

Remembrance Sunday: Please Remember at Home

St. CLARE'S & St. ANDREW'S

St. Clare's held a meeting with the town council in September, and this is what was decided:

"It was felt that the event this year will need to be greatly reduced to ensure safety of the public and participants. Therefore it has been proposed that the 'March / Parade' be cancelled and only a short outside wreath laying Service take place at the War Memorial outside of St. Clare's Church. It is proposed that wreath laying be limited to keep within the guidelines for safety during the Covid-19 situation.

Other organisations and members of the public, who usually lay a wreath, are encouraged to lay their wreath on the War Memorial at their leisure on the afternoon of Sunday 8th November, thereby allowing for the two metre social distancing to be observed at 11am. The Service will be streamed over the Parish Facebook page." There will also be a short service at St. Andrew's in the afternoon at 3.00pm. As of Thursday 5th November, all services in the church building's, apart from funerals, have been suspended for the period of the lockdown.

Pensioner Pen Pal, a Brilliant Idea

Dear Sir,

In response to 'Pensioner Pen Pal' letter by Pam Lovelass in 30th October edition of the Newton News, I think this is an excellent idea

When I visited my sister in her care home, prior to this current blight on all our lives, it was evident that some residents had few, if any, regular visitors. As a regular visitor I, and many like me, would not only be watching out for the welfare of our own loved ones but also have a chat, give a hug, to other residents we became fond of. After eight long months of not seeing family, friends or volunteer visitors from the local community, all those living in care must be feeling very frightened and lonely.

This is why I wrote to you several weeks ago about the campaign group, Rights For Residents, https://www.rightsforresidents.co.uk

We, as a group and individually, are lobbying the Government, not only on behalf of our own loved ones but for every care home resident throughout the country whose voices can't be heard. The Government claim that visiting restrictions are for the "protection" of residents, but offer no guidelines to protect them from the devastating deterioration in their mental and physical health resulting from this deprivation of liberty.

Those in care homes and other care settings have been denied any meaningful contact with their loved ones since the pandemic struck at the beginning of March 2020. We want the Government to find a more humane and nuanced solution that balances the risk of contracting Covid-19 against the devastating mental and physical deterioration we are witnessing in our loved ones. As winter is upon us, and with the latest lockdown coming into force, the situation is becoming ever more urgent. The 'Care Home Visiting Pilot Scheme' being mooted by the Government is simply not a solution for those for whom time is already running

out. The government could end this suffering immediately by taking four clear actions:

1 - Produce clear guidelines encouraging care homes and local authorities to find safe ways for relatives to visit their loved ones, rather than encourage blanket bans.

2 - Grant key worker status to relatives with access to the same testing regime as care staff, in order to facilitate safe indoor visiting. Relatives are not simply 'visitors' they are an integral part in the well-being and support of their relatives who, for various reasons, have to live in care homes.

3 - Indemnify care providers against the possibility of being sued if the virus is brought into a care home. Remove the burden of responsibility from individual care home managers to decide on visiting policies as they are frozen rigid by the fear of litigation.
4 - Produce a plan that protects people from dying of loneliness and isolation.

I have been in touch with our own MP, Paul Howell, several times over the past few months, both to draw his attention to this campaign and also to highlight to him the particular problems this deprivation is having on the health and well-being of my relative in care.

Mr Howell has responded positively each time offering his support, sadly the same cannot be said of the DCC Director of Health who has failed to respond to any of my correspondence.

So please take up Pam's idea of dropping a note to those who have no family or friends, to think about them during these months of isolation - maybe also consider joining the Right For Residents campaign on their behalf and help restore the basic human rights of those in care to see their friends and family whilst still keeping them safe.

Saturday 31 October Buildbase FA Vase Lower Breck 3 v Newton Aycliffe 2

It was a Halloween horror for Aycliffe as two own goals contributed to their demise in this season's FA Vase. Even more unfortunately both OG's were scored by the same player, Marc Costello.

Saturday 31st October saw Aycliffe travel to the Anfield Sports Centre, Liverpool, to play Lower Breck of the North West Counties League. As per FA guidance for Tier 3 areas the visitors did not take a ticket allocation for the game. Those who did travel, largely committee members, were somewhat surprised to find that the requirement for spectators to wear face coverings (mandatory in Durham & Northumberland) does not apply on Merseyside.

