Recognition for Aycliffe Boxing Club Coach, Les Gibson, BEM

Newton Aycliffe Boxing coach, Les Gibson, was named in this year's Honours List for the Queen's Birthday in June. He will be formally presented with his British Empire Medal in the spring of 2021 by the Lord Lieutenant of County Durham, Sue

Les became a boxing coach in 1976 and a judge in 1979 whilst serving in the 15/19th King's Royal Hussars Army. After leaving the army, with full qualifications to coach boxing, he opened a club. Times were tough and the club equipment consisted of a skipping rope, a pair of gloves and an army kit bag and lessons were held in Greenfield School gym.

The club moved to the Youth Centre in 1988 and then to Acorn House on the business park in 2012, where they still meet today. The club is open to anyone and everyone, no matter what your race, religion or physical and mental condition and the club has boasted a raft of champions every year since opening.

Aycliffe Boxing Club hold very popular classes for kid gloves group, for children up to the age of ten; junior classes for children up the age of 15 and youths plus an over 50s circuit training and boxercise class. All the coaches, led by Mr Gibson, are qualified through England Boxing Ltd and are DBS checked, first aid qualified and hold safeguarding children certificates. All staff are also unpaid volunteers.

The Council proposes to make an Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on Northfield Way between its junctions with Horndale Ave, Aycliffe Industrial Estate to enable carriageway resurfacing works to be undertaken. Alt route will not be available during the closure but there will be limited access to the businesses at works supervisor discretion. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence from 7pm to 6am nightly on 11/11/20 and are anticipated to be completed in 7 nights. Free Debt & Money | Defibrillator Project at Stage 4



Despite delays because of Covid-19 restrictions we have now reached a major milestone!

From a point, just over three years ago, of having no 24-hour defibrillators available to the public, as can be seen from the latest map, the three new units will now link up the circle of potential lifesaving equipment. Available 24 hours a day via a 999 call they could dramatically increase chances of survival from less than 5% to 70% in the event of a cardiac arrest - IT'S A NO BRAINER!

I would like to thank all those who have contributed especially:

Philip Clark (Horndale Residents), Ken Robson (Acorn Residents), Les Gibson BEM (Boxing Club), Bernard Hume (Rugby Club), together with Roger Pounder and Valerie Wright, who have all donated with legacy money left to them by the late Honest John. Livin Housing group have installed a completely new unit which is now fitted outside 7 Silverdale Place in the western area of the town, this is being run in connection with Junction7 by Jane and Simon.

Working with Malcolm Gray of Livin Housing group they also agreed to move, and part support installation outdoors, of an existing defibrillator currently inside Simpasture Court, this unit had been donated by Honest John

This unit will then be available to the wider Simpasture Area community and has been welcomed by Barbara Turner, who has been maintaining the existing unit as something she and many of Simpasture Courts residents wanted to do. "As an ex-nurse I know the difference this could mean to a family if it helps to save a life", said Barbara. Shelly and her staff at McColls are working with other shop owners, including Walkers Butchers, Simpasture Fisheries and the public, raising funds towards the balance of installation costs. Make sure you get a raffle ticket at McColls, there are some great prizes, and any surplus funds will be passed on to help fund the Town Centre unit. The unit in the Town Centre will be in the centre of the shopping precinct opposite the British Heart Foundation shop. As well as the funding from the Honest John Legacy and any surplus from the Simpasture funds we have received substantial donations from: Town Centre Landlords Freshwater, Paul Howell MP, GATC Youth Committee,

Seonaid, and Sonia Scott from the MAD

In recognition of the Honest John Legacy donations, both the units at the Simpasture area and the Town Centre will carry a memorial plaque recognising his contribution.

We will, with GATC support, be carrying out Covid-19 safe public demonstrations of Basic CPR and Defibrillator use. We intend to use various locations, such as a unit in the shopping area, so watch out for dates and locations coming soon. The current situation has placed extra strain on our emergency services, by providing more defibrillators and public awareness of the basics of life saving CPR, we can help them.

This link up of outdoor units is not yet giving every area a close local connection (within a 500 yards radius) to a 24-hour unit, but we are working on the few remaining gaps. We thank Middridge Parish Council, for their forward-thinking decision taken at their last Parish meeting, to my suggestion for a unit at the two new estates Acorn Gardens and Elder Gardens. When the two estates are completed (probably late 2021or early 2022) a unit here will provide potential lifesaving cover for many families. They have been involved since this campaign started and the unit they installed on The Bay Horse was the third in this project.

From no 24-hour units to where we are now is simply down to what we already knew - Newton Aycliffe is a great place to live and it is full of people who care.

