Newton Aycliffe Dad with Brain Cancer in Training for Ironman

A 33-year-old dad-of-two from Newton Aycliffe is preparing to take part in the prestigious Ironman UK endurance event, just months after receiving treatment for a second brain tumour. Craig Johnston turned to fitness as a way of coping, following a devastating cancer diagnosis. The former quantity surveyor is raising vital funds for the charity Brain Tumour Research, as he trains for the famed triathlon competition.

Craig married Jilly in 2016 and together they have two children, Alistair (10) and Millie (3). Their lives were turned upside-down one night in June 2018, when Craig suffered a seizure while in bed.

He said: "I'll always remember it was 24 June 2018, the day the England football team set new records in a 6-1 victory over Panama in the World Cup. I went to bed and that was my last night before becoming a 'cancer patient'. "The next thing I remember is waking up with my parents and two paramedics by my side, telling me I had suffered a seizure. Craig was taken to the Accident and **Emergency Department at Darlington** Memorial Hospital, where medics carried out an MRI scan. The results revealed a brain tumour and Craig was urgently referred to a specialist neurosurgeon. Ten days later he was in surgery at James Cook University Hospital in Middlesbrough having a craniotomy.

Craig was the first person in the North East to be given a 'Gliolan' or 'pink drink', known as 5-ALA, prior to his surgery. The relatively new medicine helps identify brain tumours by causing them to glow pink under ultraviolet light. He was able to benefit from 5ALA after the NHS rolled it out as a part of their support for the Tessa Jowell Brain Cancer Mission (TJBCM).

Craig recovered well from surgery. Shortly afterwards a biopsy confirmed the tumour was a grade 3 or 4 astrocytoma, meaning he would need further cancer treatment. Following a gruelling course of radiotherapy

and chemotherapy, in January 2020, Craig started to focus on healthy eating and began going to the gym. As his fitness improved and he started to see results, Craig set himself the ambitious goal of making it to the start line of Ironman UK in Bolton in July 2021. But it hasn't been plain sailing, as he received more bad news following a routine scan in July


He said: "The tumour was showing signs of regrowth and I was told I would need more surgery. It was a huge blow but I was more prepared for what was to come. This time,



the risk of Covid meant I had to self-isolate for two weeks before I was admitted and for another two weeks once I was discharged." Around the time of his second surgery, Craig started documenting his journey via his YouTube channel 'Čraig's Cancer to Kona Vlog', his ultimate aim being to earn a place in the Ironman world championships at Kona in Hawaii. The main focus of the videos is exercise and training following a difficult diagnosis. Craig hopes to create a space where he can share what works for him and where subscribers can come for tips and inspiration.

Meanwhile he is now on another course of chemotherapy, all while continuing to train for the Ironman. Craig said: "The chemo is making me sicker this time and I'm having to sleep a lot but I am still managing to get out running and cycling quite a bit. I was due to run the York Marathon later this month but that event has been cancelled due to the pandemic. I'm still planning to run the distance on 18 October.'

As Craig plans to complete more and more events in the run-up to the Ironman, he has set up a fundraising page for Brain Tumour Research, with the initial goal of raising £2,740, which represents the amount it costs to fund a day of research at each of the charity's Centres of Excellence. He said: "By being a 'test case' for the 5-ALA pink drink, I have personally benefited from research into brain tumours but I am fully aware that funding for research into this awful disease is severely lacking, especially when you consider that it kills more children and adults under the age of 40 than any other cancer." Tornado Returns to BR **Locomotive Green Livery** for 30th Anniversary

The A1 Steam Locomotive Trust, the registered charity that built, owns and operates world-famous 100mph new steam locomotive No. 60163 Tornado, has repainted the locomotive in BR locomotive green as part of its 30th Anniversary celebrations.

