Well Done Woodham | National Day of Reflection at **Sugar Hill Primary**

Tuesday 23rd March marked the first anniversary of the first UK lockdown. At Sugar Hill Primary School children wore bright clothes and the staff wore rainbow ribbons, as activities were completed that helped everyone reflect on the last year in their own way.

When arriving at school the children were greeted with showers of bubbles and it was so lovely to see the children of all ages trying to capture a bubble! It was a temptation some parents and carers could not resist and it certainly led to a positive start for the day when adults joined in the fun capturing bubbles! Lots of giggles and cheers! Throughout the day classroom staff had planned a range of activities that provided opportunities for all children to pause and reflect on the last year. The whole school fell silent at 12 noon as we thought of all the people across the world who have lost their lives through Covid-19. Senior leaders spent the day visiting classrooms talking with children about their memories of the last year. Although the children can identify the things they have missed this year like seeing family and friends, no birthday parties, no holidays (to name a few of their endless lists of things they have not been able to do) they also recognise that they have had other opportunities to spend more time with their parents and carers and siblings at home. Many children have reflected on the things they have been doing that they enjoyed. Some have started new hobbies and some have been involved in helping family and friends by delivering shopping, writing cards and letters and baking cakes! The acts of kindness are endless!

One activity that all the children were involved in was blowing bubbles. Yes, even our oldest Year 6 children had their very own pot of bubbles and had great fun blowing their bubbles at their friends. The children have been taught in their 'bubbles' following the first lockdown and with separate lunchtimes and break times school is now





living a 'new normal' as we do all we can to keep everyone as safe as we can. It was heartening to receive an e mail from a parent who drove past school at the time the children were outdoors blowing their bubbles who said, 'I think by the activities you have organised, you've marked a very traumatic year with positivity, hope and appreciation for everything we hold dear. The things we took for granted just over a year ago'. Support from parents and carers, as we have navigated through the last year and faced challenges none of us would ever have anticipated, has been recognised by Senior Leaders, Governing Body and the whole school staff. This day in school was a time to talk with the children about the importance of still following the rules and

doing all we can to stay safe.

It was a focussed time that allowed staff, children and our wider community to pause and reflect. Staff recognise that the last year has impacted on families in different ways and that moving forward there is much work to be done in supporting each other as we tentatively follow the road map to easing restrictions. Our school gardener, Gail, has planted an 'Ascot Rainbow' at the front of school - a symbol of hope for the future and a timely reminder that it has been an incredibly tough year - a year like no other. As always, we want to ensure that parents and carers know that Sugar Hill staff will do all we can to support our families. We recognise that although there is hope for brighter days ahead with the vaccination programme, that for many personal challenges on top of Covid19 mean difficult



Neighbourhood Policing

PACT Meeting: 10th February, 6pm, on Police Facebook page



The Neighbourhood team have been busy this week and have given out three fines in relation to people not complying with the government restrictions with regards to Covid-19. The team have been out on patrol on mountain bikes this week, which has allowed further engagement with the community by different means and allowing police access to routes that our vehicles can't access which will assist us in various incidents in the future.

On Sunday an off-road guad was seized, that was causing a nuisance to the community, and the rider will appear in court soon for driving offences. An incentive has been agreed which will be offered through Crimestoppers for information leading to the seizure of off-road bikes, and/or apprehension of the rider, where criminal damage has been caused - having been ridden whilst the rider was under the influence of alcohol or drugs, or there has been driving offences. The appeal for information must be specific, relating to a certain bike in a certain area at a certain time and is not an appeal for general info regarding off road bikes. If this information proves to be beneficial to the police and results in seizures, the public will receive a small monetary award.

We are working with partner agencies, to secure funding and are always looking at new and innovative ways to tackle the problem. Have you heard of our online messaging service 'Keep in the Know'? By signing up to this service, for free, you can find out what's happening in your local area - receive regular crime updates, information on road closures and learn about what your local neighbourhood policing team is doing. You can decide what agencies you wish to receive messages from when you sign up to the service. Head over to www.keepintheknow.co.uk and click 'Sign up'. It doesn't take long and you can be kept up to date with many different things.



Looking the Other Way

Dear Sir,

Violence against women exists because a minority think it's acceptable and a majority who think it's none of their business. Violence destroys lives and you don't need to be an expert to know the effects can be catastrophic and create a culture where the use of violence is not only acceptable but also expected and a legitimate means of dealing with any situation. Regardless of the circumstances, if abuse goes unchallenged we are condoning it and in effect saying it's okay, in doing so we condemn generations to come through our legacy of apathy and indifference.

