# **Blue Plaques Honour Remarkable Residents**

Inspirational women whose bravery, intellect and compassion have made a positive difference in their communities and overseas have been recognised.

Over the last few months, Durham
County Council has installed blue plaques commemorating individuals and groups in towns and villages across County Durham. The latest to be honoured were put forward by County Durham's Women's Banner Group (WBG) – an organisation that was founded in 2017 to celebrate the achievements of the working-class women of the Durham coalfields. Since then, WBG has broadened its activities and now campaigns on topics including equal rights, universal credit, pensions and anti-racism.

Ensuring women's past achievements are recognised is also a key focus and, in 2019, WBG held a hustings event to seek suggestions for inspirational women to nominate for a blue plaque. The nominees included: First World War nurse Kate Maxey, who was put forward by Lynn Gibson; the Aycliffe Angels, who were suggested by Tim Dredge; and Lady Bella Lawson and her husband, Jack, who were nominated by Dorothy Rand.

The plaques have now been unveiled, much to the delight of WBG and local people. Born in Clyde Terrace in Spennymoor in 1876, Kate Maxey became one of the most highly decorated nurses of the First World War, receiving the Royal Red 1st Class, the Military Medal and the Florence Nightingale Medal in acknowledgement of her distinguished service.

The Aycliffe Angels were a group of courageous women who worked at a former Second World War munitions factory in Newton Aycliffe, now called ROF59. These

hard-working co-workers filled shells and bullets and assembled detonators and fuses as part of the war effort. The work was very dangerous, and many workers were killed or injured during the manufacturing process. But, due to the secrecy surrounding the factory, many of these incidents were not recorded and the women's efforts also went unrecognised.

Lady Bella Jackson was a suffragist, Labour activist, community volunteer and pioneer of child welfare clinics. She was also a parish councillor, school manager and a supporter of many charities. Bella was honoured along with her husband Baron Jack Lawson, with the plaque installed on their former home in Woodside, Beamish. Jack was a miner, trade unionist, Lord Lieutenant, county councillor, MP and preacher.

Another County Durham woman, Janet Taylor, was honoured with a blue plaque at the Masonic Hall in Wolsingham. Nominated by Wolsingham Women's Institute, Janet was born in the town in 1804 and was educated in languages, mathematics, science, astronomy and navigation by her schoolmaster father. She went on to set up a nautical academy and specialised in the design, production and repair of navigational

Others to be recognised since the scheme started include the 'Fighting Bradfords' - four brothers from Witton Park who served their country with valour in conflicts including the First World War; Thomas Wright, a renowned astronomer, mathematician, instrument maker, garden designer and architect, from Byers Green; and Spennymoor Settlement, which was set up in 1931 to enhance the lives of residents through education and the arts.



Lynn Gibson, from the Women's Banner Group, said: "It is incredibly important that women are recognised for their achievements and we are delighted to see these plaques installed at a number of locations across County Durham.

"Women are so often written out of history which is why this scheme is so important. It's giving members of the public the opportunity to nominate women deserving of a blue plaque which will, in turn, get more people talking about these amazing women once

The Blue Plagues Appraisal Panel meets twice a year, in January and June, to consider new nominations. To make a nomination, contact blueplaques@durham. gov.uk to request a form.

Durham County Council, with support from principal partner Durham University, submitted the initial bid for UK City of Culture on behalf of Culture Durham, a partnership of arts and culture organisations from across the county.



# **Heighington Matters**

#### **Redworth Village Speed Limit**

For some time residents living in Redworth have expressed their concerns over the 40mph speed limit through the village. Many years ago I managed to have the speed limit reduced to the 40mph but since then because of increased volumes of traffic and their speeds residents are concerned for their safety. So I have had discussions with DBC and they are minded to reduce the speed limit despite their opposition over the years. However, the Police will not support the speed limit reduction so I have written to the Police & Crime Commissioner to seek a meeting with her, hopefully to gain her support.

