Dear Sir,

Residents who voted Conservative or LibDem in the local elections because they were promised frozen/cut council tax and an end to double taxation may be interested to know that, at Durham County Council's joint administration Cabinet meeting held last week on Wednesday 7 July, Cllr Richard Bell, Deputy Leader and Cabinet portfolio for Finance announced:

- there will be £45 million of cuts over the next four years;
- the Council plans to continue raising council tax by 1.99% (plus a 2% increase on social care precept) over the next four years, i.e. by the "maximum permissible" allowed by the government:
- the Council's Local Council Tax Reduction Scheme (which exempts people on benefits from Council Tax) will be maintained next year but reviewed next year;
- and, regarding double taxation: "it must be apparent from the foregoing that the County Council is not in a position to significantly increase the support given to town or parish councils given the financial circumstances that we find ourselves in". Name & address supplied

Incinerator Q & As

Dear Sir,

The views that I express in this letter are my own personal views and not necessarily those of Great Aycliffe Town Council or any of its members.

I refer to last week's letter to the Newton News from Eileen Brewis on the proposed incinerator to be built on Aycliffe Business Park. This was an exceptionally well-written and informative letter. I agree with every point that Eileen makes on this issue. So far, all of the meetings and the letter from Fornax have been, in my opinion, nothing more than platforms promoting the development.

 What benefits can the population of Great Aycliffe expect from the proposed development of the high temperature incinerator on Aycliffe Business Park?

1. The quality of air

In the plan, there is a stack (chimney) 100ft high. Chimneys are usually used to remove noxious substances and gasses from the site and disperse them into the atmosphere. What are these substances? It appears to me that we will only know when the site is operational. How will this contamination of air quality improve and be of benefit to the people of Great Aycliffe?

2. The most important and worrying question – how will this be of benefit to our health?

This is a quote from 'Air Quality Assessment Hazardous Waste Incinerator, Heighington Lane Environmental Report, April 2021'. 'The emissions from the proposed facility during the modelled operation scenario would contain a number of substances that cannot be evaluated in terms of their effects on health simply by reference to the ambient air quality standard. Health effects could occur through exposure results other than by purely inhalation. As such, an assessment needs to be made of the overall human exposures to the substances by the local population and the risk that this exposure causes.'

3. Will the development improve our environment? There are concerns over this issue, especially the effects of contaminated liquids entering protection zone on the magnesian limestone principle aquifer.

4. Will the development have any benefits in attracting new jobs to the area, apart from the two dozen or so at this site? I recently spoke at length to the director of a large firm operating on the business park (it is no longer an industrial park, but a business park with a large number of non-industrial outlets). He believed that this proposed development could well deter future development and extension of current businesses, not only on the Merchant Place site, but also on other sites on the business park. Needless to say, he was totally opposed to the proposed development. Other businesses are also concerned and opposed to the development. In my view, the only people who will gain from this development are the shareholders of Fornax. This is not a municipal waste disposal site but is purely there for the profit of the shareholders of Fornax. I can see no benefit to the people living in Great Aycliffe and indeed we can only expect negative effects to our future wellbeing. Bob Fleming

Have Your Say

on Proposed Boundary Changes

There is still time for residents in County Durham to have their say on proposals to change Parliamentary constituency boundaries before recommendations are made to Parliament.

The 2023 Review of Parliamentary constituencies was formally launched in January by the Boundary Commission for England. The commission, which is an independent and impartial non-departmental public body, is required to ensure that the number of electors in each constituency across the UK is more equal; in doing so, the number of constituencies in England will increase from 533 to 543.

The commission is now undertaking an independent review of all constituency boundaries in England and will present final recommendations to Parliament by July 2023. The rules that the commission work to are such, that wide scale change is inevitable. Under the proposals announced, just under 10 per cent of the existing 533 English constituencies remain unchanged. Local knowledge is needed to help reshape the map of constituencies, so as part of a consultation, members of the public are encouraged to visit www.bcereviews.org. uk to view maps showing the proposed new boundaries and also provide feedback before the consultation closes on Monday 2 August

Any changes will not affect local council services, with the boundary changes relating only to Parliamentary constituencies, which is the area an MP is elected to represent in Parliament.

People can comment on aspects of the proposals such as where the proposed new boundary lines are and also suggest alternative solutions. There will be a further two rounds of consultation in 2022 based upon representations received as part of this consultation. Following the conclusion of all three consultation periods, the commission will look at all the evidence received and form its final recommendations.

