and of course Husqvarna wasn't operating in the usual way either, but all remained 100 per cent committed to their development and that's backed up by the fact 33 of them have completed their Level 2 programmes. "In fact, some are looking to progress in team leading which is fantastic and shows their willingness to push themselves, but also Husqvarna's belief in them.

Husqvarna has also supported two people through BEng Mechanical Engineering qualifications from Teesside University, from which they recently graduated, and both are now aiming to grow with Husqvarna, becoming project engineers before progressing into management roles.

Rufus Ayre from Husqvarna, which is based on Aycliffe Business Park, said: "Attracting talent into our business and nurturing that talent is an integral element of our growth plans. Our partnership with GEM Training is really enhancing our business development. GEM Training has also recently supported Husqvarna in the recruiting of a supply chain administrator.

Rufus added: "The team at GEM Training made the recruitment process seamless, supporting us through the interview process which was done via Teams due to the ongoing coronavirus restrictions. The successful candidate is now nicely embedded within the Husqvarna team and proving to be a real asset." The apprenticeships offered by GEM Training range from Level 2 through to Level 5 and there are further plans to recruit additional apprentices for Husqvarna over the next 12 months.



Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report

The Cummings Effect

Dear Sir,

More and more, I hear people dismiss "lockdown" measures, with people expressing indifference to defiance.

It wasn't like that in March, there was a genuine community spirit and, largely, a high degree of compliance. But that has gone. Because again, and again, I hear the name "Cummings" spoken out loud.

Good for the Goose and Gander Cummings, almost single-handedly, destroyed any semblance of public-spirited cooperation and respect for the rules with his jaunt to Barnard Castle.

When willing cooperation goes, all you have left is coercion. Uniformed thugs with sticks, tasers and the rest of their array of weapons – enforcing the will of a state which has lost the trust of its people.

No better measure of that loss of trust is the announcement of fines, growing rapidly to £10,000 for those who fail to follow lockdown rules – a level of absurdity when imposed on most people who simply cannot afford that sort of money.

The lack of proportionality speaks of panic, a government which has lost control – and knows it. Thus, it gives license to its uniformed thugs to impose ridiculous penalties, in the hope that fear will induce compliance, where respect for the rule of law has vanished.

Underlying this also is a sense of drift. I haven't met anyone who believes that this government has a grip on this epidemic or had any confidence that it knew what it was doing.

Under emergency powers, with no Parliamentary Scrutiny or legitimacy, we are legally obliged to self-isolate if we have a positive test result or the risible NHS Test and Trace empire tells us to. The task of tracing infected and potentially infected people is already

difficult, but Johnson has just ensured that a huge tranche of people will now stay outside the system, rather than expose themselves to the risk of a draconian fine.

So, who in their right mind is going to get a test unless absolutely necessary, if the consequence is a £10K fine for not doing what you're told to?

Johnson's rationale is still "to prevent the most vulnerable people from becoming infected, and to protect the NHS and save lives". Thus, we're getting more of the "protect the NHS" schtick, where its conversion into the National Covid Service has cost, is costing, and will cost thousands of lives. Denise Welch hits the nail on the head on Youtube.

Instead of keeping infected patients out of the hospitals by using the Nightingale ones, the NHS is clearing the decks again, to make way for a surge that will prevent the proper functioning of the service. This, however, is so typical of this government. In the "us and them" stakes; it can mess up without a hint of penalty, leaving "us" to be heavily penalised as the government ploughs on regardless. This government clearly does not have a grip on what is now an endemic virus, and it has nothing left in the cupboard – except ever-increasing fines. And what then? Do squads of bailiffs chase up the people who can't or won't pay – or does Johnson send them to prison?

People will now identify "test and trace" as a coercive arm of the state. What little residual cooperation and community spirit there was has just evaporated. The bully boys and their big sticks have taken over, and the state has become the oppressor.

Johnson and his crew couldn't have made a bigger mess of this than they have done to date, but one might take some little comfort from that fact that he still has the capacity to surprise.

County Durham Leisure Centres Remain Open

Residents in County Durham are being reminded they can still visit the county's leisure centres and take part in fitness classes. Following the introduction of new restrictions aimed at reducing the spread of coronavirus, Durham County Council is carrying out further work to ensure its leisure centres remain coronavirus secure.

A number of measures have been introduced to make sure centres are safe to visit, including strict cleaning regimes, extra space or safety screens between equipment and additional signage to help users move safely around the buildings.

Work has been carried out by the council's building and facilities maintenance team to put these measures in place to make the venues as safe as possible. Weekly checks will be carried out and any changes implemented where necessary to keep people safe and in response to any modification to Government guidelines.

Users must also book their sessions in advance to limit the number of people inside and ensure they're following the latest guidance when entering and leaving leisure centres and when inside.

Members have welcomed the new measures and safe re-opening. Paul Reavely, who attends Zumba classes in Spennymoor, said: "I've been wanting to come back for a while now. Zumba is my favourite class and I've been suffering with my mental health, so it's good for me to come here. I like the setup as you're socially distanced and you have your own space. It's a big load off my mind coming here after a long day at work as I can just relax when I get home. I'd encourage people to come back. It's really good for your all-round wellbeing, your mental health and your fitness. It is brilliant."

During these financially uncertain times, the council is offering a non-contract membership to new members with no joining fee.

Available until 31 October, this will give people the chance to access leisure centres and fitness classes without being tied in when residents may have concerns around their finances.

