Vane Road School to be Hitachi Investment used as Polling Station

Dear Sir

I am a Governor at Vane Road Primary School and I want to use the medium of the Newton News to highlight what I believe to be a really poor decision made by the Council.

Despite the strenuous rejection by the school of a request from the Council to use the school on 6th May for the Elections, we have now received a letter from them stating that there is no alternative. You and I will both know that there are many alternatives but it appears that the Council simply aren't prepared to consider them. Whilst the school is, as you know, a new build and it was designed to enable it to be used as a Polling Station, without having to close the school, I feel that the fact that there will still be significant restrictions on society at that time, shows that the Government believe that the risk of the Covid-19 virus being transmitted in the community will still be high. For this reason, if we have to hold the Elections in school, I don't believe that it would be safe to keep the

children in school at the same time. I feel that this is wholly unacceptable and the school has written to the Head of Education, Richard Crane, and the Local MP, Paul Howell, to raise our serious concerns. I believe that there was an agreement by Government, that if the elections were to take place in May, that schools would not be used as they have been disrupted enough this year. This however seems to have been ignored,

particularly in so far as Vane Road is concerned.

The children have lost so much education over the last year that my view is that the children need to be in school, but more importantly, they (and staff) need to be kept safe and having voters on school site during this time would compromise this. I would ask that any reader of this article use any influence that they might have to try and get this absurd decision overturned. David Knight

News Welcomed

A major investment by train builder Hitachi in its County Durham plant has been welcomed by council leaders.

Hitachi Rails

announcement of a further investment in its state-of-art factory in Newton Aycliffe will



not only see the creation of additional jobs, it will also benefit the wider business community.

The move will see the launch of new welding and painting facilities at the site, allowing the company to manufacture its signature high-tech aluminium carriage shells on site rather than importing them from overseas.

It means the facility, which has the contract to build the next generation of intercity trains for East Midlands Railway and Avanti West Coast, will be able to manufacture trains in their entirety.

The latest news means that company has now invested a total of £110 million into the site, meaning the addition of around 40 additional roles.

Hitachi Rail's continued commitment to its employees, including extensive training programmes and further training to obtain specialist welding qualifications, is also being welcomed. The Newton Aycliffe site's new manufacturing capabilities will allow Hitachi Rail to further expand its north east supply chain, deepening its relationship with supplies such as Dyer Engineering and Hydram Engineering.

Cllr. Simon Henig, Leader of Durham County Council, said: "The news that Hitachi is making another substantial investment in Newton Aycliffe demonstrates its commitment to County Durham, its workforce, and the future of its site here.

"The latest announcement, which signals a total £110 million investment in the county by the company, is a significant milestone for the business and for the county. It's a great boost for our local economy at a time when our focus is very much on economic recovery from the impact of the pandemic.

"As well as providing employment for hundreds of local people, the plant supports many more through the 130 businesses that make up its local supply chain."

Cllr. Carl Marshall, Durham County Council's cabinet member for economic regeneration, said: "We worked hard to attract Hitachi to County Durham against fierce competition from around the country. Happily, Hitachi able were to see the vision we had and the fantastic opportunities we are able to offer businesses looking to relocate to the region.

"We have a long and proud tradition of manufacturing and as pioneers of the railway industry, having brand new intercity trains made in County Durham is a fitting reference to the past. It also illustrates that we embrace the opportunity to innovate and as a county we have so much to offer."

Put Up or Shut Up Location Agreement Reached for Locomotion No.1

The Science Museum Group (SMG) and Darlington Borough Council (DBC) have reached an agreement that will see the historic engine Locomotion No.1 move to Locomotion in Shildon in March, with a 6-month return to Head of Steam in the first half of 2025 - the bicentenary year for the iconic Stockton & Darlington Railway. The agreement also allows for two further loans of Locomotion No.1 to Darlington (totalling 12 months) between 2026 and 2030. It has also been agreed that both DBC and SMG will actively seek opportunities for Locomotion No.1 to go on loan to the council beyond 2030 - for up to two periods of 12 months, or one period of 24 months, in each five-year period.

Signalling the determination of both organisations to work together for the best possible outcome for the region, SMG will renew 28 other loans to Head of Steam from the National Collection. These include the tremendously important Derwent, the oldest surviving locomotive built in Darlington, NER Tennant, NER Raven T3 and a number of smaller items which help to illustrate the incredibly rich and significant railway history of the town.