Air Ambulance Raffle

The Great North Air Ambulance Service (GNAAS) is looking for residents to help sell raffle tickets to help it meet the rise in demand, after responding to 45 incidents over the past two weekends alone. The same two weekends last year – when Covid restrictions remained heightened - saw the charity's teams respond to 17 incidents.

Andy Mawson, director of operations at GNAAS, said: "Demand is much higher than last year, and at times has been higher than ever before. The problem is that, although demand is now back to normal levels, our fundraising remains lower than where we need it to be." The 45 incidents were spread across the charity's entire area, with 15 in Cumbria, 27 in the North East and three in North Yorkshire. Road traffic incidents made up the bulk, with 12 related call-outs. There were eight call-outs to falls and a further eight to suspected assaults.

Mr Mawson said: "As ever, we never know what we are facing from one day to the next, but with the support of the public, we can be ready when needed."

Through cancelled fundraising events and activity, the charity estimates it is losing more than £100,000 a month.

"It's great to see that our teams have been there to respond to so many critical incidents," added Mr Mawson. "But the more we are called-out, the greater our costs."

Last year the charity raised £180,000 through its annual raffle. It is hoping to beat that this year and is asking residents who can help them sell tickets to get in touch.

Volunteers can receive tickets through the post or be given a digital code to share among friends and family.

Mr Mawson said: "The population of the North of England have shown us true devotion and it's our duty to be there for those that need us and to make those that support us proud. GNAAS is a service for everybody and every single ticket we sell helps us to be there when someone needs us most."

Providing energetic displays during the three hour session will be local dance troupes, cheer leaders and gymnasts.






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Greenfield Day of Pride

Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report



Newton Aycliffe Cricket Club's 1st team, sponsored by Franks the Flooring Store, came away from their NYSD division two game away at Norton 1st XI with a frustrating draw after falling just six runs short of victory in a thrilling run chase. The homeside were asked to bat first and scored an impressive 205 for 9 in their allotted 50 overs with the wickets shared equally between Jack Slatcher (2 for 23), Michael Howe (2 for 33), George Slatcher (2 for 39) and Patrick Howe (2 for 46).

In reply, opener Luke Telford scored 14 and in the process passed the notable 4,000 career runs milestone for Aycliffe. The visitors then lost three cheap wickets and were in trouble at 57 for 3, but Ryan Patrick (sponsored by A Star Bathrooms) and Jack Slatcher both batted brilliantly, putting on 82 runs for the fourth wicket partnership to put Aycliffe right back in the game. Ryan Patrick top scored with 51 off 67 balls and his maiden first team half century contained three boundaries and a six and Jack Slatcher scored 46 off 87 balls. With quick runs needed and overs running out, Chris Palmer immediately put bat to ball hitting 19 runs off 21 balls and acting captain Michael Howe smashed an unbeaten 29 off just 18 balls but Aycliffe fell agonisingly just short of victory as the innings closed on 200 for 6 after 50 overs.

The 2nd team game at home to Stockton 2nd XI was cancelled as was the u15's game away at Wolviston, as eight players in the club were self isolating due to Covid.

Newton Aycliffe's fledgling senior ladies team won their first ever game when they came out on top by four wickets away at Sunderland in the Durham Womens Cricket League. The home side elected to bat first and were restricted to just 86 for 5 from their allotted 20 overs. Ashley Kell was in superb form for Aycliffe taking three wickets for just 11 runs and she was supported well by both Georgia Leeming (1 for 13) and captain Natasha Grainger (1 for 21). Opening bat Tina Masterman got the Aycliffe innings off to a very good start when she top scored with 17 runs off 18 balls, including three boundaries. Ashley Kell then continued the good work with an unbeaten 14 from 23 balls to help Aycliffe reach their target of 87 for a memorable first win after 16.4 overs and with four wickets in hand. Special mention must go to Emma Moffatt in her very first game, after only one training session, and she marked her debut with a well hit boundary during the Aycliffe innings.



2020/21 TOWN COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

This annual report provides a brief summary of some of the key achievements of the Town Council from the past year. It goes without saying that 2020/21 was a challenging and unprecedented year for the Town Council and the community that we serve.

The onset of the Coronavirus pandemic in March 2020 changed our lives in ways we could never have imagined little more than a year ago, and has made things like social distancing, face masks, hand sanitiser, support bubbles, quarantine, and vaccinations a normal part of our day to day lives.

The Town Council has strived to support the community throughout the pandemic, keeping the vast majority of our services, including the cemeteries, allotments, pre-school, parks, and golf course running as close to normal as possible under the various restrictions.

Unfortunately, the government restrictions left the Council with no choice but to cancel a number of our much-loved community events last year, including the Senior Citizens' Trips, Fun in the Parks and Fireworks Display, although not even Coronavirus could stop Santa undertaking his annual tour of the Parish!

