Giant Hogweed in the Area SAFC Branch Meeting

Key ID Features



Great Aycliffe Town Council have recently been contacted by members of the public worried about articles in the local press and on social media about Giant Hogweed in the area. The plant is a massive problem along the River Tees and is now well established along this river. People are rightfully concerned that this non-native plant that can cause significant burns and blistering if skin comes into contact with the sap

However, the Council would like to reassure members of the public that during the plant growing season the Town Council monitor its land on a weekly basis in locations where the plant is likely to be found. Whilst a few plants have been found, they have been identified at a very early stage and removed as soon as possible when detected. For this reason, the Council are confident that this problem, which is such an issue elsewhere, is under control on Town Council land.

The Council also closely liaise with Durham County Council regarding any giant hogweed sightings on their land.

Locally there is a great deal of confusion between giant hogweed and the widely prevalent native hogweed species and other similar plants such as cows parsley. The information below and above aims to aid members of the public to correctly identify the plant.

A mature giant hogweed cannot be mistaken for anything else; it is very imposing and can stand up to 3 metres tall with huge leaves the same size as a grown man. The stems are covered in sharp hooks and have dark blotches. The leaves are significantly more sharply divided compared with native hogweed.

On July 24th we are celebrating our Blue Light Day which will take place in the town centre, a fun day for everyone! We really hope to see you all there.

We are working with partner agencies, to secure funding, and are always looking at new and innovative ways to tackle the problem. Have you heard of our online messaging service 'Keep in the Know'? Councillors Call on Government to Keep Universal **Credit Uplift**

Liberal Democrat Councillor, Mark Wilkes, a Cabinet member on Durham County Council, is to call on the government to protect low paid workers. A motion has been submitted for debate to the next Full Council on July 14th by the Lib Dem Councillor. In September a £20 a week increase in Universal Credit will be scrapped, affecting nearly 53,000 residents across County Durham.

Cllr Wilkes says this will impact not only on the incomes of low paid workers but also risks causing serious damage to the economy commenting, "If this cut goes ahead it will take over £50 million out of our County's economy in the coming year. If we are to build a stronger economy the government cannot make this cut."

"Furlough is ending, our high streets haven't recovered, many essentials are seeing inflationary price increases, and many working residents are still struggling. I hope every councillor will back my motion and send a message to the Government that the £20 increase should be made permanent.' Cllr Alan Shield, Leader of the Durham Independent Group, has agreed to 2nd the motion stating, "This is not politically motivated, and shows cross party unity to implement a morally justifiable cause to maintain the current status quo for residents suffering from financial and social impoverishment.'

A number of Conservative backbench MPs have also called on government to keep the uplift.

B6443 CENTRAL AVENUE AND C34 BURN LANE, NEWTON AYCLIFFE) (TEMPORARY ROAD CLOSURE) ORDER 2021

The Council proposes to make an Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on the following lengths of road in Newton Aycliffe: Phase 1 - 45m of Shafto Way between its junctions with Central Ave roundabout and Stanfield Way; Phase 2 – 130m of Burn Ln between its junctions with Central Ave and Burn Ln roundabouts; **Phase 3** –The south eastern segment of Burn Ln roundabout between Burn Ln and Greenwell Rd; **Phase 4** – The western quadrant of Burn Ln roundabout between Greenwell Rd and Burn Ln to enable carriageway resurfacing works to be undertaken. Alt route from: 1. the south eastern side of the closure from Shafto Way southerly and continuing westerly on Greville Way, northerly on St Cuthbert's Way and north easterly on Central Ave to the north western side of the closure, and vice versa; 2. the south eastern side of the closure from Central Ave roundabout south westerly on Central Ave then north westerly and north easterly on Greenwell Rd to the north western side of the closure; and from the north western side of the closure north westerly on Burn Ln then south westerly on Westmorland Way and Silkin Way, easterly on Stephenson Way and north easterly on Central Ave to the south eastern side of the closure; **3.** As 2. with an additional route to Burnhill Way roundabout as a turnaround; **4.** Traffic will be managed under temporary traffic signals around Burn Ln roundabout. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence from 7pm to 6.30am each night on 24/7/21 and are anticipated to be completed in 11 nights. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly.

Trying to relive or recapture the past often leads to failure and disappointment. The past is there to be learnt from so we can create a better future, but we must ensure we are dealing with the reality of the present moment and not what people perceive the problems and solutions to be based on unrealistic and inaccurate comparisons of the past. The present isn't perfect but it's all we have to work with and the challenges we have to face as a community require us to deal with them here and now, and in doing so face a future we want to move towards not just for ourselves but for generations to come. This town has a great heritage and it's only right we do everything we can to preserve it but honouring and acknowledging our history is not the same as wanting to live in the past or be like it was in the good old days. Aycliffe Rugby Club Seek Assistant Coaches

After a long lay-off from playing regular league fixtures, due to the covid pandemic Newton Aycliffe RUFC are, at last, poised to start the 2021/22 Season.

