Following the bank holiday, team members at KFC Newton Aycliffe took to the streets and the local areas surrounding the restaurant to do a litter pick on Tuesday 1st June, to mark both the launch of the Great British Spring Clean and KFC's newest commitments to tackling litter.

Team members were joined by local councillors Jim Atkinson, Eddy Adam and Neville Jones, and discussed the range of initiatives that KFC will be implementing. This includes the launch of a new consultation with local councils, initially in five regions across England, to roll out targeted, pilot programmes around alternative solutions to tackling litter and increasing local investment in addressing the problem.

### Inconsiderate Parking

A problem that's not going to go away anytime soon.

This is not what people want to hear but it's the truth and the reality of the situation has to be faced before a possible solution can be considered. This is a community based problem requiring a community based solution which means taking a collective responsibility and a willingness to face some hard facts.

The number of cars on the town and surrounding areas is increasing which means few places are available to park your car and this is a reality that has to be dealt with. The grassed areas and verges are the responsibility of Durham County Council and Livin so, with all the best will in the world, town councillors like myself are limited to how much we can achieve in the short term. Individual complaints about this problem, although justified, have limited effect as they don't reflect the true scale of the problem or the damage done. If the number of cars continues to rise then we have to accept this problem will continue to create conflict as long as cars take priority over the welfare of the people in the community. There is no easy solution to this complex problem, and an appeasing quick fix to keep everyone happy is not an option. Unfortunately it's a problem that's going to be with us indefinitely unless we can work together as a community to identify the scale of the problem and find a workable and realistic outcome. To this end I would like to ask the county councillors to work with the members of the town council, local community associations and Newton News to address this situation so that a detailed overview can be provided for Durham County Council and Livin so they can be made fully aware of the scale of the problem and the negative impact it's having on the environment and on people's lives. If people have a car they need a place to

park and we have to accept that sometimes this is going to be problematic and create a conflict situation. Until the wider issues can be addressed it has to come down to the individual to take personal responsibility for how and where they park their car and how it may impact on the lives of other people in their community. ### **Town Centre Regeneration Survey Results**

On the 30th April, I published a survey in the Newton News that asked a series of questions designed to improve my understanding of how the residents of Newton Aycliffe would like to see the town centre improved and regenerated. Since my election as the MP for Sedgefield in December 2019, I have held regular meetings with the Aycliffe Town Centre Partnership, Durham County Council, local councillors and Freshwater to discuss ideas about what changes we could plausibly make to the town centre and what funding would be needed to achieve this. Unfortunately, Covid-19 has meant that there has not been as much progress made on actioning these ideas, however, in recent weeks, there has been a shift in the makeup of Durham County Council and the Government's announcement of the Levelling Up fund. Both of the aforementioned events have presented us with the perfect opportunity to move forward with progressive plans for the town centre and really deliver the regeneration that is desperately needed. This survey was the perfect platform to build our ideas upon and a way of involving Newton Aycliffe residents in all parts of the process. It was decided that we would allow a month for people to respond to our survey, either online or physically. I am hopeful that as the process moves forward, we will be able to continue to interact with the public and ensure that any changes made are what residents of Newton Aycliffe believe will be beneficial to their town. If, after reading the comments below, you want to add further comment, please get in touch. **Key Findings:** 

Following close analysis of the results, there were four key findings that give a greater outline of what the priorities are in terms of the town centre for the residents of Newton Aycliffe and what changes they would like to see made to the town centre. The findings are as follows.

Small Independent Businesses - It is widely accepted that one of the most important aspects of the town centre regeneration project is ensuring that the units that are currently stood empty on the high street are filled. There has naturally been debate over what kind of shops or businesses should fill these empty units. There has been suggestions of bars and restaurants, however, in response to question 5 of our survey, which asked what type of businesses they would like to see fill the empty units, over 40% of participants said that they would like to see smaller and more medium sized, independently run businesses.

As a Conservative, I am incredibly passionate about seeing the emergence of small, independently run, businesses

on our high street to help boost the local economy and stimulate job creation. We already have a number of successful small businesses on the high street, and I think as we come out of Covid-19 and begin our recovery, we have an excellent opportunity to bring more of these to Newton Aycliffe. In order to do this, I am going to look to work with the Town Council, County Council, Freshwater and the Government to see how we can further stimulate the engagement of small businesses to our town, tackle the issue of the extremely high rentable value of units in the town centre and encourage potential entrepreneurs to take the huge step of setting up their businesses in Newton Aycliffe.