Since completion in Darlington in 2008, new Peppercorn class A1 Pacific No. 60163 Tornado has covered over 100,000 miles and seen service on the Network Rail main line and heritage railways right across Great Britain. Highlights have included three Royal Trains with the first following the locomotive's naming by TRH The Prince of Wales and The Duchess of Cornwall in February 2009; BBC Top Gear 'Race to the North' with Jeremy Clarkson on the footplate; 'The Winton Train' to commemorate the 70th anniversary on the Kinder Transport; the rescuing of stranded commuters in Kent; the re-opening of the Settle to Carlisle Railway; the first steam locomotive in the UK to achieve 100mph for 50 years; featuring in two BBC documentaries, 'Absolutely Chuffed - the Men Who Built a Steam Engine' and 'Tornado the 100mph Steam Engine', and starring in PADDINGTON 2 the movie.

The A1 Steam Locomotive Trust was founded in 1990 to build a new Peppercorn class A1 'Pacific'. The class A1s were designed by Arthur H Peppercorn for the London & North Eastern Railway and 49 were built in 1948/49 by British Railways. However, following dieselisation, all were scrapped by 1966 with the last survivor No. 60145 Saint Mungo being the subject of a failed preservation attempt. Examples of most of the East Coast Main Line's famous steam locomotive classes were saved, the most significant gap being their final development, the Peppercorn class A1s. Over the duration of her first boiler certificate Tornado carried all of the Peppercorn class A1's historic liveries of LNER apple green (with 'British Railways' on the tender), BR blue (with the emblem on the tender) and BR locomotive green (with both the emblem and the crest on the tender).

The Trust is now working hard to get Tornado back onto the main line where she belongs and anticipate picking up the remainder of our 2020 programme as follows:

Brian's Extraordinary Model Railway

During the restrictions associated with Covid19, Rotary Newton Aycliffe has continued to plan for future events though many will not actually be able to proceed. One of these has been the 2020 Model Railway Exhibition, cancelled in March. Our small team of enthusiasts have continued to develop their skills. This is the story of one of them, Rotarian Brian Winwood.

Christmas 2018 saw the birth of a new N Gauge layout based loosely on Darlington Station and the surrounding area. Brian told fellow enthusiast and Rotarian John Burrows, 'the name of this was to be Dorlington, named after my great grandmother whose family, the Dorlings, were a Quaker family from Darlington. Initially the layout was to be 1600mm x 900mm allowing it to fit underneath a single bed when not in use. This quickly expanded and had to be split into two pieces each 1600mm x 900mm which can run independently or as one large layout. The second part was designed to show the rural past with a disused church and engine shed (complete with discarded class 31) showing how the countryside is being overrun with out of town shops and businesses'.

Brian explained that CAD (Computer Aided Design) played a big part in the design of the layout as combining this aspect with a 3D printer allowed reproduction of detailed sections of landscape and buildings that could be incorporated, adding to the realism. Shop fascias as well as landscape structures were accurately created for added realism. 3D printing was incorporated in many aspects including the creation of bespoke carriages as well as the construction of a replica 1959 underground train using a Kato 20m chassis. Brian went on to say, 'my favourite 3D produced items include Rocket which utilises a miniature powered chassis in the first carriage allowing the train to run on N Gauge and a monorail which was built from scratch on an









elevated track, (as seen in one of the photos showing Rocket, the underground and the monorail). In addition to the layout, the 3D printing technology has been used to design and produce retail kits in 00 gauge, such as a replica Scottish station and a corrugated garage/shed. Both these items, when sold, have been raising funds for Rotary as well as the Highland Railway Society'. Dorlington was due to be displayed at the Railway Exhibition at Newton Aycliffe Youth Centre which was unfortunately cancelled due to the pandemic. Concerns are growing for the 2021 exhibition; therefore, a virtual exhibition is being considered so that as many as possible can enjoy the event. Safeguarding Children and Adults in County Durham

Councillors will be updated on vital partnership work to safeguard children and vulnerable adults in County Durham when they meet next week.

Durham Safeguarding Children's Partnership (DCSP) and the County Durham Safeguarding Adult Board (CDSAB) will present their annual reports to Durham County Council's Cabinet on Wednesday, 14 October. Both partnerships are made up of representatives from Durham County Council, Durham Constabulary and local clinical commissioning groups (CCGs), along with other agencies with a role in safeguarding. The reports cover the 2019/2020 period and outline key achievements against priorities set the previous year.

