Addressing Concerns Around Anti-Social Behaviour in the Western Area

Over recent months we are aware that there has been an increase in Anti-Social Behaviour within the Western area of Newton Aycliffe. We have been working alongside our partners tirelessly to address your concerns as well as looking at long term solutions to these problems.

We know that we have not resolved the problems completely, however, I would like to reassure you that we are doing everything we can to ensure we put some long term problem solving initiatives together in order to address the concerns you have raised. We have spent time speaking with the young people who have been causing the ASB, and they have stated that they want to change and want to be involved in projects where they can give back to their community. They talk positively about wanting to make a real difference. The young people have been engaging with the Police, Livin and the community, in developing a series of mini projects, led by them, with an aim of giving

back to the community.

One young person, who was identified early on as being a ring leader for this group, came to us with an idea where he wanted to create Christmas wreaths to give to families, vulnerable persons and nursing homes within the Western area. All those people will have been affected by the ASB caused by him and his group. The young person has designed the wreaths, negotiated with a local garden centre for the parts and worked with us to secure funding from the Western Partnership. He has taken a great deal of pride in working with his peers in making them.

Over 50 wreaths have been created in total, last weekend we had the pleasure of delivering them to families within our

The young person leading this project stated: "We are very sorry for all the ASB around the Western Area. We have created the wreaths for you and your family to say sorry. We are trying to stop the ASB in this area and we really are sorry. Going forward we are wanting to work together to improve our behaviour and try and make a real difference in improving our community".

I really cannot stress the amount of work that went into this from the young people and I am very proud of two of them in particular. Unfortunately I cannot name them, but they know who they are.

We are continuing to work alongside the young people of the Western area in developing many more projects. If you have any ideas moving forward, please private



message the team.

Finally a massive thank you to Steven & Liz and Thinford Nurseries for supporting the lads. This would not have been possible without your support from the beginning. Watch this space for the next project.

Town Council Working Toward Freezing Precept


In last week's edition of the Newton News, Councillor Stead claimed he would be trying to get a standstill budget at Great Aycliffe Town Council next year. I would like to give you the true facts about the processes leading to this Council's budget and precept next year.

The end of year turnout of the Council's financial position was established in early summer, after the first national lockdown. Meetings were held between myself (as Chairman of Policy and Resources

Committee) the Town Clerk, Andrew Bailey, and Dan Austin, our Finance Manager, to analyse options for the budget 2021/2022.

This was followed by a series of meetings with myself, the Finance Manager and the Chairmen and Vice Chairmen of committees. In the interest of fairness, we also informed and discussed senior opposition councillors of the financial position and possible options facing the Council.

The result of these consultations was that it was thought that Great Aycliffe Town Council was in a strong position to maintain most of its services to the public, even though Covid-19 could affect our final situation in the long term.

We also feared that central government could be forced into a considerable period of austerity, owing to the massive debt being forced upon it in combating the result of the virus.

The unanimous decision of these meetings was that we would aim to freeze the Council Tax next year.

Following these meetings, all councillors were informed of the situation and it was decided that the Council would work towards freezing Great Aycliffe Town Council's precept next year and we will formally announce the precept request in early January 2021.

Earlier this year I invited Councillor Stead, through the Newton News, who at that time promised to reduce our precept, to come and present his proposals to myself or the Finance Manager, who would give them due consideration. Councillor Stead has not submitted any proposals and - to the best of my knowledge - has taken no part in any discussion regarding next year's finances. We are at the present in committee meetings discussing next year's budgets for each committee. Last week, Councillor Stead attended the Environment & Recreation Committee meetings, when next year's budgets were discussed in detail. At the virtual meeting Councillor Stead attended as a member of the public and when asked if he had any questions or comments to make, he simply said 'no'. The truth of the matter is that Councillor Stead is already electioneering for next year's County Council elections and trying to claim credit for other councillors' and officers' work. Once again, I must state that I do agree with Councillor Stead that double taxation is unfair, but I will address that issue with readers in the near future. 