Entertainment Venues - In answer to question 3 of our survey, 'what developments/improvements do you think would be most beneficial to the town centre?', 25% of respondents said they would like to see the addition of entertainment venues to the town centre, for example a bowling alley or cinema. At present, the closest cinema to Newton Aycliffe is Darlington, however I believe they would be a wonderful addition to Newton Aycliffe. It would be a catalyst for a stimulation to the local economy, increasing footfall in the town centre thus benefiting the other businesses and charity shops.

A cinema or bowling alley has the potential to not only increase footfall in the town centre but also attract more hospitality to Newton Aycliffe. Cinemas and bowling alleys go hand in hand with bars and, in particular, restaurants, both of which would increase employment in the area and boost the local economy. I look forward to exploring the different options we have with the Council.

The Return of a Market - As I am sure many of you are aware, Newton Aycliffe used to have a thriving market with a wide range of products available. It was a great shame that traders stopped trading there, after 40 years, in 2014. With this in mind, I was delighted that 85% of respondents said that they believe Newton Aycliffe would benefit from the return of a market. This is a view I certainly share and look forward to working hard to make this happen.

While there is not yet a consensus on what form this market should take or what kind of stalls people would like to see, it is positive that there is a desire for a market to return to the town centre and once again provide a much needed boost to the town.

A Community Space – Question 11 asked 'The local Police Force are currently developing plans to open a 'community hub' in the town centre, where both children and adults can go to socialise,

learn and seek support. Do you think this will benefit the town and the local community?'. 94% of respondents said they do believe that this would benefit the town, again a view that I certainly share. This is an idea or proposal that I have discussed with the local police force at length. I have listened to the reasons they believe Newton Aycliffe is in need of a space like this and the challenges that they have faced trying to turn the idea into reality. Therefore, I understand what needs to be done to open a space such as this and which groups and organisations we need to work with moving forward. This space would not only benefit young children in Newton Aycliffe, keeping them off the streets and giving them somewhere to socialise, but also vulnerable adults or adults who are in need at any given time. It would be a wonderful asset to the town. Final Comment – I would just like to take this opportunity again to thank everyone who participated in the survey. I look forward to continuing to hold discussions with relevant stake holders in the town centre and organisations who can help deliver on the much-needed regeneration project.

I do hope that we can deliver on the four key changes that I have outlined above and use those as a platform to help Newton Aycliffe thrive as a town with new jobs and investment in the area.

I want to work with the public every step of the way on this project, so please, if you have any other ideas or comments, do not hesitate to get in touch with me and my team.

### **Newton Aycliffe F.C. Pre-Season Schedule**

Newton Aycliffe FC has announced its pre-season schedule ahead of the 2021-22 Ebac Northern League Division One campaign. Colin Stromsoy's squad will return for training on Saturday, June 12 to undergo an extensive six week programme including five preseason fixtures to prepare for the new season.

Aycliffe will play four games at the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium including high profile ties against Spennymoor Town, Darlington and South Shields as well as making the trip to Manchester to take on Abbey Hey.

Stromsoy's men will end their schedule with a home fixture against Northern League Division Two outfit Tow Law Town.

Aycliffe will kick off their pre-season campaign with a home game against Vanarama National League North team Spennymoor on Tuesday, June 29 (7.30pm). It will be the second successive year Moors have made the trip to the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium after a successful friendly back in August in front of a restricted 150 spectators.

Darlington will be the visitors on Tuesday, 6th July (7pm) for the first time since a friendly in July 2017 when the Quakers took a 5-1 win.

The Newtonians travel to Lancashire to take on North West Counties Abbey Hey on Saturday, July 10 (3pm) in a reverse of last season's fixture which saw an entertaining 3-3 draw. The team will complete a busy week on Tuesday, July 13 when Pitching In Northern Premier League side South Shields make the trip to the Beaumont Landscapes Stadium (7.30pm). It will be the first time Aycliffe have hosted the Mariners in four years, since the South Tyneside club's infamous quadruple winning campaign of

### Votes for Women?

#### Dear Sir.

It comes as no surprise that the Tories put forward a proposal, under the guise of a bill to end non-existent electoral 'fraud', that will create a barrier to people exercising their basic right to vote and is a clear act of voter suppression.

There were only seven cases of fraud in the last election, so there is no justification for this bill which aims to introduce a requirement for voters to produce photo ID at polling stations.

It is estimated that this will disenfranchise over 3 million people, the poorest in society, who do not possess an ID and haven't the means to acquire one. This is a deliberate act to create a barrier to prevent certain people from voting.

The majority of those affected will be relying on benefits, or on zero-hour contracts, part time workers, single parents and those in insecure work and we know the majority of this economic group are women, who have continually been the majority of those effected by Tory austerity policies with 85% of cuts hitting women the hardest. The Woman's Budget Group report that:

 Women are more likely to be low paid and in insecure employment. 69% of low paid earners are women, 74% of those in part-time employment are women. 54% of those on zero hours contracts are women.

