

Happiness Hubs 2021

Spreading community spirit – Happiness Hubs 2021 grants launched Giving back to communities in County Durham and Darlington, a successful grant scheme is set to repeat its work of wonders. County Durham NHS Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG) and health and wellbeing charity Pioneering Care Partnership (PCP), are thrilled to relaunch the Happiness Hubs 2021 grants programme to offer community groups and organisations funding from a total of over £140,000.

The Happiness Hubs funding aims to provide safe spaces and activities for local adults to meet, make friends, talk and feel supported, with the ultimate goal to help people to live happier, healthier lives whilst promoting mental health and personal resilience. Sandra Roberts, Project Lead of Mental Health Services at PCP, said: "It is estimated that over 700 individuals have benefitted from the support these grants have provided directly into local communities so far. "PCP are proud to be delivering a diversity of support through the Happiness Hubs to veterans, new mothers, men and women, older people, young adults, people with learning disabilities, to name a few, and look forward to seeing what this year's grant holders will do with the funding available." The new grant scheme enables local community groups and organisations to apply for revenue grants of between £500 and £7,500 to fund projects lasting between 12 and 18 months.

The funding is part of County Durham CCG's commitment to Community Crisis Care Transformation delivery.

Dr Stewart Findlay, Chief Officer of NHS County Durham Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), said: "It has been amazing to see the impact this funding has had so far, despite the impact of COVID.

"Last year saw grants totalling over £85,000 given out, which was matched by a further £57,000 representing a real investment at community level in mental health support in County Durham and Darlington."

Grants from the Happiness Hubs can be used to launch or extend current projects, which will provide non-crisis mental health support.

Applications are now open for Happiness Hubs 2021 grants, with a cut off date for applications at midnight, Monday 3 January, 2022.

Applications will be reviewed by a panel in January 2022, with any applications received after this date to not be reviewed until March 2022

Police Carousel Training Sessions | Thank You

The Neighbourhood Police Team at Newton Aycliffe are in the process of rolling out Carousel Training Sessions to year 5 and 6 pupils in all Primary Schools across Newton Aycliffe. This is to supplement the enforcement action that is taking place around Anti-Social Behaviour, to educate young children around the consequences of taking part in such activity, and to protect young children from harm.

On Tuesday this week, some of the team spent the day at St. Francis School delivering sessions on ASB, Bullying, Online Safety and Crime and Consequences. We will add input around County lines at the next school. The pupils engaged amazingly well and as a reward, were visited by 'Jet and Ben' and received certificates.

Miss Cooper (Year 6 teacher) provided the following statement: "After initially seeming anxious and intimidated by the presence of the police, pupils engaged within a range of tasks from online safety to antisocial behaviours, and through this the children have grown and developed into members of society who understand and respect the role of the police within our local community. A wealth of information was shared in an age-appropriate and child-friendly way through quizzes, games, videos



and whole-group discussions. The officers shared their in-depth knowledge with pupils and answered questions brought up by the children in an appropriate manner ensuring that the information shared was answering the questions, without causing pupils any worry or concern. Both children and staff thoroughly enjoyed the whole day and would like to thank the team for their time and sharing their expertise".

Sgt. Boyd from the Neighbourhood Team stated "It is so important that we have the right mix of enforcement, engagement and education. On top of action that we are taking with partners to tackle ASB issues in Newton Aycliffe, we need to make sure that we are educating kids in schools around the consequences of being involved in such activity. We also recognise that these are crucial years for kids where they can be exposed to harmful influences, we really hope that the input we are providing will reduce potential risk. The kids at St. Joseph's were absolutely amazing and engaged so well, roll on Sugar Hill". We look forward to engaging with pupils at Sugar Hill Primary School which is our next location for this initiative.

(West Terrace, Aycliffe Village) (Temporary Road Closure) Order 2021

The Council proposes to make an Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act, 1984 as amended, Section 14 (1) to prohibit all vehicular traffic from proceeding on 70 metres of West Terrace that extends eastwards from its junction with A167, Aycliffe Village to enable new drainage connection works to be undertaken. Alternative route from the western side of the closure from A167 north and turning south easterly onto Durham Road leading to The Green and West Terrace to the eastern side of the closure, and vice versa. The maximum duration of the Order is 18 months. The proposed works are to commence on 6/12/21 from 8am and are anticipated to be completed in 6 days. On occasions, alternative dates for closure may be necessary and these will be signed accordingly.

St. Francis School Remembers | Historic Building to **Become School for Autistic Children**



The transformation of an historic building, into a new school for autistic children on Teesside, is 'bang on target' for a new year opening.

The disused Kiora Hall, in Norton, Stockton-on-Tees, is being given a new lease of life by the North East Autism Society (NEAS), which is investing around £1.3m in the site as part of the charity's expansion into the south of the region.

During his latest site visit, NEAS chief executive, John Phillipson, said: "We are thrilled with the progress, and it's exciting to think we are on the cusp of having the school up and running."

The official handover deadline is January 21 but Thornbrook Construction director, Ryan White, hopes that the development could be completed by Christmas.

