

Dear Sir,



With reference to the letter in last weeks Newton News, headed: 'Fly Tipping Will Attract Vermin Around Shops'. I would like to thank your correspondent, Mr Bob Forrest of Simpasture Fisheries, for raising this fly tipping issue. However, he stated that there had been 'no response' from the authorities, I would like to point out that this is incorrect on this particular occasion. As with the previous correspondence related to the 'Damaged Sign' in the previous week's edition, I would like to confirm and provide confidence to Mr Forrest, and your readers, that Durham County Council did take prompt action on this fly tipping (see photos). I reported this on Wednesday 11th

November after being contacted by Walkers the Butcher of Simpasture Gate. By Thursday 12th November the Council Warden had carried out an investigation to try and identify the possible culprits and called in at a number of residents homes that live in and around that area, this was to highlight the shopkeepers concerns and raise awareness about the impact of fly tipping and untidy yards on local businesses and the environment. The waste material was subsequently removed and the bins emptied on week

beginning Monday 16th November. Once again, I have demonstrated that there is no need to contact Newton News, you will get a quicker response by contacting Durham County Council online at: https:// doitonline.durham.gov.uk

Sergeant's Blog By Sergeant Andy Boyd

I hope this blog finds everyone well, under the circumstances, and with the Government announcement this week, that you are all looking forward to having a better Christmas than we anticipated a few months ago. Firstly, I have to apologise for not submitting a blog in a few months now, but the last eight months have been absolutely hectic, trying to deal with our normal business on top of the problems that Covid-19 brings. In my 25 years of policing, I haven't known a year like it, and hope, with vaccines around the corner, that we don't



have another one like it. Despite criticism from some quarters, I am very proud of how our organisation have adapted to ever changing guidance and law, in a role that is dangerous at normal times, having to maintain a level of service, when many are rightly worried about personal safety and the health of friends, family and colleagues. As you will know, if you read my previous blogs, on the neighbourhood team, we deal with everything from crime to antisocial behaviour and registered sex offenders, to people living in the community with an array of mental health issues and vulnerability. We support our colleagues on response teams that deal with the 24/7 immediate jobs, and CID who look at priority and serious crime to problem solve around repeat callers, locations and offenders. During the first lockdown we saw a decrease in crime and antisocial behaviour. However, when these restrictions were eased, these figures soon returned to normal levels. We also saw rising incidents of ASB, particularly in the Western area of Newton Aycliffe, which we have responded to by increasing foot patrols, carrying out dispersal orders (removing known trouble makers from the area for a limited period), dealing robustly with known causers of ASB, and looking at innovative ways to divert youths from getting involved in such activity. We have also used the Operation Endurance Team to actively target known riders of off-road bikes/quads and the areas they cause issues. Many youths are now engaging with the Youth Offending Team after being dealt with for a variety of offences, and we were successful in obtaining a Criminal Behaviour Order on one youth who is responsible for a large proportion of ASB in the Western area (we are pleased to say that this particular youth appears to want to make amends now for his behaviour and is working with us on a diversionary programme for youths in the area and some restorative measures).

So, despite some opinion from prominent members in the Western area of Newton Aycliffe, we do care, we want to make the area a safer place to reside, and are trying our best to work with partners to reduce problems in this area. The community have been fantastic recently in giving us the evidence we need to effectively do our jobs. We have received photos/videos of off road bikes (many that we could make an identification from), information with regards to vulnerability that we can assist with, and intelligence with regards to the use of drugs. As I write this, we have just executed a Magistrates Search warrant at an address in Newton Aycliffe and recovered drugs. All of this is not possible without your help and I thank you for that. Please keep this coming, please help us to help you. The winter nights are coming in, please don't make it easy for criminals to target your home, take the steps highlighted in the attached poster to protect your property.

Take care of yourself and your families.

Covid Opportunities Instils Confidence in the Future

She told the online event: "I've been hugely encouraged by the way this region's businesses have adapted and pivoted in response to the many challenges and uncertainties of the last eight months.. "Change always generates opportunity, even when forced upon us, and it's the entrepreneurs who possess the right mindset and ability to think outside the box that are best placed to react.

Dean Benson, who is also a member of the Forum board, said: "lessons could be learnt from the last recession when those businesses that retained the confidence to invest in sales and marketing had emerged in a much stronger position."