They also highlight the challenges presented by the coronavirus pandemic and identify key ambitions for the future. Cabinet will hear about how DCSP and CDSAB acted quickly to work alongside partners to adapt services in the wake of the pandemic and to address the increased risk of domestic abuse during the lockdown.

The DSCP report is the first since its transition from the County Durham Local Safeguarding Children Board and examines progress within five key areas, which are set out in its vision. These are: prevention through early intervention; joined up response; listening; identifying; and challenge.

The voice of the child is at the heart of the DSCP vision and Cabinet will hear how the partnership was the first in the country to appoint a Young People's Commissioner. Amy Waites took up this apprenticeship position in September 2019 and has been

working closely with DSCP to support and influence priorities, as well as engaging with young people. Amy also plays a key role in the independent DSCP Scrutiny Panel. In addition, work has progressed to set up a County Durham Youth Council to address local and national issues identified by children, such as climate change, mental health and poverty.

The report also looks at work to raise awareness of the signs of neglect, which is the single greatest cause of children needing protection and care in County Durham. CDSAB fifth's annual report also details work undertaken to ensure the voices of adults and carers are heard, as well as examining progress made against other key priorities, including prevention and early intervention; raising awareness; performance, quality and governance; and reviews, learning and training.

A major focus for partners over the last year has been increasing understanding of selfneglect and how to tackle it. This was the theme of a biennial practitioner event and the first in a series of briefings about important safeguarding issues.

Raising awareness of the signs of abuse, how to report safeguarding concerns and the support available is another integral role of CDSAB. Over the last year newsletters and e-bulletins have been issued and website resources have been improved to help communicate key messages. Partners also joined forces with DSCP, Safe Durham Partnership and local voluntary organisations for County Durham Safeguarding Week, and hosted presentations on issues such as domestic abuse and coercive control, illegal money lending, county lines and mental health.

Sharing information between agencies involved in safeguarding is critical for DSCP and CDSAB. Both annual reports detail the work that has been undertaken to improve processes and communications between partners, as well as the many training courses and multi-agency events that have taken

Looking ahead, DCSP and CDSAB emphasise the continued importance of existing priorities but also recognise the ongoing challenges the pandemic presents to health and social care services.

Cabinet will be asked to consider both reports and recommend them for publication.

Supporting Durham's Towns & Villages

Councillors will consider plans to prioritise regeneration projects across County Durham based on which communities are most in need, as part of wider efforts to boost the county's economy as part of the response to the coronavirus pandemic.

Durham County Council's Cabinet will hear that the Towns and Villages Strategy is more important than ever as a result of the unprecedented challenges brought about by the pandemic. As people adapt to new ways of working, shopping and travelling, the meeting will highlight the need to update and refocus the strategy to best support communities and help towns and villages become more resilient by working with key partners and aligning council activity.

An additional £18 million has been identified to ensure further resources are directed to all communities, particularly those facing the most challenges over the next three years.

In order to determine that, the council is proposing to use an evidence base considering several factors such as employment, housing, health and crime to identify areas most in need of support. This will ensure projects are directed to areas where the most impact can be made.

The approach to Towns and Villages was initially agreed by Cabinet in December 2018, to extend the council's success in regenerating its main centres and ensure issues that affect people in smaller towns and villages were also tackled.

At the time, it committed to spending on local regeneration proposals, the purchase of derelict buildings and land and environmental improvements in communities across the county, following feedback from local councillors regarding the challenges facing local people.

The issues raised were grouped into five distinct themes which underpin the strategy: strategic investments, housing and community, environment and health, the built environment and transport and connectivity.

A number of successful pilot projects, which were commissioned following the Cabinet report in December 2018, will continue to be rolled out across the county.

One such project was The Digital High Street Initiative which funded free public Wi-Fi in Bishop Auckland and Stanley, and is now being installed in Chester-le-Street, Barnard Castle and Seaham. Training is also being developed for retailers and businesses to maximise the use of online sales and promotions to support retailers to improve their business resilience in the face of changes to retail.

