Python Star Gets Behind Campaign

The campaign to keep Locomotion No. 1 in Darlington has been boosted by the support of Michael Palin.

Built by pioneering railway engineers George and Robert Stephenson, Locomotion No. 1 was the first steam locomotive to haul a passenger-carrying train on a public railway, making its inaugural journey in 1825 between Stockton and Darlington.

For more than 160 years, the locomotive has been looked after by the people of Darlington, and since 1975, it has been on permanent display at the Head of Steam, Darlington's railway museum. As a national asset, Locomotion No. 1 is part of the National Collection and is therefore under the control of the National Railway Museum (NRM), part of the Science Museum Group. Now, the NRM has revealed plans to move it

The Keep the Loco in Darlo campaign has been boosted by a message of support from actor, TV presenter, Monty Python star and avid traveller Michael Palin.

The personal message from Palin stated "Darlington and Locomotion Number One are two of the great names in railway history, they should remain united."

Informing Europe About Durham's Achievements

Dear Sir.

On Tuesday I was honoured to speak at the final REBUS international conference. REBUS is a four-year EU 'Interreg' project, in which Durham County Council has taken part, and which has sought to develop a model 'pathway' to help local authorities improve the energy and carbon efficiency of public buildings.

A PERSONAL REFLECTION

On a personal note, REBUS changed my life. In November 2018, as the Council's Cabinet Support for Economic Regeneration, I opened a conference in Durham about Electric Vehicles. There, I met the a-mazing DCC Low Carbon Team who asked me to speak at their forthcoming REBUS conference, and that was how I got involved in Climate Change.

'Emergency Climate Declaration', drafting an Action Plan, and an extensive consultation - and Durham County Council is now implementing its two-year 'Climate Emergency Response Plan' promising:

- an 80% reduction in the Council's CO2 emissions by 2030;
- a 72% reduction in the wider County's CO2 emissions by 2025;
- 111 (and growing) discrete costed actions to bring this about.

AT THE CONFERENCE

Most of the conference was taken up with the eight partner authorities sharing what they had achieved.

Malmo (Sweden) and Borsod (Hungary) described their work on awareness and behavioural change. Crete and Malopolska (Poland) had explored engagement with partners. Buzau (Romania) and Tuscany have developed public-friendly policies. Interestingly, both Malmo and Malopolska referenced the County Council's 'EcoSchools' decarbonisation work as an influence.

DURHAM'S CONTRIBUTION

Durham had been asked to focus on the work we have been doing on renewable heat, and I was able to inform the partner delegates about:

- Seaham Garden Village (for which DCC is acting as enabler and support) everything there will be heated by mine water, which will be 10% cheaper than existing heating and will save 55% on CO2 emissions.
- Our work to develop a Heat Network for public buildings in Durham city-centre, which will save 1,750 tCO2 per annum and which, although it will probably use the River Wear, is also investigating sewerage as a heat source.
- The work to install mine water heating in the Louisa Centre, Stanley a local pioneer scheme for a public building which, it has turned out, is unearthing all the problems associated with developing that resource. (We are currently pursuing a funding bid to the government's public sector decarbonisation fund.)

AN INTERNATIONAL REPUTATION

The conference concluded with important presentations on the €1 trillion Green Deal which is being rolled out across the EU, and on future 'Interreg' projects. Although County Durham will of course have no part in the EU Green Deal, DCC - because of the highly-respected work of its Business Energy Efficiency Project - has been asked to participate in Interreg's 'SME Power' project, which is about how to help small businesses reduce their energy costs and carbon emissions.

