Charity Launches Project for Mental Health Support

A leading North East charity has launched a new befriending research project to target mental health needs across the region. Pioneering Care Partnership (PCP), a health and wellbeing charity, are underway creating a befriending focused insight that will engage with professionals, organisations and service users in and around County Durham.

As it's Mental Health Awareness Week, PCP want to shine light on the importance of befriending research, as it will offer a response to future mental health services.

Carol Gaskarth, Chief Executive of PCP and Chair of the Resilient Communities Group for County Durham, said: "Befriending services can be a lifeline for people, helping to tackle loneliness and

isolation, and supporting people to feel part of their community whilst providing much needed one-to-one support.

Conducting research and considering the needs of our communities is vital; services should be developed by those who might access them to ensure delivery is effective.

"The newly appointed Researchers will be very busy understanding what is currently available and working with people in County Durham to look at new opportunities and designing what could be offered in the future.

"Through funding provided by the Mental Health and Learning Disability Partnership Board we will be able to test approaches, support the voluntary and community sector to develop services and hopefully build on the excellent work that is already happening across the County."

Newton Aycliffe's town clerk will spend his final day at the helm this week after stepping into retirement. Andrew Bailey will work his last day at Great Aycliffe Town Council on Friday 14th May, after 32 years with the local authority, 15 of which as town clerk. The experienced local government officer has enjoyed a colourful career which has taken him around the North-East, the country and the world. But after spending so long with Aycliffe's parish authority, he looks back on a number of stand out achievements during his time in the town. And he's particularly pleased with community developments delivered by the local authority, including several popular MUGAs, BMX tracks and the nine-hole extension to Aycliffe's public golf course.

Andrew was schooled in Sunderland then later in Houghton-le-Spring Grammar School and Sixth Form. His employment in local government started in 1973 as a local government management trainee with Sunderland Council. While holding various roles there, Andrew continued his professional education at college in London to study for the Institute of Sport and Recreation professional membership and diploma levels.

"During this time I was also awarded a scholarship to study abroad," said Andrew. "This involved a period of study in British Columbia, Canada."

In 1977, Andrew took up a post with one of the largest leisure facilities in the country, Crowtree Leisure Centre in Sunderland, before his next move took him further afield, working at the King Abdul Aziz Naval Base in Saudi Arabia, in support services, working with Saudi counterparts.

On his return to the UK in 1984, Andrew again entered local government and leisure services at the King's Sports Centre in mid-Sussex before returning to his native North-East in 1985 as Chester-le-Street District Council's leisure manager.

After gaining a post-graduate diploma in management studies from Teesside University, Andrew landed his first role with Great Aycliffe Town Council in 1989 as director of parks and leisure services. Andrew explained: "The position required the management of all the sports, leisure, parks and cemeteries, allotments, golf course, driving range and events, as well as play groups. However, this was also to be undertaken while subjecting the council's grounds maintenance to compulsory competitive tendering of the service, followed shortly after with the tendering of the Sports Complex.

"During this period, I also undertook the role of Health & Safety Officer for the council, having obtained a NEEBOSH qualification." Andrew's job title changed to director of leisure and environment before a period of further studying in 1996 with the Cheltenham and Gloucester College, gaining the Local Policy Certificate, the recognised qualification for parish and town clerks. He was then promoted to town clerk with GATC in 2006. "My standout memories in both roles are probably the major projects which were completed in my time, they include the refurbishment of the Sports Complex,



building a nine-hole extension and installation of irrigation to the golf course, the building of a much-needed works depot facility, development of the programme of events and permanent structures and art work for the 50th anniversary of the town, the development of the Great Aycliffe Way and later extending and adding a further loop. We also updated and provided new, modern and exciting play areas, BMX tracks and MUGAs; we designed and managed the construction of the Town Park, which is now a well-loved and used facility, as well as the design and development of the Aycliffe Angels Memorial Garden at St. Clare's Church and Sheila's Garden at St. Oswald's Park."