My own grandfather was a brutal man who used his size and strength to beat men, women and children in equal measure. He would beat his own mother to such an extent she would be unable to see for days because her face was so battered and bruised she was unable to open her eyes. My grandmother, a tiny woman, fared no better, and even when they were both elderly he would still beat her on a regular basis. My mother, witnessing such brutality on a regular basis, became conditioned and desensitised to this brutality and developed a violent personality of her own and found expression through the manic depression and personality disorder that went with it. Her own violent personality towards her own children became an open family secret and simply accepted as a fact of life.

A different time with different attitudes and different values we today would find difficult if not impossible to accept, but apathy and indifference can destroy lives and if allowed to go unchallenged are condoned and approved by our silence and willingness to look the other way, a legacy of complicity for generations to come. The violence I witnessed and experienced robbed me of my childhood but taught me a very hard lesson in life, silence and indifference will always favour and support the abuser, never their victim. In many ways I was one of the lucky ones I survived and was able to turn my life experience into a life purpose helping others deal with their own trauma and abuse.

Abuse ends and scars heal but mental and emotional pain can last a lifetime. Personally the deepest hurt came not from the abuse itself, but from the knowledge those who should have cared simply looked the other way.

Pedestrians Fear Walking in the Dark

The lady writing in last weeks Newton News about lack of lighting on Burnhill Way is a topical subject. As the former Vice Chair of Great Aycliffe Residents Association working alongside Syd Howarth it fell to me to voice public opinion about Durham County Council removing lighting to save money

Syd and I travelled to Durham and I read out a statement, penned by myself and Syd, which put forward arguments about the proposed lack of lighting which in our view and that of many residents of Newton Aycliffe, the move would result in road accidents, anti-social behaviour and would promote a sense of nervousness amongst people walking around at night. Of course, the Labour controlled council replied with an offhand statement which left us in no doubt that saving money was a higher priority.

As has been reported in the media in previous days, women are nervous about walking after dark and there are many dark areas of our town. Hooligans feel brave enough to throw stones at vehicles knowing they can melt away into the darkness. This at a time when we have a female home secretary and a female chief constable. Throughout the last few years Durham Councillors have complained bitterly about the shortage of funding from Whitehall whilst planning projects on which to spend money such as moving the Council headquarters from Aykley Heads to the centre of Durham adding to an already congested city, building a new bus station, Lumiere, and oh yes siting a custody suite at Spennymoor costing £21million (paid for from reserves). Many of these things may be deemed as necessary but when asking for an increase in rates how can we have millions in reserve then ask the poor taxpayer for more? When we talk about double taxation this is a prime example of how

the good people of Newton Aycliffe are forced to pay for lighting when we already pay County Council rates. Of course, our County Councillors point out that they do distribute money into our town but ask yourself whose money is it really. I have no real objection to raising rates as long as the money is allocated wisely.

The speech I made to County Council will be on record as it was published in the Newton News at the time, but the shocking thing was that a member of the public had to bring up this issue whilst elected Labour councillors remained silent.

Liberal Democrat Candidates Nev & Tony

Official Lib Dem Election Address

Local businessman and charity leader Nev Jones is standing on a platform of cutting council tax and making sure local people have someone standing up for them. His colleague Tony Armstrong is backing the campaign to regenerate the local





area including tackling the serious problem of empty businesses in Great Aycliffe Town Centre.

Between them they hope to bring together the community and move the whole town forward as we come out of Covid.

It filters down to everyone meaning that the average person has less money to spend on getting work done whether it be plumbing, gardening or even having money to go out for a coffee in the town when we are out of lockdown. Everyone in Newton Aycliffe is suffering because the Labour Party is over taxing us and wasting our money.

My neighbour, Eileen Sparkes, will be 100 years old on Sunday 28th March 2021.

Eileen served as an Operations Controller with Bomber Command and was, (I think), stationed at HQ 1 Group. Eileen met husband Ron at RAF Ludford Magna during WWII. Wing Commander Ronald G Sparkes DFC, MBE had volunteered for Air Crew duties with the Royal Air Force in 1940, trained in America and Canada and served on an Intruder Squadron before moving to Heavy Bombers. He completed 37 bombing raids over Germany with 101 Squadron, for which he was awarded the Distinguished Flying Cross.