He added: "Entrepreneurs are agile and adaptable and as a result thrive on change. However, one of the biggest challenges is not in starting a business but in scaling it and that's where it's vital to surround yourself with a good team of management and staff. "Running a business can also be very lonely and it's also important to seek the advice and support of your peers, through an organisation like the Entrepreneurs' Forum.'

Richard Lane told the online audience of more than 50 that technological changes, including cloud computing, had made starting a business much more attainable.

He added that this was reflected by a new phenomenon - the 'furloughpreneur', those on furlough who used the time to develop their business ideas.

"My advice to entrepreneurs is that any reduction of sales and marketing creates a void, that can be filled by a competitor. Above all, look after your people, look after yourself, look after your customers and be proactive.'

Dr Tim Hammond said that Northern Accelerator – a collaboration between Durham, Newcastle, Northumberland, and Sunderland universities is making a step change in how the Universities commercialise ideas from their research base. This is particularly critical as the Universities account for approximately a third of all research spend in the North East.

"Covid-19 has presented many opportunities which have seen the development of new and responsive business models and innovation," he added. "We are pushing to get these innovative ideas out of the universities and, through Northern Accelerator, are creating collaborative solutions as well as increasing engagement with external organisations."

Entrepreneurs Response to Lib Dem Calls for Investment to End Council Tax Rises

Lib Dem Cllr, Michael Stead, is calling for a council tax freeze during the town council budget process. Cllr Stead, who was elected with an 80% vote for the Woodham Ward of Great Aycliffe Town Council earlier this year, stood on a policy of fair council tax. Michael comments, "We need to make sure that as much money as possible stays in the pockets of Newton Aycliffe residents this year. It is essential for the town that we do not overburden our residents with council tax hikes. The Town Council now has the highest



reserves it has ever had. I will therefore be calling for a council tax freeze as well as some specific investments and savings in order to make sure that long-term our council tax bills do not rise.'

Cllr. Stead is proposing that part of the £1.3m reserves that the town council has is allocated to invest to save projects. He explains, "There have to be ways to bring down the cost of running Great Aycliffe Town Council, whether it is in reducing the £20,000 water bills or moving more of our vehicles over to electric to make long-term savings and protect the environment. I am certain there are dozens of additional options which we can look at.

The Lib Dem Councillor suggests that having at least £100,000 allocated towards projects, which save money long-term, would allow a council tax freeze for a number of years, and suggests a council committee be repurposed to do this. Mr Stead also wants a review of all expenditure in all departments to find any possible savings which

He adds "We need to do this to make sure that those front line services, which residents rely on in Newton Aycliffe, can be protected whilst keeping money in residents pockets. Both can be achieved." Even after freezing council tax and investing to save, the Town Council would still have well over £1million sat in the bank. Michael, represents the Woodham Ward and will be standing for the Lib Dems in the upcoming County Council elections too. He says his policies will mean that there are more than sufficient reserves to protect the council and keep council tax down.

As a County Councillor he has said he would continue the fight to tackle double taxation which is crippling people in Newton Aycliffe. Residents currently pay both the Labour-run County Council and the Town Council for the same services whilst other parts of the County only pay once as they have no town council.

100K COV-AID FOR 'SUPPORTIVE' CHARITY

Various Road Work Issues Happiness Hubs Roll Out

Dear Sir, MIDDRIDGE ROAD

Responding to residents' concerns, I have twice emailed Highways Adoption with concerns about the new roundabout being built for the Persimmon development on Middridge Road.

Their reply is that: "the roundabout was designed as a compact roundabout to national design standards (DMRB CD116) and has single lane entries. The vehicle tracking plans demonstrate that a 16.5m articulated vehicle can safely negotiate the roundabout under these conditions. Any relaxation in standards may nullify these constraints and allow excessive vehicle entry speeds or drivers to attempt to enter the roundabout concurrently".

These officers are experts in their field - although they, as much as we, are aware that sometimes things do not turn out in practice as they appeared on the plans. In this respect, they have assured me that there will be a Road Safety Audit after it is built, to check that it is working safely.

With *any* change to a familiar road layout there is a danger that people get 'caught out' and there are accidents until people get used to it. PLEASE, everyone be very careful as you negotiate this new roundabout, and it will do no harm for people's safety if we all share how careful one has to be.

MEADOWFIELD WAY

At this week's GAMP meeting, members approved a scheme funded by myself and my two councillor colleagues in response to residents' concerns - to add road safety measures to the miniroundabout at the top of Meadowfield Way, including rumble strips and an enhancement to the roundabout itself. This is a dangerous junction, so please be careful, especially as we make the changes to try to make it safer.

