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## Unique Opportunity for Residents in this Area

Due to the success of previous projects, Bishop Auckland College has secured additional funding through the Great Aycliffe and Middridge Partnership (GAMP) and Livin to help residents, aged 16+, in the GAMP area to progress/move closer to or into employment, further training or volunteering.

### **Project Description**

There are three funds designated to supporting those over the age of 16+ residing in the Great Aycliffe and Middridge area.

### These three funds are:

 Upskilling Fund aimed at those in low paid jobs, to support them in acquiring new skills/qualifications, enabling them to move up the career ladder, change direction or gain additional work in a new sector. This opportunity is available where there is no mainstream funding available and where opportunities cannot be provided through employers' Continuous Personal Development Fund (CPD).

 Employability Skills Fund aimed at responding to specific training needs, where there is no mainstream funding available.

 Discretionary Fund aimed at removing barriers, for example, travel, childcare, resources that prevent clients from accessing training and employment.

To-date the Project has successfully supported 308 people into employment. 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## Five Acres Community Garden Opens at ROF59

On May 17th a brand new facility opened for School Leavers and Adults with Learning Difficulties, offering Arts, Crafts, Music, Sport, Horticulture, Agriculture and Cookery, to support members with skills in preparation for adulthood and assisted living.

Five Acres Community Garden is a Community Interest Company (not for profit), the Directors are Debbie and Gavin Iceton,





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who also operate J&C Coaches. "Since J&C Coaches started in 1975, our constant 'bread and butter' contract work has been the transportation of children and adults with additional needs and learning difficulties, it's our turn to give something back to this sector in our Community" said Debbie. We intend to turn our five acre field at Brafferton into a horticulture and agricultural centre, incorporating a community garden and respite lodges for families who need a break. Planning permission is ongoing on this site, sadly delayed due to the pandemic. In the meantime, John and Julie Finley have allowed us to open at ROF59 - this has enabled us to diverse and offer so much more to our members. In addition, we now have a sensory room for chill and relaxation and a crafting lounge, the contents of which were kindly donated by Zara and Simon Davies of Crafters Companion.

To the rear of ROF59 we have space for physical activities, in the warmer months we will be holding outdoor events such as festivals and craft fairs. We will also be introducing a social evening, one night a week, and a social club for members and their families one night each month. It's a fun, enjoyable, daily experience for all who attend.

We have amazing staff who are passionate about delivering the best possible experience, encouraging and practicing physical and mental well-being for our members.

The Happiness Hub Fund, PCP (County Durham CCG) have recently awarded Five Acres a £5000 grant towards a Garden Shed and Poly Tunnel - this is a fantastic contribution and we are so grateful. Thank you also to everyone who has donated items and given financial support that will help our members realise their potential.

## **Care Home Restrictions**

From Monday 17 May care home residents will be able to have more named visitors and more opportunities to make visits out with no need to self-isolate when they return.

As part of step 3 of the roadmap, the number of named family members or friends able to visit their loved ones in care homes will be increased from two to five, as the visiting restrictions continue to ease. A maximum of two visitors will be allowed at any one time or on any given day.

This follows a reduction in Covid-19 cases and the ongoing successful vaccine rollout with 95% of older care home residents receiving their first jab.

Residents will also be able to go to medical appointments, a workplace, educational setting, and day centres without having to self-isolate on their return.

The period when a Covid-19 outbreak in a care home can be declared over will also change from 28 days to 14 days after the last positive case assuming there are no Variants of Concern (VOCs) identified.

This means visits can resume sooner following an outbreak, once the relevant testing has been completed and provided all staff and residents tested receive a negative result.

## Greenfield Students Engage with Environment





Students from Greenfield Community College have been part of a valuable project supported by County Durham Community Foundation and Durham County Council Arts Team. The project has enabled students to engage with their environment through creativity and take time to think about their recent experiences and the impact of Covid 19.

Led by Greenfield Arts, the project has engaged artist Paul Theo Murray to work alongside Year 10 3D design students to produce artwork that reflects upon their thoughts for the past, present and future, using the environment as a metaphor for exploring their ideas and feelings.

