Students Train in First Aid & CPR

On Woodham Academy's second Specialist Day, students took part in a range of different activities and studies that cover Citizenship, RSE and Careers. As part of this, the Year 10 students had a session that covered first aid and CPR.

During the session, students learned about how to keep themselves safe in an Emergency. Groups discussed the risks that are in the local area and what to do if they come across someone that needs help. As well as learning the different steps to follow in the situations, the process of calling an ambulance and identifying the locations of Defibrillators in the local area, students also took part in practical scenarios.

During the practical elements, students were role playing scenarios of finding a casualty. They assessed the surrounding area to ensure it was safe before checking for a response of the casualty. The first scenario was an unconscious, breathing casualty. Students were taught how to put someone into the recovery position to keep them safe whilst waiting for an ambulance. After being shown the process, students practiced on each other until they were confident with the process

During the second part of the practical, the students used resuscitation dolls from the British Heart Foundation. This is where students focused on CPR. All students were taught how to do CPR, why it is important and what a defibrillator looks like and how to use it. During the session, the students all demonstrated CPR along to 'Stayin' Alive' by the Bee Gees so they mastered the perfect rhythm.

To round off the session, the students spoke about different scenarios and what their actions would be. All the students in the day left feeling more confident to act if they found themselves in an emergency. Well done to all Year 10 students that were involved throughout the day!

On completing the challenge Tracey, who took part in the challenge with her husband, said: "I thought I would be really emotional crossing the line, but I was smiling from ear to ear. I was buzzing the whole way down the final stretch, the noise from the crowd was incredible.'

The Austrian Ironman course is a true demonstration of sporting prowess, with

participants first completing a 3.8 km lake swim, followed by a 180.2 km bike ride and finally a 42.2 km run, all to be completed in under 17 hours!

Tracey trained morning and night 6 days a week, starting back in December 2019, right up until the competition in September. Tracey managed to smash the competition target of 17 hours, going through the finish line at 15hrs 19mins.

The challenge marked the culmination of Tracey's fundraising efforts for The Alice House Hospice, the only adult hospice in the Hartlepool and East Durham areas. Alice House Hospice works to ensure that people affected by a life limiting illness or death of a loved one receive the care, comfort and support they need. Tracey said: "I've seen the work that the Alice House Hospice do first-hand, and it's incredible, I just wanted to give something back to them when they give so much to others."

Closed Bridge Update from County Council

Dear Sir.

I am writing in response to the letter in last week's Newton News headlined 'Closed Bridge', to provide an update on the footbridge near Brockett Close.

First and foremost we would like to assure the writer of the letter that the safety of all pedestrians is of paramount importance to us. We inspected the footbridge in April and noted that three deck planks at the northern end were loose due to rot in the underlying main timber deck beams.

The damage was minor and an instruction was issued for the rotten wood to be removed and new timber introduced to allow the decking to be secured.

At that time the bridge was temporarily closed while further checks were made.

The bridge was then opened and has been available for use until recently.

We recently closed the bridge again to allow removal of the decking to patch the main beams.

Unfortunately, when the decking was removed it was found that the rot was more extensive than initially thought and the work was stopped to allow more extensive repairs to be programmed. This work has now been ordered and design and procurement has commenced.

It is anticipated that the work will be complete by the end of this year.

We appreciate that this may not be as soon as the writer of last week's letter would like but complex work like this does take time. The writer can rest assured we will do everything we can to complete the work as soon as we can.

Pupils Showing Racism NAFC Junior Section the Red Card

Year 5 pupils at Sugar Hill Primary are currently working on a project to understand prejudice and create a campaign against it. Within class lessons, across different curriculum subjects, they have been introduced to the idea of stereotypes and how these can lead to prejudice. As part of their learning, they have been looking at different ways/reasons that people could be prejudiced against (e.g. religion, ability, age and race).

They have looked at different cultures and how the differences in appearance can lead to prejudice. As they have been learning about this, they have made links with current news issues around racism and particularly in football. The children have been introduced to the 'Show Racism the Red Card' to understand more about the issues as well as illustrating how a campaign works.