Aycliffe were without regular goalkeeper Adam Pickford who sustained an injury in the loss at home to Consett on the previous Tuesday night. He was replaced by Adam Cameron, hurriedly signed from Whickham as cover.

The visitors got off to a poor start with a cross on four minutes deflected into his own net by Costello. Aycliffe fought back with Liam Jarvie having a chance which was just wide of the post.

An equaliser came from Ethan Wood on 24 minutes, in typically spectacular, fashion with a shot from outside the box finding the top corner of the net.

However, the home side were able to grab a second soon after and took a 2-1 lead into half time.

The second half saw few real chances for Aycliffe until the 84th minute when Lewis Walton was brought down in the box. The referee pointed to the penalty spot and Jake Petitjean made no mistake, bringing the scores level.

With no extra time or replay in this year's Vase most spectators were expecting a penalty shoot out when the Halloween own goal curse struck again giving Lower Breck the win and a trip to North Ferriby in the next round.

Aycliffe were left to a subdued trip home, not made any cheerier by the news from Downing Street of Lockdown Two. This effectively puts a break in the season with training and matches suspended from 4th November to 2nd December.



The Government may have been slow to react initially to Covid-19 because we were prepared for the wrong pandemic, but the necessity to protect the NHS, and our lack of essential PPE, were both due to many years of unnecessary Tory austerity. Moreover, the way in which the vulnerable elderly residents of Care Homes were neglected was positively disgraceful.

Given the situation, the Government were right to order goods and services without waiting for the usual competitive tendering, but why did they award these contracts to companies with no experience, or worse, a proven track record of failure, leading to a great waste of public money? Is it a coincidence that these companies all seem to be Conservative Party and/or 'Vote Leave' supporters? After the national lockdown, Boris Johnson typically swung to unjustified optimism, saying that we would be 'back to normal by Christmas'. However, allowing people to take holidays abroad, and encouraging them to eat out in pubs and restaurants, and return to their offices, simply helped keep Covid-19 active. Then insisting that university students return to their halls of residence, rather than working from home, inevitably led to a fresh explosion of new cases. And finally, having rejected the earlier scientific advice for a short "circuit-breaker" lockdown, as recommended by Sir Keir Starmer, he has just been forced to introduce a much longer lockdown, but now with Covid-19 completely out of control, and the death toll again rising rapidly.

However, my greatest concern is that worldwide experience shows that the only way to control Covid-19 is with an effective locally-based 'Test, Track & Trace' system, whereas our so-called 'world-beating' nation-wide system has proved to be an expensive failure. Until this is fixed, which requires that the Government drop its ideological obsession that free-enterprise is always best, and instead rely on Local Authorities, I fear that we will be condemned to a never-ending cycle of lockdowns and relaxations. Since there is no sign of this, 'Keeping Your Faith in the Conservatives', it will continue to be very expensive, both in terms of unnecessary loss of life, and a waste of taxpayer's money! Interested in Becoming a Town Councillor?

In 2017 Labour won 21 seats out of 30 on the Town Council. They had 17 Councillors who were unopposed in 17 seats out of 30. 1 Conservative and 12 Independent candidates stood for election, 9 Independents were elected (5 men and 4 women). If 30 Independents and others had stood, Labour would likely have lost control of the Council.

We were going to run some training courses in 2020 for those who might want to consider standing as a councillor. The next elections for Town Council are on 6th May 2021.

The Courses would have involved:

Who can stand, How to stand, Timetable of Elections, Election Addresses, Leaflets, The Processes, Rules of Debate, Code of Conduct, Declaring Interests, Social Media, Standing Orders, Chairing meetings and so forth - It's not rocket science.

The idea is that if you know what is involved you can better decide if it's what you want to do, in plenty of time, then if you stand and get elected you are ready from day one of becoming a councillor to do

Ideally we could do with 15 women and 15 men standing. From all backgrounds, experience and knowledge. We want Independents, Lib Dems, Conservatives as well as Labour. But such that no one political group has overall control of the Council and Councillors have to work together, co-operate for the good of the community. We need to remove the Labour Party's dictatorial control, the one-party state mentality on the Council. Bring common sense, a balanced Council, with open minds, to the issues affecting our residents. What is best for our community without the tribalism that Labour sticks rigidly to.