The project is inspired by Finders, Seekers, a recent exhibition at Greenfield Arts by artist Bethan Maddocks, and students are creating thought provoking and stimulating artwork that they are developing to share with their peers to reflect and support positivity at this time. Workshops have included cyanotype, printmaking, bookbinding and seed bombs.

"These creative, artist led workshops are a fabulous opportunity for young people to explore ideas and express their feelings. The conversations and artwork will shape a resource that will encourage another 1000 young people to enjoy arts and creativity and help better understand themselves and the world around them" said Katy Milne, Creative Director at Greenfield Arts.

After an absence of some fifteen months, Darlington Piano Society is to host four recitals between June and September. These will be given by pianists whose planned visits had to be postponed because of the Covid-19 pandemic.


The four dates and pianists are Steven Osborne (27th June), Mei Yi Foo (25th July), George Harliono (22nd August) and Antonina Suhanova (19th September). Steven Osborne last played in Darlington in 1998 and since then has risen to be a planist of international standing and recently won the BBC Music Magazine Instrumental Award for his recording of Prokofiev's "War Sonatas". Mei Yi Foo gave an outstanding recital in 2017 and brings another captivating programme; in 2017, at 16 years of age, George Harliono was one of the youngest ever recipients of a four year scholarship at the Royal College of Music, and Latvian pianist Antonina Suhanova is a Master's degree graduate of the Guildhall School of Music and Drama.

Greg Johnson, Chairman of the Society, said "the last fifteen months has been a barren period for all types of live performance, with our events having to be postponed and rescheduled a number of times because of Covid-19. With the progressive easing of lockdown measures, it will be a great relief to return to live performance in June, as long as there is no slippage in the easing of lockdown restrictions. After the difficult time experienced by many, the return of the recital series will be a boost for the wellbeing of everyone who attends"

The recitals will, as ever, take place in Central Hall at the Dolphin Centre at 3pm on the Sundays listed. Tickets can be bought in advance via the Society's website - www.dpiano.co.uk - using the booking form there or through a TicketSource link. As the series of events begins after the implementation of Step 4 of lockdown restrictions, tickets will also be available at the door. Full details of the recital programmes can be found there also.

The lockdown situation has provided the opportunity to plan well ahead and plans for the six recitals in the usual winter series, beginning in October, are also in place. "Our efforts during lockdown have secured what I see as a continuum of ten outstanding recitals that every lover of the classical piano repertoire will revel in hearing" added Greg Johnson "and I hope that many will attend and take the opportunity to take a step towards normality as a result.

Year 9 BTEC Sport students have also particularly enjoyed improving their Volleyball and Badminton skills and tactics previously learned in their practical lessons.

Students have expressed their enjoyment at now being able to receive specialised coaching in a wider range of sports, which they had previously missed out on during the periods of national lockdown earlier in the academic year. Nicole Anderson in Year 7 says "I love the fact that all of the extra-curricular clubs are back on. It allows you to make friends and use all of the different facilities on offer in the PE Department. The activities are fun to join in and for me, the Mountain Bike Academy links closely with my elite sport of Cycling, outside of school." Amelia Hawkins commented "The staff are always so welcoming and it doesn't matter what ability you are, everything is well thought out and planned for a wide range of abilities." Jackson Raitt, who participates in at least five different Sports Academy clubs across the week says he particularly enjoys the Boxing Academy as he acknowledges, "I play a lot of football, so it's great that there are a wide range of choices available and I've been able to try something completely new."

Due to Covid restrictions on year group bubbles, this year attendance to all clubs has been trialled using invites via the SIMS Student App. Students across all year groups can access the Sports Academy clubs on a rolling weekly basis by accepting an invite to any clubs that they wish to attend during their allocated week. This system has worked very successfully and has allowed for close monitoring of attendance to all clubs.

Following an extended period of closure due to the Covid pandemic, staff at Darlington Hippodrome are gearing up to re-open the doors in May.