An accident in May 1945 (trialling a Lincoln Bomber) saw him spend 2½ years at the Queen Victoria Hospital, East Grinstead where he became a member of the Guinea Pig Club - and (in his own words), went through 26 operations on the slab - one of Macindoe's army.

In 1960, he was made a Member of the British Empire (Military Division). Ron spent most of his remaining career in the fighter and air defence environment and he eventually retired in 1977 with the rank of Wing Commander.

Eileen and Ron married in 1945 and had one son, David, who sadly died of a brain tumour in 2003, aged 57 years.

Eileen still manages to live independently, is bright as a button, albeit now suffering from a failing memory. Sadly, there are no immediate family members nearby so friends and neighbours will be gathering (safely distanced) on her drive at midday to raise a glass and sing Happy Birthday!

An award-winning supported housing charity in Newton Aycliffe is looking for support workers who have a passion to help others succeed in life.

ROC Solid, based at Hope House in Burnhope, helps a range of vulnerable people including care leavers, people with complex needs, young parents and babies, families at risk and people recovering from life controlling habits.

"It's really rewarding work and we're a really supportive team," said service manager Mandy Shaw.

The charity was founded in 2007 and has around 70 units of accommodation. It operates two centres staffed 24/7 in Newton Aycliffe and Billingham and supports people living in ROC Solid houses in local communities. It has gained several awards and its work with women at its Billingham project has been cited as an example of national good practice by the Prison Reform Trust. "We help people learn independent living skills and we can go with them to various appointments to give them support," said Mandy. "Some clients have been with us for several years because they're too vulnerable to be without ongoing support."


Experience is preferred but not essential. "We do ongoing training, all staff have personal development plans and regular supervisions and we also have a health care scheme for everyone," said Mandy. "We work in partnership with a lot of other professionals and keeping people safe is our top priority.

"It's a 40-hour week sessional contract and you have to be able to work on a rota that includes days, weekends and some sleepovers in Hope House," said Mandy.

"You also need transport and a driving licence - a level 3 qualification in a relevant subject would be good but some of our staff achieve the qualification once in post." All employees are subject to Disclosure and Barring (DBS) checks.

Members of the team have varied past working experiences - the manager at Newton Aycliffe, for example, was a factory worker who wanted a new career in a health and social care setting. He started as a support worker and grew into his current role - he now has a raft of qualifications to his name.

Building Back Caring and Fairer

Dear Sir.

Labour leader of Durham County Council Simon Henig recently published a list of 120 Things Labour Has Done For County Durham in the last four years.

PROTECTING LOCAL SERVICES

Few people will read the whole list, but we have done so, and one thing that immediately becomes clear is that, despite £½billion per year cuts in government funding, Durham County Council has maintained a good standard of public services ... which contrasts markedly with the national news of government cronyism and wasted multi-billion contracts.

And, whilst government insists on a centralised one-size-fits-all model of levelling up which is delivering mainly for Tory MPs' constituencies and has so far failed to deliver ANYTHING for Sedgefield area, our Labour County Council has managed to find from its constrained finances a £25million regeneration scheme which is being implemented across the whole county in discussion with the local communities involved.

Nowhere do we see the Tories' out-of-touch Westminster focus more clearly than in planning, where their Planning for the Future white paper is proposing to set up 'Growth Areas' where planning consent is automatically assumed, and where developers will bypass planning committees and public objections. (This must be opposed.)

PROTECTING PEOPLE

By contrast to a Tory government which seeks to abandon residents to big business, the mission of the County Council for the past decade has been to protect the people of County Durham – and particularly the vulnerable members of our society.

DCC is one of only a few councils in England which still exempts its poorest residents from paying Council Tax and, during the pandemic, DCC used the Hardship Fund to provide up to £300 additional council tax relief to thousands of households. The Council allocated £3million for support to vulnerable people; and when the Tories refused to do so, stepped in and provided free holiday meals to 10,000 children. Meanwhile, our 'one-stop shop' Coronavirus Hub (03000 260 260) advised and helped 75,000 residents who had a Coronavirus-related problem during the pandemic.

Central to this determination to protect have been County Durham Labour's extensive and highly successful environmental and climate policies. And – where DCC recently won the national accolade of 'best climate initiative' – we note that a recent UN report recorded that the Tory government is failing to live up to its climate rhetoric.

BUILDING BACK AFTER THE PANDEMIC

Coronavirus has shown us what matters most. As we emerge from the crisis, we need more investment to secure much-needed services, and we need to build a future society which is more caring, green, equal and fair.