"It's going extremely well, and everything is bang on target. It's such an interesting project because of the history of the building and it's fantastic to be able to put it back into such a positive use," said Mr

"The challenge is to try to retain the historic features while making it fit for purpose for the charity and, from everything we hear, people in the local community are over the moon that something so worthwhile is being done with the site."

Kiora Hall has had varied uses since it was built in 1902, including a family home, offices, an Army gun battery, youth club, school, and community centre. It was also used as an Italian prisoner of war camp during the war.

"We want this to be a place that the people of the Stockton area think of as their own," said Mr Phillipson. "It will not only become a school for autistic and neurodiverse children on Teesside, but our aim is to open it up for wider community use."

The development follows the opening of the charity's first school on Teesside. The Mackenzie Thorpe Centre, at South Bank, which recently celebrated its first anniversary. NEAS also operates a school in Sunderland, as well as a school and further education college in Newton Aycliffe.



On Thursday 11th of November, my first Remembrance event was at Teesside Airport with the Middleton St George Memorial Association at 11.00am. I then went to NETPark at Sedgefield where the Minister for Industry, Lee Rowley, was visiting CPI before then heading to Ferryhill to pass a Remembrance wreath to the Mayor to be laid on my behalf on Sunday. After taking Mrs H for a meal at the Impeccable Pig at Sedgefield, recently awarded AA Inn of the Year, I headed to Hopper House Brew Farm for a meeting with the NFU where I was provided with quite a list of areas of concern for me to follow up.

Friday was another full day, starting with a visit to Teesside Airport to meet some of the many businesses located there. These included Fairs-Lloyds Travel, a travel agent based at the Terminal Building and the International Fire Training Centre. I then headed to Jubilee Fields in Shildon to meet the team from Livin to see some of the regeneration plans they are implementing and I raised with them that we have areas in Aycliffe that need some attention too. After this it was back to Kromek at NETPark for a meeting with Peter Gibson, MP for Darlington, before heading to Ferryhill where I had a surgery for residents. Once this was completed, it was off to Darlington for the stronger Communities Awards hosted by Darlington Borough Council. As you may be aware, the Sedgefield constituency includes a number of wards from Darlington. Concert at Durham Cathedral.

After this service, I briefly joined the team at REME for a meal before going to Neasham for a service and then laying more wreaths at Hurworth, High Conniscliffe, Piercebridge and Middridge I then went to the Remembrance service at Trimdon Village which saw the end of an emotional few days.

The Earth is Dying, and Humans are Killing it

Dear Sir.

I think most people now accept that we are damaging our natural environment – poisoning the rivers, culling the forests, polluting the seas.

Meanwhile, although scientists squabble about actual numbers, they almost all agree that whole species of animals and plants are disappearing at a rate many times faster than at any moment in the earth's history since the Chicxulub asteroid crashed into the Gulf of Mexico 66 million years ago ... that we are witnessing an Extinction Level Event almost certainly caused by our ecocide. And this is before we even start to take into account the climate crisis starkly highlighted by the recent COP26 Conference in Glasgow.

JUST BLAH, BLAH, BLAH?

It is not true to assert that *nothing* good came out of the Conference. But it is hard to avoid the overall impression that the Conference's main achievement was (begrudgingly) to agree promises which almost keep the promises already made a decade ago in Paris ... and that, whilst it has been suggested that the Conference managed to place the 1.5°C target "on life support", what we can actually expect are continuing increases in emissions to 2030, and levels of global warming somewhere between alarming and catastrophic by 2050. It all seemed to be about fair words for the future, with no guarantees and nothing about action now. Indeed, the most memorable idea coming out of COP26 has been the argument that, to create the wealth needed to transition to a green economy, we have to continue using fossil fuels - an argument which future historians will consider ironic, if there are any historians left alive to consider

Perhaps the greatest disillusionment has been the realisation that our politicians are impotent to influence the free market economy – it has simply grown beyond their control. The biggest delegation at COP26 was the fossil fuel lobby. There are now 2,755 billionaires in the world (up 660 from 2020) whose collective wealth has grown 86% in the last year ... but we dare not tax either them or the mega-corporations – which in turn helps explain why one of the claimed 'successes' of the Conference was an announcement by the banks that they saw a green transition as an investment opportunity.

A DEADLY FAILURE?

To be fair, no national politicians could be expected to return home having agreed to job losses and energy crises consequent upon a not-yet-planned transition. What is unforgiveable, however, is that our Parliament is not, *NOW*:

- putting solar panels and battery storage into every building to reduce energy consumption (and cost);
- extending (and providing free) public transport to reduce traffic pollution; and
- extensively greening our cities and rewilding our countryside.

These are things for which we already possess the technology and means of funding ... all that lacks is the political will to act meaningfully.