As town clerk, much of the work goes unseen, but is equally important - including production of an asset management plan, which informs the council's budget plans and spending, registering all of the council's land holdings and dealing with legal aspects such as leases.

Andrew added: "The town clerk is also responsible for overseeing the smooth operation of the council, its committees and sub-committees, and implementing their decisions, as well as leading and offering support to a dedicated team of managers and staff. Over my long career with the town council, I have seen the town grow and improve," he smiled.

"New housing has continued to be built on large sites, as well as infill sites. We have also had new housing developments which are not within the parish of Great Aycliffe, including in Heighington and Middridge parishes, but they are within metres of the boundary. The business park continues to expand and provides additional employment for residents and surrounding areas. "Many new facilities, such as bars, gyms, cafes and leisure facilities have also sprung up and added a new dimension to what was originally an industrial/manufacturing trading estate."

Andrew has high hopes that Newton Aycliffe and surrounding areas within the parish will continue to grow and develop in the future. "While there is limited expansion available to the west and north of the town, there is considerable housing development planned to the east of the A167," he said. "Within

this development will come an increased demand for services, whether on the site of the development or existing facilities in the town. Aycliffe Business Park continues to increase in size towards the A1(M), with large units becoming the norm. Hopefully this will provide further employment opportunities for residents." Upon retirement, Andrew says he hopes to eventually see more of the world, once Covid restrictions allow. But he added: "Initially, any plans will revolve around tasks at home, with a number of projects in the pipeline. "My brother, who is a farmer, has already made it clear he can use any spare time I have! In the longer term, as the Covid

pandemic recedes, I would like to think I could have one or two last ski trips before I become too old. My travel ambition is to visit Japan, see the country and people and hopefully visit some friends who live there." And with that, Andrew signs off on his time in Aycliffe, after overseeing an eventful and progressive period in the town's history, and adding a significant contribution that cannot be understated.

Lib Dem Pair Stun with Big Wins in Aycliffe



Lib Dem candidates Michael Stead and Nev Jones have rocked local Labour with shock wins in the 2021 Durham County Council elections. The pair stormed to comfortable victories in their Aycliffe wards, with both taking seats from Labour.

Popular Nev, co-owner of Aycliffe bus firm J&C Coaches, stormed to a landslide win in Aycliffe East, polling 966 votes. The nearest to him was Labour candidate, Jim Atkinson, who retained the seat he won four years ago with 556 votes.

Labour had hoped Wendy Hilary could have retained Labour's other seat in the ward, previously held by Sarah Iveson, but she finished fifth in the poll behind Conservative and Lib Dem candidates.

"I'm absolutely made up, elated" said Nev, "This is just the start, I have plans and I want to make a real change. I'm passionate about Aycliffe, I've lived there all my life, and I just wanted the opportunity to make a difference, so I'm absolutely thrilled. But it isn't just about me. I've had so much help. My family especially, my kids helping me deliver leaflets, the Lib Dem party have been amazing. Too many to mention but I thank them all for a great team effort."

In the Aycliffe North & Middridge ward, declared earlier on Friday, Stead, with 1130 votes, finished second to Tory candidate David Sutton-Lloyd, who polled 1,269. With Tony Stubbs from the Tories getting 905 votes, and his party retaining their two seats in the ward, Stead effectively took John Clare's seat from Labour.



If we had a retail park, that would be in direct competition with them, then maybe rents would be reduced and incentives would also be given to retain the shopkeepers. Is it true that there are plans afoot to build new housing which will increase the population by 20% -There are also lots of small areas on the periphery of Aycliffe being built on, besides the ones mentioned.

The town bus could incorporate the route for people without their own transport, like other towns have done to encourage shopping here.

It has to be said that the council can't do anything that will adversely affect the traders, why is a private company being ring fenced and protected?

