#### (B6444 HEIGHINGTON LANE, AYCLIFFE) (TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE) ORDER 2021

The Council proposes to make an Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on 75m of B6444 Heighington Ln, Aycliffe from the junction with Station Rd westwards to the entrance to Heighington Station car park to enable barrier testing works at Heighington Station level crossing. Alt route from the eastern side of the closure, B6444 Heighington Ln south easterly on B6444 St Andrews Way to A167 then southerly to A1(M) Junction 59 (Aycliffe) Interchange, south westerly on A1(M) to Burtree Interchange (J58) then northerly along A68 and A6072 to the roundabout junction with B6444 leading to the western side of the closure, and vice versa. A local (non-HGV) diversion will be signed from the eastern side of the closure, northerly via Spring Rd and Whinbank Rd, left onto Horndale Ave then south westerly along School Aycliffe Ln to the A6072 roundabout junction with B6444 to the western side of the closure and vice versa. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence from 11pm on 20/1/21 until 7am on 21/1/21. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly.

# **Overwhelming** Builders Cause Support from 3M Disruption



## The Play Café project, set up to help families of school aged children during school holidays, received overwhelming support from employees of 3M at Christmas.

It was a wonderful response and still the 3Mers did more. They set up a pyjama fund and the children were all bought lovely M&S PJs. The children had a fabulous Christmas and some have just received their PJs this week with the Play Café New Year support pack.

A similar donation will enable the Play Café to continue running trips there and hopefully elsewhere, when the restrictions are eased. 

If, through your magazine, you do find these gentlemen, perhaps you would be kind enough to email them a copy of the pictures. Thank you so much for your kind help and assistance.



However, is it true that there are things that people can do at an individual level to help abate climate change. So here is a list of 30 CLIMATE-FRIENDLY ACTIONS you might feel able to do. They are arranged by cost; those in the top half will actually save you money:

- Defrost your fridge and freezer. Be more thorough at recycling. 1.
- 2
- Go through your wardrobe and give to charity shops all those 3. decent clothes you are never going to wear.
- Stop buying bottled water.
- Register to vote, and vote for candidates who are climate-activist. 5.
- Whenever possible, ditch the commute and work from home. 6. Get a smart meter installed.
- 8. Contact the DCC Warm Homes site and ask for free advice on home energy measures.
- If physically able, walk more especially as an alternative to 9. short local car journeys.
- 10. More home-cooked meals less fast food and fewer takeaways.
- 11. Reduce food waste by better meal-planning.
- 12. Significantly reduce the amount of meat you eat.
- 13. Prefer no-fly/ closer-to-home holidays.
- 14. When replacing an appliance, check the energy efficiency rating.
- 15. Change your gas and electricity to a 'green' provider such as Octopus or Bulb.
- 16. 'Rewild' part of your garden/ stop using chemical insecticides / grow plants which will attract pollinating insects. 17. Complain to your supermarket about excessive packaging/
- prefer products in biodegradable packaging. 18. Boycott products with palm oil.

- Look at where your food is coming from; reduce your food miles.
   Fit draught excluders to your letter box, windows and external doors
- Are all your lights low energy or LEDs yet?
   Plant a tree or pay the Woodland Trust to plant one for you.
- 23. Get a better insulation jacket for your immersion heater.
- 24. Gardeners: buy a water-butt and a composter.
- 25. When was your heating boiler last serviced?
- 26. Try to avoid clothes made of synthetic materials where
- unavoidable, wash them in a bag to catch the microfibres.
- 27. Fit timer switches to lights such as downstairs toilet and garage.
- 28. Fit a remote control for your heating such as Nest or Hive.
- 29. Buy solar panels, and associated battery storage.

# **Businesses Opportunities at Teesside Airport**

As your MP I want to flag up the opportunity for local businesses arising at Teesside Airport. Tees Valley Mayor Ben Houchen is calling on local business bosses to sign up to an event which will outline how they can join the efforts to overhaul Teesside International Airport.



The redevelopment of the airport includes new food and drink options, with the creation of new bars, two renovated executive lounges, a coffee shop and the return of duty free, as well as refurbishment of key areas of the terminal.

Mayor Houchen is now inviting local businesses to a special event from 8am to 9am on January 12 so they can learn more about how they can bid for work on the terminal expansion.

The virtual event will talk through the plans and the work that is available for local businesses on these projects. Work is available for experts including shop fitters, mechanical and electrical contractors, bar fitters, commercial kitchen installers, and much more.

Mayor Houchen said: "Since we brought the airport back into public ownership, and saved it from closure, we've been making sure it benefits not only our business passengers and holidaymakers, but also our fantastic local companies. This way, we're doing our bit to keep the money we spend in our region and put it in the pockets of local people.