Another area that has already seen additional focus is assisting with the conversion of vacant retail stores to provide a range of new uses, including smaller retail start up space, employment space and residential units.

The Towns and Villages strategy forms part of a co-ordinated focus to ensure the council can continue to meet the needs of its residents including the refreshed County Durham Vision and 2019 Housing Strategy, which ensures the needs of communities can be met. The Vision, which was launched by the County Durham Partnership last year, provides a shared understanding of what the county should look like in 15 years' time and sets out three ambitions to improve the quality of life of residents. The Vision for 2035 is that there are more and better jobs; people living long and independent lives and that communities are well connected.

In addition to the County Durham Vision, the Towns and Villages strategy must also now take into account the impact of the coronavirus pandemic, recognising the additional pressures faced by businesses in towns and village centres and helping communities to recover and build long term resilience.

As well as using the evidence base to target the most affected areas, the council proposes to work closely with its Area Action Partnerships (AAPs) across the county to identify strengths and weaknesses in each of the different areas and monitor the support available in those to coordinate funding and projects.

If approved, discussions with AAPs will take place over the next two months and will inform an action plan, which will be considered by Cabinet in January 2021.

In early March, following Government guidelines, care homes throughout the country banned all 'non essential' visitors to protect their residents from the deadly Covid virus. Care home Managers and staff were left to cope as best they could - mostly without the recognition and applause lauded on the NHS.

Back in June/July leading Dementia charities began warning the Government of the 'hidden catastrophe' unfolding in care homes with relatives unable to visit for almost three months - more people were dying with Dementia, including many without the virus, a significant proportion due to lack of the emotional support only their families are able to provide. Families of those in care do more than turn up with chocolates and flowers - they are an integral part of their loved ones physical and emotional wellbeing - performing tasks those with Dementia sometimes refuse to have done by care staff, bringing in favourite foods or drink, keeping them tethered to their world, refreshing their fading memories, in many cases they are the voice of those who have lost the ability to articulate their needs

The easing of lockdown measures over the past months, meeting up with family / socialising / much needed hairdresser visits - all of this has bypassed those in care.

All these poor souls were granted was a once per week pre-booked 20-30 minute visiting slot, through closed windows, or outside in draughty shelters - cancelled if the weather was unkind - distanced from their visitor who they often had difficulty recognising or understanding due to the masks visitors had still to wear, monitored at all times by a staff member, no privacy, unable even to hold the gloved hand of their nearest and dearest and often the number of visitors restricted to the same designated person / few people. Now, once again, as a result of rising rates of the virus coupled with the inhumane Government Winter Plan for care homes, even these restrictive visits have been discontinued. By the time we get to see our loved ones again it may well be Spring - a full 12 months without meaningful contact - always supposing these people, many of whom are already living with life limiting conditions, last that long! I recently joined a campaign group 'Rights for Residents' - a growing group of families across the country who, like me, have simply had enough of this deprivation of the basic human rights of our loved ones in care. We are urging the Government and Local Health Authorities to bring about changes to the guidelines to enable us to spend safe, meaningful time with our parents, siblings or spouses, before it is too late.

We are not asking for visiting to restart 'willy nilly' with people free to come and go into homes as once we were able, we are aware of the concerns of foot fall within the homes - but with the kind of measures we are urging the Government to take action on, we would pose no more of a threat than care home staff who go into work and then return and carry on with their 'normal' lives - and why should they not? This campaign is not a witch hunt on care homes or staff, but a plea to Government to support Care Providers assisting them to be innovative and creative in providing a more nuanced approach to visiting in care homes as opposed to this blanket ban. If other families in the area are feeling the same way, please take a

