Local Author Visits for Natural Future of DLI Collection to be Discussed

Councillors and stakeholders are to be given the opportunity to contribute to a review of the future of a treasured regimental collection. Durham County Council is holding a meeting next week at which its members and invited interested parties will be given the chance to feed into the review of options for the display and storage of the Durham Light Infantry (DLI) Collection and Archive, and the former museum building and grounds.

The meeting of the council's Corporate Overview and Scrutiny Management Board will be broadcast live on the authority's YouTube channel to provide Covid-safe viewing of the meeting for the public. For social distancing reasons, there will be extremely limited availability for members of the public wishing to attend, with anyone seeking to do so required to register in advance.

The council's Cabinet agreed at a meeting last month that officers undertake a review of all options for the display and storage of the collection and archive, which comprise more than 200,000 historic documents and 15,000 objects, as well as the museum building and grounds.

Cabinet agreed to ask for a report to be prepared and brought back to councillors by September. As part of the review, a special meeting of the board has been organised to give members of the board and invited stakeholders the chance to contribute.

Invites to the meeting on Wednesday 28 July have gone to the following key stakeholders: the DLI Trustees, the Army Museums Ogilby Trust, the Faithful Durhams, the National Lottery Heritage Fund, the National Army Museum, the National Archives, Arts Council England and the Veterans Group.

A presentation will be given to the meeting on the scope of the review. Stakeholders will be also given the chance to present their views, or to put them in writing.

There will be an opportunity for members of the board to comment and to ask questions on all information presented; following which they will identify and agree key issues for inclusion in a report which will go to the council's Cabinet in September for a decision.

The council's Cabinet members are also being invited to the meeting to give them the opportunity to hear the views of board members and stakeholders.

A summary of the key issues identified at the board meeting will also be reported to the September Cabinet meeting to ensure members of that are fully informed in any decision-making.

Cllr Craig Martin, Chair of the Corporate Overview and Scrutiny Management Board, said: "We recognise the importance of the Durham Light Infantry to our county and the great regard in which its history is held. We also fully understand the desire for the DLI Collection and Archive to be as accessible to as many people as possible. We are pleased to be in a position to invite key stakeholders to come along and present their views as part of the review process. They can be assured myself and colleagues on the Corporate Overview and Scrutiny Management Board will be taking on board everything they are saying when considering and formulating our response to Cabinet.'

The meeting takes place in the council chamber at County Hall at 1.30pm. It will be broadcast live at https://www.youtube.com/user/ DurhamCouncil and members of the public who want to watch the meeting are encouraged to do so online.

In order to ensure social distancing within the chamber, spaces for members of the public are very limited and anyone interested in attending in person must register in advance by emailing Democraticservices@durham.gov.uk



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War Memorial Vandalised





On Saturday 17th July the recently installed uplights at the town's War Memorial were smashed and vandalised. The damage has meant that the lights are now turned off until funds are raised to be able complete the repair.

The project was completed in October last year, when local tradesmen donated their time and expertise to illuminate the memorial stones situated outside St. Clare's Church, in time for Remembrance Sunday.

The original concept for the war memorial was pulled together by the late Syd Howarth, through the Rotary Club of Newton Aycliffe, and was first erected for the Annual Remembrance Sunday Parade and Service, which took place on 9th November 2008, which also marked the 60th anniversary of the founding of Newton Aycliffe. The project was completed by electrician, Andy Shields (EJS Electrical) and Landscapers TB Tarn. The electrical components were donated by Gary Monk from UPEX Electrical Distributors.



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Christian Aid Collection

St Mary's / Shafto Ward Update

Dear friends and residents,

Following our success of 2 County Councillors and 6 Town Councillors in May, I am pleased to update you on my progress in St Mary's and Shafto Ward.

We have been working with Independent Councillors to redress the balance of power and create a 3 way democracy.

On my own ward I have had the vandalised and rotten wood at the back of McColls store rebuilt into a solid, waterproof unit, after 5 weeks liaising with their head office. I have had potholes reported to Durham County 'Do it on-line' website. They have been successfully repaired.

I also got deep trench-like lorry damage to Central Avenue grass verge repaired, a broken branch hanging dangerously from a tree on Trevor Green removed. I sent nominations for the Aycliffe best garden competition for houses on Wolsey Close and Langley Road. I also helped an elderly resident get his garden waste removed after a 6 week delay.