Students from School Aycliffe's bus access into Heighington For some time I have been trying to find out out how many people need to travel from School Aycliffe into Heighington to catch the 0800hr bus into Darlington for school or work. Currently anyone wanting to do so have to walk the 1 mile+ leaving home around 7.15am and parents in particular are concerned over the safety issues involved. To date I have received 13 responses which given that there are over 600 houses in School Aycliffe gives me very little for me to work with as there is not sufficient numbers to encourage a bus company to lay on a bus for such small numbers so it is remains a difficult problem to solve - but I will continue to try to do so.

#### School costs into Hummersknott

In 2011 free transport costs into Hummersknott was stopped and parents had to contribute towards them. Following many meetings with the Head teachers of Carmel and Hummersknott who were sympathetic to the parents concerns, the Schools Forum agreed to subsidise the transport costs which kept the cost of travel to  $\mathfrak L2$  per day. Since then costs have risen to  $\mathfrak L4$  per day per student which is of concern to lots of parents. After talking to the Council I have invited them to meet with parents to discuss their issues. I am awaiting their response

#### SAFETY - Kieran Maxwell Estate - Station Road.

I have received emails from some residents who are concerned about young people cycling or running through the barriers and hedges onto Station Road from Keiran Maxwell housing estate. By its very nature few vehicles need to use the road which in some ways adds to the danger but even so three near misses have been witnessed where children have been fortunate not to have ended up under a car wheel.

So in the first instance could parents living in the estate talk to their little ones to encourage them to stop riding, running and walking onto Station Road where vehicles and large lorries drive to access the houses and the Garden nursery at the end of the lane. I have contacted Esh for their comments and they have confirmed that everything they have done confirms to British Standards and there is nothing more they can do so parents it is back to you - talk to your children.

#### **Church and Village Public Toilets**

Disturbing reports are coming my way of young people climbing on the roof of the village toilets, hammering on the door of the church and urinating in the church yard. So once again I appeal to all parents to speak to your children about the importance of respecting everything and everyone in the village as their behaviour is unacceptable. I will be asking the Parish Council to paint the roof of the toilets which should discourage anyone climbing on it - for their own safety as well as protecting the roof surface from vandalism.

Parking Bays in Hopelands

It is some time since I dropped a letter through the letterbox of all Hopelands residents asking for their preference on where new Parking Bays should be constructed so it is understandable people are asking me when will the parking bays be installed. The answer is still to be confirmed. The Parish Council are investigating an alternative position for the Parking Bays which involves having the telegraph pole re-positioned. The Parish Council are awaiting a response to determine the costs of having the pole re-positioned involved before making a decision.

And finally Heighington W.I.

A big thank you to Heighington Women's Institute for creating the two enormous 'carpets' of red poppies which they have adorned St Michael's Church Tower stretching from the very top of the tower down to the ground. Made up from over 17,600 individual poppies the finished effect seen against the ancient stone of St Michael's is highly impressive - if you have not seen it I would recommend you doing so - and having a wee dram refreshments in one of our two public establishments.



# **Searching for More Foster Carers in County Durham**

More people are being urged to consider becoming foster carers to help make a difference to the lives of children across County Durham.

Durham County Council has launched an appeal to recruit more carers for children with additional needs and disabilities.

This could involve caring for a child with a hidden need such as a learning disability, or a physical disability which might limit a child's mobility or sensory development.

Some children needing foster carers across the county also have greater medical needs than others, including epilepsy or diabetes. The council currently has over 250 families caring for children and young people, with carers able to continue supporting young people into adulthood.

Ann has been a foster carer with the authority for more than 20 years. She has fostered several children, including one young person with complex disabilities for most of that time.

Ann said: "Every day is challenging but rewarding. For everything I give, I get back double and I am passionate about what I do. It was my life's ambition to give a child a home and it is true that the more you put into being a carer, the more rewarding it is.
"I have a great local network of support here and my council fostering

social workers have always been fantastic.