Last Tuesday finished with me sharing a call with the other Tees Valley MPs to discuss with Matt Hancock, the Secretary of State for Health, the situation regarding Covid-19 in the Tees Valley. In this we all stressed the need for any interventions to be appropriate to the region and where possible to keep areas with no rates outside of any interventions. I also asked him to consider the situation for large regions like County Durham, where there can be significantly different infection rates. Whilst we clearly need to be safe first, we also need to allow others to remain open where appropriate. This of course continues to be a moving target and decisions will change on almost a week by week basis, but I have also asked for some clarity on how regions can effectively come out of an intervention. I had discussions on Wednesday around nuclear energy investment and the potential energy gap we face if decisions are not made soon. I also had a briefing session with the back office team from

soon. I also had a briefing session with the back office team from the BEIS Select Committee to understand their operations better before going into the chamber for Prime Ministers Questions. Later I joined a group of northern MPs to look at how we work together to get best results for our region. After this, I had a tea room meeting with George Eustace, the Secretary of State for Defra, where I was able to brief him on our new Farmers Auction Mart and invited him to visit.

Thursday was a busy day starting with two questions in the House to the Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, Michael Gove, where I was able to ask first about encouraging government departments to relocate to our area and then to ask him to support companies with a "Made in Britain" agenda like Ebac and Roman. Following this I went immediately to the BEIS Select Committee who were to discuss recovery from the pandemic, the session heard evidence from Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEP's) and local government agencies as well as the Chamber of Commerce. I then had a meeting with Danny Kruger, MP, who has just released a report on Levelling Up, which has significant correlations with the All Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) I chair on Left Behind Communities. Both of us support the proposal for the next tranche of dormant assets funds to be utilised to create an endowment for investment in our communities as we recognise the importance of community infrastructure. After this I caught a train north.

Friday I was in the constituency office and I had discussions with the neighbourhood police team about community initiatives and anti social behaviour and later with Durham County Council (DCC) about Greenfield College. Afterwards, I called into The Big Club to find them in discussions with the team from DCC as regards Covid compliant processes. I am pleased to say the DCC team were very complimentary about the efforts being made. The Big Club have successfully put in place; track and trace, hand sanitizing and temperature checks, all happening as a matter of course and they are operating a full program of entertainment every weekend. I am sure they would appreciate your support. I then popped into the Aviation Gin Bar who had their OctoberFest bunting up and were also very well set up for Covid safety.

The Conservative Party Conference was on line from Saturday to Tuesday so I caught a number of interesting fringe events and speeches between other work. Monday included an additional BEIS session where we discussed our priorities and how to make them effective. Tuesday saw briefings from Darlington Borough Council and County Durham & Darlington NHS Foundation Trust before finishing with a discussion forum, hosted by George Eustace, on the forthcoming Agriculture Bill.

Talking with DBC and the NHS, unfortunately, whilst there are some signs of a levelling off, we continue to see rising positive test rates for Covid-19 locally and the potential for Darlington joining Durham in interventions is increasing. As I said last week, whether we agree with the increased restrictions or not, it is important we follow them. It is not all about what is right for you as an individual, it is also about the risk to those around you so please be considerate and follow the guidance HANDS-FACE-SPACE

Wash your Hands Regularly, Wear a mask on your Face where required and Give People Space.

A Climate Sunday Sermon

Dear Sir.

Sunday 4th October was 'Climate Sunday' in the Church of England, and I was invited in my role as DCC Climate Champion to speak to two Durham churches at their Harvest Services. This was a great honour, a lovely reminiscence of my time as a Methodist preacher ... and an opportunity to explore the links between my Christian faith and my commitment to Climate Action.

This is a précis of what I said (you can read the full sermon here: bit.ly/CS41020):

EXTINCTION - OR SOONER

Climate Change is an Extinction Level Event, but I do not like to focus on the 'eventual extinction' aspect because:

- 1) The crisis is NOW!
- 2) Long before extinction, the effects of Climate Change e.g. mass-migration/ the cost of extreme weather events will visit economic calamity and societal disintegration upon our descendants.

WHAT IS CHRISTIANITY'S RESPONSE TO CLIMATE CHANGE?