Councillors have three main components to their work:

Decision making - through meetings and attending committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.

Monitoring - Councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things

Getting involved locally - as local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their residents. These responsibilities and duties often depend on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available, and may include:

- · Going to meetings of local organisations such as tenants' associations;
- Going to meetings of bodies affecting the wider community;
- Taking up issues on behalf of members of the public;
- Meeting with individual residents.

Last week I ended by saying that as we were going into recess for a week, I should have chance to catch my breath. To say that I was overly optimistic was an understatement. Firstly, discussions on the Northern Research Group, NRG, attracted media attention. This was caused by a letter we were sending to the PM being leaked and then spun as if we were rebels. I ended up talking to both newspapers and radio to explain our intentions. What we are trying to do is ensure that amongst all the many issues that the PM is dealing with that he keeps us front and centre in his thoughts. Later in the week I was involved with the Tees Valley MPs and Government in discussions about a possible move to Tier 3 Covid-19 regulations but before this could conclude it became apparent that a more national approach was to be implemented and so this discussion was paused. We then had several discussions around this prospect and many representations were made by me and other colleagues on the specifics. These were largely driven by our in-bound emails and my representations were, therefore, primarily on golf (where I would declare an interest!), gyms and swimming pools (where I am less involved), and church services (where I probably should go more often!), all of these were given the same support. As you will be aware this is written by

Tuesday and we will be debating these proposals on Wednesday so you will know the outcome by now. We are at a critical juncture so, whatever restrictions are determined, please follow them.

On a different note it is an opportune time to reflect on the last year. It is just over a year now since the General Election was called and I was chosen to be the Conservative candidate for Sedgefield. I could not possibly have imagined what the following year would

After the initial whirlwind of having the Prime Minister come to Sedgefield, to celebrate the victory, this was rapidly followed by joining my fellow local new Conservative Members of Parliament in our first trip to Westminster on Monday 16th December. Over the next few days we did everything from basic inductions through to attending the Queen's Speech and then voting Brexit through. When I was working to be selected to be the candidate for you I spoke to a sitting MP who said to me that before you are elected no one wants to know you but afterwards everyone does. It is only after being elected that you understand the extent of that statement. My post, both physical and email, was immediately immense. I received communications on just about any subject

you could name and in very significant quantities. This gave me an immediate realisation of the breadth of subjects you become involved with as an MP. The immediate practical realisations are that you need to employ your own staff, set up your own offices and sort accommodation in London. You then start the day job, for which there is no manual or job description. My background in industry and as a local councillor give me particular areas to start to focus in, resulting in me joining the BEIS Select Committee and chairing the APPG for Left Behind communities. Whilst this provides two significant areas of work it does not mitigate you from needing to understand so many other subjects. For instance, subjects like food standards that both residents and local farmers have an obvious interest in, but may have different outcomes in mind. Or, I could also be asked to represent views on a result of some other agenda that constituents have an opinion on, an example could be Military Veterans. This range of things to consider means that as an MP you are rarely an expert, but rather you have the opportunity to make direct contact with those that are. The access we have been given to Ministers and their staff has been incredible and I continue to be amazed by the depth of knowledge I can tap into and their patience in explaining things. This has been particularly relevant as the Coronavirus pandemic hit. This pandemic has clearly made a massive difference in our Government's ability to progress its Manifesto but, it has shown to me the incredible level of work done by Ministers in so many departments to support people like me in trying to respond to their constituents. I certainly understand that there is a hierarchy of knowledge. There are things you know, there are things you know you don't know, but there are also many, many things you don't even know you don't know! As they say, every day is a school day. Whilst I try to consider every vote in the context of what I think the people of Sedgefield would like me to do, it continues to surprise me that some people complain that I am always voting with the government. I am sure that there will, on occasion, be issues that may cause me not to vote with the Government but at the end of the day I was elected on the basis of the Conservative Party manifesto which this Government is trying to deliver, so it is quite appropriate for me to normally vote with the Government. Unfortunately, this pandemic has somewhat scuppered my plans to be as accessible to members of the public at Constituency surgeries and meetings. As the situation appeared to be changing for the better over the summer my office had plans to restart face to face meetings in different locations around the Constituency, but this is obviously now not possible. As an interim measure my office will be holding

Safety First for Local Manufacturer

recent BS 8414 standard.