Council Tax Freeze

Dear Sir,

On Tuesday 29th September, the Leader of the Labour Group on the Town Council, met with the Leader and Deputy Leader of the Independents, together with Senior Officers present, and agreed that the Council Tax would be frozen for the next Financial Year 2021/2022.

The Finance Officer stated this at Environment Committee on Wednesday 25th November. The relevant Committees of the Council have also gone through their cycle of meetings, approving the budgets on this

In November 2019, Officers and Councillors, Labour and Independent, examined electric vehicles and electric grounds maintenance equipment with a view to investing in zero emission, carbon neutral vehicles and equipment. The Council has an ongoing program of doing just that, replacing vehicles and equipment as and when the time comes for replacing each item.

It has a medium term financial plan, as well as long term, in which the assets and liabilities of the Council are planned for over five to ten years or more (replacement, renewal, repair and so forth). By investing for the long term, the Council is able to manage cost effectively. The Council has always and continues to invest and plan well ahead. The Audit Control Sub Committee, the Asset Management Sub Committee as well as all Committees and Sub Committees constantly monitor and question all aspects of the Council's performance and savings, and investment is a constant ongoing process. The Council produces weekly account control sheets itemising every item of spending, enabling members and the public to question anything, at any time, with Officers by email or phone. Rather than just cheap political point scoring. Our Capital Reserves have been built up prudently and wisely, over many years, and actually mostly allocated for replacement and maintenance of existing buildings, equipment and so forth. By proper planning over the long term this Council is in a better position than most to weather Covid-19 and Government and County Council cuts to our budget, without adding to the burden on the Council

In 2007 a group of 'loonies' nearly got control of the Town Council, after promising to cut Council Tax by 50%! They won 15 out of 30 seats (but two defected to Labour four weeks after the election). It's funny though, once they got elected they did absolutely nothing to reduce Council Tax nor freeze it. We believe in a low Council Tax whilst providing the range of services and facilities that we do for the local community. Sometimes you have to do things which aren't economic if you live in a civilised, humane society. It's making sure we provide

the best value for money in providing those facilities and services and ensuring they are sustainable. If we didn't have those facilities and services, consider how less enriched our local community would be. We have an open mind and continue to strive to ensure that the Council provides



value for money, but we will never sell off public land or assets to private developers, nor cut services purely to cut Council Tax for political advantage.

At Risk Groups to Receive Free Vitamin D

All care homes will automatically receive a provision for their residents, while individuals on the Clinically Extremely Vulnerable list will receive a letter inviting them to 'opt in' for a supply to be delivered directly to their homes. Deliveries will be free of charge, starting in January, and will provide four months' worth of supplements to last people through the winter

The supplements will support general health, in particular bone and muscle health. This is particularly important this year as these individuals are more likely to have been indoors for extended periods due to measures introduced to stop the spread of Covid-19. Evidence of the link of Vitamin D to Covid-19 is still being researched with larger scale trials needed. In the meantime, the Secretary of State has asked NICE and PHE to re-review the existing evidence. The government will publish its findings towards the end of the year. The advice from Public Health England is for everybody to take 10 micrograms (400 IU) of Vitamin D a day between October and early March to keep bones and muscles healthy. Public Health England advises people who are more at risk of not having enough Vitamin D to take a Vitamin D supplement all year round. A range of products and doses are available at supermarkets, pharmacies and other retailers. Anyone who is able to purchase a Vitamin D supplement and start taking them now is advised to do so, even if you are also eligible for a delivery later in the year.



Roads policing officers are once again taking part in a national campaign to target drivers under the influence of drugs or alcohol over the Christmas season.

From Tuesday 1st December, officers from the Cleveland and Durham Specialist Operations Unit (CDSOU) will carry out random vehicle stops and intelligence led enforcement in a bid to remove drivers, who are under the influence, from the roads and keep people safe.

Police will be out morning and night to catch those who may be flouting the law.

Whilst pubs and restaurants must remain closed under tier 3 restrictions across Cleveland and Durham, police are reminding people who may have a drink in their home to ensure that they don't drive whilst over the limit the following morning.