## **MP Visits Local Schools**



Go Well, a Community Interest Company based in Chilton, welcomed Paul Howell MP on Friday 14th May, as they showcased how schools in south Durham are putting the health and wellbeing of the pupils at the heart of their Covid-recovery plans. Research released this week by the Schools Active Movement, which Go Well is part of, revealed a shocking picture. Of the teachers surveyed in this area, 100% reported a decrease in physical fitness amongst their pupils, 93% a decline in general wellbeing and 79% a reduction in fundamental movement skills. During his visit, Paul Howell MP saw lunchtime activities at Byerley Park School, Newton Aycliffe and enjoyed the spectacle of a colour run at Walworth School. He also talked to staff at Sedgefield Primary School and learned how the school is using physical activity to help improve children's mental and physical wellbeing.

Sarah Price, managing director at Go Well, which supports schools to help their pupils develop healthy active futures, said: "We are dedicated to using the power of PE, school sport and physical activity to improve lives. We are very pleased Paul Howell, MP, has taken the time to visit us and our schools, and to understand the difficulties facing teachers as they help pupils who have missed out on so much over the past twelve months. The long-term health and wellbeing of children is at risk. We urgently need Government to announce the continuation of the PE and Sport Premium Funding for the next academic year. This will enable schools to access the support and opportunities their staff and pupils need to inspire and build healthy active futures."

Paul Howell, MP for Sedgefield, said: "Physical activity makes such a difference, not only to our physical health but to our mental wellbeing too. I was pleased to have this opportunity to see how Go Well and our local schools are supporting children to develop healthy habits for life."



## Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report

Newton Aycliffe Cricket Club's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, put in an excellent performance to beat Saltburn 2nd XI to gain their first win of the season in the NYSD 2nd division. ## **Election Thanks**

#### Dear Sir,

As you may know, I was not elected to the Aycliffe North & Middridge division of Durham County Council in the recent local elections. I am at ease with that result; you cannot believe in democracy yet complain when voters choose someone else. **HEARTBROKEN** 

Of course I am disappointed. I have often said that being chosen to represent a community as its Councillor is the greatest honour. I 'loved' looking after my ward, and it was wonderful wandering past initiatives in which I had had a hand (I vlogged on some of these during the election campaign). Indeed, being the local County Councillor had become part of my identity - every day I signed dozens of letters: "John D Clare (Aycliffe North & Middridge)" - and it is still strange not waking up to a pile of tasks.

In particular, as I wrote in the Newton News in February, there were a number of unfinished issues I was keeping a watching brief on - including Forrest Park, the S&DR regeneration project (and the Locomotion pub), the Woodham Burn nature corridor, Cobblers Hall environmental play area, and the Kings Drive shrub beds. Hopefully, someone else will now see these to completion.

And I am especially heartbroken not to be able to extend the County Council's Climate Emergency into County Durham as planned. Having said that, it had been obvious for months that I was likely to lose my seat on the County Council and - as I have written elsewhere in the Newton News - we had been embedding climate action into the Council's everyday structures and systems ... so that work will continue automatically as long as the new administration does not actively renege on its climate declaration.

### A SENSE OF RELIEF

Having acknowledged the immensity of the loss, however, it is also true that being a County Councillor is a very onerous and stressful job if you do it properly.

Aycliffe North & Middridge is one of the largest wards in the county, and the hundreds of service requests I am factually proven to have submitted were only the tip of a 24/365 iceberg of problems and complaints, meetings, local groups, site visits, walkabouts and drive-arounds, keeping people informed etc. ... along with residents' personal troubles - many of which were empathetically draining. Desperation does not keep office hours - I fielded complaints even on Christmas Day, and the most notable request was at 3.45am (by chance I was awake to respond). Last week I took my first holiday in eight years without my Council phone, computer and a pile of Council work!

Added to this, this work was done under a daily barrage of abuse. Hundreds of messages which were simply lists of foul words. One 'contract' publicly issued on Labour Councillors' lives. A number of 'we know where you live' messages. Lots of what is called 'gas lighting' - posts designed to undermine my self-esteem and mental health. Three people who thought it acceptable to follow me down the street screaming at me. Five cases where I had to seek police advice concerning harassment. One libel, so serious it required a solicitors' letter. These are typical of the price a prominent local politician pays nowadays for trying to serve their community. So - upset as I was to lose the election - I cannot say that I did not leave the count also with a sense of relief.