It made me realise the high international esteem in which DCC's climate work - and its climate action team - are held. Cllr John D Clare

N.A.F.C. REPORT

Due to Lockdown 2, Newton Aycliffe FC's season is currently suspended. The Ebac Northern League has stated its intention to recommence on Saturday 5th December, when Aycliffe are due to visit Penrith. The six games that were due to be played in November have now been rescheduled with the season now extended by three weeks. The last game of the season should now be Saturday 15th May 2021. However, this assumes that lockdown will end as planned, with no further disruptions. Fans can keep up to date with fixture news at the club website: www.newtonaycliffefc.co.uk

Meanwhile Head Coach Colin Stromsoy gave his views on the effects of the season suspension:

Newton Aycliffe Head Coach Colin Stromsoy has challenged his players to continue their hard work during lockdown following the suspension of the Ebac Northern League. As of Thursday, 5th November, grassroots football fell victim to the latest Government guideline measures as the country continues to battle against the threats of the Coronavirus pandemic resulting in the Northern League being put on hold for the next month. Aycliffe were set to host neighbours Bishop Auckland at the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium last Saturday, looking to put an end to a recent run of indifferent form following a bright start to the campaign.

In the absence of being able to play competitive fixtures and participate in training, Stromsoy has insisted it is up to the players now to keep on top of their fitness ahead of play resuming.

"We're going to set up a workout group with them where they will be set a certain amount of work each week - similar to what we had in pre-season during the first lockdown," said Stromsoy. "But that's just a base," he added. "If they only do three 5k runs per week for example then we're in trouble when we get back. You've got to work much harder than that.

"On average we'd have a training session and a game and then maybe something else at the end of the week so they've got to make sure they're putting the work in. Whether they do or not, time will tell - but it is up to them now to take the initiative a little bit.

Like most involved with football at this level Stromsoy would have preferred the season to have been able to continue, but the break does allow Aycliffe to arrest a recent slump in form and offers the opportunity for injured players to re-establish their fitness. Obviously nobody wants to stop," he said. "In an ideal world we'd be able to continue and play on as normal without restrictions and with as many spectators as possible but sadly that isn't where we're at in this moment in time. It's out of our control. From a footballing perspective it's perhaps good for us to get a little break. We've had a bit of tough luck over the last few games, some of it down to misfortune and some down to our own individual errors.

"It gives us the chance to get one or two bodies back as well. We were down to the



bare bones a little bit on Saturday and Ethan [Wood] took a knock in that game too so we've got an opportunity for everybody to get back fit – but that goes for every squad in the division. We can also look at trying to get one or two more bodies in around the group and get any clearance sorted that may be required for certain players - so in reality it's going to work out better for us in that respect.

Aycliffe began the season in impressive style, remaining unbeaten in their opening nine Ebac Northern League Division One games before slipping to a narrow defeat at Whitley Bay in late October.

Since then they have gone three games without a win in all competitions following last week's 3-2 defeat on Merseyside in the Buildbase FA Vase against Lower Breck. Stromsoy has insisted however, his side have made a positive start to the new campaign but has highlighted areas for improvement.

Whenever the action returns, Aycliffe will resume fifth in the Division One table 11 points behind leaders Hebburn Town but, perhaps more crucially, just four points behind both second placed Stockton Town and third placed Consett in the two remaining promotion spots.

"It's been a good start all told, we've had some really positive performances and results. We've played some good teams and have matched them. But there's still work for us to do and areas to improve for all of us - and I include myself in that. We'd have liked to have progressed further in the cup competitions – Saturday in particular was frustrating.

"It's been a tough schedule for everyone with two games a week, we've not been able to spend much time on the training pitch so far this season with the schedule and it looks like that may continue with the amount of games everybody will have to reschedule now.

"We'll have to see what happens when we come back, whether the fixtures will be reshuffled or whether we'll pick up from the date we return. The key for us now, during this time away, is to recover properly, refocus, continue to put the hard work in and make sure we come back with a mentality that we want to do better. They're a good, honest group of players here and a great bunch to work with and if we keep doing the right things we'll do OK. We're all just hoping to be back sooner rather than later."

Totally Incompetent Grounds Maintenance Company

Dear Sir

I would just like to draw a matter to your attention regarding the unacceptable grounds maintenance in our area.

For a few years now we have had to deal with unsatisfactory work on our green areas, I'm referring to the red estate but I can imagine it applies to all areas in Newton Aycliffe.

The quality of the work done is shocking, bushes that need cutting



back are not cut back and the ones that are cut back are hacked down with no care or regard for the area. The grass cutting is a bit of a standing joke in the area, it's either not cut at all, cut very poorly or cut when the ground is sodden leaving our greens and house boundary's looking like mud pits. I have attached some pictures of DCC's attempt at grass cutting today, in the middle of November, after days of rain.