Mark Wiper, BTS' technical manager, said: "Production on the project was initially launched in April 2020 – just as the coronavirus lockdown was in full force.

"Through the dedication and commitment of our supply chain partners, the system has been delivered to market in record time, allowing us to meet the latest safety test standard."

BS 8414 is British Standard to assess the fire safety of cladding applied to the external face of a building by mimicking a blaze breaking out of a window. It was most recently revised in April 2020, and it is this latest standard that the SF-FS has met.

Mark said: "Our team and our partners worked hard throughout lockdown to make sure the system was ready to be tested as soon as the new regulations came into force, and I'm extremely proud that all the effort has paid off. Our ability to demonstrate compliance with BS 8414 gives us technical credibility that, for some specifiers, can be a pre-requisite for tender opportunities, giving us an important advantage over our competitors."

The testing result is an important boost for BTS, which recorded a 20 per cent increase in turnover in 2019, as the team look to the future after a challenging 2020.

NEW APPRENTICESHIP Junction 7 Covid-19 STARTS ARE UP BY **32% AT SWDT**

A Newton Aycliffe engineering training provider has announced its new apprenticeship starts are up nearly a third this autumn. The excellent news for South West **Durham Training** coincides with the launch of a national campaign promoting engineering to young people.



The Royal Academy

of Engineering is running the second 'This is Engineering Day' on Wednesday (November 4th), themed 'Be the difference', to encourage more young people from all backgrounds to take up engineering careers.

RAE has released figures showing that every year the UK is short of up to 59,000 engineers, while only 12% of the engineering workforce are female and just 9% are from black, Asian and minority ethnic backgrounds.

The Academy says the narrow image of an engineer is reinforced online by endless pictures of white men in hard hats, deterring the next generation from joining the profession. It has released a number of films focusing on nine real-life engineering heroes whose work helps make a difference in the world. See: youtube.com/ watch?v=OlvxmX1KNlw&feature=youtu.be From mitigating flooding and addressing climate change to making farming easier and improving healthcare, they show young people how they can 'Be the difference' if they choose engineering as a career, no matter what subjects they enjoy at school.

South West Durham Training has been training the engineers of the future for more than 50 years from its state-of-the-art training centre in Aycliffe Business Park, and supports a wide range of engineering employers across the region.

Chief Executive Stuart Johnson said: "We are delighted to report that our new apprenticeship starts are up by 32% this autumn, particularly given the difficult current economic conditions. We have seen a combination of existing employers growing their apprenticeship provision and improving their investment with us and new employers taking more apprentices on, which is excellent news given the national shortage of engineers the Academy is highlighting today.

One of SWDT's current apprentices, Steven Lowe-Smith, an Engineering Technician at Mill Masters International in Newton Aycliffe, is also urging other young people interested in engineering to take an apprenticeship.

Steven, 18, of Newton Aycliffe, who is taking an Advanced Apprenticeship in Engineering Technician - Toolmaking and Tool Die Maintenance (Standard), said: "I've done a range of different subjects, including pneumatics, machining, electrical and mechanical maintenance. From working with a range of different tutors I have picked up practical and theory based skills which I can put together to help me in the workplace. I would recommend this apprenticeship due to the massive range of different activities practical and theory - that we do."

Dr Hayaatun Sillem CBE, Chief Executive of the Royal Academy of Engineering, added: "Today we're calling for even more partners to celebrate This is Engineering Day as we continue our work to transform the image of engineering so that many more talented young people from all backgrounds can see a future for themselves in this vital and rewarding profession."

The surplus food will continue to be collected and we are looking at ways of how we can distribute this fairly and safely.