Inspector Jamie Bell, from the Cleveland and Durham Specialist Operations Unit, said: "Whilst pubs and restaurants remain closed at the moment, there will be people who fancy a tipple at home over the festive season, which is absolutely fine as long as they don't get behind the wheel of a vehicle whilst over the limit.

"People will also need to be mindful of driving the following day; they will need to leave enough time for the alcohol to leave their bodies to ensure that they can safely use the roads."

According to the Department for Transport, an estimated 8,680 people were killed or injured by drink drivers nationally in 2018. Inspector Bell added: "Whilst we tackle this issue all year round, it is more likely at Christmas time that people may get behind the wheel after a drink. It is extremely frustrating, as a roads policing officer, that some motorists still choose to drive under the influence of drink or drugs, in the knowledge that their actions could kill or seriously injure someone else's loved one.

"Drink or drug driving is completely unacceptable and preventing this risk on our roads is one of our main priorities."

Drivers risk up to six months' imprisonment, an unlimited fine and a substantial driving ban if they are caught driving while above the legal limit. Anyone who causes a death while drink or drug driving faces up to 14 years' imprisonment.

Police Commissioner Responds to MPs Letter

Steve White, Acting Durham Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner said, "I acknowledge Mr Jabbour's and the local MPs concerns over building a centralised custody suite, and am open to discussing the plans in a personal briefing like I have done with local MPs and Councillors since July. I would like to address the concerns that have been raised and present the reasoning behind the decision making process.

My appointment by the Durham and Darlington Police and Crime Panel means that they hold me to account, and they rightly expect me to make difficult decisions, with an expectation that such decisions will not be delayed where they reduce risk and where the impact is significant and positive upon force operations. Any delay in the decision making process, for instance until after the Police & Crime Commissioner Elections 2021, would be severely detrimental, potentially leading to the loss of site needed for such a complex project and we are currently managing a high corporate risk because current facilities do not meet Home Office standards.

The estimated cost of the new custody facility would be around £21m and that would be paid for from reserves held by the Office of the Police, Crime and Victims' Commissioner. Police forces are required to hold reserves in order to maintain good financial health and a sensible and indeed common practice with such funding in the public sector is to use the funding for one-off major capital works that are needed to ensure risk issues are reduced and to improve the overall efficiency and effectiveness of the force.

We have already undertaken and continue to deliver a significant programme of engagement on the proposed custody facility, and have communicated with the Police and Crime Panel, all local elected officials, community safety partnerships, Health & Wellbeing Board, the Area Action Partnerships, health and criminal justice organisations and many others. We will shortly be speaking with parish councils too. However, it must be understood that we cannot consult on a potential planning application in advance of statutory consultation because we could be perceived, particularly if working closely with the local authority, as influencing that process. It is important to highlight that the new custody facility will not only function as an efficient detention suite but would also enable centralisation of other functions linked to detention and investigation processes including a Crime Scene Investigation office and improved technology capacity to facilitate a virtual court for officers. A new facility would be a safer environment for our staff and officers to work in by enabling full CCTV monitoring systems to be installed. It would also eradicate all blind spots and provide holding areas that would facilitate officers to book multiple detainees in at once, instead of them having to wait as they presently have to. This would have a beneficial impact by allowing officers to get back to the street

This week saw me participating in two Westminster Hall debates. Westminster Hall is the oldest building on the parliamentary estate. It was built in 1097 under William II, the son of William the Conqueror, and at that time was by far the largest hall in England measuring 240 x 67 feet (73 x 20 metres) with a floor area of around 17,000 sq ft (1547 sq mts). It was here that Charles I was tried and condemned to death for tyranny and treason. It is here that lying in state of monarchs and consorts typically takes place. The most recent being Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother and one of the few non royals to receive the honour was Winston Churchill in 1965, when an estimated one million people paid their respects. These "Westminster Hall" debates are actually held in the Grand Committee Room just off Westminster Hall. The first debate I joined was "Infrastructure in the North" where I started by reminding everyone that we are the north of the north and any consideration has to get beyond Manchester and Leeds. The second was "Levelling up in the Tees Valley" where I talked about the need for improved transport links in the region. I also had discussions with a local business fellowship where I took questions and representations as well as another call with the acting PCVC, Steve White, where particular discussions were around the controversial plans to consolidate the custody suites in the county.