Residents in the area get a lot of flack from councillors and people in authority if they mount the grass in vehicles during the winter, damaging it, why do DCC and the grounds maintenance company, contracted by Livin, seem to be able to do it without question? As a private household we have to pay nearly £40 per year direct to Livin for maintenance of our green areas, for an estate with around 300 private homes this is an investment of £12,000, This, on top of our council tax contributions, should guarantee the residents a good standard of workmanship, a standard of workmanship we should not have to complain about every time something is done.

We work hard as an estate to keep it clean and tidy, we look out for one another and many families are settled here, the very least we can expect is Livin and DCC to maintain our green spaces to a decent standard, we pay for it after all. Michael Murphy



If anyone is unable to find the support needed from these sources, please complete an enquiry form at www.durham.gov.uk/covid19help. These enquiries will be directed to County Durham Together, the virtual community hub. The hub can support people to access food supplies such as online shopping, or put people in touch with local organisations that can help. For anyone feeling lonely or isolated the hub can also support people to access groups or the Chat Together service. Alternatively, residents can contact the hub directly by emailing help@durham.gov.uk or calling 03000 260 260. People may also be interested in helping to share key messages in their communities – if so they could become a Covid 19 community champion – those interested should email covidcommunitychampions@durham.gov.uk

Help is also at hand for those who have been told to self-isolate after contracting coronavirus through the test and trace payment scheme. Anyone who has been told by NHS Test and Trace to self-isolate, on or after 28 September 2020 either because they have tested positive for coronavirus or have been in close contact with someone who has tested positive, and meets the eligibility criteria, may be entitled to a £500 support payment. Last week started with some interesting discussions, where I joined the All Party Political Group (APPG) for post offices, where we were joined by Nick Reid who is the new CEO of Post Office Limited, we discussed future post office strategy and the disgraceful Horizon scandal. I had meetings to discuss the opportunities to improve Aycliffe Town Centre and Joe Hannan from my office and I then joined the APPG for fair share, which is about restructuring the council tax regime. I also had a meeting with the NRG (Northern Research Group) followed by a brief attendance at the virtual Middridge Parish Council before going to Number 11 Downing Street to meet the Chancellor with other north-east colleagues. I also joined the APPG for dignity in dying and then had a meeting with my new Labour co-chair on the Left Behind Communities APPG. On Thursday I had the usual BEIS select committee, on this occasion the enquiry was forced labour in UK value chains and in particular we referenced the Uighur in the Xinjiang region of China. The witnesses in front of us included some very well known brands including Nike and Northface as well as a government minister. That afternoon we had a private briefing to BEIS, this time by UK Space about the importance of the space industry to all of the UK. The weekend of course was Remembrance Sunday and I was incredibly proud to participate in the ceremony outside St. Clare's Church. It was supposed to be a very minimal affair, with few in attendance, and by normal standards that was the case but it was good to see those that did attend showing respect and a common sense level of social distance. There are very many local memorials throughout the Sedgefield constituency and I visited 25 of them on Sunday to show respect to those who gave their tomorrow for our today. This was guite an emotional experience bringing home the number of communities that were affected by so many losses due to conflict. Whilst we respect all of those that gave their lives, in particular the two who received Victoria crosses, Thomas Kenny and Jack Youll, stood out. A quote from Jack was "There are two kinds of honour, the seen and the unseen, I hope the people of Thornley give the rest of the boys the same recognition on their return." This was typical of people like Jack, to think of their colleagues, and is a message for us all. As a particularly poignant display, the one in Piercebridge, where individual "Gainford Tommies" had been represented, delivered a real connection to those that were lost. Over the weekend I was also delighted to see the announcement from Thérèse Coffy, the Secretary of State for work pensions, regarding the £170 million winter grant scheme which is a continuation and expansion of the local welfare support assistance grant, which ran until the end of October. Close to £1.8 million of this is for Durham County Council to administer. Along with this the holiday activities and food programme is to be extended covering Easter, Summer and Christmas in 2021. This is all part of a long term plan to tackle hunger, health and education.