The Council also set up a Covid-19 Small Grants Fund last year offering local community organisations and charities the opportunity to access funds to help them deal with the financial losses suffered as a result of the pandemic.

This fund helped support organisations including food banks, scout groups, residents' associations, the women's institute, the Rotary Club, the Youth Centre, the Beekeepers' Association, and a number of local charities.

A full list of grants and donations given out last year is included elsewhere in the newsletter.

The Council has also set-up a COVID-19 Recovery Fund for the new 2021/22 financial year, using some of the money saved as a result of the cancellation of the community events last year.

This fund will seek to pass these savings back to local taxpayers via one-off investments during the 2021/22 financial year, to help compensate for the services that have not taken place this year. Potential uses of this Covid-19 Recovery Fund include:-

- Setting up a Community Grants Fund to provide financial assistance to local organisations to help them recover from the pandemic;
- Investing more money in events taking place in 2021/22 or subsequent years to make up for the cancellation of the 2020 events;
- Investing in environmental improvements such as tree and bulb planting and creation of new wildflower meadows.

The coming year will no doubt continue to be challenging as the country recovers from the pandemic.

The Town Council will also face challenges over the coming years as its deals with likely funding cuts and budget pressures, and the Council will need to review what services it currently offers and how they are delivered to ensure that the services, events, and facilities being offered align with community needs and priorities.

The following sections of this Annual Report focus on the many services that the Town Council has planned and budgeted to provide to the community of Great Aycliffe during this 2021/22-year, subject, of course, to the lifting of Coronavirus related restrictions.

ENVIRONMENT

The Town Council:

- Provides over 200 allotment sites located at:
 - o Clarence Chare;
 - o Finchale Road;
 - o St. Oswald's;
 - o Aycliffe Village; and
 - o Byerley Park
- Provides pigeons, poultry, and beekeeping plots at specific allotments sites.
- Provides and maintains two cemeteries at West Cemetery and Stephenson Way and a burial service for St. Andrews Church in Aycliffe Village.
- Provides grounds maintenance e.g. the provision of flower beds, grass cutting and tree planting and maintenance, on all Council owned land and facilities.
- Runs the Environment Centre at Moore Lane and a programme of environment events.
- Carries out environmental management of a number of nature and conservation areas including the Great Aycliffe Way and other green open space across the Parish.
- Provides public seating, bus shelters, litter, and dog bins on Town Council owned land.
- Delivers a comprehensive programme of activities for schools, community groups and public events during school holidays.
- Delivers an Environment Week, which involves visiting the primary schools in the town to give an interactive presentation on litter and then offering the opportunity for the children to take part in a litter pick in their local community.
- Assists and facilitates community groups such as local scout, guides, and Friends groups.
- Holds a licence agreement with Durham County Council to operate and maintain areas of land and woodland which form part of the Great Aycliffe Way.

RECREATION

Leisure facilities and community events have formed a major part of the Council's provision over the years. This includes the provision of:-

• Eight very different parks, all with their own character. These are found around the town at the following locations:

o Moore Lane Park o St. Oswald's Park o Town Park o Horndale Park o Simpasture Park o West Park o Byerley Park o Woodham Park

 Modern and well-maintained play equipment is provided at all of these parks, as well as at the following specific sites:-

o Oakleaf Sports Complex o School Aycliffe o Aycliffe Village o Scott Place

o Cobbler's Hall

- Five multi-use games areas at Moore Lane, Simpasture, Horndale, Woodham and Cobbler's Hall, as well as a skate park, scoot track and BMX track.
- The Park Patrol Service which provides an out of hours service to monitor and safeguard the Council's assets and its users.
- The Oakleaf Sports Complex, which provides an indoor bowls green, a multi-use sports hall, four squash courts, function room and bar and catering facilities. The sports complex is also home to an Indoor Bowls Club, Squash Club, Running Club and Archery Club, and provides a number of activity sessions for both adults and children, including an activity programme for children during school holidays. In recent years, a programme of events has been developed at the sports complex including Fantazmajoria (steam punk/sci/fi event), MMA events, Dog Shows and craft fairs.
- The Oakleaf Golf Complex, comprising an eighteen-hole golf course, golf shop, changing rooms, and driving range.
- Eight football pitches, including junior football and six a side pitches at three sites:

o Sports Complex o Simpasture and

o Moore Lane

A series of annual leisure events (subject to Coronavirus restrictions) such as:

o Senior Citizens' Excursions o Fireworks Display o Fun in the Parks o Santa Tours and Letters

Support to events run by local organisations:

o 10K Fun Run organised by Aycliffe Running Club

o Live Music Festival organised by Aycliffe Radio

- A number of new events which have been developed in recent years including:
 - o Skatefest Competition and Demonstrations
 - o Party in the Park Part of the Durham Brass Festival

PRE-SCHOOL LEARNING CENTRE

The Town Council provides a Pre-School Learning Centre located in St. Oswald's Park which is currently registered for 40 places for 3-year-olds. The Council also provides a setting for two-year olds called 'Tots in the Park', offering 12 places, morning and afternoon, 5 days per week. A programme of training and support for staff has been undertaken to ensure that the best service to children is provided.