The Durham RFU have been working hard to restructure the divisions to accommodate additional teams and tried their best to keep travelling to a minimum.

Aycliffe will now play in the newly formed Durham/Northumberland Division Three South. With only 7 teams in the division 18 league fixtures have been pre-arranged. This has shortened the average weeks in a season by a country mile. However, there will be lots of spare weeks to add plenty of friendlies.

The first arranged league fixture is set for 18th Sept 2021 at home to Hartlepool TDSOB. With this in mind Aycliffe will start pre-season training from 8th July. Throughout July training will take place on Thursday evenings 7pm start and Saturday afternoons at 1pm. Please note training this Saturday, 10th July, will start 12.30pm. Aycliffe will continue to welcome new senior male players from the age of 17, who would like to try the sport or ex-players who have recently moved into the area or fancy a change of clubs. The pandemic has taken its toll on a number of junior coaches who have since moved on to different ventures. We are continuing to speak to the local schools in order to develop a new infrastructure for kid's rugby in the not-too-distant future.

Finally, this takes me nicely to the fore mentioned strap line above. The rugby club are actively seeking volunteer assistant coaches. Some of our senior coaches have moved on due to other commitments. This has left a bit of a void in our coaching team. We would welcome new coaches or player/coaches to assist current head coach Bob Malvern. These roles will suit ex rugby players who may have Level 1 or 2 coaching badges. It may also suit university students who are proficient at the game and are studying sports teaching qualifications. Fitness coaches will also be welcomed to volunteer their services. 

Incinerator Clarification Required

I wish to respond to last week's article which promotes Fornax's proposal for an incineration plant at Merchant Park, Newton Aycliffe. The article was unsigned but, appearing as it does next to Mr Howell's Parliament Talk column, it gives every appearance of at least being endorsed by Mr Howell.

I would like to thank Mr Howell, Councillor Gerald Lee and representatives from Fornax for taking the time to respond to people's questions about the proposal. However, I must take issue with the way the situation has been presented in the article, and readers might find

a bit of background helpful. The planning application - received 27/4/21 - was not given much publicity at all, beyond the businesses in the immediate vicinity of the proposed site. Only a handful of householders were notified directly. It was a resident's social media post which drew the attention of others to it in any significant way. Immediately following this, a Facebook Group was set up to inform people about the application. Leaflets were commissioned, paid for privately, and distributed by volunteers in areas of Aycliffe Village, Newton Aycliffe, Heighington and School Aycliffe. The deadline for objections was mid-June, so there was really no time to lose. Fornax had complied with statutory consultation procedures but felt no obligation to ensure people in nearby residential areas were made aware. A notice was placed in the Northern Echo, but one in the Newton News would have reached many more local people. This is not an application to remove a tree or extend a residential property. This is an application for an incinerator plant which will treat clinical and hazardous waste, produce toxic emissions, have an effect on many people living in surrounding villages and farms, and generate considerable heavy traffic (an average of 30 journeys per day, using 14 tonne trucks and articulated trailers) on a B road with a level crossing. Despite Covid, much more could and should have been done to inform the public of the application. Those who were consulted were, in the

they say, "Meetings were held with both the MP, and separately with members of DCC's regeneration team. No further comments or feedback was (sic) received from those contacted beyond these meetings, reflecting the anticipated low response to the proposals". Local residents, however, have different priorities to businesses. Residents are concerned about health, well-being, family safety, etc. rather than opportunities for profit. As evidenced by the numbers of objections submitted by residents once they did know about it, Fornax would have drawn a different conclusion about their 'anticipated low

Howell says "Residents were frustrated by the level and timing of information they had received". Actually, residents were angry. They felt this was a 'done deal', negotiated behind closed doors, with the public being taken for granted.

With regard to the meetings held online on 14th and 15th June with members of the public, the article states there was a 'wideranging and in-depth discussion'. I would argue there was no 'discussion'. Mr Howell asked that questions be submitted, via his office, to Fornax well in advance. Apart from a couple of questions, at the meeting of 14th June, questions were read out by Mr Howell and answered by Fornax. At the meeting of the 15th, when residents asked their own questions and were able to challenge answers given, Fornax appeared less sure of some of the answers.

Studies and reports by organisations such as UKWIN (UK Without Incinerators) and Zero Waste Europe, as well as articles in medical journals, show that incinerators - even the modern, new tech ones - can lead to health problems for those who live nearby, and authorities should proceed with caution when considering new applications. Yet the article states 'There will be no harmful emissions from the site'. This is just not true. Fornax clearly stated in the meetings that there will be toxic emissions.

We all accept that our waste has to go somewhere, and that landfill is not always the appropriate solution. However, incineration should be a last resort.

