
A 'Brainy Bunch' **Competition Winner**

Further Fantastic Public Support for Defibrillator Project

Following our recent annual Newton News update on the current 24-hour Public Access Defibrillator Project for Avcliffe, I am yet again delighted with the responses.



Firstly, David and Julie Morton contacted me. David, a local businessman, has heart problems and was considering buying a defibrillator for his own use.

However, as he said to me "it's not going to be much help to anyone else if it's in a cupboard under my stairs".

They have donated a substantial sum to purchase and install, for public availability, an outdoor cabinet on their home at Foxton Close. We will equip this box with our spare defibrillator which will be available via a 999 call.

Situated at the entrance to Foxton Close from Woodham Way it is the ideal location, and bridges the gap between the units at the PCP and Woodham Community Centre. A public campaign is now underway to raise a further £1,200 to purchase a new spare unit, which backs up all the existing units. David and Julie are raising funds locally, and donations can also be made by contacting me or by:

Follow instructions to make donation, Make reference Defibrilator donation. Secondly, Philip Clark contacted me on behalf of Horndale Community Committee. The Committee were one of the very first

to help start the project several years ago. They will be funding the fitting and support, for another outdoor unit on Greenway Convenience store. The shop owners, the Singh family, will maintain the unit using the funds donated by the Residents Community and accounted for by Woodham Village Community Association.

These two units provide further links to the chain of potential lifesaving equipment. The few remaining gaps of coverage are rapidly being filled. Our aim is that by the end of this year we could have most residents within a radius of 500 yards of a defibrillator.

This highlights again what I have said so many times, Newton Aycliffe is a wonderful place to live, full of incredibly good people who care about their community. As Covid lockdown eases we will restart the free CPR and Defibrillator use courses so watch Newton News for details.

The street lights were removed a number of years ago, having only just been replaced a few weeks before. There are a number of houses near the golf club on both sides of the road which are now isolated unless you walk during daylight hours or have a car. The stretch of road without lighting is very dark and there are woods on both sides of the road, it is not a pleasant walk in the dark, indeed it is frightening. The bus stop is also situated in the middle of this dark stretch of road. Children have to use that bus stop to get to and from school and I am aware the light nights are coming, but it is still a risk. So, I ask you, in light of Sarah's murder and the growing movement to light our streets and keep people safe, do you feel it is now time to review these lights as a matter of urgency to keep all people who walk that stretch of road safe? Award Success for Children's Services

A North East council has won a national award for its work to support children and families across County Durham.

Durham County Council's youth justice service has enjoyed success at the Children and Young People Now Awards, with its Parenting Support Group winning the Family Justice Award. Despite the pressures of responding to the pandemic, there were more 600 entries into this year's awards, which have become the gold standard for everyone working with children,

young people and families.

The council's Parenting Support Group (PSG) was established in 2016 to support the parents of young people who offend and who are at risk of offending.

Since then, it has helped more than 70 parents and carers, with sessions focusing on a number of topics including adolescence and the teenage brain, communication and self-care.

The group has also continued to support parents and carers throughout the lockdown, delivering sessions virtually. Every parent involved with the support group has said it has helped them learn new skills and 100 per cent of parents would also recommend the group to other parents in a similar situation. The service was also highly commended in the Youth Justice Award, for its work with The Skill Mill. The Skill Mill is a social enterprise business which directly employ young people who have previously offended, for six months, helping to reduce reoffending and support young people into further longer-term employment.

Cllr Olwyn Gunn, Cabinet member for children and young people's services, said: "This is a fantastic achievement for everyone involved in our youth justice service. These awards highlight the very best practice in working with children, young people and families, so to win one award and be highly commended in another is outstanding. "Providing much needed support to parents is crucial in helping our children and young people to lead happy, healthy and safe lives and it is wonderful to hear how much of a difference that our Parenting Support Group makes to both parents and their children.

"The fact that these awards are judged by an expert panel and a panel of young people only further highlights the wonderful work of all those involved who are striving to improve the lives of others. I hope that our staff members, volunteers and parents all feel a great sense of pride for all they are doing to improve the outcomes of our young people."

Junction 7 Covid-19 Community Support

Thanks to funding secured through Great Aycliffe and Middridge Partnership, Junction 7 in Newton Aycliffe have successfully supported families across the area during the Covid-19 pandemic. Junction 7 were successful in applying for and securing two grants through the GAMP Covid-19 Area Budget fund, to help them provide much-needed food, essentials, and support to families across Newton Aycliffe.

Simon Day from Junction 7 said: "We recieved a huge increase in demand for our service since the outbreak, receiving more referrals each week. The funding received helped us greatly in supporting those additional families, that found themselves in need during this difficult time. I would also like to take the opportunity to thank the numerous volunteers who gave their time each week to help support the scheme, without this support we would have struggled to cope with the demand."