The board of Aycliffe Business Park Community (ABPC) is looking to appoint an individual or company on a consultancy basis to support the implementation of its 'On the Map' business engagement project. Aycliffe Business Park is the largest in the North-East, with an estimated 500 companies employing more than 10,000 people. ABPC was originally set up eight years ago as an informal group, but was formalised into a limited company in 2016 with the appointment of several unpaid directors Five years since launching officially, ABPC now wants to engage with more companies on Aycliffe Business Park by appointing its first paid-for role, initially on a six-month term. The objectives of ABPC's 'On the Map' project are to raise awareness among businesses on the park that may not yet have engaged with ABPC, increase the number of businesses that engage with ABPC events and activities, gather feedback and views of businesses to help inform future activities, and ensure ABPC is meeting the needs of businesses based on the park. The scope of the work required from the

three-month project, due to start on 1st July, is to visit businesses on the park, gather basic information about what the business does, design a simple set of survey questions to ask businesses visited in order to gather feedback and views and inform them of the opportunities on the ABPC website.

The remit will also be to increase the visibility of businesses, showcase their offer to other companies on the park and ensure they're aware of the external support available and how it can be accessed.

All work is to be carried out under the Aycliffe Business Park Community brand, working closely with the ABPC board.

The successful candidate would be expected to produce a monthly written report outlining the number of businesses contacted per month, the numbers engaged, information gathered and business feedback/views, as well as attending monthly board meetings and the regular news and networking meetings

The candidate could either be an individual consultant, or from a consultancy business. Those interested are invited to submit a short proposal outlining their experience, how they would approach the work, the number of days proposed, and their hourly or daily rate. The council elections gave me the opportunity to get out and talk to a number of you whilst campaigning for our candidates in Newton Aycliffe. I was delighted to see David Sutton-Lloyd and Tony Stubbs elected into Aycliffe North & Middridge. In Aycliffe we now have two Conservative, two Lib Dems, two Labour and one Independent County Councillors. This is a marked difference to the seven Labour County Councillors we had as recently as 2017. I look forward to working with this group of seven, five of whom are newly elected, as well as the Town Council members to deliver more for Aycliffe. Whilst not a Conservative member I am also pleased to see my ex-neighbour, Nev Jones, as an elected member. It will be interesting to see how the County Council control plays out over coming months as the numbers have dramatically changed with Labour dropping to 53 out of 126 councillors, meaning they no longer have absolute control. Although Conservatives increased from 10 to 24, they are the second party and the Lib Dems have 17, there are also 32 Independents. Some of them are individuals but some are in groups and how this will consolidate with the political groupings for a leadership team will be fascinating.

I also joined the Minister for International Trade, Ranil Jayawardena, on a visit to Kromek at NetPark in Sedgefield to show him the leading-edge work Kromek do in areas like radiation and virus detection. We also had the usual weekly briefs from both Matt Hancock and Nadhim Zahawi as the vaccine roll out and lockdown release programmes continue to be successfully delivered. I was part of a small group meeting with Oliver Dowden, Secretary of State for Digital, Culture, Media and Sport, where we discussed everything from Broadband roll out to sporting events as well as how we need to encourage cultural developments where opportunities are limited. I had the opportunity to visit Gestamp and meet the management team to learn how they have managed through Covid and where Government could support them further. As an employer of over a thousand people they are a key business for our town.

Tuesday saw me at the State Opening of Parliament where the legislative programme for the next session is presented and I was lucky enough to draw a place in the ballot to attend. Normally all MPs would be there but Covid-19 has meant a reduced number can attend. I stood in Central Lobby to observe. The Queen's Speech is an important part of the State Opening of Parliament Ceremony, which marks the start of the parliamentary year. State Opening is the main ceremonial event in the parliamentary calendar. For over 500 years, it has served as a symbolic reminder of the unity of Parliament's three parts: The Sovereign, the House of Lords and the House of Commons.