ALSTON CRESCENT

The GAMP meeting also approved a scheme - again, funded by myself and my two councillor colleagues, again as a response to residents' complaints - to add a 7-car parking bay at the top of the northern entrance to Alston Crescent. This road is a bus route, and cars parked along the side of the road at this point cause congestion which, so close to the junction, is certainly inconvenient and could be dangerous

ELDER GARDENS

I have contacted Planning Enforcement so many times regarding mud on the road at the Elder Gardens (Keepmoat) site that the officer and I are on first name terms. Keepmoat are sweeping the road three times a day, but the road remains a mess in times of inclement weather. Please, if you are dissatisfied with the condition of the road, phone DCC on 03000 260 000 and add your complaints to mine.

Another week of many meetings, particularly zoom and teams, some of which have been particularly informative. Last Tuesday, along with other local colleagues, I met with Priti Patel, the Home Secretary, where we discussed the agenda to consolidate the custody suites in Co. Durham. The big concern we all have, is the question as to whether a stand-in police and crime commissioner should make decisions of this magnitude so close to an election where he is standing down. We also took the time to remind the Home Secretary of the importance of keeping pressure on antisocial behaviour and county lines drug gangs. Tuesday also saw the meeting of the BEIS select committee, this time our focus was on the impact of Covid-19 on business and workers. Later in the week we separately had a round table with many people from business. This was a private session to allow contributors to speak frankly, it was cross party, with different MPs leading separate breakout groups. This was an enormously informing session and will be repeated over coming weeks. We also had a Zoom call with Eddie Lister, who is the head of staff for the Prime Minister, a very different person to his predecessor. On a lighter note, I was able to have a virtual meeting with some young scouts whose leader I met on Remembrance Sunday, it is

On Friday I had a very interesting discussion on the promotion of the creation of a British development bank, led by Gareth Davies MP and joined by Will Tanner, who is the director of Onward. I look forward to learning more.

On Friday afternoon I had a catch up discussion with Sue Jacques, who is the Chief Executive of County Durham and Darlington Foundation Health Trust, where we were briefed on the latest position in our hospitals. They are managing, but we must help keep Covid-19 pressure off them so they can continue other surgery. As a result of this discussion Peter Gibson and I took the opportunity to join Sue when she visited Darlington and Sedgefield Hospitals on Saturday evening. It was good to see the staff who have been under incredible pressure this year but and they are obviously pleased at the recent progress for vaccines, which gives them some light at the end of this

This week I have also had the opportunity to join, virtually, two of the Area Action Partnerships. On Tuesday it was our local Great Aycliffe & Middridge Partnership and on Monday I was able to join their equivalent for the East Durham Rural Corridor which looks after places like Fishburn and Trimdon. This gives me at least a chance to keep in touch whilst movements are limited.

Flytippers Risk Being Stripped of Vehicles this Christmas



Enforcement officers are warning flytippers that they risk being stripped of their vehicles this Christmas. The warning comes after a number of vehicles found to have been used in flytipping incidents in County Durham were taken off their owners for good.

Neighbourhood wardens from Durham County Council seized four vehicles as part of Operation Stop It, which aims to educate people on the need to dispose of waste safely and prosecute those responsible for flytipping.

One vehicle, found to have been used in a flytipping incident, was sold at auction while two, which were no longer roadworthy, were crushed. Another vehicle found abandoned and similarly no longer roadworthy was also crushed. The crushing of the vehicles took place at North East Salvage in Peterlee on the council's behalf.

The maximum fine for flytipping can be as much as £50,000. lan Hoult, the council's neighbourhood protection manager, said:

"These vehicles were seized as part of Operation Stop It an ongoing

"These vehicles were seized as part of Operation Stop It, an ongoing investigation into flytipping. This is the sort of thing that can happen if you are caught flytipping with your vehicle. We will take them away from you, we will look to seize them and we will look to sell them at auction or, if they are not roadworthy, crush them.

"Operation Stop It has been going for some time now and we have been really pleased, overall, about the reduction in flytipping in County Durham up to April 2020. Our residents tell us on an ongoing basis that it is an issue for their areas and it is really important that we continue to tackle it."