Since the beginning of the pandemic Junction 7 have operated a referral system for food packages out of their base in The ARK at Silverdale Place, where a team of volunteers put packs together and organise their safe distribution and collection.

Further Improvements to an Expanding Woodham Academy



Woodham Academy continues to invest in the fabric of the school, with another brand-new science laboratory and fully refurbished music room now open. The organisation was successful in applying for and securing two grants through the GAMP Covid-19 Area Budget fund, to help them provide much-needed essentials and support to families across Newton Aycliffe.

Since the beginning of the Covid 19 pandemic LCA have been providing cleaning packs and baby packs to individuals and families who were experiencing financial difficulties and struggling to purchase the cleaning and personal products they needed to keep themselves, their belongings and their homes virus free.

Pauline Chambers from Lifeline Community Action said:

"The demand across the area for our service dramatically increased when the outbreak took hold, with more families and individuals requiring our support. The funding received helped us greatly in the ability to support those additional families, that found themselves in need during this difficult time.

We have supported a total of 231 people with the funding received which is slightly more than we expected, but we were only too happy to be able to help where we could".

PACT Meeting: 10th February, 6pm, on Police Facebook page

Hello, I am PCSO Sarah Button from the Newton Aycliffe Neighbourhood Policing Team.

Following on from reports of an on-going issue with anti-social behaviour, we have recently carried out an operation to tackle this problem in the Western Area of town.

The operation worked successfully and resulted in: 2 off road bikes seized, 5 fixed penalty notices have been issued to parents for those kids who have had 2 warnings in relation to breach of Covid-19 regulations, 1 car seized, 1 person arrested for drug driving, 14 home visits conducted by the team to speak with the problem youths (during these visits some were issued with warnings some were issued with FPN), high levels of foot patrols carried out throughout the area, home visits conducted to reassure concerned members of the community.

This work will continue, as we are fully committed in ensuring that your concerns are addressed.

We have finally been given some details from the Government mapping our way out of Covid-19 restrictions, there is a light at the end of the tunnel! To support this happening, we all need to keep doing our best to ensure we are following the regulations set out to us by the Government and keep everybody as safe as possible. We would also like to encourage residents to sign up to "Keep in the Know" full details below.

Have you heard of our online messaging service 'Keep in the Know'? By signing up to this service, for free, you can find out what's happening in your local area – receive regular crime updates, information on road closures and learn about what your local neighbourhood policing team is doing. 

Last week was critical for Durham County Council's Climate initiative.

GREEN INDUSTRIAL GROWTH

TUESDAY morning, I met with DCC Climate officers and Business Durham to be briefed on the 'green industrial revolution' in County Durham. I wanted to ask them HOW climate change could bring economic growth. A recent study showed that DCC is one of few councils which regards Climate Change as an opportunity for economic regeneration; we must turn that intention into jobs.

CLIMATE EMERGENCY RESPONSE PLAN

Next, on WEDNESDAY morning, the DCC Cabinet met to review and confirm the Council's Climate Emergency Response Plan (CERP) after its first year. It is a programme for two years only and - with 111 actions to complete (each one costed and budgeted and, crucially, a named person's responsibility) - the pace of action has been breathless. The Plan has been financed by a £3 million revenue budget, expected to draw in capital totalling some £50 million. Cabinet heard how progress has continued throughout the pandemic, with only a handful of projects delayed (mostly, those that relied on face-to-face meetings), and just three cancelled (one because the government redirected the funding to the pandemic). Indeed, far from stalling through the pandemic, the programme has grown - it now numbers nearer 140 actions, including new major initiatives such as an £8 million Zero-Carbon Depot (powered by its own solar farm) and a scheme to site 160 EV chargepoints in lesscommercially-favourable locations in the county.

The Council's Climate action has earned a string of accolades. One study declared County Durham "the UK's greenest city". Another found the CERP one of only 13 Plans in the country to have an adequate Food Policy. The Council's Business Energy Efficiency team was praised at two prestigious European conferences, and is so highly regarded that, despite Brexit, it has been invited to join an EU 'SME-Power' collaboration. Finally, in December, our CERP won the APSE award for best national climate initiative - the 'Oscars' of UK public service and a stunning achievement considering the amazing work of councils all over the country. Wednesday's Cabinet report also signalled where we intend to go. Of all the report, Paragraph 53 is *my* paragraph - it outlines the principles that I, as Climate Champion, have been seeking to imprint onto the Council's developing strategy: a green new deal; more work on adaptation; a just transition; embedding; engagement. EMBEDDING

I have urged officers to build climate progress into the automatic, everyday functioning of the Council. We now have:

a Corporate Director of 'Neighbourhoods and Climate Change' at the top table;

- a oversight 'Net Zero Carbon Board' at senior-officer level;
- a 'Climate requirement' inserted into every job description;
- a 'Climate Change' assessment in the 'Implications' appendix of every decision;

the Low Carbon Team asked to comment on every relevant planning application;

the opportunity to add climate requirements to the Council's procurement process.