I have several times supported the police by reporting off-road illegal motorbikes, when underage riders are going up footpaths in the dark with no helmet, no lights, no number plate and definitely, no tax, MOT, driving

The Council on 16/7/21 made the above Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on the following lengths of road in Newton Aycliffe: Phase 1 - 45m of Shafto Way between its junctions with Central Ave roundabout and Stanfield Way; **Phase 2** – 130m of Burn Ln between its junctions with Central Ave and Burn Ln roundabouts; **Phase 3** – The south eastern segment of Burn Ln roundabout between Burn Ln and Greenwell Rd; **Phase 4** – The western quadrant of Burn Ln roundabout between Greenwell Rd and Burn Ln to enable carriageway resurfacing works to be undertaken. Alt route from: 1. the south eastern side of the closure from Shafto Way southerly and continuing westerly on Greville Way, northerly on St Cuthbert's Way and north easterly on Central Ave to the north western side of the closure, and vice versa; 2. the south eastern side of the closure from Central Ave roundabout south westerly on Central Ave then north westerly and north easterly on Greenwell Rd to the north western side of the closure; and from the north western side of the closure north westerly on Burn Ln then south westerly on Westmorland Way and Silkin Way, easterly on Stephenson Way and north easterly on Central Ave to the south eastern side of the closure; 3. As 2. with an additional route to Burnhill Way roundabout as a turnaround; 4. Traffic will be managed under temporary traffic signals around Burn Ln roundabout. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence from 7pm to 6.30am each night on 24/7/21 and are anticipated to be completed in 11 nights. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly.

Councillor Fleming also kindly reported illegal camping, parties and alcohol in public places on Whitehead Walk. I have reported damaged and corroded walls at Escomb Close to LIVIN twice and, more recently, Windlestone Walk as well as reporting trees blocking out views and sunlight to a resident on Trevor Green.

What I have enjoyed most is getting out and walking my Ward and talking to residents. We have set up cross party for Aycliffe a Covid Recovery Fund of £100,000, which is being gifted to local people to help them recover and rebuild their businesses, lives and social events they have had to miss or postpone.

Liberal Democrats are preparing a Focus Newsletter to notify voters what we have been doing as a team and asking you, the people, how we can help you and get your views on things, such as the incinerator being forced upon us by Durham County planning officers.

The rapid expansion of housing towards Middridge in the North and Chilton in the East is a concern for some due to new building going onto greenbelt areas. I have also written to the Durham Police Crime and Victims Commissioner, to ask for the reinstatement of neighbourhood PACT (Police and Communities Together) meetings.

I asked for the police to stop focusing upon 35mph fines in Aycliffe Village and instead to concentrate on the 80mph races on the dual carriageway past the Gretna pub. I have also asked for new bins on Rufus Green, St Aidans Walk and Escomb Close and outside St. Oswald's Park because the 2 bins just inside the park gates are not

2 bins just inside the park gates are not accessible in the winter after 3pm Let me know if you need to discuss issues on the estate via my email or phone number via the Great Aycliffe Council website. Special thanks to the unsung heroes on my ward, litter picking as volunteers. I thank you all very much.

Durham BRASS Postponed to Next Year

The organisers of a popular annual music festival have taken the decision to postpone this year's event.

Durham BRASS was due to take place across County Durham, with live performances running from Wednesday, 14th July to Sunday, 18th July. However, due to uncertainty regarding national announcements on Covid restrictions and the publication of safety guidance on large scale events, Durham County Council has decided to postpone the event until 2022.

The festival had been planned with Covidsafety measures in mind, with a largely outdoor programme and social distancing arrangements. And, although it had been hoped that national restrictions would have been further eased on 21 June, the council's plans complied with current rules, meaning it had been felt that the festival could still go ahead despite the Government's decision to delay Stage 4 of its roadmap out of lockdown.

The council has been monitoring sector guidance and local conditions closely and, with the current lack of clarity around safety measures at large-scale events, it is no longer felt that it would be possible to host the festival in a safe and enjoyable way on the planned dates.

Cllr Elizabeth Scott, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for economy and partnerships, said: "Keeping people safe has to be our main priority during these challenging times. It is clearly very disappointing that we have had to postpone BRASS but with the ever-changing and unclear situation regarding the virus, national restrictions and additional safety measures at large-scale events, sadly we feel that this is the safest and most sensible decision for all involved.

"It is all the more upsetting that we had worked so hard to ensure the festival would be able to go ahead even if Stage 4 of the roadmap was delayed but, sadly, we no longer feel this is possible.