"My advice to anyone thinking about fostering a child is to go for it but to do so with an open mind as every day is different. Also, don't be scared to ask for help or support as it is always there for you." Carers are given access to a network of professionals as part of their support package, including their own fostering social worker, specialist nurses and therapeutic social workers. The council also provides access to an educational team who can provide advice and guidance when needed. They are paid competitive fostering allowances and fees, with

Christmas and summer top-ups and extra tax relief, which do not

Additional financial support, specialist equipment and other help specific to the individual child may also be available, depending on the needs of the child.



Cllr Ted Henderson, Durham County Council's Cabinet member for children and young people's services, said: "We need more foster carers to care for children of all ages across the county, including a number of children with physical and other disabilities. Although taking care of a child with disabilities might seem quite daunting, it will also be one of the most rewarding things you will ever do. "Furthermore, we can reassure people that they will feel supported throughout the whole process. Our fostering team is always on hand to provide advice and help to carers whenever they need it. "In providing a safe and stable home to a child with a disability, you will be giving them the opportunity to achieve their full potential and you will see them flourish. Whether you are single, married or in a relationship, I would urge anyone wanting to know more about fostering to take that first step on their journey and contact our team." # RUNNING CLUB NEWS

Richard came home in second place, in a time of 4:53:36. There were no parkrun Personal Bests to report this week, however one Member celebrated a huge parkrun milestone. Running at Sedgefield on Saturday morning, Mandy Heywood completed her 250th parkrun, a fantastic achievement! The Club was also represented at parkruns at Chopwell Wood, Darlington South Park, Hackworth, Jubilee, Riverside and the Town Moor.

Saturday afternoon saw the latest fixture in the North-Eastern Harrier XC League (NEHL), with a quartet from the Male Section taking on the mixed terrain course at Lambton. First home for the Club was John Firby, crossing the line in 47.11 (a net time of 44:34 after starting from the Mid-Pack). Dez Fielden was not far behind in a time of 47:50, with a net time of 45:13.

I finished last week talking about the imminent budget that the chancellor was to deliver. I was pleased to see his proposed changes to beer duty and the continued commitment to investment in infrastructure. A particular piece of good news, in virtually his last statement, was the changes to the rate of taper for those on Universal Credit. This affects the amount of reduction in benefits when somebody works more hours and means they will keep more of any extra income they earn, for many this will make a significant difference.

As regards my week in parliament, I was in the Chamber of the House of Commons to listen to the chancellor and his budget speech and then later the same day the chancellor came and spoke to backbench Conservative MPs at the 1922 committee. Following the chancellor's statement there is a three-day debate in the house on the statement. The first of these was last Thursday when the primary focus was about the impact on businesses. I was able to speak in this debate and reflect on the impact for people in the Sedgefield constituency. Having spoken on Thursday, I am not allowed to give a speech on Monday or Tuesday as the debate continues, however, I can intervene on other speakers if I wish to seek clarity or challenge what they have said.


I was also in the chamber on Thursday for what is known as the adjournment debate. This is a short debate where a member can raise something of particular importance to them. On Thursday, the member speaking was Matt Vickers, the MP for Stockton South, and he was raising hospital provision in North Tees, as this affects my constituents, particularly those who live in the village of Sedgefield, I joined Matt in the chamber.

When it comes to infrastructure one of the notable commitments to be confirmed, shortly after the chancellor's statement, was a feasibility study into improvements in the railway line that goes from Darlington to Weardale. This stretch of line passes through both Heighington and Newton Aycliffe stations. My hope is that the changes to the line can also incorporate some redevelopment of the Locomotion pub at Heighington Station which, as we all know, is in a depressing state of disrepair. My colleague Richard Holden secured an adjournment debate on this on Monday. I mentioned the progress of the existing feasibility study for Ferryhill railway station and the parallels between the necessity of the existing bid for Ferryhill and the new bid for Weardale. They would both connect communities, ensuring that people can reach the centres of employment and that those centres can reach back into the countryside and leisure activities that go with that. I touched briefly on Ferryhill again and the connection to Newton Aycliffe, which had the munitions factory. Munitions in the war drove Ferryhill station, which was at that time the busiest station in Europe - bizarre, but it was. I would like to see that reconnection to history and the reconnection of our communities.