To coincide with the launch of National Fitness Week, the county's leisure centres have also offered free taster sessions to non-members to give them an opportunity to try out the facilities. It's hoped more of these will be offered in the future.

Cllr Carl Marshall, Cabinet member for economic regeneration, said: "We've worked incredibly hard to make sure our leisure centres provide a safe environment for everyone and that we minimise the risk of the spread of coronavirus. We'd like to remind people that they continue to be safe and remain open for users.

"We understand that these are difficult times for everyone. As well as worrying about the virus, many of our residents have concerns about the financial impact of the ongoing pandemic. However, it's vital that we look after our health and wellbeing and that's one of the reasons we'd like to offer people the chance to access our facilities without them feeling tied into a contract that they must continue to pay for. We hope this helps some of them get back into exercise safely without any additional pressures and we look forward to welcoming new members across the county."

Alongside these new leisure offers, the council is supporting a range of wellbeing activities across the county to encourage people to keep active and protect their health and wellbeing.

Next week marks the start of Bike to School Week which celebrates cycling to school and the benefits of active travel for children. This could provide families with a great alternative to public transport during the pandemic, allowing them to stay healthy and safely distanced from others.

Prickly Haven have been very fortunate to receive donations and support from some wonderful people, firstly June Heron and Will, Mandy and Trish, Tara, Viv, Karen and Val because they are always passing stuff to me to either keep the hogs happy and comfy in Rescue or supplying some wonderful car boot items, we try to do one car boot sale a week to keep this rescue afloat financially, especially now, because a lot of our little ones will be here till spring. Most of us who save these little ones take them into our homes, raise money to feed, house and provide 24hour critical care for these downtrodden little mammals because we love them so much and will stop at nothing to treat, rehabilitate, which leads to release back to the wild and, if necessary, somewhere a lot safer than where we found them. None of this would be possible of course without our wonderful Vets close by who are always there for our prickly babies. On a more serious note, we are having a lot of problems with hedgehogs being attacked by dogs. On Monday evening of this week, a 500 gram female, she wasn't a big girl by any means but when I got her indoors she was far worse than described, skin was ripped from various parts of her body, she had been possibly laid helpless for more than 24hours by which time fly eggs had been laid on her, she was also cold and in shock. This attack happened in Biscop Crescent, I am certain that this is a message to every dog owner out there because these hedgehogs are protected, endangered and at risk of extinction. Also another dog attacked a little hog, Tara was at the right place at the right time, Winston is going to be fine, thankfully.

If you have to let your dog out when it's dark please watch out for hogs, if you don't have a security light in your garden, shine a torch to check first, give them a chance to get out of the way because they are a valuable addition to your gardens.

Newton Aycliffe 4-0 Barnoldswick Town Newton Aycliffe booked their spot in the Second Qualifying Round of the Buildbase FA Vase with a comprehensive victory over Barnoldswick Town on Saturday.

Connor Phelan, Liam Jarvie, Adam Burnicle and Jake Petitjean completed the rout at the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium as Colin Stromsoy's men recorded their second win of the week following Tuesday's late Northern League win over Newcastle Benfield. Stromsoy wanted to see more of the same from his side's display in the second half from Tuesday and take the game to Barnoldswick and he was rewarded when his side took a deserved lead inside 20 minutes of Saturday's tie.

Having threatened for much of the opening exchanges, Phelan finished smartly from inside the area, placing the ball into the bottom corner of Jack Little's goal after Ethan Wood's clever change of play The goal allowed the home side to dictate play with confidence and Marc Costello was unfortunate not to cap a wonderful move eight minutes later when Wood again cleverly bypassed the Barnoldswick defence with a cute lobbed pass. Costello beat the onrushing goalkeeper but lifted his shot onto the roof of the net.

Jarvie was unable to sort his feet on the half hour mark after Lewis Walton's cross found the attacker at the back post as Aycliffe were the ones who continued to press.

Jarvie didn't have to wait much longer though as he scored his first goal of the season to double the home side's advantage five minutes later.

Walton's throw from the left found Ben Reay who jinked his way between the Barnoldswick midfield and defence before releasing Jarvie and the former Darlington Town man made no mistake this time placing the ball beyond Little at his near post.

Jarvie nearly returned the favour to Reay minutes before half time when he found the midfielder on the edge of the area but Little got down well to his right to gather his snapshot and deny Reay a third goal in as many games.

Having kept Barnoldswick quiet for large

periods of the first half, the visitors were perhaps fortunate not to go in at the break a man down after Andrew Hill's lunge on Walton but referee Matthew Smith opted for a yellow card instead.

Aycliffe took a two goal lead into the interval but that lead was extended inside just 42 seconds of the restart to all but kill the tie. Wood again involved for Aycliffe as his ball around the corner released Jarvie down the right and his pullback found Burnicle unmarked who managed to roll the ball into the far corner to score his first goal of the season.

The goal did ignite a response from the North West Counties Premier Division side as Zack Dale forced Adam Pickford into a smart stop down to his right from a close range volley.

Bradley Knox headed over for the visitors just before the hour mark as Aycliffe failed to clear their lines from a corner.

But it was the hosts who found the target again with Petitjean sticking a leg out at the back post to divert Jarvie's cross into an almost empty net to seal a comfortable day for Aycliffe and secure their passage into the next round of the Vase.