The Chancellor gave his spending review this week where two particular points stood out for me locally. The first was that the proposal to reopen a passenger train station in Ferryhill had been included in the National Infrastructure Strategy and the second was the introduction of a levelling up fund of £4bn for projects that drive growth and regeneration in places in need. This was something I specifically lobbied the Chancellor for, so I hope to support projects for us bidding into this pot.

On Wednesday I met with Oliver Dowden, the Secretary of State for Culture, Media and Sport, where I discussed the needs of improved Broadband in places like Redworth and how we had to better support grass roots sport. On Thursday David, from my office, held a virtual surgery with residents, discussing actions we are supporting locally on broadband for Redworth and other villages.

Friday saw weekly catch ups with first Ben Houchen, the Tees Valley Mayor, and the Conservative MP's in his patch before later with the Chief Executive of Durham and Darlington NHS Trust, Sue Jacques. It was good to hear from Sue that, although infection numbers are still too high, local trends are in the right direction with falling hospital numbers in particular being good news. I also had the pleasure of switching on the Christmas lights in Ferryhill centre and, if regulations allow, they are well worth a look.

I get representations on whether we should be in tier 2 rather than tier 3 but also from people saying we shouldn't have a relaxation over Christmas at all due to the risks. The Government needs to balance both of these views amongst many others. I understand the complexity of considering the dynamics of absolute infection rates, their trends, the sensitivity of over 60's and the pressure on the NHS means it is not easy to communicate where the tipping points are that mean we can move between tiers. This, however, is something government need to find a way to improve clarity on and my other concern remains the size of the groupings. I believe County Durham is almost too large to consider as an entity for this so to consolidate everywhere from Teesside to Northumberland as one patch is something I am lobbying against and even if we start there I would like to see the opportunity for segmentation of the region as data trends are considered for future tiers.

Can I also remind you that the proposed relaxation over Christmas is to allow flexibility to meet family and friends. It is not a challenge to see how far the rules can be stretched, we all need to remember it is our friends and family we are putting at risk and should therefore take the opportunity to meet, but we should do this as safely as possible. For example, all of your combined Christmas bubble do not have to meet at the same time and the more people in the bubble the more important you consider the vulnerable in it. I will be in a 3 household bubble but we are planning to normally only have 2 out of 3 meeting at any one time as far as possible, but we all expect to see each other over the period.

For now though we need to follow the rules and if we are to work our way down these tiers it is important that everyone follows the guidance, so please everyone do your bit and remember

Have Your Say on A689 and Junction 60 Proposals

Dear Sir

Tees Valley Combined Authority (TVCA) is seeking the public's views on major road schemes in the area. One of these is a range of improvements to the A689 to 'ease traffic congestion'. These changes include 'signalisation' (installation of traffic lights) on junction 60 with the A1(M), and the extension of the cyclepath by the road between Sedgefield and Wynyard. The closing date for feedback on the scheme is 18th December.

I don't want traffic lights on junction 60. I have used this junction for over 10 years and never had a problem with congestion. Traffic lights will break up the flow of traffic and cause unnecessary delays. I believe they also cause driver stress. They will also detract from the rural setting of the junction 60 roundabout and create light pollution. The signals at the Bowburn junction 61 (which used to be temporary, now permanent) are now a painful driving experience since that junction was 'improved'. The same applies to the Scotch Corner junction. I don't want junction 60 to be a repeat of these bad experiences. The experience is usually one of driving up to the lights on green for them to change to red just before arrival. Then to have to wait with an empty roundabout in front. Drive 100 yards and there is another set of lights at red. Then another. With the traffic stationary on the roundabout, it becomes more difficult to change lanes. Very stressful.