Will humanity escape the Sixth Mass Extinction? I am increasingly despondent - our whole way of life is predicated on an economic model which is inexorably destroying the very narrow band of Nature which enables human existence. It will not come as a fiery apocalypse or a diluvian deluge. What I fear is social and political disintegration under the pressures of the cost of repairing infrastructure damaged by extreme weather events, of crop failures and goods shortages, of the consequent health & care issues, and of the accompanying international migrations and diplomatic tensions. Looking at the way things are going in the world at the moment, the worry is that these things may be upon us sooner than we would wish. John D Clare

2022/23 Town Council **Budget Setting** Consultation

The Town Council is in the process of developing its Revenue and Capital Budget for the 2022/23 financial year.

Clearly the budget that we set is important to our local community, both in terms of how our spending plans may impact on the provision of services and investment in assets for the benefit of the town, and in terms of the level of Council Tax that we need to raise from local taxpayers in order to fund these plans.

In overall terms, the Council is proposing a 2022/23 Budget that protects and maintains all of our current services next year. The Council is also maintaining some surplus resources in the budget which will allow it to replenish its balances and reserves. This will help ensure that we can continue to make capital investment in community assets such as our cemeteries. allotments, parks and play areas, for the benefit of the community, in the coming

In order to do so, the Council is proposing that it raises the Town Council proportion of the Council Tax bill by 1.99% next year. This increase is well below the current rate of inflation and, to achieve this, savings have been made across all budgets to limit the increase in the Town Council Tax element of the Council Tax bill to our local residents. This would increase the Town Council element of the Council Tax bill by £3.32 per year for the vast majority of local taxpayers i.e. those living in Band A properties. The Council appreciates that any increase in the monthly outgoings of our local taxpayers will not be popular in these difficult times. However, we hope you will agree that a monthly increase of 28p is a small price to pay to ensure that all the existing services provided by the Town Council can be protected for another year.

N.A.F.C. REPORT

Friday 12th November **Ebac Northern League Division One** Whickham 1 v Newton Aycliffe 0

It was a frustrating night for Newton Aycliffe at the First Mortgage Glebe Sports Ground as Brian Atkinson fell to a narrow defeat in his first game in charge of the club. A scrappy affair was settled in the 11th minute when Declan Bisset's whipped freekick evaded everyone in the penalty area, including goalkeeper Adam Pickford, for the only goal of the game.

Aycliffe dominated possession for large periods of the game and saw a penalty appeal, against the returning Ben Reay, waved away in the closing stages. But the Newtonian's were unable to find an equaliser against a resolute Lang Jacks backline including goalkeeper James Anderson who scooped the man of the match award.

Defeat leaves Aycliffe seventh in the Ebac Northern League Division One table having lost back-to-back games.

Atkinson made three changes to the Aycliffe starting XI who suffered a 1-0 reverse against West Allotment Celtic with Jack Naylor and Lewis Walton returning to the defence in place of Nick Green and Callum

Munro who missed out altogether. Liam Jarvie also missed out in Atkinson's squad as a returning Reay made his second debut for the club after joining from Crook Town in the week.

Adam Burnicle and Andrei Ardelean led the line for Aycliffe but it was the home side, unbeaten since the arrival of Tony Fawcett, who started brighter with Bisset testing Pickford with an early freekick from the left. Bisset was almost provider in the ninth minute when his corner from the right was met by Kieran Galbraith with the defender's header stopped on the line.

But the hosts did take the lead two minutes later after winning a freekick on the left midway inside the Aycliffe half which Bisset curled in and found the corner with nobody in the area from either team able to get a touch

The goal sparked Atkinson's side into life though as Aycliffe began to dominate possession as they pressed for an equaliser. And, Aycliffe saw appeals for a penalty waved away when Anderson clattered into the back of Ardelean when trying to collect a Joe Ferguson freekick, only for the referee to award the Lang Jacks stopper the decision. Anderson sent a long ball forward from the resulting freekick and it bounced between the Aycliffe lines to find Scott Jasper who had a clear run at goal from the right, but was denied by a smart save from Pickford. Ferguson tested Anderson on the half hour mark from range before Marc Costello almost capitalised on a fumble from the Whickham number one, but he couldn't generate enough power in his follow-up.

The lively Reay was next to try his luck when recycling an Aycliffe corner as he stung the palms of Anderson.

Zak Atkinson latched onto a long clearance

to flash just wide of Pickford's post before Burnicle fizzed an effort just wide for the Newtonian's who trailed at the break. Ferguson tried his luck from range again early in the second half before Burnicle this time hit the target from inside the area only for Anderson to parry away.

Jake Petitjean called Anderson into action once more, just after the hour, with a dipping freekick from outside the area as Atkinson's Avcliffe continued to look the more likely. Scott Robson brought a good save out of Pickford in a rare second half attack for the Lang Jacks as the game began to open up in the final 20 minutes.

Atkinson flashed wide as the home side

threatened on the break before substitute

Ben Dibb-Fuller sent his effort narrowly over the bar from the edge of the area. And then came the moment of controversy in the final stages, as Reay latched onto Ferguson's lofted ball and looked to have gotten the better of Lang Jacks defender Galbraith, before going down, but the referee remained unmoved as the home side held on, to record a narrow victory and condemn Atkinson to defeat in his first game in charge.