The announcement is part of a Memorandum of Understanding agreed by SMG (owners of Locomotion No.1) and DBC that covers the period until 2030. Both Locomotion and Head of Steam have ambitious plans to redevelop and grow their museums over the next five years, culminating in the 200th anniversary of the Stockton and Darlington Railway in 2025

At Locomotion, this includes a £4.5m project to construct a brand-new collections building that will significantly increase the amount of covered space available to visitors and house around 40 rail vehicles from the National Collection.

Recent developments at Locomotion have seen the repair and rejuvenation of Locomotion's historic buildings - a collection of unique Grade II-listed buildings including the former home of Timothy Hackworth (the first locomotive superintendent of the Stockton & Darlington Railway), as well as workers' cottages and Soho Shed - the earliest surviving industrial building in Shildon, and arguably the oldest goods handling rail building in the world. Darlington Borough Council, working in partnership with Tees Valley Combined Authority, plans to create a major new £25million visitor destination and museum around the North Road Station site, opening in 2024. This free-to-enter tourist attraction will be a central part of the bi-centenary celebrations of the Stockton & Darlington Railway (S&DR) in 2025.

Locomotion No.1 will be part of that celebration at the Head of Steam. The development will combine multiple listed buildings into a unique visitor experience including major exhibition and interpretation space, café, archive, study area, and function spaces.

Also on the site will be a purpose-built facility for the creation and maintenance of



steam locomotives by A1 Steam Locomotive Trust with public viewing facilities and interpretation, and the 1861 Building, a facility for the repair, maintenance, storage and display of locomotives and associated rail artifacts.

The 1861 Building will be occupied and operated by two separate organisations, the North Eastern Locomotive Preservation Group (NELPG) and Darlington Railway Preservation Society (DRPS).

Lib Dem Councillor on a Money Saving Expedition

Liberal Democrat Town Councillor, Michael Stead (Woodham Ward), who is also standing for the County Council in May's elections wants to consult on cutting councillor numbers from 30 to 23.

Cllr. Stead commented, "So many people are saying we do not need 30 town councillors. I totally agree with them. The National Association of Councils recommends that a town of our size should have around 23 councillors."

Councillor Stead says this would save money

and allow for a review of boundaries to make the council more democratic. After consulting with Durham County Council he has discovered that this is done through them and not the Boundary Commission, which had been suggested by others last week. In addition, he says, the council is undemocratic.

addition, he says, the council is undemocratic. Michael explains, "Not only do we have too many councillors but in some areas there is one councillor per 500 residents whilst in another area it's one councillor for nearly 900. This is completely undemocratic. By coincidence, I think it probably favours the Labour Party."

Cllr Stead's motion is being debated this week and would see a review to cut councillor numbers and reorganise town council wards so they are fair. Stead also sees this as one of many ways to cut costs at the Town Council.

Cllr Stead adds, "Every week I see another opportunity to do things more efficiently. More and more ways to save money. I'm seeing this, and so are residents. My campaign over the last 18 months has already seen our first Town Council tax freeze for what seems like forever. We now need to have passion for every penny and a war on waste. This will protect services and keep council tax down." "I am also still determined to end the injustice which sees us pay hundreds of pounds more council tax than residents in Crook, Consett and Chester-le-Street. Tackling this is essential. It seems that both the Tories and Labour are not interested in tackling the unfairness of double taxation, so it's left to the rest of us to keep the pressure on."

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Taxpayers Money Wasted

Dear Sir,

I agree with Derreck Pinkney in feeling taxpayers' money spent on 'improving' the approaches to the mini roundabout at the junction of School Aycliffe Lane and Horndale Way was wasted, but he is wrong to suspect the purpose of this was to protect DCC employees by 'constantly having to organise remedial works'.

This cannot be the case, as DCC doesn't do remedial works any time soon! Aside from looking at the state of our roads, I know this because back in 2015 I notified the Council and my local Councillors of issues with badly damaged pinch point bollards on Pease Way and Stephenson Way and, despite a follow up reminder in 2019, and a supporting email to the relevant Council officer from Councillor Eddy Adam, with the possible exception of one set, they still haven't been repaired!

Several of the bollards marking the pinch points still show obvious signs of severe impact damage, one being totally sheared off, and several others have reflectors which are missing. I have witnessed numerous near-misses where there has nearly been a head-on collision, and some drivers probably avoided a collision by steering into the columns.

I hate speed bumps with a passion, but I hate pinch points even more! They stop rather than slow traffic and put cars on a collision path. The one on Stephenson Way near the bus stop causes gridlock at times, with nobody able to go anywhere due to the intersection of two other roads.