The aim is to become, not a Council which does climate actions, but a climate-focussed Council.

ENGAGEMENT

THURSDAY morning saw another milestone. To better engage about Climate Change, we have set up a 'Climate Emergency Strategic Board' of key stakeholders. DCC cannot decarbonise the County alone, so the Board will enlist big local players to help address some of the huge county-wide climate problems. A second body will engage with residents, especially climate action groups; we want people to hold the council to account, and to help create policy. SCRUTINY

Finally, on FRIDAY morning Cllr Eddy Adams' Environment Scrutiny Committee, too, assessed the CERP - watch on: https://youtu. be/0VX2FAz_utc

So last year not only achieved great things but, hopefully, set up next year to do even better.



Moving forward, looking back: a year of ingenuity for Darlington Hippodrome.

On Monday 16th March 2020, Darlington Hippodrome temporarily closed its doors following official government guidance that advised people should avoid public buildings due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

It's been a demanding and unpredictable year since then, but thanks to the theatre's dedicated staff and, most importantly, their loyal customers, there has been plenty to smile about and take part in over the last year.

The regular online Hippodrome Pub Quiz (without the pub!) has been the smash hit of the year. Marketing Officer Julian Cound has excelled as the genial host of the regular brain workouts. Julian has helmed 67 trivia streams which have seen over 4200 guizzers take part!

It's been a challenge to keep active whilst we've been in lockdown but with the help of dance partners The D Project, the theatre has put on over 50 dance fitness sessions for adults. The Monday Movers session for the over 65s has proven particularly popular. The kids have been alright too with 130 youth theatre and dance sessions taking place onstage (when restrictions allowed) and online.

Senior House Manager Andy Hutchinson-Clish took us on a virtual tour around the Hippodrome's usually off-limits backstage areas and led viewers on a virtual ghost tour (the theatre has so many ghosts this required two videos!). These videos have racked up over 10,400 views

The Hippodrome's two charities of the year, St Teresa's Hospice and Darlington Samaritans, have been the recipients of the continued generosity of the theatre's following. Over the last year, participants in our Hippodrome Pub Quiz have donated £315 to Darlington Samaritans. In early December 2020, a group of staff (and a few dogs) ran the St Teresa's Hospice Santa Fun Run dressed as Santas, raising an incredible £1290 to help the hospice continue the vital work they do.

And it's not just external charities that have experienced the kindness of the theatre-going public - a staggering £20,000 has been donated to the theatre by customers.

People have also been able to enjoy classic cinema screenings, book clubs, artist masterclasses, literary livestreams, a digital careers fair, and life drawing sessions.

There is hope on the horizon for the return of live events and the Hippodrome team are working hard to continue their innovative programme of online events whilst planning an exciting programme of public events both inside and outside the theatre.

Councillor Andy Keir, Darlington Borough Council's cabinet member for local services, said "The theatre has faced a tough year but managed to keep the public engaged with an exciting and regular programme of events and activities. The generosity of the public towards the theatre's chosen charities and the theatre itself has been heart-warming and commendable. There is some light at the end of the tunnel and I'm sure we all can't wait until we're able to enjoy the Hippodrome again in person."

Last week I was pleased to get my vaccine jab at one of our local pharmacies, of which there are over 400 nationwide now participating. I also called in to see the team at Cobblers Hall on Sunday, and they alone had delivered over 15,000 jabs by last weekend. It is fabulous that we have now vaccinated more than 23,000,000 people and that we are on target to offer vaccinations to all adults by the end of July. Indeed, I have heard that there is even optimistic forecasts that it might be achieved in June.

A key announcement in the recent budget was the Levelling Up Fund, which has three primary targets for funding. These are transport investments; regeneration and town centre investment and cultural investment. This funding is to be led by local authorities with the support of an MP and each authority can place as many bids as it has MP's. My primary focus on this is going to be the town centre in Newton Aycliffe and I look forward to both working with Durham County Council and all other interested parties. This looks like a fantastic opportunity to re-shape what we have into something better and I will keep you informed of progress.

As usual, I had a number of interesting zoom calls this week including on offshore wind, the kickstart scheme, the levelling up fund and sustainable farming, as well as parish council meetings with Bishop Middleham and Fishburn.