On Friday 22nd October, Year 5 children were allowed to come into school wearing red or football tops and stood up in assembly to explain how supporting the campaign linked to their learning. The project will end with the children presenting their own campaign in school during the project showcase week, at the start of December. The children and staff are really looking forward to sharing their work with the whole school, their families and governors. School leaders and staff recognise that learning about prejudice is crucial to educating children for life and the children are making links with what they already know and how they can make a difference in ensuring they embrace all differences and recognise that there is no place for racism and prejudice in school, the local community and the wider world.

A life lesson for us all and one never too young to learn.

Reminder for **Parents to Apply** for Secondary **School Places**

Parents in County Durham are being reminded that the closing date to apply for secondary school places for their children is fast approaching.

The deadline for applications for the next academic year, which starts in September 2022, is Sunday 31st October 2021. In order for a child to be eligible to start secondary school in September 2022, the child's date of birth must fall between 1st September 2010 and 31st August 2011. Cllr Ted Henderson, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for children and young people's services, said: "For parents, the decision of where to send their child is, understandably, a big one. We would urge parents to make sure they apply by the deadline as a late application greatly reduces chances of getting into a preferred school." Applications can be made online at www. durham.gov.uk/schooladmissions or by post. If posting, the forms should be sent back using signed for or special delivery services. Application forms can also be requested by phoning 03000 265896 or by writing to the school places and admissions team at Green Lane, Spennymoor, County Durham DL16 6JQ.

Offers of places will be made to parents on 1 March 2022

For applications completed online, offers will be received by email. For applications sent by post, offers will be received by letter. These should arrive by no later than 3rd March 2022.

Rotary President Visits Five Acres Community Gardens

Recently, President Gary Blenkinsopp of Rotary Newton Aycliffe visited Five Acres which is a day centre like no other for young adults based in the ROF59 building on Aycliffe Business Park. Their space within ROF59 is owned by John Finley of Finley Structures and they are forever grateful to John who gave them their first 3 months rent free. The purpose of Gary's visit was to hand over a cheque from Rotary, to hear about their plans for the donation and learn more about the work they do. The centre is the brainchild of Debbie and Gavin Iceton with the idea being formed a few years ago after Debbie had a conversation with a friend. She realised that a day facility for young adults with learning difficulties did not exist locally. It is now well established and ably managed by Donna Martin with Charlotte Iceton as Assistant Manager.

The centre is open weekdays 9.15am until 3.15pm and caters for young people of age 17+ who, because of their complicated disabilities, may not be able to find employment yet channelling their energies and talent is essential for their well-being and that of their families and also gives them an outlet in their lives. The centre has a huge space for all sorts of noisy and physical activities and a beautiful sensory room for quiet and relaxing times. There is also a craft room equipped with the essentials for creating, learning and preparing young people with life skills. Many thanks to Sara Davies of Crafters' Companion who donated most of the craft stock when her Aycliffe store closed. The donation from Rotary will be used to buy iPads for the teaching of basic technology, something not necessarily offered in other learning facilities for young people with complicated needs. They are also taught gardening, animal care, basic cookery, and other skills to help prepare them for adult life.

Future plans include the development of a parcel of land in Brafferton owned by Debbie and Gavin (Five Acres) with planning permission underway to site woodland lodges. Huge thanks to Husqvarna who have donated equipment for use on the





land and to J & C Coaches who donated a coach to enable trips away. The area will be used to provide accommodation for those young people whose parents/families are in need of some respite care and, when operational, will be fully staffed with qualified personnel in residence. Fencing is needed for the perimeter of the site, primarily for the security of residents, so they are appealing to any companies who feel they want to raise their product profile by donating to this very ambitious, innovative and so worthwhile project. 


Halloween Allotment Visit Ward Update

As I said last week, I am spending quite a lot of time on the Nationality and Borders Bill. The purpose of the Bill is to increase fairness of the system, support and protect those who need entry, deter illegal entry and to remove more easily those with no rights to be in the UK. I am currently doing two days a week on this Bill and, on each day, we have both a morning and an afternoon sitting. This squeezes my time but there are still many other interactions I can do, this included catching up with Paul Butler, Bishop of Durham, primarily to talk about the aftermath of the murder of Sir David but we did, of course, have broader discussions than that.