I'd prefer the pinch points to be removed altogether, but, failing this, DCC should at least ensure the bollards are fit for purpose and not the eyesore they are now.

Back in 2019, the guide price was £21,000 for each chicane and £14,000 for each speed cushion, I have no figures, but expect the pinch points would cost about the same as chicanes, so I appreciate why the Council would be reluctant to replace what is already there, and rue the taxpayers' money spent in putting them there in the first place. I hope they don't build any more!

I was also advised that in the five years prior to the introduction of the traffic calming there had been no accidents on Pease Way and only one 'rear end shunt' on Stephenson Way, which further begs the question as to whether it was worth the cost of installing the scheme in the first place.

If there has to be traffic calming, I favour chicanes as the least bad option. At least they facilitate safe crossing, though swerving erodes tyres and braking and accelerating uses fuel. Speed bumps damage cars and cause erratic driving, braking and accelerating uses more energy, causes tyre erosion and damages suspension. My late father hated them because they made him wince with pain (he had a spinal problem).

On the subject of spinal problems, I have noticed that many of the roads in and around town are now breaking up, with numerous pot holes developing, and what have been repaired have only been repaired temporarily and often unevenly. I realise this is a costly problem, but the taxpayers' money wasted on unnecessary junction 'improvements' and unpopular and potentially fatal traffic calming measures would surely have been more wisely used on such necessary repairs. I hope they have retained enough of our money to carry out these repairs, and properly. John Snowball

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Parking Danger at School Time

Dear Sir,

This week the schools opened with a sigh of relief from most parents and a lot of the children. However, the driving standards in the mornings for the start of the school day, and when schools are letting the children out, haven't improved at all, in fact it's probably got worse. Parents parking where they like, in front of drives, on pavements, corner of junction and keep clean lines, just to save them walking a few extra steps. Then there are the late comers who drop their children off on the yellow zig-zag lines or just literally stop anywhere. Do these individuals not realise the dangers they are putting other children and parents in, as well as their own children? I would also like to make a comment regarding the installation of the traffic islands at the mini roundabout at the bottom of School Aycliffe Lane, which one of your readers complained about. I personally don't see how they cause a problem for any drivers, in fact they improve the situation as they stop drivers going over or diagonally cutting the roundabout, which of course drivers shouldn't be doing anyway. Danger, Urgent Action Required

Dear Sir,

A dangerous situation exists in the Moor area of the town. This area is situated close to the roundabout into Woodham.

The land was originally declared unstable by Sedgefield Borough Council and unfit for housing or recreational purposes (I will return to this in future letters).

The land was given over to nature and Great Aycliffe Town Council agreed to maintain the area.

When the development of housing on the Cobbler's Hall site took place, Durham County Council promised to develop the area into a Nature Park/Reserve. The area would have ponds, viewing platforms and be planted up with appropriate marshland plants.

On viewing the plans, the Town Council realised that the ponds were nothing more than deep, steep-sided, clay-lined sumps. We immediately objected to them on safety grounds and tore up our agreement to maintain the site.

The engineer who was tasked with drawing up the plans for the pond informed the Town Council that his brief was not to build nature ponds but to put a surface drainage system into that area.

In my experience, such systems are expensive as underground cisterns have to be installed. These cisterns gradually hold back water and feed it slowly into approved water courses.

During construction, lifebuoys were installed to ensure the safety of the workforce. On completion of the work, the lifebuoys were removed.

Other promised work on the site never came to fruition, apart from a cheap, inadequate chestnut paling fence.

At a meeting between the Deputy Leader of Durham County Council and the Portfolio Holder for Neighbourhood Services at Durham County Council, the Town Clerk and myself were offered that the ownership of the land could be transferred to the Town Council. We pointed out most firmly that we would not accept the area, that it was a very real risk to life and that Durham County Council should address the situation immediately.

In recent times, Durham County Council have replaced paddling pools at the Riverside Park in Chester-le-Street at considerable capital and revenue cost. It appears to me that nothing is too good for those who live north of Durham Gate and anything is good enough for people such as those in Aycliffe who live south of it. This is a case where there is a potential danger to children's lives and saving money on such a scheme is totally unacceptable. At the very least, the ponds should be capped and a high metal security fence placed around them.

Finally, this should be done immediately. Councillor Bob Fleming

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International Women's Day

In the week we celebrate International Women's Day, we are still reeling from the news that NHS workers will only be receiving a 1% pay rise, the equivalent of the cost of one sandwich a week. Why are these linked? Well, 77% of workers in the NHS are women.