There are currently 45 Operation Stop It investigations into flytipping ongoing and a total of 15 vehicles have been seized as part of investigations since April. In February this year the council invested £500,000 in the recruitment of eleven new wardens as part of efforts to ensure previous reductions in activities like flytipping are built on. The £31million investment in front line services included the biggest ever recruitment drive for wardens the council has seen. Some of those wardens are now able to focus solely on investigating flytipping. Residents are advised not to employ anyone to take unwanted waste away without checking to see a registered waste carrier licence. It is a person's own responsibility to ensure they are disposing of waste properly and there is no excuse not to do so. Waste can be taken to one of Durham County Council's Household Waste Recycling Centres free of charge and bulky collections (large items) can be taken away for a fee.

Incidents of flytipping can be reported via the council's reporting system which is at www.doitonline@durham.gov.uk
Anyone who witnesses flytipping (and it is safe to do so), should take a note of:

- the vehicle make, model, colour and registration number;
- what was dumped;
- a description of the flytippers.

People are advised not to look for clues in the waste, as there may be harmful items in it.

Police Break Up **House Parties**



Eight people have been reported for breaches of Covid-19 legislation after being found at a house party.

Officers from Durham Constabulary were called to reports of anti-social behaviour at a property in Eastbourne Road, in Darlington, shortly before 1am on Friday and found eight people from different households all gathered at the same address.

All eight, four men and four women aged between 52 and 32 years, were reported by police for breaches of the regulations.

The incident was one of a number attended over the last few days by officers from Operation Triton, Durham Constabulary's team dedicated to ensuring compliance with Covid-19 regulations.

Responding to calls from the community, these officers attended incidents in Darlington, Durham City, Crook, Shildon and Spennymoor over the weekend. On Saturday night a Fixed Penalty Notice was issued to a man in his early 20s who had invited five people to his Ushaw Moor home for a house party.

A spokesman for Durham Constabulary said: "These are challenging times for everyone but, so far, all the evidence seems to suggest that the vast majority of the public are still doing the right thing and are sticking to the regulations.

"Our officers will take a reasonable and fair approach to policing the current situation, but make no mistake, Covid-19 remains a potentially deadly threat and we will take action against those who choose to put the lives of others at risk".



Dental Technician Takes on New Associate

Robert Taylor, now age 76, has been a Dental Technician for 60 vears. After a local apprenticeship, he joined the Royal **Army Dental Corps** in the 1960s and served in Germany, Singapore and Malaya. After leaving the army he set up in business,



and for several years had premises in Newton Aycliffe. He moved the business to Chilton 30 years ago.

For most of his career the law prevented **Dental Technicians from seeing** patients and fitting dentures on their own account. Robert's work had to be prescribed and fitted by a dentist. In 2006 a change in British law created a new class of dental professional. It meant that a Dental Technician would be able to take additional qualifications to become a Clinical Dental Technician (CDT for short). A CDT can make and fit dentures to patients, often without the

patient needing to visit a dentist. It had always been Robert's dream to be able to work directly with patients. But it was a while before the first UK training course was set up, and by then he had already reached retirement age. Despite that, he was up for the challenge, and he signed up for the very first English course to train as a CDT.

Clearly, you can teach an old dog new tricks, because Robert was the oldest person to complete the three year course and qualify. At 68 years old he added the letters Dip CDT RCS (Eng) after his name and registered with the General Dental Council as a CDT. Robert has since established a successful CDT practice in Chilton. He sees patients three days a week, and the rest of the week is taken up with making the dentures he is going to fit. But now he has reached the grand old age of 76 he knows that he must slow down and perhaps even think about retirement. For some time, he looked for another CDT to work in his practice and share some of his workload. There are only 375 registered CDTs in the whole of the UK, so it was never going to be easy to find the right person.

Happily, André Edmundson expressed an interest and he and Robert soon found that they had a similar approach to their profession. André is now working with Robert as an associate at the practice. André is a fully qualified

patients, the latest Covid-19 lockdown was announced. Because a lot of denture wearers are in the older age groups, the lockdown has made some of them nervous about being fitted for new dentures. Many people even believe, wrongly, that during this lockdown the practice is not seeing patients. During the first lockdown, the practice had to close. In part, this was because there had not been time to put the necessary precautions in place and partly because the level of risk was not well understood. Understanding of the necessary risks and precautions has

improved and with suitable precautions the practice is able to remain open. The practice has invested in screens, extra disinfection and protective equipment, and staff training. New social distancing measures are in place and the practice has implemented the precautions advised by the College of General Dentistry and Faculty of General Dental Practice (UK) 2020. The practice is confident that every possible measure to prevent the spread of the virus is in place, not least because Robert himself, at 76, is in one of the vulnerable groups and needs to stay safe!