When the debate about free school meals at half term was raging, I said that the discussion was too focused on using free school meals when a more comprehensive solution was required. I was told by ministers at the time that plans were afoot and my faith in them has been justified by this announcement, it's just a shame that others want to make political capital again by calling it a U-turn. This sort of scheme takes significant working and could not have been created in that time and is clearly part of an ongoing delivery plan.

We are now in the second week of the increased restrictions and the announcement that a potential vaccine, with 90% success, has been identified is fabulous news, we all need to continue to follow the guidelines through this month. If we can get the infection rates down and then see vaccines introduced, we might actually have light at the end of this dark tunnel.

So please remember: HANDS-FACE-SPACE

Wash your **Hands** regularly, wear a mask on your **Face** where required and give people **Space**, follow the new regulations for November and that will hopefully put us in a better place for December. Stay safe and have a good week.

"All About The Money"

Dear Sir.

Heard of these? Polio, Typhus, Leprosy, Measles, Mumps, Rubella, Chicken Pox... all the diseases our ancestors knew, and more, are all still here. We're just simply better at controlling them or curing them. So, is coronavirus going to be with us forever?

Of course. SARS, MERS, bird flu, swine flu, all the rest are still here. And there will never be a successful vaccine against any of them. The current virus is being called 'Coronavirus'. It is not THE coronavirus. It's just A coronavirus. There are many of them and they mutate all the time (Denmark anyone). New ones appear but the old ones don't go away. We just develop immunity to them or find better treatments. Vaccines are not a good bet against any coronavirus. They work well against many stable types of virus and against a lot of bacterial infections, but coronaviruses mutate too fast for a successful vaccine.

Many common colds are coronavirus. All the flu variants are coronavirus. They mutate constantly. That's why we get seasonal flu and colds. Some of the variants will infect asymptomatically. Some will give you a cold. Some floor you. A few will kill you, especially if you're very old and/or sick. And there really is sod all you can do about it. You're not immortal, no matter how righteous and obedient to the Government's "Rools" you are.

Modern flu vaccines claim around 40% effectiveness. There is no control group. You get the jab, you don't get sick, you are counted in that 40%. If you hadn't had the jab, would you have caught flu that year anyway? How many of the 40% wouldn't have caught it with or without the jab? How effective is a flu vaccine? We never know.

It's the old 'paper balls on the track' game. Someone sitting in a train throws a scrunched piece of paper out of the window every mile. A passenger asks "why?"

"It keeps elephants off the tracks," they say.

"But there are no elephants" passenger replies.

"See? It works."

A PCR test is not a diagnostic test for ineffectivity and was never designed to be one. The Government using it to count 'cases' must know that. Still, money, eh? A lot of money in testing even if the test is useless in identifying infectious people. If the taxpayer falls for it and pays up, who cares if an entire population is terrified into penury in the process? There are huge amounts of money to be made in vaccinations. Even if they don't work. They only need to give the illusion they work. 'Repeated vaccinations' is a money tree. Treatment, not cure, is where profit lies.

I've never had a flu vaccine. And while I have accepted all kinds of vaccines, all of them went through years of testing before being released. That's not possible with any coronavirus vaccine. It mutates so fast you have, at best, months to come up with a new one. That's why they are pointless.

It is not THE END of Western Civilisation, but repeated lockdowns just might be.

We are now all to wear useless masks that won't stop any virus, but which will cause a resurgence in bacterial and fungal respiratory infections. Unfortunately, if you have any respiratory infection, the NHS is only testing for coronavirus. If you don't have it you are unfashionable and will be sent home to die from a myriad of other treatable illnesses. If you die you will be marked as a coronavirus death even if it was Legionnaire's or you fell off a ladder.

Why the hyping of fear? Money. Of course. There are now billions invested in finding a vaccine. Nobody needs one, and it won't work anyway. For years I've been taking zinc and VitD supplements, I get VitC from citrus fruit and quinine from tonic water. These hinder any virus replicating so even if I happen to interact with some disease-ridden human, I'm mitigating my risk of infection taking hold.