CAPITAL INVESTMENT

The Council has continued to develop its Asset Management Plan in order to plan investment in Council and community assets such as buildings, vehicles, machinery, play equipment and street equipment.

The Council's Capital Programme makes budget provision each year for an ongoing programme of investment in these assets and significant investment has been made in recent years in new community assets such as play equipment, multi-use games areas and skate parks.

An updated play area is planned for Woodham Park later this year – further details on this project are included elsewhere in the newsletter.

COUNCIL FINANCES

Despite the challenges created by the Coronavirus pandemic over the last year, the Council ended the 2020/21 year in strong financial health, having delivered a substantial saving on its Revenue Budget and increased it balances and reserves to more than £1.5 million.

Whilst some of the savings last year were as a direct consequence of the pandemic, including the unfortunate cancellation of many community events, the Council has also continued to deliver efficiency savings across all services.

This healthy financial situation meant that the Council was able to set a 2021/22 Revenue and Capital Budget that will enable all current services, facilities, and events to be provided to the usual high standards next year, the set-up of a COVID-19 Recovery Fund, and continued investment in community assets, whilst freezing the Town Council proportion of the Council Tax hill

Whilst further financial challenges lie ahead, including likely cuts to the Council Tax Support Grant funding, significant pressure on staffing budgets linked to increases in the National Living Wage, and potentially significant capital investment commitments, and the ensuing depletion in the Council's balances and reserves that this will cause, the Council is well placed to maintain a strong financial position and will seek to manage these challenges via the forthcoming update of its Medium-Term Financial Plan.

The Council also achieved another unqualified external audit report in relation to its Annual Governance and Accountability Return last year. This was a very pleasing outcome and provides independent assurance that the Council's accounting statements present fairly its financial position, and that its financial management, governance, and internal audit arrangements are all sound.

Town Council Launches akLeaf Covid-19 Recovery Fund

The Town Council made a substantial saving on its Revenue Budget during 2020/21 and a significant proportion of the surplus was made up of 'one-off' savings that came about directly as a result of the Coronavirus pandemic.

This was largely as a consequence of services that did not take place during the year, including the unfortunate cancellation of the vast proportion of the Council's community events

The Town Council has therefore agreed to set aside £100,000 from the Revenue Budget saving in a 'COVID-19 Recovery

This fund will seek to pass these savings back to the local community via one-off investments during the 2021/22 financial year, to help compensate local taxpayers for the services that have not taken place this year.

It has been agreed that there will be four main strands to the COVID-19 Recovery Fund, as follows:-

- 1. A £25,000 Community Grants Fund to provide financial assistance to local organisations to help them recover from the pandemic. Applications are invited from local community groups for grants from this fund and applications forms are available on the Council website.
- 2. A Recreation Fund to make investment in recreational activities and events.
- 3. An Environment Fund to make investments in environmental improvements such as tree and bulb planting and creation of wildflower meadows.
- 4. Funds to undertake improvement of the former Elmfield School site, subject to a lease being agreed with Durham County Council.

Local Recycle Centres

Durham County Council has removed the traffic management systems that were set up in May last year to support the safe reopening of HWRCs during the coronavirus pandemic.

The measures have been removed from most of the county's HWRCs and are no longer in place at Coxhoe, Heighington, Hett Hills, Horden, Pity Me, Bishop Auckland, Seaham, Thornley Station and Tudhoe.

However, traffic management will continue to be in place at Annfield Plain to support the ongoing works to develop a low carbon site and large-scale solar farm at the Morrison Busty Depot.

In line with government guidance, vehicle access will continue to be monitored at each site and only one person is allowed onto a recycling platform at a time to ensure safe social distancing for visitors and staff. Residents are being encouraged to check how busy their local HWRC is before visiting by using the council's online map which shows the traffic levels for each site using a traffic light system.

To ensure queues are kept to a minimum, residents are also being asked to consider whether their journey to a recycling centre is essential and to visit another site if their local HWRC is busy.

