



Electoral Inequality and **Santa Tours**

I was shocked to read the letter in last weeks Newton News from Labour councillor Cllr Eddy Adam.

Cllr Adam states there isn't electoral inequality in Newton Aycliffe. This is simply untrue.

This refers to the number of electors (residents) needed to elect each town councillor. National guidelines are clear that the difference between one ward and another should wherever possible not exceed 10%.

This is to make sure we have democratically elected councils.

For example If Ward A has 1000 electors and two councillors that's 500 electors per councillor. If Ward B has 1500 electors and 3 councillors that's 500 as well per councillor and that's electoral equality. It will never be spot on the same, but should be reasonably similar.

So here are the figures the County Council have confirmed. Of course the electoral roll changes daily so there might be a few slight changes since last week but only by one or two in each area.

Aycliffe Central - 512 Aycliffe Village – 790 Neville - 775 Shafto St. Mary - 627 Simpasture – 645 West - 688

Woodham - 819

Byerley Park/Horndale/Cobblers Hall - 541 So the number of electors per councillor in Aycliffe Central ward is 512 whilst in Woodham it is 819.

Not my figures, the real figures. So there's massive electoral inequality.

Cllr Eddy Adam talks about the Santa Tours being provided by Labour, yet it was the very same Labour Councillors that were trying to stop this towns long tradition, citing Health and Safety as an excuse not to run them, this debacle of a decision even reached National TV, and it then took the general public to find the solution, and turn this shameful decision around.

My name is Alfie Middleton and I am the Police Community Support Officer for the West Ward of Newton Aycliffe.

Officers have increased mobile and foot patrols around Newton Aycliffe, and have even been conducting pedal bike patrols to monitor hard to reach areas of the town. In the next few weeks the team will be taking delivery of a couple of new Electric Bikes kindly funded by GAMP. These bikes will be invaluable for the team. We are working hard to tackle Anti-Social Behaviour, in particular the use of off-road bikes, which I know causes a great deal of distress to a lot of you. As part of our ongoing efforts an incentive has been agreed which will be offered through Crimestoppers for information leading to the seizure of off-road bikes and/or apprehension of the rider where criminal damage has been caused. The appeal for information must be specific, relating to a certain bike in a certain area at a certain time and is not an appeal for general info regarding off-road bikes. If this information proves to be beneficial to the police and results in seizures, the public will receive a small monetary reward.

We are working with partner agencies to secure funding and are always looking at new and innovative ways to tackle the problem. Have you heard of our online messaging service 'Keep in the Know'? By signing up to this service, for free, you can find out what's happening in your local area - receive regular crime updates, information on road closures and learn about what your local neighbourhood policing team is doing. You can decide what agencies you wish to receive messages off when you sign up to the service. Head over to www.keepintheknow.co.uk and click 'Sign up'. It doesn't take long and you can be kept up-to-date with many different things.





READERS' PHOTOGRAPHS | Milestone Moment as Work Begins at £400m Business Park for County

Work is set to begin on a major business park for County Durham, paving the way for 4,000 new jobs and a £400 million boost to the economy

Durham County Council is to begin work on the park at Aykley Heads, at Durham City, having already pledged £6 million to the project's first phase. The remaining £6 million for phase one comes from the government's Getting Building Fund, which aims to deliver jobs, skills and infrastructure across the country.

The milestone commencement of work has today been welcomed by the North East Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP,) North East England Chamber of Commerce and Durham University.

The vision for Aykley Heads is to create 'A Development for a Different World' – in recognition of the impact of the coronavirus pandemic on the way people work. It will offer a new and unique business location for the region that maximises economic growth in County Durham and delivers jobs in new and growing sectors. It is one of five designated strategic employment sites across the county and part of the council's ambitious mission to provide more and better jobs, bridging the gap in economic performance with other parts

Aykley Heads is also evidence of the council's commitment to keeping major projects on track through the coronavirus pandemic, in recognition of how important they are to the county's long-term economic future. The site's first two phases offer the prospect of a potential 4,000 jobs and it is estimated a further 1,800 will be supported in the construction of the park.

The first phase will see the creation of 3,500 square metres of flexible office space within a three-storey building and 124 car parking spaces to the north of the site.

Work on 'Plot C' will begin in the coming weeks with the commencement of groundworks ahead of the construction of the building.

Cllr Simon Henig, Leader of Durham County Council, said: "We are delighted to be starting work at Aykley Heads, a key strategic site which aims to deliver thousands of new high quality jobs for County Durham and the North East. Aykley Heads will offer 'A Development for a Different World' – in recognition of how the pandemic has changed the way people work. It will be a top-class destination for businesses by virtue of its location in a World Heritage City, excellent transport links and also the environment we are creating for staff which will be an attractive and environmentally friendly setting with plenty to enjoy indoors and out. We are also very pleased to be working with Durham University to explore how the park can deliver a unique digital offer for occupants.