I am not listening to lying venal politicians nor to anyone who stands to profit from a vaccine. I don't care whether anyone 'believes' me. I'm just telling you what I'm doing and why. What you choose to do is entirely up to you.

Many rich people, and many governments, have invested heavily in vaccine production. They lose all that money if people stop being afraid, so anyone who protests or refuses to believe the litany must be arrested and fined. Otherwise, who needs the vaccine they've spent all that money developing? Oh, they know it won't work, but that's not the point. The point is profit.

I've been vaccinated against pretty much anything there's a reliable vaccine for, and I am not touching this coronavirus vaccine for self-evident reasons.

What you choose to do is entirely up to you.

Aycliffe Village Speed Watch

Aycliffe Village Residents Association (AVRA) have been operating a Community Speed Watch since September. Speeds have been monitored along Durham Road and also on the A167 into the Village from the bypass. The results have shown a general reduction of speeds on Durham Road in the mornings at school times, and, considering that the monitoring point is a significant distance from the 30 restriction sign is a positive result. The average number of speeders was 10% of the total recorded on Durham Road of 118 vehicles.

On the A167 there were 66 speeders out of 850 vehicles.

These figures are combined from September and October monitoring and this monitoring will continue over coming months.

The details of offenders are registered on the Durham Police Computer for future reference and action from Durham Police. The A167 has also had positive results whilst the monitoring is taking place but at other times speeds of some vehicles is far too high and AVRA are again taking this up with Durham County Council to investigate the possibility of further more permanent measures to address this problem. There have also been a number of complaints about the speed of some vehicles on the road that crosses the Green from the County towards the lower end. Many children are present on the Green especially when the weather is warm and many families are seated outside the County with numerous vehicles parked on the road reducing the width to single lane. 20 is plenty on the Green and most drivers are careful,

County Library Collection Scheme Reintroduced

A collection service that enabled County Durham residents to access library books during the initial coronavirus lockdown was reintroduced this week.

Durham County Council introduced its 'pick and collect' service in July to enable people to borrow books for the first time since lockdown restrictions were introduced in March. Between July and September, more than 15,000 titles were borrowed through the scheme, providing much-needed entertainment and escapism to people of all ages.

With a second national lockdown now in place until Wednesday 2nd December, the council has brought back the service.

It follows the closure of all of the council's libraries in line with Government requirements. Collection points will be reintroduced at twelve libraries: Barnard Castle, Chester-le-Street, Consett, Crook, Newton Aycliffe, Peterlee, Seaham, Shildon, Spennymoor, Stanley, Bishop Auckland Town Hall Library and Clayport Library in Durham.

All other libraries will remain closed during the lockdown period, but anyone can use the pick and collect service, regardless of where in the county they live or which library they normally visit.

Members of the public can order up to six books either online or over the phone. They will then be contacted by library staff, using their registered phone number, to arrange a collection day when they can pick up their chosen titles from a participating library. Cllr Joy Allen, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for transformation, culture and tourism, said: "Our pick and collect service operated from July until mid-September when we reintroduced in-library browsing and PC use. It was a great success, providing an easy way for people to access books while also protecting the safety of both staff and customers. We understand the important role books play in lifting people's spirits and by reintroducing our pick and collect service, we hope our libraries can continue to provide comfort and entertainment to residents during this difficult time."

The libraries where the service is being reintroduced have been chosen as they are located in town centres and in larger buildings where there is space to queue. The chosen sites also offer a good geographical spread of locations around the county. Times when collections can be made may differ at each library and will not be in line with their former opening hours. Customers will be advised of this when making their booking. None of these libraries will be open for

browsing and all other library services, including access to public computers, will remain suspended for the time being. County Durham library users can continue to access online services, however, with an extended digital offer including more eBooks, eMagazines and eAudiobook titles and free access to research tool Ancestry.

These services will continue alongside a temporary Doorstep Book Delivery service, which was introduced during the March lockdown period to provide reading material for isolated and vulnerable Books on Wheels library members.

Anyone can become a library member by visiting Library Online at www.durham.gov.uk/ libraryonline or calling one of the participating libraries.

Newton Aycliffe Fabrication Firm Forges Growth Plans