Does the plan take into account the reduction in traffic coming off at junction 60 to take the A689 into Teesside which should result when the Darlington North Link Road is built? It will then be able stay on the A1(M) through junction 60 to come off at junction 59 and avoid the nightmare driving experience that is the signalised A19/A689 junction at Wolviston.

I have never seen the justification for traffic lights at these roundabouts. If the TVCA can publish the data that shows fewer delays and accidents with signals, I might be convinced

of their worth or necessity. But there's nothing about this in their publicity brochure. The other reason I don't support the proposal is that there is no provision for a cyclepath west of Sedgefield. Let's get the TVCA to include a cyclepath so that we are connected to Sedgefield and points in between. Though I cycle regularly, I have only ever cycled once between Sedgefield and Newton Aycliffe on the A689 and would not recommend it.

If a cyclepath west of Sedgefield was included and the signalisation of Junction 60 dropped, then I would support the plan.

Cemetery Fencing Damaged

(MIDDRIDGE ROAD, NEWTON AYCLIFFE) (TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE) ORDER 2020

The Council on 27/11/20 made the above Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) and pursuant to arrangements made under Section 101 of the Local Government Act 1972 with Darlington Borough Council, to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on 715m of Middridge Rd between its junctions with Chestnut Way and the road leading to Middridge Farms, Newton Aycliffe to enable new roundabout resurfacing works to be undertaken. Alt route from the eastern side of the closure from Greenfield Way generally southwards and continuing south on Horndale Ave turning south west on School Aycliffe Ln then north westerly on A6072 through Redworth to Shildon and northwards on Spout Ln to Middridge Ln to the western side of the closure and vice versa. A diversion route for vehicles over 7.5t will be signed from School Aycliffe Ln south via Preston Rd and continuing south on Spring Rd then westerly on B6444 Heighington Lane to A6072. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence from 8am on 28/11/20 and are anticipated to be completed in 2 days. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly.

Opportunity for Local Residents to Plant Trees in their Community



People hoping to make a difference to green spaces can plant trees in their area with the help of a new funding grant.

Durham County Council has made funding available for community groups, parish councils, schools, and individuals who want to help revitalise local green spaces and combat climate change.

The grant coincides with National Tree Week which runs until Sunday 6th December and is the UK's largest annual tree celebration, marking the start of winter tree planting.

However, due to the coronavirus pandemic, restrictions and safety measures have meant people will be unable to get together this season and plant trees as they normally would.

While restrictions currently prevent groups from gathering to plant trees, individuals can also apply for the grant.

The council will be accepting applications until February 2021 to provide an opportunity for groups to plant trees once coronavirus restrictions are lifted.

The pandemic has had a significant impact on everyone and, with limited trips out, local green spaces have become a place for people to reconnect with the outdoors.

During the pandemic, outdoor spaces have helped support people's mental and wellbeing during this difficult time by offering an attractive space for people to enjoy and use for exercise, contemplation, entertainment or a chance to explore their local natural environment.

Trees provide many other benefits such as conserving water and soils, supporting wildlife and biodiversity, and are a key solution to climate change.

A maximum grant of £150 will be available to communities and individuals that apply and can be used for schemes to plant trees such as fruit trees, commemorative trees, open-grown specimen trees, hedgerow trees, small field corners and coppices.

The council's clean and green team is also currently planting trees across the county as part of the wider Forestry Commission's Urban Tree Challenge, a funded project to increase tree coverage in urban areas

Both projects support the council's Climate Emergency Response Plan (CERP) which aims to reduce the county's carbon emissions and become carbon neutral by 2050 while tackling climate change through hundreds of projects such as tree planting and energy conservation

Cllr Brian Stephens, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for neighbourhoods and local partnerships, said: "Green spaces are vitally important for supporting our own health and wellbeing while preserving the natural environment. During the coronavirus pandemic, people have been relying on these areas for exercise and a trip outdoors where other means have been unavailable.

"Now more than ever we are all realising how valuable green spaces are to communities. This grant will help groups and individuals plant trees across the county, improve and preserve local outdoor spaces while helping our pledge as a county to combat climate change." Early applications for the grants are recommended as they will be allocated on a first come first served basis.