Cllr Mark Wilkes, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for neighbourhoods and climate changes, said: "We have lifted the temporary measures on the majority of the county's HWRCs which will help to improve traffic flow at some of our sites, and remove the significant cost of these traffic systems. "However, we are still in a pandemic so it is important that residents visit our HWRCs safely by remaining socially distant from others while using the site, and visiting sites at quieter times where possible."

The Prime Ministers' announcement that restrictions are to be largely lifted from Monday is another major step back towards post Covid normality, whatever that may be. This next stage is about us all taking more personal responsibility rather than being told what we can and can't do. It takes us all doing the right thing for the best outcome to be found. We all need to have consideration for others and the environment we find ourselves in. An easy example from my world would be when I am travelling to London by train. If there are only a few people in a carriage I would not wear a mask, but, if it was crowded, then I would wear one, at least moving around. The message from the scientists remains clear though, that the way out of this is via

The message from the scientists remains clear though, that the way out of this is via immunity and immunity can arise by having had exposure or by vaccination. The more of us that are vaccinated the less the risk of transmission and therefore the less risk of putting pressure on our NHS. Please, if you have not already been vaccinated, take the opportunity, and help your friends and family. It was a shame that England just missed winning the European Cup, but they still did better than they ever had in that tournament and let's hope they take a step further in the World Cup next year. A big benefit of the stage 4 release is that of sports and theatres opening up, allowing us all to enjoy events again.

BEIS this week saw us taking evidence from experts on the financial structure of Liberty Steel as part of our inquiry on the Steel industry. We also released our report on the 'Findings of the report of Climate Assembly UK'. Our short inquiry has focussed on how Government and stakeholders have engaged with the findings of CAUK and investigates how its recommendations have influenced the Government's work to date. The report is available online on the Government's website.

I had a catch up as regards the work being done on the feasibility report for reopening Ferryhill railway station. I am increasingly confident that the data will support us achieving this, which would be a great step in building back better infrastructure for our area. I took part in a meeting with a group looking at a new social covenant, this is about trusting communities more and enabling local people to take the actions that help their communities and links, quite heavily, with the APPG on Left Behind Neighbourhoods I chair.

Saturday saw me having the opportunity to help open a memorial garden in Fishburn. Sandra Dowson, a local resident, had led fundraising to build a beautiful feature area in the cemetery where people can both sit and reflect but also have plaques installed to remember people they have lost. I had the privilege of saying a few words and then the pleasure of joining Sandra and others in Fishburn Club afterwards.

Unusually I was drawn to ask a number of questions to ministers this week, normally I average about one question every two weeks, but I have had three in five days. I started with a question in BEIS orals where I was wanting the Minister to show support for NETPark and its innovative businesses. This was followed by a question to the Cabinet Office about the opportunity to make better use of the new County Hall building in Durham by using it for a Government department. I proposed ARIA (Advanced Research and Invention Agency) and suggested this could allow more Council roles to be dispersed to places like Aycliffe. Later in the day I was able to ask the Home Office about funding to support initiatives giving young people more to do and redirecting them away from anti-social behaviour. All of these questions can be viewed, along with the ministers' answers, on my website.

We continue our surgeries around the constituency, last week we were at Fishburn; this week we're at Sadberge and we are off to Hurworth next week. If you want an appointment at any of the future surgeries, please get in touch with us. There is, of course, always the opportunity to arrange one at our office on the Aycliffe Business Park as well.

As we pass stage 4 on Monday, please remember to be considerate to others and respect those that have concerns as we open up. Some will find it difficult to reengage in an open society and we should all try to help them by being sympathetic and giving them the space and time they need. The mantra of Hands Face Space and Fresh Air still holds as a common-sense thing to continue. Please look after you and yours and stay safe.

Built in Doncaster in 1923, to operate high speed passenger services on the east coast main line between London and Edinburgh, the engine quickly became a celebrity. The locomotive broke several records: in 1928 hauling the first regular service to travel non-stop between London and Edinburgh and in 1934 Flying Scotsman became the first locomotive in the world to achieve an authenticated speed of 100mph. Flying Scotsman has visited Australia and the USA and was even the subject of a feature film. Visitors to Locomotion will be able to learn more about the engine with a series of talks from experts including the free presentation 'Flying Scotsman: how good is it?

As well as the chance to see the locomotive, visitors can take part in free, environmentally-themed family learning activities which take place daily throughout the school summer holidays (no booking required).

Visitors can also relive some of the glamour of steam's golden age by ordering afternoon tea from the museum's café.

Flying Scotsman is owned by the National Railway Museum in York and is operated and maintained by Riley & Son (E) Ltd.