"We do appreciate that the situation may be very different by the time BRASS was due to take place, but feel it is necessary to make a final decision now so that everyone involved in the festival, from the audience to the bands, has sufficient notice."

The festival was due to include performances by Richard Hawley and the NASUWT Riverside Band, Field Music, The Trevor Horn Band, CBeebies Band Jam star YolanDa Brown and a host of street bands. The council will continue to monitor Government guidance and local circumstances as planning continues for its other festivals and events.

Everyone who has a ticket for a BRASS event will be contacted over the course of the next week.

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


Newton Aycliffe Dad with Brain Cancer Becomes an Ironman

A 34-year-old dad-of-two from Newton Aycliffe has completed the prestigious Ironman UK, just months after finishing treatment for a brain tumour.

Craig Johnston did the famed triathlon event in just over 16 hours. The estimator turned to fitness as a way of coping, following a devastating cancer diagnosis. He is also raising vital funds for the charity Brain Tumour Research.

Craig is married to Jilly and together they have two children, Alistair (10) and Millie (four). Their lives were turned upside-down three years ago, when Craig suffered a seizure in bed one night. He was taken to A&E, where an MRI scan revealed a brain tumour. Ten days later, he had a craniotomy at James Cook University Hospital



in Middlesbrough, to debulk the tumour.

The results from the biopsy revealed the tumour was a highgrade astrocytoma, meaning he would need a gruelling course of radiotherapy and chemotherapy. In January 2020, Craig started to focus on healthy eating and fitness, setting himself the ambitious goal of making it to the start line of Ironman UK in Bolton, Greater Manchester on 4 July 2021. But his ability to get there was in jeopardy, when he received the news that his tumour had re-grown and he would need more surgery and cancer treatment.

In February 2020, Craig restarted chemotherapy while continuing to train for the Ironman. He said: "The chemo made me sicker the second time but I still managed to get out



running and cycling quite a bit. After I finished chemo, I had a couple of seizures while out training, which were scary and resulted in a knock to my confidence."

The Bolton Ironman is a notoriously hard triathlon, covering 140.6 miles. Starting at 6am on 4 July, Craig completed a 2.4-mile swim before cycling 110 hilly miles, finishing off with a 26.2-mile run. Craig, who had to learn to swim in order to qualify for the event, said: "The support on the day was fantastic and really helped to push me to the finish line. Even though I underestimated the enormity of the challenge, I'm proud to have done it and know how to tweak things next time, in order to achieve a better time." Not one to rest for long, Craig has already resumed training in preparation for his next challenge, the Outlaw Half Nottingham Triathlon in September. He has also raised an incredible £1,925 for Brain Tumour Research. He's hoping to push that total over the £2,740 mark – the equivalent amount it costs to fund a day of research at each of the charity's Centres of Excellence. What an Experience!

With the new opening of our Gin Experience – where members of the public can now make their own gin, here at The Herbal Gin Company, the team has been doing more research on the botanicals that we have available for making some fantastic gins.

We also want to share a few interesting facts about some of the botanicals that are household names.

Fact 1 - Gin and New York...?

Readers of an earlier blog on our website will remember about the fenugreek smell that shut down New York not too long ago (twice)... However, this isn't our only story about New York, so let's move from fenugreek to nutmeg.....

It tuns out that 600 years ago, nutmeg was more precious than gold. Pound for pound it cost more, as it could only be found in the Moluccas archipelago of Indonesia. There was massive demand for this rare spice in Europe and competition raged to control its distribution. Inevitably this less to (sadly usually violent) colonisation of the area. Evidence is available to show that nutmeg was a vital constituent in the making of juniper rich spirit - i.e. gin. Portugal were the first colonisers off the Moluccas and then it was

Portugal were the first colonisers off the Moluccas and then it was the Dutch and then the English, after it seized two of the islands in question in 1603. [For any fellow Scots out there, please be aware that the Acts of Union led to the creation of the United Kingdom in 1707 so England is the correct description here.]

The Dutch were pretty upset about the loss of such an important territory which meant they could not get their nutmeg fix for, amongst other things, their Genever or gin. So much so, that they decided to trade it for another territory (think Monopoly), that they valued less, in order to regain world nutmeg domination.

Turns out, the other territory that they traded for the Moluccas was a small place called New Amsterdam. Nowadays known as New York.1 How things change...!