Emissions produced by incinerators do not count towards the Emissions Trading Scheme (which is an important measure in reducing greenhouse gases, by forcing those who produce emissions to pay for it). There is, thus, an incentive to use incineration as a means of waste disposal, and indeed its use is increasing. Studies show, however, that greater use of incineration leads to less waste being recycled. It is also known that generating energy from waste is very inefficient. People are being encouraged to (a) use less

and (b) recycle more, in order to minimise residual waste. Therefore there will be less, not more, need for new incinerators. Fornax are planning to build four more incineration plants in the UK and, once built, they will be around for decades.

As this is written Tuesday, before England play Denmark, I can only applaud the team for their performances against Germany and Ukraine and hope it continues against Denmark. It is great for us to get the lift from their results.

Last week started with the meeting of the Left Behind Neighbourhoods APPG. Taking ownership, taking control, was the subject. Community asset ownership can bring a wide range of benefits to a local area and its residents. From strengthening the economy and building civic pride to supporting more responsive public services and safeguarding social infrastructure such as pubs, shops, and post-offices. We heard how different communities did or did not have this capacity. During the week we engaged further with Fornax regarding their proposed clinical waste plant and asked them to put the additional questions people had raised, along with their answers, on the Q&A page of their website. This is so much more transparent than them being fed via my office. If anyone has any questions, that have not been answered, let us know and we will try to help.

On Wednesday I had discussions about how HS2 impacts on the north east, which is everything from absolute capacity through to contracts for Hitachi. The recent announcements on proposed changes to LNER and Cross-Country timetables for 2022 show how capacity constrained we are. We had a call with the new Health Secretary, Sajid Javid, and I was pleased at his initial positioning. We had an innovation strategy roundtable with Secretary of State Kwasi Kwarteng and Minister Amanda Solloway. This is where a number of MPs were on a call to discuss the importance of innovation led businesses and it gave me the perfect opportunity to shout up for all that is happening on NETPark, I will be doing this again in the chamber as I have a BEIS question coming up.

I left Westminster a day earlier last week meaning I was able to go to the 'Muddy Run' at Trimdon Grange community centre. This is a 5k run normally held in winter, hence muddy, I have to say that I forgot how many hills there are in Trimdon, and how steep they are. The prospect of Pie and Peas at the end was a significant motivator in getting me round!

Thursday saw me join Boris on his visit to Nissan and the announcement of the battery gigafactory. This is yet another fantastic statement of business confidence and resonates throughout the north east. Also, on Thursday, on one of my regular visits to NETPark, I met the team at Filtronic and later that day I visited Orbit, a Satellite Applications Centre of Excellence from Durham University, also based at NETPark.

As a result of my recent visit to Sedgefield Farmers Market, which takes place on the first Sunday of each month, I went to visit Parlour Made Cheese in Morton. This is a family run business where the distance from Cow to Cheese is literally through a wall, hence the name Parlour Made. They have developed online selling as a result of Covid, they previously largely sold to restaurants. Later, on Friday, we held a surgery in Trimdon Station, next is Fishburn, then Sadberge. Monday saw me visiting Tata Steel and Liberty Steel in south Wales with the BEIS select committee as part of our enquiry on UK steel. This meant I travelled on Sunday. It's a 5-hour cross country train journey, I could have almost got there in the same time if I had gone via London on the Azuma. It just reminds me how rubbish east west train journeys are and how much we need to improve them. I am pleased the PM has increasing confidence we can open up on the 19 July and hope this happens. It is, of course, then incumbent on all of us to use common sense from then on. I was also delighted to see the Queen recognise our NHS with the award of the George Cross. I am sure everyone applauds her for this action. So, we continue, Hands, Face, Space, Fresh Air and Come on England!







Newton Aycliffe FC Latest

Newton Aycliffe 3 v Darlington Town 1

Newton Aycliffe FC's second game of pre-season saw them come out with their first win having finished on the end of a 1-3 defeat, albeit in respectable fashion, against Vanarama National League North side Spennymoor Town on Monday.

It was the Wearside League visitors who took the lead early on when the referee's assistant flagged for a free kick wide on the right for what looked like a strong but fair challenge.

Having pulled themselves level Aycliffe took the game to Darlington Town and took the lead before half time as a cross from the right only made it as far as a Town defender who failed to clear the ball and, Chris Brass style (search it on YouTube), deflected it

off himself with the ball falling to Sado who turned it home, sending the home side in at the break a goal to the good.

Half time saw Aycliffe only change goalkeepers but some early second half substitutions shuffled the forward line and Aycliffe instantly applied the pressure. Despite having the majority of the possession in the early part of the second period, it took until the 72nd minute before the Newtonians put clear daylight between themselves and their visitors.

Following a spell of pressure, a ball in from the right went deep into the box and was met by Jake Petitjean whose looping header went over Charlton in the Town goal to make the score 3-1.

Barring a heavy challenge on ex Darlington Town forward Liam Jarvie, which went unpunished, the remainder of the game went without incident.

With no added time the game finished 3-1 in what was a competitive friendly.

Next up for Aycliffe is a trip to Abbey Hey of the North West Counties League. That will be followed by another visit by a team from a higher league.