Volunteers Required

NEW GUIDANCE TO SUPPORT SAFE CARE HOME VISITS DURING LOCKDOWN

All care home residents in England should be allowed to receive visits from their family and friends in a Covid-secure way — with social distancing and PPE - following new guidance to be used while national restrictions are in place from Thursday 5 November. The guidance will enable care home providers, families and local professionals to work together to find the right balance between the benefits of visiting on wellbeing and quality of life, and the risk of transmission of COVID-19 to social care staff and vulnerable residents.

It will set out clear principles for how visits are conducted – with arrangements to be adapted from home to home, based on the needs of their residents and taking into consideration factors such as layout and facilities - and reiterates the importance of ensuring social distancing and proper PPE use is observed.

Options for safe care home visits in line with the guidance could include:

- Visits using Covid-secure visiting areas/pods with floor to ceiling screens and windows where the visitor and resident enter through different entrances, are separated by screens and visitors do not need to enter or pass through the care home;
- Visits at windows, where the visitor doesn't need to come inside the care home or where the visitor remains in their car, and the resident is socially distanced;
- Outdoor visits with one other person visitors can meet outside with a loved one, in areas which can be accessed without anyone going through a shared building and;
- Further support for virtual visits, encouraging the use of video calls.

Plans are currently being developed to allow specific family and friends to visit care homes supported by testing. A sector-led group is overseeing the development of these plans with trials set to begin later this month.

A new national programme for weekly testing of professionals who regularly visit care homes, including community nurses and physiotherapists, will also be rolled out in the coming weeks following a successful pilot in Cambridgeshire, Peterborough and Northamptonshire.

Health and Social Care Secretary, Matt Hancock, said: "I know how heart-breaking and incredibly frustrating it has been for families and friends who haven't been able to see their loved ones during the pandemic.

"Care homes should feel empowered by this new guidance to look at safe options to allow visits to care homes that suit their residents and facilities. We've seen some really innovative solutions used to help families see each other safely, face-to-face, which has been life-changing for some.

"It is vital high quality, compassionate care and infection control remains at the heart of every single care home to protect staff and resident's lives, but we must allow families to reunite in the safest way possible."

Minister for Care, Helen Whately said: "I know how incredibly hard visiting restrictions have been for families, friends and residents in care homes. There is no escaping the pain and the very real consequences of being separated for such a long period of time. The accounts I have heard personally are truly heart-breaking, especially where care homes have been unable to reopen for visiting during the summer.

"I am determined to bring loved ones back together even during this second wave of the pandemic; that's why I am advising care homes to enable Covid-secure visits across the country.

"We are also working to trial testing for visitors, so that we can reduce the risk of indoor visits and give families more opportunities to spend time with relatives in care homes.

"We must get the balance right between reuniting families and ensuring care staff and residents are safe from COVID-19."

The government is also working with providers to help them communicate to families and help them plan visits in a way that minimises the wider risks – for example, avoiding travelling to and from the home using public transport, or maintaining social distance from other families when they arrive at the home for their visit.

Visits outside of these principles should still be allowed in exceptional circumstances such as end of life.

Care homes should support the NHS Test and Trace system by keeping a temporary record, including address and phone number, of current and previous residents, staff and visitors as well as keeping track of visitor numbers and staff. It is recommended homes have an arrangement to enable bookings or appointments for visitors and ad hoc visits should not be permitted.

Protecting staff and residents has been a priority throughout the pandemic, with 120,000 tests being sent out every day solely for the care sector. The government has provided access to £3.7 billion for local authorities through un-ringfenced grants so they can address the expenditure pressures they are facing in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, including social care, as well as £1.1 billion provided to support infection control in care homes.

In addition, 11,000 iPad tablets, worth £7.5 million, will soon be distributed to thousands of care homes across England to help residents keep in touch with loved ones.

Greenfield Students Take Up Extra Opportunities

Students at Greenfield Community College have settled well this term in a safe and supportive environment. Learning opportunities have also seen an added dimension through an extensive extracurricular programme.

Led by Mr Butterworth, Subject Leader for PE, the programme has attracted students from a range of year groups. "We launched the extra-curricular programme three weeks ago and have had an extremely successful uptake so far. Students from Year 7-10 have attended a range of sports that are on offer. We currently have 18 clubs running over the course of the week, a great start to the year" said Mr Butterworth.