I was planning to speak in a Westminster Hall debate on 4 November about public access to AEDs (Automated External Defibrillators) which I know David Sutton Lloyd, councillor for Aycliffe North and Middridge, has done so much work on, but my co-sponsor, Jim Shannon of the DUP, has tested positive so this debate has now been rescheduled to the 18th of November. For the first two weeks of November the UK political attention is less on Westminster and more on Glasgow, as we are hosting COP26. COP stands for Conference of Parties and 26 is because it is the 26th meeting. The parties are the signatories of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change, a treaty agreed in 1994 and has 197 parties, made up of 196 countries plus the EU. The big hope is to try to move forward the delivery of the Paris agreement signed in 2015 which rallied governments, businesses and organisations around a common goal - to limit global temperature increases to well below 2 degrees, with a view to 1.5 degrees. Although the agreement was signed in 2015, it is not finished, that is what the negotiations are for, closing off the outstanding elements of the Paris agreement to send an even stronger signal that the world is united and committed to reaching the 2 degrees, with a view to the 1.5 degrees, target. You can imagine, getting 197 different parties to sign off on the same agreement will be no mean feat, so I wish them all the luck in the world. As I'm sure you're aware we continue to see Covid cases at higher levels than we would like. However, the good news is that the severity of any impact is significantly lower than it was in the past. This is due to both the success of the vaccine and also the way our NHS has been able to improve treatments for those who are more badly affected. It goes without saying that the best way to keep the severity low, is for us all to have either our first jab, second jab or booster jab whatever stage you are at, but please engage with the programme and help all of us to have as healthy a winter as we can. Stay safe

# Victory for Coates in Mini Season Finale

The MINI Challenge UK season came to a thrilling end last weekend at the iconic Brands Hatch GP circuit in Kent and it was Max Coates who took the win in an actionpacked season finale.

On the back of a pole position at Donington Park last time out, Coates looked strong all the way through qualifying. He ended the session 2nd which also gave the Yorkshireman the second highest qualifying average of the season.

As the first race got underway Coates made the best start and initially led on the way into the Druids Hairpin. The three drivers behind all entered too quickly and Coates had to take avoiding action by moving onto grass. He dropped to 11th place but made short work of getting back into the top ten. He was then in a race long battle for 6th place and a last lap move round the outside netted him 7th at the flag.

Over the first two laps of race two he gained two places putting him into 5th place and another race long battle, this time with champion elect, Dan Zelos. Whilst Coates was quicker on the GP part of the Brands Hatch circuit, he couldn't get close enough to mount a serious challenge.

The final race was set to be a real thriller, thanks in part to its reverse grid nature which placed Coates 3rd on the grid. Coates again made a strong start but had to settle for 3rd spot until Kenan Dole, sitting in 2nd, slid out of the race at turn three. Coates then started to close the gap to the leader,



Jack Davidson. Coates had strong pace setting the fastest lap on the third tour. He caught the leader and immediately began to attack but lost out as Davidson's defensive moves compromised Coates. The Graves Motorsport driver was the man on the move though, getting back to 2nd by lap five but again falling back to 3rd whilst dicing with Davidson. With three laps to go the top seven drivers were nose to tail and the leading pair ran wide exiting Stirling Bend. Coates seized the opportunity to take the lead and immediately began opening a gap which he then extended before taking the flag 1.932 seconds ahead of the competition. The result landed the Primex Plastics backed driver 5th in the 2021 MINI CHALLENGE UK Championship as well as the Graduate championship for drivers in their second year of competing in the series. Coates said "What a race to finish the year, that was so tough with cars in front and behind. It's great to reward the efforts of the Graves Motorsport team with this race win and also pay thanks to my sponsors who help me to continue my with my racing career. It's a clear statement of intent for what we can achieve next season which I am really looking forward to.'

Coates has already confirmed that he will continue in the MINI CHALLENGE UK next season with the same Graves Motorsport team. The championship will again support the British Touring Car Championship (BTCC) at seven events in 2022 in which the team will use the season to build into their intended debut season of the BTCC in 2023.