Indeed, the majority of workers in front-line services are women. Women are also the majority when it comes to zero-hour contracts and insecure work, which have been hit hardest during the pandemic and women have suffered the biggest drop in earnings.

Most childcare responsibilities still falling on the shoulders of women, who have been expected to continue working from home, while also home educating their children. Yet it is known that future economic growth will depend on access to high quality, affordable childcare, which is still lacking.

A recent report by the Commons Women and Inequalities Committee stated that the economic fall out from Covid is having a worse impact on women, and covid support policies are 'skewed toward men' worsening inequality. It warns that any advances made in economic equality are rapidly going backwards. This is on top of ten years of Tory austerity policies and huge benefit cuts, which also mostly impacted women. Given the lack of concern by this government about the impact of its policies on 50% of our nations population, who is best placed to speak up for women? The answer to that is women themselves.

We need more women speaking out to ensure women's voices and their perspective is considered throughout our political system. This not only benefits women, but studies also show when women benefit from political decisions, men do to.

It's not easy for women to have a voice, surveys show women in the political sphere receive the most abuse and are attacked for things their male counterparts are praised for, but, together we can stand up to this behaviour.

So well done to Paul Howell MP for bringing the Treasury to Darlington, with its 750 jobs, in the recent government Budget. However, I cannot but point out that DCC's Budget last month plans for 30,000 jobs. So well done Teesside! 

This week's blog focuses on thanking everyone who helps this rescue out with donations of goods, crafts, food and monetary assistance and you will all see regular people being mentioned Sonia, June, Pat and her husband, also Sheila. We



are going to tell all our Newtonians why our fundraising is important.

All over the United Kingdom there are just under 1000 rescue centres, that are being ran from our homes. We are not only responsible for feeding, cleaning, diagnosing and treating these very vulnerable mammals we are also self funded which is why we do car boot sales when we can. Every hog that comes in gets assessed, weighed and cared for as appropriate to their medical needs. Indoors, not outside in a shed, where they can be watched and they need warmth too. Hoglets need either a vivarium or an incubator, feeding around the clock and specialist foods. Also the greatest reason we take these beautiful cute mammals into our homes is really because they we are very fond of them, just because they are classed as wild animals it doesn't mean they don't feel pain, cold or sadness. Us rehabbers see all of this which is why we want the species to survive, they are a protected species which are also endangered. They don't have fleas and if they do the fleas are Hedgehog specific, rescue centres can sort fly strike, maggots, fleas and ticks, there are many things we are called upon to do to save their precious lives. We need finders to recognise that they are also nocturnal so if one is seen out in daytime looking lethargic or at risk from cars or predators they need to be picked up, placed in a high sided box with a heat source, maybe a hot water bottle wrapped in a towel, and a rescue centre informed or a vet, vets don't charge finders because they have a relationship with rescue centres and can pass a hoggie to a rescue centre to follow up treatment, rehab and release.

A lovely lady called Margaret of Bewick Crescent was in that situation on Monday night, poorly hog on her back doorstep, within half an hour we brought him in, warmed him through, doing really nicely and seems to appreciate getting the help he needs, Oscar is his name after her new baby grandson, she saved him, she names him, lovely isn't it.

Tip of the week: Either ring British Hedgehog Preservation Society on 01584 890801 or get in touch with a local vet and I hope you all know which one we use or visit our Facebook page Prickly Haven Hedgehog Hotel.



As I said last week, the hope was for a budget for the north, well I was absolutely delighted with the huge announcements made. Foremost upon these for us was the Treasury to lead an Economic campus to be based in Darlington, to have this complemented by the Freeport for Teesside and the Offshore wind infrastructure at Port of Tees was just outstanding. There were many other positive announcements, but these were the stand outs for me. I will take time in future columns to explain the benefits of a Freeport but today will focus on the Treasury. From what I have heard so far, the intent will be to move around 750 jobs to this campus. The important word here is jobs, not people. It will probably only see around 100-150 people relocate. When I spoke to the Chancellor, at the 1922 committee, he assured me that the jobs on the campus will include real decision makers and that he himself expects to spend several days a week there. Another point to note is that it is an Economic Campus, not just the Treasury but Business, Energy and Industrial Strategy; International Trade and Local Government will also be residents. This is fantastic for job and career opportunities but in my time in the local councils one of the regular complaints was that these departments didn't understand our region when making decisions and having these jobs based in our patch should be transformative in this understanding.