"Over the past months we've announced that Loganair will begin operating a series of domestic flights from next year and Balkan Holidays will expand its summer service twice-weekly to Bourgas, Bulgaria. The UK's biggest holiday company, TUI, is also set to start a Majorca service from Teesside in 2022. And to top it off we've secured a low-cost carrier in Ryanair, offering services to Alicante and Majorca from June 2021. Because of this, now is the right time to invest in our airport so that it can handle the increase in passengers that will be going through our airport terminal. "In the past, we've gone local for our IT services, accountancy needs, security and more, with a lot of the arrivals renovation work carried out by Stockton-based MJ Joinery. But as we look to bring the airport into the 21st century, we're going further than ever to redevelop our airport and bring mothballed areas back into use, meaning lots more exciting opportunities for companies to work with us.

"This is the perfect opportunity for local companies, across the whole host of trades that we'll need, to discover more about the vision for the future and how they can be part of the transformational change at our airport."


# N.A.F.C. JUNIORS

*I will start by wishing all of you a safe and healthy 2021.* When I wrote the column before Christmas I had hoped that by now we would be talking about easing restrictions, but the new variant of Covid-19 has put paid to that, for now. As you will know, we are now in effective lockdown again and it is imperative that we all follow the new rules.

I have had many calls and discussions on this with various ministers over the last few days. These have been primarily with the Secretary of State for Health and his team but also with the Education ministers. The first briefings from the Health team were around the details of the presentations you will have seen on TV, and the reasons underlying why these measures have proved necessary. Looking at the regional graphs we have all seen it is clear that where the new variant has taken hold it has very quickly infected at an exceptional rate. Whilst the North East and the South West seem to have been least affected so far, the new variant is still present and we need to do everything we can to stop the spread.

We then had discussions with Nadhim Zahawi who is the minister responsible for the vaccination roll out. These supported the Prime Ministers proposition that we will target, that everyone in the top 4 priority groups will have been offered a vaccine by mid February.

I have seen information that implies that for every 20 people vaccinated in category 1 it is likely that we save a life, increasing to needing 600 to be vaccinated to save a life in category 4 but to 47,000 to save a life in the last group in category 10. This clearly shows why the vaccination plan is sequenced as it is. Particularly when you then consider that of the total deaths so far 36% of them were in category 1 alone and 88% were in the top 4

groups. Whilst I understand the calls for teachers and others to be prioritised, if you look at the project from a saving lives perspective then the categories should be followed. I would encourage everyone to have the vaccine as soon as it is offered. Nadhim and his team have put in place a roll out capability that is greater than the rate the vaccine can be supplied, so the challenge is currently with the producers to supply as quickly as possible. I am told that the two key measures we need to see, moving in the right direction, to allow a release of the tiers are hospital pressures and death rates, clearly improvement in these metrics is driven by a combination of the comprehensiveness of the vaccine roll out and the adherence by people to the lockdown rules, so please do your part.

The discussions we had with the Education ministers were around what is happening to our young people in schools and colleges. We have seen the need to cancel most exams and move to largely on line learning for students. There are many different situations for different students so if you need any clarity do not hesitate to contact us. I want to recognise the extraordinary efforts of our teachers at this time. They have had a very challenging time efforts of our teachers at this time. They have had a very challenging time with the need to continually evolve guidelines. Their efforts to maintain online learning and simultaneously physically teach our more vulnerable children, and those of key workers, are incredibly important over the coming weeks and they have my complete respect and thanks for everything they do. It is also appropriate to mention key workers at this time, remember they are everywhere from our front line emergency staff to supermarket shelf stackers and from delivery drivers to refuse collectors. Please respect and thank them all in the jobs they are doing, it is their efforts in particular that will help us get through the next phase of the pandemic. Finally for this week I wanted to mention what was supposed to be the big issue in this Parliament. When I was elected, Brexit was the primary point of

issue in this Parliament. When I was elected, Brexit was supposed to be the big discussions. As you also know we very quickly "Got Brexit Done" but then entered a transition period whilst the trading arrangements with the EU were negotiated. It was said that it was impossible to get a deal that had no tariffs or quotas but still freed us from the European Court of Justice. Well, that "impossible" deal has been delivered and I am delighted with the outcome. For the first time since 2016 our businesses know the legal frameworks in which they will be working for years to come and they can plan accordingly. Whilst this has been happening Liz Truss, Secretary of State for International Trade, has been getting on with business and negotiated around 70 trade deals with countries around the world.

In summary, we have what are hopefully the final weeks of the pandemic to deal with now, but we also have the major positives of the vaccine roll out and the opportunities that we can carve out as a sovereign state to complement our European trade.

For now though, it's a case of Stay Home, Save Lives, Protect our NHS. Stay safe and look after you and yours. Paul Howell, Member of Parliament for Sedgefield.