Build Back Lasting

This week the DCC Economy Scrutiny Committee considered EU Funding, which has previously provided invaluable support to the county (as a 'Transition Region', County Durham's allocation was £155 million – which had been expected to double over the next few

EU grants were targeted at deprivation and decarbonisation. In County Durham, they funded such as the DurhamWorks programme (which has supported more than five thousand 16-24-year-olds into work); the Business Energy Efficiency Programme (which has saved money for hundreds of small businesses); a 'County Durham Growth Fund'; housing retrofit schemes; and many more.

LOSING EU FUNDING

The government promised that, after Brexit, it would replace this EU funding; what that promise means, this year, is a pilot 'Community Renewal Fund', which asks DCC to collect, shortlist and submit (by 18 June) competitive bids to a maximum of £3 million for the County as a

Entirely separately, addressing its promise also to tackle regional inequalities, the government has announced a 'Levelling Up Fund', by which County Durham will be able to make six competitive bids for up to £20 million each for transport and regeneration.

There is no guarantee that the County's bids will succeed. And it is worth noting that, even if County Durham is successful in achieving the maximum from all these funding pots, at £123 million it will still fall well short of our previous EU funding.

Unfortunately also, the levelling-up scheme is attracting criticism for political partiality - Rishi Sunak's seat of Richmond, the 83rd/533 richest constituency in the country, is included in the scheme, and an analysis of the chosen constituencies has found that they are overwhelmingly Tory.

TARGETING THE FUNDING

Paul Howell MP graciously made it clear in the Newton News last week that this is not his money to spend. He then went on to say that he intends to focus it on the town centre.

Apart from 'immediately-shovelling-money-into-private-businesspockets' being wearisomely Tory, it will be difficult to work up from nothing a successful £20 million bid by the government's deadline for 'priority-schemes' of 18 June.

And I would wonder whether we might not consider other targets for a £20 million fund aimed at transport and regeneration? The obvious 'shovel-ready' scheme would be the South-West Durham tourism/ economic/ community regeneration programme developing around the Stockton & Darlington Railway Bicentenary, which is part of my Cabinet Support Economic Regeneration brief.

Or – if instead we waited until the government's 2024/25 final deadline "for larger schemes" – why not try for the Rail Freight Interchange at Forrest Park and/or an upgrade to the C35, as an enabling transport package for Aycliffe Business Park?

I would urge all parties to use this opportunity to build a lasting economic infrastructure for the benefit of local business. John D Clare



The progress on vaccines continues to be amazing, as a country we have now vaccinated over half the adult population and in Newton Aycliffe over 20,000 people have been vaccinated by the Jubilee Medical Practice team at Cobblers Hall. I would like to thank and applaud this team, led by Gill Johnson, the team of admin and clinicians, Janet, Dr Winny Jose, Jennifer, Kennedy, Kath, Hayley, along with ANP's and paramedics Tony, Belinda, Susan, Lisa, Ali, Julie, Bev, Joanne, Shirley, Chris, Kev, Leean, Viv, Margaret, Denise, Christopher and Alan along with several volunteers to marshal that include Greg, Chris, Mike, Thomas and Jackson who have braved some very bad weather to help guide patients to the right place. They have all been outstanding. Please remember though it takes a couple of weeks for a jab to be fully effective and also that you still have to follow the rules.

I have spent time this week encouraging the team at Durham County Council that we should be compiling a bid to the Levelling Up Fund urgently with a view to hitting the first deadline and I will continue to pursue this.

I have also had some very interesting sessions including on ARIA (Advanced Research and Invention Agency) which has the potential to drive dramatic innovation from which some of our local businesses can potentially profit and I will speak in the House in its support. This is a fund being introduced that will facilitate high risk and high reward transformational research. I also will be speaking in debates on Trade and Hospitality in the next week as well as asking a question to the Minister for Women and Equalities about young women studying STEM subjects. I had the pleasure of meeting the Head of Woodham School to catch up on a number of points and was delighted to hear how well their testing had gone, but also that, so far, they had not had a single positive test. On Friday I also joined the CAMRA Durham team to discuss their requests for support and will write to the Chancellor as a result. I also spoke in the House on the trade bill amendment being referred to as the genocide amendment. I absolutely supported the need for Parliament to have a vote on any new trade deals and I would not support any with countries with credible concerns of genocide. Next week sees the first stage point in lockdown lifting on 29 March, but please could I ask you to see these changes as options and not to try and stretch interpretations to the limit. It is all about lifting the restrictions in a slow and controlled way, as the Prime Minister has said, we want this to be irreversible.