Normally with a budget there is some point of detail that opposition politicians find that can be misinterpreted for their political advantage, it's a shame that this time they are again politicising our fantastic front line NHS workers by claiming they have been offered a 1% rise. My understanding is that in the budget Government set aside the money for the NHS pay rise, that money equates to a 1% pay rise across all grades

- but that isn't necessarily what DHSC want or that the Independent Pay Review Body will recommend. That could translate into a 2% pay rise for nurses, 1% for healthcare workers and no rise for doctors, or whatever scenario the review body propose, but it's for the Independent Body to make their recommendations.

One of my great pleasures this week was a call with the team at Job Centre Plus, whilst clearly they are seeing more demand, they are also seeing significant numbers of new positions being filled. The team were fabulous to talk to, they are so positive and enthusiastic in their work and doing all they can to match people to the different opportunities arising. I also had discussions with Tom Dower, the head of the UTC, and Lord Baker who was one of the primary motivators for its founding. It was great to hear their future plans but also that every one of the students leaving them went on to either employment, education or training. The primary companies supporting the UTC are Gestamp and Hitachi. On Friday I was able to visit Hitachi to see what normally would have been my highlight of the week. I met with their UK lead, Jim Brewin, who showed me their latest investment in welding and paint facilities. This is such a powerful and fundamental step forward for the site, it changes them from being primarily an assembly operation to being a manufacturer. This adds so many more skill sets to their outstanding employee base and increases the range of their capabilities when bidding for contracts. It has also been an important week for the Restoring Your Railways agendas, I will go into more details another time but the detail work plan on the Ferryhill Station bid evaluation has been agreed and the Leamside and Weardale bids have been submitted. I also met the team at Teesside Airport to see the way the Airport is being reconfigured to deal with the increased business. They are creating separate check in desks for the new Ryan Air flights as well as new scheduled check in desks. Let's hope we get the opportunity to use them sooner rather than later.

I also popped in to see the vaccination team at Cobbler's Hall and found yet another group of people so enthusiastic about their work. They are delivering an outstanding roll out and I can only thank them for all they are doing. I am scheduled for my first jab on Friday 12th, I can't wait. I join the team in being intensely irritated by those continuing to deny Covid, in particular a local councillor whose nonsense is not helpful. This week will have seen the schools open

and us all thinking about the next steps. It will not be long before we will see the opportunity for pubs with outdoor spaces to open and I hope the local councils do everything they can to support them, should planning permissions be needed, as I am sure demand will be high.

Please continue to follow the rules, we are making fantastic progress.

For now, Stay Home, Protect the NHS and Save Lives - Stay Safe. Paul Howell

Charity Donates Large Veg Boxes for Busy Hospital Staff

NHS staff on the front line caring for patients, including those with Covid-19, at Darlington Memorial Hospital, are benefiting from home grown organic produce, thanks to the skills and generosity of young people and volunteers at the Outdoor Learning Centre in Croft-on-Tees, run by Clervaux Trust.

Clervaux Trust decided to use an award of £2,000 from The Hadrian Trust specifically to support key workers during the current crisis - to give the hospital ten large vegetable boxes a week, for twelve weeks. Each box is packed with top quality fresh fruit, preserves and eggs, as well as vegetables, most of which are grown in polytunnels at Clervaux's 100-

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acre farm site. The produce is intended for staff to take home or have as a snack during a busy shift.

Bethan Davies, fundraiser at Clervaux Trust, commented, "We have a mix of children and adults with Special Educational Needs, aged from ten, placed with us on residential and day programmes at our Outdoor Learning Centre. They're supported by staff and volunteers to grow a wide range of organic produce. During this time of crisis, they wanted to do something to show their support for key NHS workers as well as bringing communities together - we've been able to achieve this thanks to the money given to us by The Hadrian Trust. Work Begins on Landmark Industrial Development

The latest phase of a major County Durham scheme is now underway with the development of a range of industrial units at Station Place in Newton Aycliffe. Station Place, which is now under construction, is part of the wider £90m Merchant Park industrial scheme in Newton Aycliffe - a 65-acre development at Aycliffe Business Park off J59 of the A1(M) and home to Hitachi Rail.

The new £4.8 million scheme on Site 2 at Merchant Park is set to provide 50,333 sq ft of new industrial space to support new and expanding businesses in Newton Aycliffe. Work will start on Station Place this month after planning permission was granted in December 2020.