### THE FUTURE

I am still, of course, a Town Councillor for Byerley Park, Horndale & Cobblers Hall Ward, and you know that I will do that job thoroughly. However, I think the message of the election was clear, and I am pulling back from front-facing politics.

It only remains for me to thank residents sincerely for allowing me to be their County Councillor. Not only has it been a massive honour, but also fulfilling and huge fun and a peerless opportunity to do good in my local community, for which I am immensely grateful! John D Clare

This week Parliament continued with the debate on the Queen's Speech, I was able to contribute last Wednesday and raised the importance of jobs and how they create opportunity which in turn can feed aspirations, a key attribute we all need to improve our situations. On Thursday you may have seen that the Prime Minister visited Ferryhill along with Julia Gillard, who was the Australian Prime Minister from 2010-2013. They were there to meet virtually with Uhuru Kenyatta, the President of Kenya, who was in a school in Nairobi. School children from Ferryhill and Kenya shared the announcement of funding to support girls to get 12 years of quality education. It was fabulous to see the excitement from the children seeing Boris in their school and his engagement with them was also lovely to see. After we left Cleves Cross Primary, I took the Prime Minister to meet a couple of my staff and Joe Quinn, the new Conservative County Councillor in Ferryhill, to Ferryhill Station. We were able to show him the importance of the potential reopening of the train station here and explain how game changing it would be for the local economy.

I continued the theme of schools on Friday and had a fantastic few hours visiting Byerley Park and Walworth Primary Schools in Newton Aycliffe and Sedgefield Primary School. The schools admirably demonstrated the achievements made in sport and activities. Hannah, Layla, Dominic, Evie, Ruby and Harry from Byerley Park Primary School explained to me how their activities worked and how they had Captain Taskivator giving them challenges and indeed they then designed some challenges themselves. At Walworth School I met Paul from Go Well (aka Captain Taskivator) and they had a Colour Run in progress, this is something to behold, as is mentioned elsewhere in this magazine. Maybe once social distancing ends, I could encourage some of the Aycliffe Councillors to join me to try this! At Sedgefield Primary School I also met with Sarah Price, the Manager of the Go Well Team, a Community Interest Company (Not for Profit) who are working across the Sedgefield constituency to inspire and build healthy active futures.

Last week I also joined a round table discussion entitled 'Pride of place: building social infrastructure in left behind areas'. This had Lord Greenhalgh, Lord Heseltine and Professor Michael Kenny as key speakers. The discussion was around how to restore civic pride and engagement in so called 'Left Behind' areas.

Monday, of course, has seen the further relaxation of lockdown with indoor hospitality opening for small groups. I am sure that, like me, many of you may have ventured out for a pint or a meal with friends. If you do, please be sensible and remember Hands, Face, Space and Fresh Air is something to continue as it helps minimise any risks of having to return to further lockdowns. We have also seen some pockets of concern around the country with the Indian Variant, so called as it was first identified in India. The Government is attacking this with surge testing, in the short term this is more effective than more vaccinations as the vaccines take a couple of weeks to become fully effective. My understanding is that of those affected a disproportionate amount are people who have had the opportunity for vaccine but declined it. This just further illustrates how important it is to take up your opportunity when you get it and to also follow through with the second jab when it is due.

We are continuing to collect the Town Centre surveys and will let you know the results shortly. I notice we had a letter in last week suggesting I should not be looking to invest in the Town Centre as I would be supporting a private business. Let me assure everyone that anything we do will be fully transparent and an appropriate use of public funds. At this stage, all I am trying to establish is what people would like us to try and achieve.

Please remember to continue to be sensible and whilst we can do more, common sense tells you that it is best to continue the Hands, Face, Space and Fresh Air protocols for a while yet. Stay Safe. Paul Howell