Normally, the ceremony begins with a procession, in which the Queen travels from Buckingham Palace to Westminster usually by carriage. The Queen's Speech usually happens once a year, in Spring or after a general election. The last one was in December 2019, which enabled Boris Johnson to set out his agenda when he won

the election.

The Queen's Speech is written by the government. It sets out the Government agenda for Parliament's new session, and the laws the Government wants Parliament to approve.

The speech is read out by the Queen from the Throne in the House of Lords chamber and normally takes about 10 minutes. This year the ceremony will be scaled down due to the Covid-19 pandemic. The Queen will arrive by car at Westminster, and seating will be restricted - 74 will be allowed in the Lords Chamber, whilst 34 further MPs and Peers will be able to participate from the gallery. To prevent the spread of the virus, mask-wearing and testing will be enforced, and the Lord Chancellor will not directly pass the speech to the Queen but will place it on a table. Key points of the Queen's Speech were:

measures to support the health and wellbeing of the nation, including tackling obesity, improving mental health and proposals on social care reform

overseeing the fastest ever increase in public funding for research and development strengthening the economic ties across the union; investing in and improving national infrastructure (rail and bus network)

supporting a lifetime skills guarantee that will enable access to high quality education for all

• simplify procurement in the public sector by streamlining more than 350 EU-derived regulations

achieving net zero greenhouse gas emissions by 2050

bringing forward legislation to ensure the United Kingdom has, and promotes, the highest standards of animal welfare

addressing racial and ethnic disparities, including a ban on conversion therapy

introducing law to ensure the integrity of elections, protect freedom of speech and restore the balance of power between the executive, legislature and the courts legislation to increase sentences for the most serious and violent offenders

government to provide the Armed Forces with the biggest spending increase in 30 vears.

There will then be several days of debates following the contents of the speech, and the proposed legislation. This year, there will be six days of debate. At the end of the debating, there is a vote. This is usually seen as symbolic, as it is extremely rare for the Government to lose it (the last time was 1924)! After this long debate, bills start to get introduced, and the year's work of debating, amending, and passing legislation begins. This week saw our vaccination team at Cobblers Hall pass over 30,000 jabs delivered, an incredible performance for the team. Their contribution, along with everyone else associated to the vaccine roll out, has meant we have now confirmed the next stage of the restriction lifting process from Monday. Please remember to continue to be sensible and whilst mandatory precautions are reducing, common sense tells you that it is best to continue the Hands, Face, Space and Fresh Air protocols for a while yet - Stay Safe. Riley was so proud of himself and rightly so. It's lovely to hear that Riley's Grandad is on the road to recovery.





The more food we provide for them in our gardens the better the outcome for these very cute mammals.

We have had a lot of support, as usual, from Sonia, Bev, Angie and, not forgetting, June and Valerie for continuing to knit lots of lovely animals for us to sell. We have also received a cash donation anonymously, thank you all. Because it has been very cold this May we are admitting before any releasing can be done and other rescues local to us are able to step in and help. We are also attending car boot sales to raise funds to stay afloat with food, medical supplies and bedding. Antibiotics don't come cheap but it's being able to act in any emergency that is essential to rescue centres. When we receive a hog into rescue, not knowing what their problems are some detective work is necessary, time is of the essence, the sooner we get them in, the better the outcome.

In this last week we have admitted six poorly hedgehogs. Bonnie is already nice and settled here and having treatment for parasite burden, Ken and Kathleen brought her in and also left a cash donation towards her care, she has a poorly eye but it will be sorted. Also a cash donation has been received from Holly's finder, she is doing very well and has completed her treatment, poor soul was freezing cold and hypothermic on arrival but 24 hours in our vivarium soon made her better. Finally Rebecca also got in touch with us about a very weak hog, just admitted an hour ago, he or she will be allowed to sleep, get used to captivity and treatment starting later today.