Fact 2 - Real or synthetic

Vanilla was first used well before nutmeg, in fact 1000 years ago, by the Toronac people in Mexico. They were pretty switched on by using vanilla in conjunction with cacao to make a flavoursome drink (still going strong!). The Aztecs took them over, and it doesn't come as a surprise to then work out that Spain took vanilla back to their homeland after their brutal and devastating takeover of the Aztec people. (However let's not assume too readily that, previously, the Aztecs were too polite and kind to the Toronacs!)

The flavour success was short lived. Mexico kept the vanilla monopoly as it turned out that the vanilla pods would only pollinate by native Mexican bees. A while later a Belgian botanist worked out how to hand pollinate vanilla flowers (!) and less than 50 years later the Germans (who else) created a vanilla synthetic flavour that now flavours 97% of our 'vanilla' flavoured foods.

One of the best ways to create a vanilla-like flavour is to use Tonka beans in the recipe - rich and flavoursome, giving tones of vanilla and more.

Fact 3 - Numbness of the tongue

Fact three involves joint contributions by nutmeg (again), Grains of Selim and Galangal which all cause mild, but noticeable, tongue numbness. Galangal already features in some of our Herbal Gin recipes but Grains of Selim (more in blog posts to come) have yet to feature and nutmeg has started to appear in some of our 'Experience' trials.

This fact came to light after we started to taste all the botanicals as individual items. (It's a tough job!) During this, we noticed that Grains of Selim especially caused a strange feeling of tongue numbness. Turns out this is an effect of chemicals called neolignans which have recently been discovered in Nutmeg oil, Galangal and are manifest to our taste buds when we chew Grains of Selim. These chemicals act on the temperature sensing nerves on the tongue to give a numbing sense of coolness that strangely persists.

It's such an unusual experience but it's fascinating to get to know the reasons for such unusual effects.

Hopefully this gives a further set of insights into taste, flavour and how our Gin Experience will allow you to create a gin that will be unique and priceless. Cheers

Aycliffe Athletics Club Round Up



It was fabulous to see the announcements from the Department for Education about the latest schools to benefit from the second round of the Prime Minister's transformative school rebuilding programme. This latest announcement of the next 50 schools to benefit includes two in Newton Aycliffe, with both Sugar Hill and Woodham Academy benefiting.

This week is the last before Westminster goes into recess for the summer, this will give more opportunity for me in the constituency but will mean that there is less to say about things that are happening in Parliament. So, what I intend to do over the forthcoming weeks is to tell you a little more about the structure of Parliament and how it works, so if you have any particular questions you would like me to address just let me know.

First, let me update you on last week. I went to the virtual meeting of the APPG for weddings where we met with the Rt Hon Penny Mordaunt who is the Paymaster General and Paul Scully, the Minister for Small Business, to discuss the ongoing challenges for all of those in the wedding industry. I then went to the virtual joint meeting of the APPG for the Armed Forces Covenant and APPG for Veterans to hear Minister Leo Docherty talk to us. I also took the opportunity to call and introduce myself to the members of Middleton St George Parish Council before their meeting. I was a little early so also said hello to the Zumba class and was very nearly a participant, maybe another time!

Tuesday saw me at The Great Yorkshire Show to meet with the NFU. I have many, many farms in the constituency each with a variety of different challenges and it was a great opportunity to have time for them and their NFU representatives. There are so many changes going on that affect them through the Agriculture Bill and it is important I can give their regional perspective. I caught up with the team who are working on the feasibility study for the reinstatement of a railway station at Ferryhill and was very encouraged by how the data is looking. This could be a game changer for Ferryhill and put another station in reach of people in Aycliffe.

I attended a briefing on the East Coast Cluster which is about the decarbonisation initiatives on Teesside and the Humber, there are many jobs and economic opportunities that will flow from these green projects as we work to reduce our carbon footprint.

I had a virtual tearoom surgery with Kit Malthouse the Minister for Policing where I raised a number of points around ASB and the need to improve the 101 phoneline. He had some good responses that I will raise with the PCC at my next meeting with her. I was scheduled to visit Sedgefield Primary School, but this had to be cancelled due to a pupil testing positive, but I was able to visit Ferryhill Community and Business College. Like so many schools they are ready for the respite that the school holidays will bring after an incredibly busy time for all our school staff. The work they have all done through the pandemic has been amazing and I hope they can get some relief before September. However, they are also delivering some summer schools to help transitioning pupils so I continue to applaud their efforts and look forward to visiting again in the new school year.