· Women are the majority of people living in poverty and femaleheaded households are more likely to be poor. For example, 45% of lone parents (90% of whom are women) are living in poverty. This will also affect those belonging to ethnic minority groups and those with disabilities and men who also fall into this socio-economic group, but, by effectively removing the vote from poor working-class women, it is significant in its symbolism.

It is not just the cost of acquiring ID that is a barrier, it's the bureaucracy involved which many people do not have the time or energy to go through.

After 100 years of hard-won suffrage, when women campaigned, fought, and even gave their lives, for the right to vote, if this bill is passed, it is this Tory government that will effectively be rolling back this fundamental right to a time when only a select class of women could vote.

A century after women acted under the slogan 'Votes for Women' it looks as though, once again, this slogan will be relevant as we fight to ensure votes for women remains a fundamental right for ALL women, by opposing this bill.

### **Proposed Incinerator Development**

On 25th May 2021, I chaired a meeting of the Planning Sub-Committee of the Town Council. The main item on the agenda was the proposed development of a High Temperature Thermal Treatment Facility for Clinical and Hazardous Waste, at land north of Hitachi Rail on Aycliffe Business Park.

 The building would house a high temperature incinerator plant.

The site would operate 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, 355 days a year.

 Catchment area for materials to be processed would be centred around the site, including Newcastle, Durham, Sunderland and other local towns. However, a regional capacity shortfall in the North East and Scotland would be addressed by the proposed facility.

The facility is expected to process 1.25 tonnes of waste per hour.

Maximum annual operation is 10,500 tonnes.

- There will be 15 HGV movements a day. ٠
- The stack (chimney) will be 30m high. .

Containers, which had contained clinical waste, would be transferred to the container wash for disinfection.

The report we received indicated that human health receptors/risks need to be assessed

Low potential negative environmental impact.

Operational site emissions suggest • potentially significant effects may occur, combined impacts of site emissions and traffic emissions should be quantified. No operational emissions modelling methodology is provided.

The meeting was full to capacity and after questions from the public a brief description of the plan by a County Planning Officer and a detailed presentation of the plan by Chrissy Walton, the Town Council's Corporate and Policy Officer, it was resolved that the following response be forwarded to Durham County Council.

'The Town Council have considered this application at the Planning Sub-Committee on 25 May 2021, which was attended by a number of members of the public, and would make the following comments to the proposal:

The Town Council would request that this application is placed on hold until a full and detailed public consultation can take place. It is also requested that DCC consider holding a public meeting in order to give residents the opportunity to ask questions directly and receive answers in person.

That this application is considered at committee rather than a delegated decision at officer level.

The proposed site is not suitable for this type of development as it is too near to domestic properties.

In addition, the Town Council would object to

the location of the proposal due to:

Proximity to houses;

Proximity to historic and listed buildings/ monuments;

Potentially dangerous site and traffic emissions;

• Significant environmental impact on air quality;

Habitat loss for 4 butterfly species which are on the RED data list species, 2 of which are vulnerable and 1 is near threatened; Unclear impact/information regarding

Great Crested Newts;

• Potential risk to groundwater within a protection zone on the Magnesian Limestone principal aquifer;

Negative visual impact on the area.'

Recently the Council has been informed that the planning request would now be dealt with at committee level.

I will be requesting the full Council meeting

on 16th June to authorise myself and Council officers to seek appropriate advice from a consultant in this area of planning and, if required, to employ a consultant to represent the views of the Council when this issue is discussed at the County Council Planning Committee.

I personally believe that this development should not take place in close proximity to a growing town and the largest industrial estate in the County.

Air quality will be affected, with untold particles and gasses which, depending on the wind and weather, will be deposited throughout Newton Aycliffe and South West Durham.

I believe this plan has no positive value to our community and we should fight it with all the resources at our disposal.

A week in the constituency for me as Westminster is on recess at half term, meaning, whilst I had a number of zoom or similar meetings, I was also able to spend more time here.