I took the opportunity to attend a reception hosted by my colleague, the MP for Ashfield and Eastwood, Lee Anderson, with the Coal Authority to discuss Clean Energy from Coalfields, this primarily looks at extracting heat from the water in old mine workings. This is something I had already been engaged with as a Durham County Councillor and I've met a number of people from Durham and the surrounding area. It was good to see some of the work in Durham being used as leading examples of the opportunities we have. I also had a session with Lord Baker, who was one of the primary advocates of the introduction of University Technical Colleges. We discussed the development opportunities in the north east and elsewhere but also the development of issues like T levels and BTECs. It was very valuable listening to Lord Baker and others in the forum who have spent much more time than me contemplating the pros and cons of different educational structures. As you know I am a member of the Northern Research group which is focused on making sure that the Government gives full consideration to the north of England in all it does. We have had many meetings with different ministers and this week we were able to talk with Michael Gove and share our views on the Levelling Up agenda he leads. I also went to London County Hall to represent the APPG in a joint forum with the CPP, Centre for Progressive Policy, to discuss the importance of investing in social infrastructure and why this is critical in levelling up

Friday last week was a sitting Friday when Private members Bills are debated. This week was all about a 'Fire and Rehire' Bill. This is such a critical area, and we need to make sure that the environment changes to make certain that businesses are not using the process of firing and rehiring in its worse form, as a threat to employees in any negotiations and I look forward to seeing how the Government take this forward. On Saturday it was an absolute privilege to join several local Councillors and others at ROF59 for the unveiling of a Blue Plaque to celebrate the work and commitments of the Aycliffe Angels during the war. The plaque was unveiled by Muriel Scott, an inspiring 100-yearold lady who was an Aycliffe Angel in her 20s. It was attached to the outside of ROF 59 which of course was part of the armaments buildings where the Aycliffe Angels worked. The restoration of this facility in recent years by John Finley and his team has given the building a whole new future and it was good to see that the facilities in ROF59 including the trampolines, are now fully open again after a very difficult time through Covid.

This week was budget week, and I am writing this on the Tuesday before the budget is delivered but I thought it would be good to let you know where my lobbying efforts have been. I, of course, wanted to see the Chancellor putting efforts into levelling up and looking after the north, but when it comes to taxes, I would particularly like to see him continue to freeze fuel duty and introduce a differentiation on beer duty so that the keg beer in our pubs is charged less than the canned and bottled beer available from supermarkets.

Clearly Covid continues to be a concern, we must all be aware of the risks if it re-emerges, and we need to be vigilant going forward. We are seeing increasing cases and the importance of the vaccines also increases so please can I encourage you all to take up the option of booster jabs as and when they are offered to you. If you are over 50, and it's been 6 months since your second, it will be time for your booster jab.

garages being deliberately withheld from residents who had applied to rent them". My initial contact received a prompt reply explaining they weren't the person responsible for dealing with this matter; however, they had forwarded my email to the relevant officer for their attention.

At the time of this editorial I am still awaiting a reply from the officer concerned, this is in spite of two follow up emails and a request to a county councillor to follow it up to see if they could shed some light on the situation. They did and were able to inform me my enquiry had been forwarded to the appropriate department as there were set procedures to be followed.

The guestion has still to be answered. Why are garages standing empty when residents want to rent them, and why some garages, in a shocking state of disrepair, have been allowed to become little more than a vermin infested dumping ground. There may be genuine reasons for this current state of affairs or there may be a long term development strategy for the garages, but silence simply creates an atmosphere of uncertainty and confusion and people form their own conclusions which do nothing to help the situation.

There are already serious congestion issues in the town, with the limited parking available, so the withholding of garages, for whatever reason, is going to have a knock on effect. If there are answers to these questions then we need to hear them, if not we need to see damaged garages repaired and maintained, and, where possible, empty garages let to the residents who are waiting to rent them, sooner rather than later. With the change of seasons, comes a change in what we eat. Gone are the classic summer strawberries and the light salads that go down so well on balmy evenings and in come the warming hot-pots and bowls of soup.