There has been a number of challenges in the planning and organisation of the programme, with the current COVID pandemic, but staff have been fully committed to creating an extensive offer for students and have fully followed regulations in place to ensure the students can continue to access activities in an enjoyable and safe way.

The extra-curricular programme has been further supported by the reintroduction of the annual House competition 'Race to Tokyo'. This competition sees students in year 7 and 8 gain mileage for their respective tutor group for every club attended in a race to achieve the mileage from Newton Aycliffe to Tokyo first. Tokyo is the venue of the 2021 Olympic games and this house competition has proved very successful, once again providing additional motivation to attend



extra-curricular clubs. Prizes for most committed pupils are awarded at the annual Sports Presentation Evening. Well done to all involved. Supporting **Safer Homes Across County Durham**

Vulnerable residents across County Durham are being offered support to feel safer in their own homes.

The 3 Towns Partnership, one of Durham County Council's 14 Area Action Partnerships (ÁAPs), has awarded just over £5,000 to the Safer Homes project to support residents in the Crook, Tow Law and Willington areas.

Safer Homes is a project run by the council in partnership with Durham Constabulary and County Durham and Darlington Fire and Rescue Service to help offer a sense of security to victims of crime and vulnerable members of the community.

As well as offering people crime and fire safety advice, Safer Homes offers practical help to make homes safer, by providing items such as light timers, door alarms and shed alarms.

Rather than relying on people to access the service themselves, the project reaches people in their own homes and allows residents an opportunity to meet, speak and engage with their local officers.

Cllr Brian Stephens, Cabinet member for neighbourhoods and local partnerships, said: "It is great to see the 3 Towns Partnership supporting the Safer Homes project and helping our isolated and vulnerable residents across Crook, Tow Law and Willington to feel more secure, particularly as we approach the winter months.

"The Safer Homes project also highlights the benefit that partnership work brings to our communities and the difference that can be made when we continue to work together. This partnership work is more important than ever in this challenging environment in order to best support our residents across the county."

Inspector Ed Turner, who runs the local police team, said: "The funding that has been provided by the 3 Towns Partnership to support our ongoing community safety work will really make a difference. The 3 Towns area is already a safe place to live and work but these funds will enable us to make it even safer and help those that are vulnerable or have been a victim of crime by providing them with reassurance, support and advice to make their homes and lives better.





COUNCILS SEEK ASSURANCE OF FAIR & SUSTAINABLE GOVERNMENT FUNDING

North East councils are calling on the Government for a financial settlement that allows them to continue responding to the

coronavirus pandemic while providing the services people rely upon.

Writing on behalf of all 12 local authorities in the region, Cllr. Simon Henig, Leader of Durham County Council and chair of the Association of North East Councils, is seeking an assurance that resources will be made available in the Local Government Financial Settlement, as local authorities consider their budgets for 2021/22 and medium-term financial plans.

In a letter to Robert Jenrick, the Secretary of State for Housing Communities and Local Government, Cllr. Henig explains that keeping funding at its current levels will simply not cover the shortfalls faced due to ongoing pressures in social care, national living wage increases and other challenges caused by the pandemic.

He highlights how councils across the region have been working tirelessly to support communities and businesses during the outbreak, and says it is critical local authorities are not left in the position of having to cut budgets going forward. Cllr. Henig writes: "We need a settlement that does not require us to make cuts to services going forward and which allows us to concentrate on our response, and recovery from, coronavirus."

In the letter, Cllr. Henig sets out the key areas in which councils require support from the Government. This includes certainty and the timing of the Local Government Finance Settlement, with leaders urging the minister for a long-term and sustainable package of support and for the details of this to be shared as soon as possible.

He ends the letter by emphasising the importance of extending the additional funding to cover the expenditure pressures and income loss caused by the outbreak into

the next financial year. Cllr. Henig said: "This letter has been sent because all twelve North East councils agree that these issues need to be resolved urgently, and by mid-November at the latest, to allow us to plan our budgets.

"To do this, we need assurances that our region will receive a fair and sustainable financial settlement that recognises the challenges we face."