I had a zoom meeting with my colleague Lee Anderson, MP for Ashfield. Lee is an ex-miner, and we had a discussion with union and trustee representatives about the mineworkers' pension scheme and the recommendations made by the BEIS select committee. I was part of the committee that produced a report requesting Government to improve the allocation of funds to the scheme. I also had discussions with one of the newer companies in the market who are installing fibre broadband to explain to me their approach, and how it affects people in the constituency. I have also continued discussions with Council officers and others as regards our proposals for applying the opportunities afforded by the Levelling Up Fund. The results of our recent survey on the potential for Aycliffe town centre is reported separately in the Newton News. The main issue in the inbox, as regards Aycliffe, is the planning proposal for an incinerator on the Business Park. We are arranging two online Q&A sessions with the business to help people be better informed as to what precisely is being proposed. This is not part of the planning process; it is a voluntary opportunity from the business to explain their proposal for those that are concerned. I have had some criticism for not immediately objecting to the proposal but, with the details I have seen and the environmental standards they would be mandated to achieve, I find it difficult to object. However, my role is to represent residents and if, after they have considered the full information, grounds for concern remain then I will fully represent them. I am not a scientist, so I am very definitely open to hearing concerns. I am not immediately objecting because environmental standards have moved significantly in recent years. I trust the Environment Agency who have no other agenda than public safety and a clean environment, and they would need to approve the operations. I understand the standards this facility would need to achieve are the same as a much larger waste incinerator built in Copenhagen in 2019 which is so clean that they have an artificial ski slope on its roof that local residents use. This is a completely different paradigm to when I lived in Aycliffe (prior to the establishment of the Environment Agency and stricter enforcement) when unpleasant smells regularly wafted across the town.

Recess means that because there are no debates happening, I have more time to spend with the team in the office in Aycliffe. This week we have started planning the specific details regarding pop up surgeries. Whilst we will be able to meet people in the Aycliffe office this is not always accessible to people elsewhere in the constituency, as I am sure you are aware it reaches from Thornley in the north, to Hurworth in the south. For surgery planning, the constituency has been divided into seven regions and whilst we will hold at least one surgery each week, it will move between the regions in an attempt to be more accessible. We will publicise on our website and in the Newton News (and other media) the proposed schedules. As regards the constituency, the independent boundary commission has this week produced its first iteration of the proposals for the next election. This is to equalise the number of constituents each MP represents. I currently have an electorate of 64,325 but the requirement is for each MP to have between 69,724 and 77,062. I therefore needed to have at least 5,400 added. Because other constituencies around me also require changes, the impact on the proposals for Sedgefield are more significant. It starts with a proposal to rename the constituency as 'Newton Aycliffe and Sedgefield' and sees major changes to the geography. I will lose all of my Darlington Borough Council wards as well as Wingate and Station Town and they will be replaced by areas like Shildon, Coxhoe and Bowburn. The next stage in this process is for representations to be made on the proposals, after which the boundary commission announce their final proposals. These are intended to be finalised in time for the next General Election, currently scheduled for 2024. However, this proceeds I will continue to be your Member of Parliament until the next election and hopefully beyond. We continue the steps out of lockdown and look to the next critical date of 14th June when we will know whether restrictions are to be lifted on 21st June. For now, can I please continue to encourage you all to be sensible and not push the boundaries

Andy told us that he loves his job and a recent promotion to Acting Inspector means that he is even more involved with our community, where he sees the amazing work done by charities, councillors, and volunteers, such as ourselves.

Andy went on to say, "overall, crime in Newton Aycliffe is quite low. However, one of the main problems was anti-social behaviour which tended to be concentrated around certain areas of the town. The neighbourhood policing team was guite small but were highly motivated and had a good working knowledge of the area and the people, and maintained useful contacts with many of the community organisations. The aim of the team is to problem solve around issues causing the most amount of harm to the community".

He informed us that a recent initiative was the intention to set up a Community Hub in the town which would be a multi-agency help centre for residents, that anyone could access for assistance in finding the right

#### **OFF ROAD BIKES**

As the weather continues to improve, we see more instances of off-road vehicles along the coastal areas. We are working with partners to improve defences against access from these vehicles and prevent further damage to footpaths, walkways and natural habitats, especially over breeding season. We encourage all visitors to the coastal areas to be vigilant for this illegal use and to report it to Police via 101 as soon as possible. Please try to gather riders clothing descriptions, vehicle descriptions, any displayed registration plates, direction of travel and direction of arrival. These pieces of information are very important in identifying and dealing with these nuisance vehicles.

#### METAL DETECTING

Over the past few months, we have received complaints from landowners and farmers around persons entering their land with metal detectors. Whilst this appears to be a tranquil and peaceful pastime, please be mindful of the legal aspects of metal detecting. Metal detecting on private land needs landowners permission due to issues with trespass and possible criminal damage. There could also be further issues around theft should items of value be found. Before using a metal detector on public land, check with the local authority as some may have restrictions on the use of metal detectors. Other areas, such as Sites of Special Scientific Importance, are likely to have complete bans on the use of metal detectors, as the digging up of land is prohibited. As always, ensure that you have the correct information and permissions, prior to putting on your headphones!

After being asked to bat first, Avcliffe used all of their allotted 40 overs to score a respectable 164 all out with the main contributions coming from 16 year old Matty Greaves (30 off 70 balls), 15 year old Leo Mercy (28 off 31 balls) and Matty French (20 off 35 balls).