"We know from our conversations with developers and investors that these are the kind of things they want in a business



park and that there is strong interest from companies in being part of Aykley Heads. This will only be strengthened by County Durham being included in a national top ten recently for fintech growth. The start of work on site signals our desire to continue to deliver and support schemes which bring economic growth and more and better jobs. Projects like Aykley Heads will be key to ensuring resilience and our long-term

A hybrid planning application for Aykley Heads was approved in December, giving full permission for Plot C and outline consent for the rest of the site.

This includes land currently occupied by the council's County Hall headquarters, with the authority having agreed to move to a new smaller headquarters in the heart of Durham City to pave the way for the business park. The new headquarters will provide a base for 1,000 council staff, boosting footfall and trade in the city centre, as well as in Crook, Seaham, Spennymoor and Meadowfield where other employees will be located. The first two phases of Aykley Heads will, when complete, provide up to 38,468sq m of floorspace and be divided into six plots, with each providing office buildings and parking spaces. 'Character zoning' will be used to create distinctiveness, while green spaces and paths will be provided for the enjoyment of workers, residents and visitors.

Aykley Heads already benefits from close links to the A1, East Coast Main Line and other public transport, as well as cycling routes. These have already attracted a number of high profile firms to the vicinity, including the business and IT consultancy Waterstons, as well as Atom Bank and the Chamber of Commerce.

County Durham boasts four other strategic employment sites, with Jade Business Park near Seaham, Integra 61 at Bowburn, and Forrest Park at Newton Aycliffe all welcoming their first tenants last year. The £5 million expansion of NETPark at Sedgefield, is also underway and set to create up to 1,400 jobs. In total, the five sites are set to bring 15,000 jobs to the county.

County Durham and Newcastle were recently named among the UK's ten highest growth 'clusters' in fintech - financial services and technology.

County Durham Proposed Plans to Build on Playing Field

I put pen to paper having recently reviewed the new County Durham Plan. This is a weighty document, setting out the planning intentions of Durham County Council (DCC) for the next ten years.

The principal development, planned for Newton Aycliffe, is on the Copelaw site. DCCs original plan was for 800 dwellings on this site. The new County Durham Plan is for 2,219 dwellings on the site. This will be around 5,000 residents - an increase of around 20% of the current town population. Secondary developments are listed on the former Avenue School playing fields. Two separate developments are proposed for the playing fields, totalling 147 dwellings. It is remarkable that the County Durham Plan describes the land as green open space. Under the former Sedgefield Borough Plan, the school playing fields were protected for future sports and amenity use.

Cllr. James Atkinson, who represents the area, as both a Town Councillor and County Councillor, does not appear to have consulted his constituents on this planning intention. When Tesco was built on the former Avenue School site, it was proposed to include a residential development to the north of Tesco car park.

Former Councillor Terry Hogan and I, together with Syd Howarth, challenged the residential development. As a result, no housing was built on the site. The Youth and Community Centre was built and the Town Centre Park developed. I doubt the residents of the Bousfield Crescent/ Washington Crescent area would welcome a large housing development on a site, where previously our children played after school and where many sporting events, by many organisations, have taken place.

This would be an ideal site for future youth and community sporting and recreational activities. Once lost, these amenities are lost forever. What is more, it is in contravention of the Great Aycliffe Plan, which protects our green open spaces. As the Leader of Great Aycliffe Town Council, I successfully prevented the transfer of our green open spaces to Livin.

Five years ago, myself, Cllr. Wendy Hillary and Cllr. Jed Hillary successfully challenged Livin's proposed development at Armstrong Close, which included removing garages and developing designated green open space. This was a planning landmark decision for the Great Aycliffe Plan.

As the Vice Chair of the DCC planning committee for the area covering Newton Aycliffe, Cllr. Atkinson must have been aware of the planned development on the former Avenue playing fields. He must have been aware of the proposals when the Plan went out to public consultation, but failed to

inform his constituents, who no doubt would have had an opportunity to challenge the proposal with a petition.

As I write this letter, Cllr. Atkinson has still not mentioned this proposal at all. When would he have mentioned it? Would it have been before or after the land was sold off to developers? Only Cllr. Atkinson can tell us that. He appears to have served DCC well, but not necessarily his constituents. If I am successful in the forthcoming election, I shall be putting a motion before the Town Council to oppose this development and obtain support from various agencies and professionals. This is going to be a very important issue and at this time I'm keeping my cards close to my chest. Cllr Bob Fleming

Beware of False Promises

The Lib Dems say they are standing to cut Council Tax... But won't say how. In 2010 the Lib Dems promised to put more police on the beat, promised to abolish student tuition fees and, of course, many other things. 