THE END OF A TENNIS ERA

Ian Wilkinson, one of the leading tennis coaches regionally and nationally, has announced his retirement from coaching Many readers will be aware of lan's teaching career at Greenfield School in Newton Aycliffe, but he has always been modest about his achievements on the tennis court. Earlier this year a special presentation evening was planned to recognise lan's outstanding tennis career of almost 50 years as a player, coach and organiser. The onset of the pandemic unfortunately curtailed the proposed celebration, in which he was going to share his memories and anecdotes with tennis club members, and be presented with a special letter from the Lawn Tennis Association, recognising his exceptional contribution to tennis.

lan first picked up a racquet in Shildon, when he was 12 years old, and by 14 he was playing club tennis. After entering the Durham County Juniors Tournament at Ashbrooke, Sunderland, on grass, he quickly realised he had a lot to learn. He combined his love of tennis and teaching to progress through the coaching qualifications to eventually achieve the LTA's highest level after gaining considerable experience coaching junior and senior players. lan specialised in developing inclusive and comprehensive tennis programmes adopted by numerous clubs and local authorities in the North East and beyond.

In 1981 he became a full time coach at one of the first indoor tennis centres in Great Britain at Teesside Airport.

In 1983 Ian was a coach at the Bjorn Borg Tennis Centre in Marbella, Spain and in 1984 he was trainer and coach at the Harry Hopman International Tennis Academy in Bologna, Italy. Returning to the north east, Ian was appointed Durham County Coach for girls and boys.

In 2008 Ian was appointed Ambassador for the Tony Blair Sports Foundation after Greenfield Juniors assisted in the launch of the Foundation.

As a player, Ian won honours at Shildon Tennis Club, Durham Archery and Tennis World. He also represented, and was captain of, Durham and Cleveland Men's County Team. In 1990, he and his partner, John Willis, qualified for the finals of Lacoste Over 35s, at the All England Tennis Club, Wimbledon, after defeating Northumberland, Yorkshire and Lancashire pairs to qualify. It is a major challenge to establish, develop and sustain a new tennis club in an area where none existed previously. In 2001, lan worked alongside former head teacher Mike Thornton to successfully obtain funding from the LTA and Government to build a modern three court floodlit facility which became Greenfield Tennis Club as part of a community hub. The Club was launched in the same year and teams have since competed successfully in the Darlington and District League and also the Durham and Cleveland League, and an organised programme of social tennis has welcomed players of all abilities.

Ian has been very proud of the success of the Club, key factors being partnership working with local schools and support from Great Aycliffe Town Council, Durham County







Council and the LTA. This enabled the development of a tennis culture, year round, offering quality experience in an inclusive programme of activity suitable for all ages and abilities, and a number of coaches were developed within the system.

We would all like to wish an enjoyable and relaxing retirement for lan and note that his enduring flame of passion for tennis remains undiminished.

Let's Stamp Out Anti Social Behaviour

Dear Sir

As a Councillor I am frequently asked to help residents in my ward with cases of Anti Social Behaviour. Many of the cases which I hear are quite heart rending, especially when they affect the elderly or involve children. Often with remarks such as 'the police and council don't seem to care', and 'I am at the end of my tether and feel hopeless'.

This can lead to mental stress and other disorders. I have heard of people who cause this distress as persons of an alternative lifestyle and may include drug abuse and alcoholism, however, in my humble opinion, they should not be interfering with the lives of neighbours. Anti Social and Criminal behaviour has been increasing over the four years I have been an elected councillor and I believe the time has come to take action.

First though we must distinguish between several different bodies who can be involved in helping with this behaviour and some of the powers various organisations have to help deal with these problems. Many people think of livin as the council, whereas livin is a social landlord. Our town council has very little authority to deal with ASB, tending to pass most matters onto other authorities as explained below.

- 1. In many cases your first port of call will be Durham Police who can be reached by ringing 101, this will take you to a call centre which will assess the seriousness of your problem and allocate police personnel accordingly. Please always ask for a case number so this may be logged and referred to later. You may be asked to record or set up a diary of incidents.
- 2. If you feel in imminent danger, or feel the incident is more serious, call 999 for urgent action.
- 3. Should the problem be fly tipping or nuisance from a private rental property, residents can request help from https://doitonline.durham.gov.uk which has a subsection headed ASB. Durham County Council has a department which deals with private landlords.
- 4. If the problem is coming from a livin property, contact livin on 0800 587 4538 or https://www.livin.co.uk
- 5. Finally, contact your local Town or County Councillor who may be able to signpost or help. Contact details are available from Great Aycliffe Town Council website or ring 01325 300700. I hope this proves useful to anyone suffering from this sort of behaviour and hope that ASB becomes a thing of the past very soon. Councillor Ken Robson

N.A.F.C. REPORT



Newton Aycliffe 1-1 Whickham

Newton Aycliffe came from behind but were held at home to Whickham on a frustrating afternoon at the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium.