Muted. A third of evangelical Christians deny Climate Change altogether; three-quarters deny it is man-made. The Christian Right actively opposes Climate Action. One poll suggests that Christians are half as likely as non-Christians to regret the extinction of species, and (horrifically) less-likely than non-Christians to support Climate Change in order to save people from poverty and starvation.

WHY?

Three theological/Biblical ideas help explain these attitudes, viz.:

- 1) ...God gave humanity 'dominion' over Nature.
- 2) ...we do not need to worry because 'God is in control'.
- 3) ...climate disasters should be welcomed as heralds of the Second Coming of Christ. Each of these ideas could merit a bible study of its own, but to comment briefly:
- Biblical 'rulership' is about love and sacrifice, not exploitation.
- Jesus' reassurances not to worry were not an encouragement to inaction, but a warning against materialism.
- No right-minded person wants human disasters.

THE POLITICAL ASPECT

4) The fourth reason some right-wing

Christians oppose Climate Change is not theological at all, but political - because they perceive the Climate Change movement as radical and anti-capitalist. Indeed many Christians will adopt a climate-friendly lifestyle (recycling, buying local) as part of their personal walk with Jesus ... but say that they find politics distasteful and would not want to support any campaign.

- Such an approach is not going to stop the ice-caps melting.
- Responsibility nowadays is too often loaded onto the individual ... when in fact it is our economic, social and political SYSTEMS which are at fault.
- It is NOT WRONG to ask those firms which meet our market needs to do so without commodifying nature, treating human beings as a factor of production, and destroying the earth.

WHAT DOES THE BIBLE SAY?

Genesis 2.15 tells us: "The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to tend and keep it."

- The Hebrew word for 'tend' references the caring way a gardener tends his allotment.
- The Hebrew word for 'keep' describes how a responsible farmer maintains his farm in good condition, and is very strong (i.e. this is not optional).

The significance of this verse is that God ordained this BEFORE the Fall, and it thus shows us His original intentions regarding the relationship of humanity with Nature.

THE ROLE OF THE CHURCH

In 2015 Pope Francis published the encyclical Laudato Si (2015) calling for Climate Action.

Recently the Church of England has declared Climate Action "an essential part of our responsibility to safeguard God's creation":

- IN PRACTICE (the Church of England's General Synod has asked churches to be carbon 'net zero' by 2030.)
- IN MISSION (i.e. to campaign and participate in Environmental Action.)
- IN FAITH (i.e. to PRAY about it.)
 We are faced with an existential threat to humanity. What does God want us to do about it?

Genesis 2.15 tells us: "The Lord God took humanity and put us on earth to tend and keep it."

Five Years of **Train Building**

Hitachi Rail is celebrating five years of its plant at Newton Aycliffe, which has been the scene of some truly pioneering work in the industry including the building of the Azuma bullet trains. Council Tax Bands and Cost

As we approach another round of local elections, we see in the Newton News the slinging backwards and forwards of innuendo and insults. The current hot potato is double taxation. It is said by some that Aycliffe is double taxed whilst Chester-le-Street is not. Could you, as the people's champion, obtain the various household tax bands for the two towns, then your readership will have an honest answer? Name and address supplied

ED: Great Aycliffe Town Council adds an extra 'parish' precept on top of the precepts set: by Durham County Council, by the Police and Fire Service, and for Adult Social Care. There is no parish council in Chester-le-Street, so no parish precept is added; the difference is about £250 for a Band D property. Aycliffe residents could compare their council tax with Peterlee, which has a parish council, and therefore adds to the Council Tax in the same way as Great Aycliffe Town Council. This should help readers to understand how the council tax is set in towns across County Durham. (Council tax bands are based on the value of your property as at 1st April 1991, not on its current value).

PAVEMENT PARKING: Options for Change

Consultation by Department for Transport

Closes: 22nd NOVEMBER 2020

The government is asking whether a change of existing pavement parking legislation should occur and three options are being proposed:

- 1. Improving the Traffic Regulation Order (TRO) process, under which local authorities can already prohibit pavement parking.
- 2. A legislative change to allow local authorities with civil parking enforcement powers to enforce against 'unnecessary obstruction of the pavement'.
- **3.** A legislative change to introduce a London-style pavement parking prohibition throughout England.