Dogs Trust Rescues 1500+ Through Puppy Pilot Scheme

The UK's largest dog welfare charity is demanding that the Government acts now to end the cruel puppy smuggling trade, as demand for dogs continues to soar

- In just five years, Dogs Trust has rescued 1,500 puppies who were being illegally imported across UK borders, many in terrible conditions – and this is likely to be the tip of the iceberg
- Since the rescue scheme began in late 2015, the street value of the puppies intercepted is more than £3 million
- In 2020, Dogs Trust saw a 66% increase in dogs coming through the scheme compared to 2019
- The charity is once again calling for urgent Government action to end puppy smuggling and for buyers to do their research to avoid inadvertently fuelling this cruel trade Dogs Trust is demanding that the Government takes urgent action to end puppy smuggling as the charity reaches the milestone of 1,500 smuggled puppies rescued and re-homed through its Puppy Pilot scheme with an approximate street value of £3 million if they had been sold by their dealers. Dogs Trust is calling for the Government to:
- Raise the minimum age for puppies to enter the UK to six months
- Increase penalties for those caught illegally importing dogs

The Puppy Pilot scheme was originally set up in 2015 to aid the interception of illegally imported puppies by APHA (Animal and Plant Health Agency) at the ports and provide care and rehabilitation for them prior to finding them new homes. Five years on and the 'pilot' scheme is still needed more than ever as demand for dogs during the pandemic continues to fuel the trade.

In 2020, Dog Trust saw a 66% increase in dogs rescued through the scheme, compared to the previous year - from 204 in 2019 to 338 in 2020. The average age of puppies being seized in 2020 was around eight weeks, compared to around 11 weeks in 2019. The legal age for puppies to enter the country is 15 weeks from another EU country and the youngest puppies seized were just four weeks old; far too young to have been taken away from their mother let alone transported thousands of miles across borders.

In the five years Dogs Trust has been running the programme, the most common breed to be intercepted and cared for through the scheme has been the Dachshund, with around 425 puppies being re-homed since 2015 – over a quarter (28%) of the total number of dogs. The second most popular was the French Bulldog (21%) and the third was the English Bulldog (10%). The puppies that were seized at the border and went into quarantine primarily came from Hungary (16%), Poland (12%), Romania (10%) and Slovakia (5%)4. For more than six years, Dogs Trust has been calling on the Government to end puppy smuggling, an illegal practice whereby puppies, generally under the legal minimum of 15 weeks of age, are brought into Great Britain for sale with either no or falsified paperwork and often without having received the necessary treatments, including rabies vaccination. These puppies are forced to travel for long journeys in squalid, cramped conditions with no toilet breaks, no food and

insufficient water, so they can be sold to unsuspecting buyers.

Another disturbing and increasing trend is

heavily pregnant dogs being transported illegally into the country in the late stages of pregnancy, causing significant suffering and health implications to both mum and puppies. Not only will importing one dog attract less suspicion at the border, but as responsible buyers will ask to see the puppies with their mother, this tactic allows criminals to give the impression of being legitimate breeders and avoid being reported to Trading Standards. Since August 2017 Dogs Trust has cared for 41 pregnant mums on the Puppy Pilot. 217 puppies have been born, of which 41 sadly died (to end September 2020). It is illegal to transport a pregnant dog in the last 10% of her pregnancy, and yet this is still happening due to lack of action from the Government.

Following the event, Catherine commented that "Local partners working with local children to promote a love of learning and reading made this event great fun and a huge success. I can't wait to meet the children in person when restrictions allow".

Register to Vote For May Elections

People in County Durham are being reminded to register to vote ahead of upcoming elections.

Elections for county councillors, parish and town councillors and a Police and Crime Commissioner for the Durham force area are taking place on Thursday 6 May 2021 and those wanting to vote must be registered. Poll cards are being delivered to residents from today onwards. Anyone currently registered on the electoral register and eligible to vote in the elections will receive a poll card providing details of their allocated polling station.

Anyone who is not registered or has recently moved house and has not informed electoral services is encouraged to register at www. gov.uk/register-to-vote by midnight on Monday 19 April.

Anyone who is listed on the electoral register can request a postal vote or proxy vote if they are unable to vote in person.

The deadline for postal vote applications is 5pm on Tuesday 20 April, while for proxy vote applications the deadline is 5pm on Tuesday 27 April.