Scott Robson gave the Lang Jacks the lead with a speculative strike from range early in the second half before Lewis Walton slid in at the back post to convert Nick Green's pinpoint cross just after the hour. Aycliffe had chances to win the game as the half went on and were denied what looked a clear cut penalty 12 minutes from time when Ben Reay was brought down by Regan Ward having gone around the goalkeeper but referee Derric Wade was unmoved.

There were two changes to Colin Stromsoy's line-up from the team who lost at Whitley Bay in midweek with Nick Green replacing Connor Phelan at fullback and Arran Wearmouth coming into the attack ahead of Ben Dibb-Fuller. New signing Shahban Mohammed was part of a strong looking substitutes bench.

Quick to put Tuesday night's defeat behind them, Aycliffe made a fast start when Adam Burnicle looked to capitalise on Charlie Exley's missed clearance in the fifth minute as the striker forced a smart stop from Ward at his near post.

Burnicle saw a goal disallowed midway through the first half, adjudged to be offside, from Liam Jarvie's cute ball after a slick passing move from the home side. Jake Petitjean got on the end of Walton's freekick from the right but his header wasn't troubling Ward. The best chance of the first half came to Jarvie on the half hour when he broke the offside trap from Wearmouth's pass and was able to cut inside of Liam Doyle but his low strike was blocked by the legs of Ward.

Conor Newton found himself in the sin-bin for the visitors just before the break for continuing his remonstrations with referee Wade before Jarvie dragged a cross-come-shot wide after a well worked corner. A 45 minutes low on quality was brought to an end with Aycliffe perhaps the better side as the scores remained goalless. Wearmouth got on the end of an excellent Green cross two minutes after the restart and might have done better but his header went narrowly wide of the post. Two minutes later and some inside the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium thought Jarvie had given Aycliffe the lead after he latched onto Petitjean's through ball but the frontman lashed his effort into the side netting. Despite offering little up to that point in front of goal it was Whickham who found themselves in the lead in the 55th minute when Doyle forced Ethan Wood into a misplaced pass that fell at the feet of Robson just inside the Aycliffe half. Robson was allowed to advance to the edge of the Aycliffe penalty area where he took aim and arrowed a rasping strike into the top corner beyond the outstretched Adam Pickford.

Stromsoy brought on Dibb-Fuller for Wearmouth in response to going behind and the home side were level within eight minutes.

Aaron Brown and Marc Costello stretched the play out wide to find Green who sent a delightful cross over to his opposite fullback Walton who was able to force the ball in at Ward's near post. This month it was revealed that childhood poverty has dramatically increased in the North East, with over 34% of children in County Durham now living in poverty. Stagnating wages and high housing costs are to blame and most of these children live in households where the parents are workina.

These figures were based on 2019, precovid, data gathering and so do not yet take into account that since March a million people have dropped off the national payroll, 32% of families have had a drop in income and food poverty has increased by a staggering 250% and rising.

1.4 million UK children experience food insecurity during school holidays and 6.3% report being worried about being hungry in the October half term holidays (Food Foundation) with this in mind, and the exceptional circumstance the country is currently in, the Labour Party brought forward a proposal to Parliament for England to follow the example of the Scottish and Welsh Parliaments so that our poorest children could continue to receive free school meals during the school holidays, as they did earlier in the year.


I have an ambition to start a new badminton club for children in Newton Aycliffe and surrounding areas and would like to inform residents of this new venture.

Last week was yet another interesting one in Parliament in a job I absolutely love doing. The week started with a series of discussions with local MPs from both the Tees Valley and Co Durham with regard to Covid restrictions and a possible change of tier for our area. The consistent message across all calls was that we felt it was too early to consider changing to tier 3. We had another series of similar calls at the end of the week where the message was the same, indeed there seemed to be a possibility of some flattening of the curve although some spikes are still showing. The hope is that these early signs change into a more positive flat or even declining trend which would keep us away from the risk of increased restrictions. It was also pleasing to see that, as the week ended, the Chancellor announced further support for those in teir 2 which should help our area.

The most contentious vote in the house last week was the one associated to the opposition day debate on free school meals. The way Labour advertise their opposition debates is increasingly misleading and the debate on school meal vouchers was no different. Not a single MP in the chamber thought of child poverty as anything but of the upmost importance and the debate was on the method of tackling it but Labour framed it for political gain.