The scheme is due to complete in early 2022 and will deliver a total of ten new industrial units ranging in size from 5,000 sq ft for start-up and growing businesses and creating 130 jobs.

Durham County Council is supporting the development of the industrial units, after agreeing to a 35-year-lease at Station Place in September 2019.

The units will be managed by Business Durham, the economic development arm of the council. The development is being delivered in partnership with Merchant Anglo and Rokeby Developments.

Station Place is part of Aycliffe Business Park, which is the largest Business Park in the North East, home to a wide range of well-established businesses and next to Hitachi Rail Europe.



F.A. "Curtails" The Ebac Northern League Season

Newton Aycliffe captain Aaron Brown has spoken to the club website following the FA's decision to curtail the 2020-21 season at Steps 3 to 6 including Ebac Northern League Division One.

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The Northern League season has been suspended since the beginning of November following the Government's imposed lockdown and has yet to resume as Coronavirus cases continued to increase across the country during the winter months, resulting in an extension of the nationwide lockdown into the New Year.

Following the Prime Minister's recent national public address outlining the roadmap out of lockdown, the decision has finally been made by the FA to cease the 2020-21 season with immediate effect "no further league matches taking place this season," with clubs yet to reach the half way stage of the campaign. In a statement published on Wednesday, February 24, the FA said: "The FA's Alliance and League Committees have now considered the large amount of data and information submitted by clubs across the National League System Steps 3-6.

"The results of the survey showed that over 76% of all clubs across Steps 3-6 indicated a preference to curtail the 2020-21 league season if it could not be restarted with limited spectator numbers and hospitality by April 1, 2021.

"Taking into account the survey results and the ongoing impact of COVID-19, which continues to adversely affect incomes



for clubs, due to restrictions on both spectators and hospitality, the FA's Alliance and League Committees have reached a consensus that subject to the approval of FA Council, the 2020-21 league season for Steps 3-6 of the NLS should be curtailed with immediate effect." Speaking of the decision, club captain Brown said: "It's frustrating more than anything because we've just been waiting for the inevitable I



suppose, but the decision is not surprising there weren't many alternatives, especially at our level."

While clubs at Steps 1 and 2 of the nonleague football pyramid had been granted permission to continue due to their elite status, they too have found it difficult to continue their season with the National League North and South at Step 2 recently voting to declare their season null and void. "I think once you saw the likes of Spennymoor and Darlington have their season's stopped there was only going to be one outcome for us," said Brown. "Again it's just frustrating because we've been trying to keep spirits up in our group chats and keep on top of our fitness in the unlikely event we could come back and now we just have to wait to see if we can start the new season in August." The decision means it is the second successive season the Northern League has failed to reach its conclusion following the null and void outcome of the 2019-20 campaign in March last year after the Covid-19 outbreak first began in the UK.


At that stage Aycliffe had played 30 of their 38 Ebac Northern League Division One fixtures whereas at the suspension of play this time Colin Stromsoy's side had played just 12 league fixtures.

"It makes more sense this time with us having played less than half the season," explains Brown. "I think last year there were alternatives where the likes of Stockton in our division or South Shields, higher up the leagues, would not have felt as aggrieved. This time, with so much of the season still to go, it's not as clear cut for teams at the top. I suppose you can look at Hebburn and say they looked good to have a successful season but behind them, there were six or seven teams - including ourselves - who will all feel they could have had a good crack at promotion this season."

It means Aycliffe will finish the season fifth in the table with 22 points from their 12 games including six wins, four draws and two defeats.

Aycliffe began the season unbeaten in their first nine games; a run which saw them win 6-0 away to Thornaby, 7-1 away to Northallerton Town and claim dramatic comefrom-behind wins against Newcastle Benfield and West Auckland Town.

"We made a really solid start to the season," said Brown. "There were some really good results in those first few weeks of the season and even though we had a bit of a bad week before the season stopped I think we all thought we were in a good place and could have a good go this season. We've got a young squad but there are a lot of good



Attentions will now turn to the summer and whether football can return for the 2021-22 season, hopefully with spectators once again being allowed in to stadiums and clubhouses open to help with club revenues throughout the league.

The Ebac Northern League is consulting clubs in both divisions on whether they would wish to compete in an improvised league cup competition during the months of April and May, should the opportunity present itself. Currently, it is not known when spectators will be allowed to attend games and as such, the competition would not involve mandatory participation and clubs would be able to optout. The deadline for clubs to declare their interest was Friday 5th March.