The most significant Bill in the House this week was the Police, Crime Sentencing and Courts Bill which contains much that will lengthen jail time for serious sexual offenders by increasing the minimum term in prison to be served before parole for those under life sentences imposed for rape and the most serious assaults. It delivers tougher sentences for child murderers, killer drivers, and those attacking emergency workers. It also includes an important law, Kay's Law, which is being introduced after a woman died at her ex partner's hands while he was released under investigation. In addition it stops extreme protests like those performed by Extinction Rebellion who stopped trains and buses running and blocked roads, even for emergency vehicles. I would like to assure you that it does not stop reasonable peaceful protest. It will keep us safe while also safeguarding our rights to free speech and free protest, which are such a large part of our British freedoms.

The actual debate on this bill was impacted by the events at the vigil on Clapham Common. For the avoidance of doubt, I absolutely believe that women need to feel, and be, safe walking home but I don't think this vigil was helpful. We need to remember that the rules around restricting the vigil were the temporary Covid restrictions. Where this bill looks at the rules around protests it is a more normal world perspective. The outcome of this vigil, while concerning, is not entirely relevant when looking ahead at situations when national health emergency measures will no longer be in place. The events as reported in the press did not look good for the Met, but I do not see how the people turning up can be absolved from some responsibility, unfortunately whenever well-meaning people take part in an event like this they attract the rent-a-crowd who are just looking to promote their own agenda. It is what can be referred to as the law of unintended consequences.

On another issue, I have talked with teachers about the use of schools as polling stations for the forthcoming elections, and I have made representations to Durham County Council that other options would be better, as it would be best to keep school disruption to a minimum once they are reopened.

Once again, I will sign off with the same message and I really look forward to the day when it is redundant.

Stay Home, Protect the NHS and Save Lives.

How Vulnerable People Can Vote in Elections

Voters in Co. Durham area will go to the polls for the county council, Police & Crime Commissioner and parish council elections on Thursday 6th May. These elections will take place at a time when coronavirus continues to present risks to public health.

The good news is that spring is just around the corner and our hedgehogs are starting to wake up, more sightings are possible. Tara and I will be contacting various people so they can have their hoggies back into their gardens, but we will hold out till after the Easter Holidays. The weather has to be a certain night time temperature and hopefully wild food in abundance with nesting material available too. Can we ask everybody to be mindful when they do their gardening, please check before strimming, grass cutting and raking leaves, these mammals do not run when in danger, they curl up tightly, we have had injured hedgehogs here before and it's quite distressing, a vets intervention is always necessary and it takes a long time to help them recover. Another good reason to watch before you strim is, it is nearly baby season, hoglets can't see or hear for the first 3 weeks of life, when mum gets scared she abandons her babies and we are required to step in and hand rear them till they can manage themselves, which also takes time. All rescue centres have the equipment, food, time and expertise to take in hoglets and provide the critical care they need, they need more warmth because they have no underbelly fur, but the one thing they do have is cuteness, lots of it. Tara is going to be attempting to rear babies for the very first time and she will love it, as I do. They flourish as they get older and, of course, it's very rewarding to watch them as we have to let them go back where they belong. It's never easy, especially when we have fed them, toileted them and cared for them and 24/7, because we

The problems they face in the wild are man made, cars, dogs and also when people try to kill slugs etc in the garden - slug dies because it's been poisoned, hedgehog dies too because it eats the poisoned slug. Please save your money, don't buy anything that can harm wildlife, our prickly pals are much better at killing your garden pests when you are



Austrian Ironman Challenge in aid of Hospice

Stuart Rimmer is in training for the Austrian Ironman event - a gruelling 2.4 mile open water swim, 112 mile bike ride, topped off with a 26.2 mile marathon - which he hopes to complete in to raise as much money as possible for St Teresa's Hospice. Covid-19 is playing havoc with the date of the Klagenfurt event and hence Stuart's training programme - it is scheduled for July but might have to be postponed until September.

"You train for 30 weeks in the run up to the event for at least 10 hours a week,' said Stuart, 57, of Newton Aycliffe. "At the moment I'm out at 5.45am for a run before work and a cycle after. But I haven't been able to swim for four months and should be doing 2.5 hours a week. At the start there will be 3,500 athletes in the water - it's like being in a washing machine and you get kicked and punched. You just have to look for a gap. I'm preparing for July but to be honest September would be better as it would be cooler.

"If the water is above 25 degrees you can't wear a wetsuit in the swim and, because this makes you less buoyant, you have to

use your legs more - so you have less left in them for the cycle and the run. Also, the run is really tough if it is red hot. It's difficult to train at the moment because you don't want to peak too early.'

Darlington-born Stuart became a triathlete when he met his wife Tracey, 50, eight years ago. "It was the only way I was going to see anything of her, but we both love it," he said. "She works for John Meynell Funeral Directors and I have lost a lot of customers over the years to cancer, which really opens your eyes, so we wanted to do something for the hospice movement.