To be clear, I have not voted against feeding schoolchildren and I have not voted against reducing child poverty. I have voted against the extension of free meal vouchers as being the appropriate method of tackling inequality and child hunger. I disagree with Labour that the use of vouchers is the appropriate solution, indeed, for many years, that was Labours position. You could also ask why they would choose to have this debate on the very last day possible before half term if it wasn't to make political points. If the motion had been passed then it would've left next to no time for our already hard pressed schools to administer the process.

The government is very active in terms of trying to create long-term preventative measures but in the short term is also recognising urgent needs and indeed Durham County Council has received an additional £694,000 for welfare support. These funds provided by the government are now being framed by some councils as them helping because the government didn't, even though the Government provided them with the funds! Whilst we may disagree on the opposition day debate, I can assure you I am clear in my desire to lift children and their families out of poverty.

Other discussions this week have included some with owners of care homes in Wingate; a discussion with the HS2 purchasing team reinforcing the need for local UK supply chains to be given priority; a discussion with Durham County Council officers around the selective licensing proposal and a discussion with fellow MPs around the Mineworkers Pension Fund.

I also had the opportunity to ask a question in the house on transport questions, where

I again raised the need for support for the coach industry and also referenced the need to look at options around improving air travel restrictions. We also had another meeting of the BEIS select committee, where this time we had a number of the regional Metro members including Andy Burnham from Manchester and Jamie Driscoll from North of Tyne. The discussion with them was about their opportunity to engage in supporting regional growth and in particular how they, as Mayors, fit into the levelling up agenda. Given the discussions Andy Burnham has had with Boris Johnson this week, as you can imagine, this was an interesting session. My last duty of the week was a visit to meet the principal of the new South Campus at Durham University, this is a fantastic investment by the University and increases the opportunity for students to be accommodated in university buildings as opposed to the centre of Durham. Obviously they are also dealing with the problems of Covid 19 but so far this campus is relatively unscathed.

You may also have seen that I have supported a letter to the Prime Minister from the Northern Research Group. This is a group of Northern MP's formed to look specifically at issues affecting the North and to lobby as a group on the basis of facts and research. We will be doing our utmost to make sure that initiatives like "levelling up" and "build back better" deliver for all of us. Next week we are on recess which should give an opportunity to catch my breath before the home run to the end of the year, which will no doubt have some very interesting challenges, not least around the conclusion of the Brexit trade negotiations. As I said earlier, it is a critical time in the fight against Covid 19 so please remember HANDS-FACE-SPACE, wash your Hands regularly, wear a mask on your Face where required and give people Space. Stay safe and have a good week. Paul Howell MP

Organisers Should Be Ashamed



COUNCIL MAKES ENERGY EFFICIENCY SWITCH TO REDUCE CARBON FOOTPRINT

A North East council has been rolling out energy efficient measures across buildings in its area as part of a commitment to improving the environment. Durham County Council's in-house teams have been replacing lights in buildings and public places across the county with more energy efficient LED lighting.

The LED retrofit project is part of the council's Climate Emergency Response Plan, which has been helping to reduce carbon emissions, save energy and lower costs. The council has also committed to achieve an 80 per cent reduction in carbon emissions by 2030.

On top of existing street lighting retrofits, the new lighting continues on from previous LED work that has been carried out by the council and is being installed in over 400 bus shelters, newly renovated subways, and some schools across the county.

Over 12 of the council's main buildings have so far been retrofitted with new lighting, from business centres to leisure centres and, more recently, floodlights at Teesdale Leisure Centre. The project is expected to save 20 per cent of the carbon emissions by reducing buildings' electricity usage while generating over £60,000 in annual cost savings.

Durham Town Hall and Bishop Auckland Town Hall, have also been retrofitted with LEDs.

In a further step, as schools account for almost half of the carbon emissions from buildings, the council is committed to providing advice and guidance on reducing energy consumption through its Enlighten schools project which, in addition, secures funding for the works.

Crook Primary school was the first school to participate in the project, with carbon savings of 15,700kg of CO2.

The benefits of installing LED lighting in schools include:

 An improved learning environment compared to fluorescent or incandescent lighting.



- Enhanced light for reading and concentration compared to non-LED, yellow lighting.
- · Improved light direction.
- Better potential sleep for pupils as full spectrum light provided by LEDs triggers 24-hour hormonal response cycle.
- Better working environment.