Another focus for me remains the potential for using the Governments Levelling Up Fund to reimagine Newton Aycliffe Town Centre. The Durham County Council team that are working on the project gave me an update on progress and I was pleased to see some good potential opportunities, I have fed into them the information from our recent survey. It was also good to see that Great Aycliffe Town Council have created a working group focused on this same agenda. It's imperative that we all work together to get the best from this opportunity. Talking about the Town Centre it was great to see so many community organisations represented last Saturday, it was a credit to all who organised or participated. We have a great town with so many fabulous community groups. This Saturday it's a Blue Light event with all the emergency services there, please come along and join them and take the time to spend with our hard-pressed retailers who have had an incredibly difficult year. After this week's surgery in Hurworth, next will be Ferryhill and then one in Woodham Community Centre, appointments are available at the surgeries or at the constituency office and if you would like one just send an email to my office. We, of course, have now seen the release of a lot of the mandatory restrictions re everything from mask wearing to the number of people gathering together and the way pubs and restaurants operate. Please remember it's incumbent on all of us to use common sense and the mantra of Hands, Face, Space and Fresh Air remains as relevant as ever. The difference now is it's

Face, Space and Fresh Air remains as relevant as ever. The difference now is it's about us deciding when it's necessary as opposed to being told. An example for me would be I am likely to continue wearing a mask in a busy train, but I have the choice not to if the carriage is not full. Please stay safe and be considerate to others.

Aycliffe Cricket Club Scoreboard Report

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The Second team travelled to table toppers Richmond 4th XI in the NYSD 4th division and were defeated by 72 runs. Keeping Healthcare Services Safe

Healthcare leaders across County Durham and Darlington are uniting to call on local communities to help keep patients and healthcare services safe as nationally Coronvirus restrictions are lifted in many social settings.

The legal constraints on mask wearing and social distancing in England have been removed from this week in many social settings however, this does not apply across healthcare settings.

Healthcare professionals are urging members of the public to continue wearing masks, to adhere to social distancing and to continue practicing good hand hygiene when in hospital, a GP practice or any healthcare setting to help protect patients and vital healthcare workers.

Executive director of nursing at County Durham and Darlington NHS Foundation Trust, Noel Scanlon, explains why this is essential to keep patients safe. "It's just under 500 days since the first national restrictions were put in place and we're all desperate for society to return to how it was before Covid. Unfortunately, infection rates

continue to rise, with the latest statistics showing that both County Durham and Darlington have well over double the national average number of people with Covid-19, many of whom may not realise they're infected. The Delta variant of Covid, which is currently dominant in the UK, is more highly transmissible than any of the other variants, meaning that an infected person is likely to pass it in to many more people. 'So we need to do all we can to continue to protect our patients and our people by keeping these infection control and prevention measures in place and continuing with other restrictions such as limited visiting. This includes asking patients to attend appointments unaccompanied, other than in exceptional circumstances and with the consent of the medical team. If you bring someone to hospital, you are welcome to wait in the car park - please don't wait in corridors - you're putting yourself and others at risk.

"Covid is transmitted when we breathe out which is why we require anyone coming into our hospitals, including staff, to wear a hospital supplied face mask, which are available at the sanitiser stations at hospital entrances - other face coverings aren't acceptable. Our patients are, by the very fact they're unwell and in hospital, weaker and more vulnerable to Covid - which is why we continue to require masks. Wearing a mask protects others rather than ourselves and are a requirement for coming into our hospitals. "We understand that some people struggle to wear a mask but we ask that they make every effort to tolerate doing so for the short time they're with us for an appointment. "While the vast majority of our patients are incredibly supportive and understanding, sadly, when trying to enforce mask wearing and visitor restrictions, some of our staff are being verbally abused, shouted at, even reduced to tears and fearful for their safety. This won't be tolerated."

Dr Stewart Findlay, GP and Chief Officer for NHS County Durham CCG, said: "The continued high community rates across County Durham are something we all must take very seriously and we can all do our bit to help protect each other, our loved ones and those most vulnerable. We are still all in this together - we are asking our local populations to continue with all these important measures which will help reduce the risk of infection when in hospitals or GP practices and help protect those needing our help as well as our own staff. We ask you to respect our healthcare staff and comply with the safety requirements in hospitals and healthcare settings. Doing all you can to avoid either getting Covid or spreading it really is the best thing you can do to help ensure our services can continue caring for those most in need - after all, we never know when that might be us."