To further develop its understanding of the pavement parking problem, the DfT is seeking your views on:

- Whether its ongoing work (Option 1), explained in more detail below, to improve the TRO process, under which local authorities can already prohibit pavement parking, is sufficient and proportionate to tackle pavement parking where it is a problem; or if not:
- Which of the two specific options you prefer. These were identified in the department's review of the pavement parking problem, and echoed by the Transport Committee; are aimed at providing better tools for local authorities. These options, explained in more detail in this consultation document, are:
- Legislative change to allow local authorities with civil parking enforcement (CPE) powers to enforce against 'unnecessary obstruction of the pavement' (Option 2), or:
- Legislative change to introduce a London-style pavement parking prohibition throughout England (Option 3).
- Any alternative proposals you may have for managing pavement parking.

The DfT recognises that there are pros and cons for each of the options, and your responses on each will inform how this issue should be addressed.

AYCLIFFE F.C. MAINTAIN UNBEATEN START

Seaham Red Star 0-3 Newton Aycliffe Newton Aycliffe overcame the elements at a soaking Ferguson Motor Repairs Stadium to take all three points against Seaham Red

Star.

Liam Jarvie scored his fifth goal in four games to give Aycliffe a first half lead before Connor Phelan and an Adam Burnicle penalty sealed a 3-0 win for Colin Stromsoy's side. The win keeps Aycliffe in third place in the Ebac Northern League Division One table, two points behind the leaders.

There was one change to the starting XI from Tuesday night's 3-2 win over Billingham Town, as Burnicle returned from an injury picked up at Thornaby in place of Ben Reay. With the rain pouring on the North East coast there was little between the two teams in the opening exchanges of the game as both teams adjusted to the slick conditions. Andrew Johnson was the first player to test either goalkeeper when his near post header forced Adam Pickford into a smart save after

the ball zipped up off the surface in the 20th minute.

The deadlock was broken 10 minutes later with the first moment of quality in the game as Ben Dibb-Fuller found a pocket of space inside the Seaham half and was allowed to advance. His defence splitting pass was inch perfect for Jarvie to run on to who was able to keep his composure and go around goalkeeper Andrew Jennison to slot home into an empty net. New Red Star signing Lewis Suddick almost levelled the scores five minutes later when he escaped Aidan McGee and was able to curl a strike beyond the stretching Aaron Brown but thankfully for Aycliffe it went wide of Pickford's post. Pickford was forced into a flying save to his right before the break when Paul Gardiner was able to turn and fire a snap shot at goal as Aycliffe's lead remained intact. The conditions worsened for the second half but it was Aycliffe who made a flying start as Phelan doubled their lead to cap an excellent Aycliffe move.

Dibb-Fuller and Marc Costello linked in midfield with Costello finding Jarvie and the attacker was able to slip the ball through to Phelan who had continued his run up the right hand side and was able to slide the ball beyond Jennison. Johnson got on the end of a lofted ball from Thomas Bott but Pickford was out to close the angle and push wide as the home side looked to try and find a way back into the game. Burnicle tried to repeat his heroics at Thornaby on the hour mark when he tested Jennison with the outside of his boot from the edge of the area. Suddick had Pickford scrambling to his left moments later but once more the former Hebburn

Town man's strike when past Pickford's post. From the resulting goal kick Aycliffe went up the other end of the field and were awarded a penalty when Jake Petitjean was sent tumbling by Matthew Tumilty much to the disgruntlement of the Seaham players. After a lengthy wait Burnicle stepped up to coolly send the ball down the middle and seal all three points for Aycliffe.

The visitors might have added to their lead through Burnicle who couldn't keep Jarvie's cross down following the move of the match by Aycliffe. Reay was denied by Jennison after being put through one on one before Wood lofted the rebound over the bar. There was still time for Pickford to make an excellent save to deny Gardiner from close range having spilled Johnson's effort from distance in the rain. Aycliffe held on for a clean sheet and remain unbeaten in the Northern League.