Cllr John Clare, Durham County Council's climate change champion, said: "Climate Action is not just about big things like greening the grid – it's about decarbonising every aspect of our lifestyle. Changing a light to LED might seem a minor improvement, but changing the lights in town halls, leisure centres, schools, and more than 400 bus shelters makes a big difference.

"And, of course, now, every time anyone stands in a lit bus shelter, it will remind them that we are working towards our target of becoming carbon neutral as quickly as possible. It is perhaps also a reminder that we too can contribute towards that target by making even small changes in our own lives; it all adds up."

Online Meetings Offer Opportunity to Influence Council's Work

People across County Durham are being invited to have their say on the future of the area at a series of virtual events where residents will also be thanked for their good work during the pandemic. Cllr Simon Henig, Leader of Durham County Council, said: "Getting together in the traditional way is much more difficult these days but it is still incredibly important that we are able to speak directly with residents and offer the opportunity to directly influence our work. "These online events will enable people to give their views on the future of our county, the vital work of our AAPs and our ongoing and important efforts to revitalise our towns and villages.

"But this is not just an opportunity for us to talk with residents about our work over the past six months and our plans for the future. It's also a chance to celebrate everything those in our communities have been doing to support each other during the pandemic.

Novel Idea for Woodham Academy Bookworms



One of the healthier side-effects of the recent lock-down and on-going social-distancing restrictions has been an increase in home reading; with a recent survey suggesting that 41% of adults reported spending more time reading than previously. Of these, half said they were reading more, simply because they had more time on their hands, whilst another sizeable proportion said they were reading more with their children. Not unsurprisingly, perhaps, many respondents reported re-reading books they already had in their possession – as venturing out for new ones wasn't always possible. It is with this in mind that Woodham Academy has introduced a 'mobile library' service for those students currently unable to attend school in person.

The novel idea, the brainchild of Woodham's Reading Team, has been some time in the making, because they first had to manually digitise their entire stock (3,000 books, and counting), before learners could search for their favourite titles, authors and genres, etc. and have them delivered safely to their doors. Miss Thomas, an English teacher who is in charge of literacy at Woodham Academy, says the delivery service is an extension of the school's established reading ethos, and will help ensure pre-teens and teenagers continue to enjoy reading throughout their secondary education. So, what are our younger-generation of book-worms reading, exactly? Well, whereas, booksellers in general have reported a sharp rise in sales of 'comfort reading' titles, such as crime fiction, school-students nationally are bucking the trend, and are continuing to devour 'dystopian' fiction in large quantities, with series like The Hunger Games, The Maze Runner and Divergent still topping the charts, alongside the usual cast of wizards, ghouls, vampires and zombies. The Reading Team, however, always remain hopeful their readers will turn over a new page, and so have large amounts of classics and modern classics in stock, which they are always eager to lend to their readership.

Ground Deal Creates New Landscape for Football Club

Northern League first division club Newton Aycliffe FC have agreed a stadium naming rights deal with nearby sports turf experts Beaumont Landscapes.

Aycliffe-based Beaumont - which was originally formed in the same year as Aycliffe's football club, in 1965 - have agreed to take on the upkeep of the club's ground and playing surface as part of the sponsorship agreement. It means the club's ground, formerly known as Moore Lane Park, is now officially recognised as the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium.

Aycliffe chairman Allan Oliver explained: "Players want to play on the best surface they can, and we didn't have the best pitch in all honesty. We had massive drainage issues, we were spending money on it but by October and November the rain came, we couldn't get it off the pitch and we were back to square one.

"Now the drainage has improved, the water gets away a lot better, and that will enable Beaumont's team to vastly improve the surface. Our team is earning itself a good reputation for playing good football, getting it down and playing, and we're good to watch. To play that way you need a quality surface, so this is a massive step forward for us." Alex Lineton, managing director of Beaumont Landscapes and a third generation of the family running the firm, said: "This partnership works really well for

us, because we can showcase our grounds maintenance and sports turf services in one package. We feel the football club is a real heart of the community that we want to be part of. Being an Aycliffe-based company we want to be here at the centre of it, showcasing our services but also supporting the local community.

Beaumont was established in 1965 by Steven Lineton, who ran the new business alongside his garden centre based on Beaumont Hill in Darlington. In 1991 Beaumont moved to larger premises on Aycliffe Business Park and has since pushed more into the commercial maintenance sector.

Beaumont now has a growing list of 150 contracted sites across the whole of the north east, down to the Yorkshire and Humber areas and across to the Cumbria region. These include a range of public and private sector contracts, various commercial premises including factories, hotels and premises run by national property management companies, as well more than 50 schools around the North-East region.
